GRANT PROPOSAL - CULTURAL AFFAIRS/DISTINGUISHED LECTURE SERIES Wintertime

Nov. 3-12, 2006

Charles Mee's *Wintertime* is an unusual piece, one of his re-creations of ancient plays. Mee believes firmly that nothing is original—Shakespeare borrowed from the Greeks, modern entertainment borrows from Shakespeare. He pulls together disparate elements from past theatrical works and meshes them with contemporary aspects, creating a play that is contemporary but never strays from its historical roots. As such, *Wintertime* is, by Mee's own description, "a sweet, dreamy, romantic comedy from the world of *The Winter's Tale* and *The Cherry Orchard* and Molière and Magritte."

In all of his plays, Mee creates provocative situations and characters that may make conventional theatre-goers uneasy. He does not write political plays that merely propel any specific liberal agenda. Rather, Mee takes a larger, contextual view of these characters, and, in so doing, he points out the ills of the society in which they live and suffer. Furthermore, Mee's range of character types is, perhaps, more representative and up-to-date regarding the current college campus demographic and speaks more directly to them than do most traditional dramas that are produced in conventional theatre departments.

Thus, it also demands that the audience appreciate the show in a different manner than that required of traditional theatre. This play provides a unique opportunity to college students, demanding new approaches, stretching their abilities, and challenging their assumptions about performance and theatre.

Tom Mikotowicz, who has chosen to direct *Wintertime*, was intrigued by the play because "it stretches the bounds of performance, time, and space with new uses of realism." He likes the fact that this playwright's work is performed by all major theatre companies that perform serious classical works.

Ten people will perform in the production, which calls for modest demands in terms of set and costumes.

He was intrigued by the play because he felt it stretched the bounds of performance, time, and space with new uses of realism. This play provided a unique opportunity to students, demanding new approaches, stretching their abilities, and challenging their assumptions about performance and theatre. It also demanded that the audience appreciate the show in a different manner than that required of traditional theatre.

More than 20 people were involved on and off-stage to produce the play, which called for modest demands in terms of set and costumes. A total of 1065 people saw the production.
