TOWN WARRANT

To Ernest H. Allen, a Constable in the Town of North Yarmouth in the County of Cumberland.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of North Yarmouth, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Grange Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, A. D., 1966, at one o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on articles numbered 1 through 2, and to notify and warn said voters to meet at the Grange Hall, in said town on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, A. D., 1966, at seven o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on articles numbered 3 through 48; all said article being set out below, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect all necessary Town Officers by secret ballot.

The polls for voting on articles 1 through 2 will be open at one o'clock in the afternoon and will close at seven o'clock in the afternoon.

Art. 3. To see if the Town of North Yarmouth will accept the building code as posted in the warrant to replace the present building code or take any action thereon.

BUILDING CODE

Town of North Yarmouth, Maine

In order to promote the general welfare, prevent disease, promote health and provide for the public safety, the Town of North Yarmouth enacts the following ordinance regulating and governing the design, construction, alteration, demolition and moving of all buildings and structures and their service equipment, and parking facilities for trailers, in the Town of North Yarmouth.

Be it ordained by the Town of North Yarmouth as follows:

Section 1.

This ordinance shall be known as the Building Code of the Town of North Yarmouth.

Section 2.

A Building Inspector and alternate and an Electrical Inspector and alternate shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a period of one year beginning April 1st. The Building Inspector shall also act as the Heating Inspector.

Section 3.

An appeal may be taken from any order issued from the Building Inspector, or from his refusal to grant a permit, to the municipal officers in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 90-A, Sec. 3 IV, C (5) of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended.

Section 4. Definitions

PERSON or PERSONS — any firm, corporation, architect, engineer, contractor, builder, sub-contractor, foreman, plumber, carpenter, electrician, employee.

Section 5.

(a) Any person, before constructing, altering, demolishing, or moving any dwelling house or other building, shall first make application on a form provided by the Building Inspector, signed by the applicant, to the Building Inspector for a permit to do the same. The issuance of a permit by the Building Inspector is a condition precedent to such construction, alteration, demolition or moving.

(b) Any person, before installing or altering any wiring, shall apply to the Electrical Inspector for an electrical permit.

(c) Any person before installing any centralized heating system shall apply to the Building Inspector for a heating permit.

(d) No permit shall be issued which will allow or permit a violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

(e) The failure of the Inspector, to whom application is made to issue a permit or a written notice of his decision directed to the applicant within 30 days from the date of filing of the application, constitutes a refusal of the permit.

(f) The Building Inspector and the Electrical Inspector and their alternates shall be given free access at reasonable hours to all parts of structures regulated by this ordinance.

Section 6.

All dwellings for human habitation shall have a minimum foundation area of five hundred (500) square feet.

Section 7.

All dwellings shall have a minimum of eight inch (8") masonry wall foundation which shall protrude below the frost line; in any event not less than thirty-six inches (36") below the finished grade.

Section 8.

All dwellings shall have a water supply, connected to such buildings, and an electrical system to comply with the State of Maine code, all sanitation systems connected and operating and plumbing inspection completed before occupancy.

Section 9.

All buildings to be used for human habitation shall have adequate sewerage either connected to town-accepted or maintained sewers where available, or to a masonry cesspool with a masonry top-cover of no less than six inches (6") throughout and re-inforced by steel throughout, or to septic tanks, with a minimum size of five hundred (500) gallons for either.

Section 10.

(a) No buildings or outbuildings shall be built any closer than twenty feet (20') to any side lot line.

(b) No buildings or outbuildings shall be erected any closer than sixty-five feet (65') from the center of the road-bed, unless adjoining building set-backs are more than sixty-five feet (65'), in which event, such buildings shall be in line with existing buildings.

(c) Each resident lot shall have a minimum size of 150'x150'. When on a water or sewage line, frontage of a lot may be reduced to 120'. However, lot must be a minimum of 20,000 square feet.

(d) On clay soil, lot shall not be less than one (1) acre in size.

Section 11.

All buildings for human habitation shall have a masonry constructed, lined chimney, or a prefabricated chimney approved by Fire Underwriters.

Section 12.

All buildings must have a fire resistant roof.

Section 13.

No building constructed, altered, or moved may be used or occupied until and unless a certificate of use has been obtained from the Building Inspector.

Section 14.

In addition to all the provisions and sections of this ordinance, the Building Inspector shall be hereby authorized and empowered by Chapter 97, Sec. 10 through 20, inclusively, of the Revised Statutes of Maine for 1954, and all acts ammendatory thereof and additional thereto.

Section 15.

(a) This ordinance does not effect existing structures or construction, alteration, demolition, or moving which has already commenced, but it shall be effective for any new construction, alteration, demolition, or moving of any building which is undertaken after the effective date of this regulation, even though such building was in existence on the effective date of this ordinance.

(b) No building permit or renewal thereof granted hereunder shall be valid unless the work for which it is issued is commenced within six (6) months from the date of issue or renewal, and the work is completed within eighteen (18) months from the issuance of permit or renewal, provided that the Building Inspector may allow a greater period for the completion of said work.

Section 16.

(a) All dwellings shall comply with the National Building Code on construction.

(b) All dwellings and public buildings shall comply with the State of Maine Electrical Code on wiring.

Section 17. Unsafe Buildings: Vacated, Removed or Made Safe

(a) When a building or structure or any portion thereof is found unsafe upon inspection of the Building Inspector, he shall order such building or structure or any portion thereof to be made safe or taken down or removed. The term unsafe building or structure or portion thereof shall include buildings or structures or portions thereof structurally unsafe; unstable, constituting a fire hazard; unsuitable or improper for the use or occupancy to which they are put; constituting a hazard to health or safety because of inadequate maintenance, delapidation, obsolescence or abandonment; or otherwise dangerous to life or property.

(b) When a building or structure or portion thereof is in an unsafe condition so that life is endangered thereby, the building official may order and require the inmates and occupants to vacate the same forthwith.

Section 18.

(a) When any person complains, in writing, to the Building Inspector, that this ordinance is being violated, it is the duty of the Building Inspector to examine forthwith the condition of the violation.

(b) When any violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be found to exist, whether said violation is discovered after complaint, or by the Building Inspector on his own initiative, the Building Inspector shall forthwith give notice to such violation to the owner of the premises on which the violations occurs, and shall state in writing such changes as he shall deem necessary to remove the violation and bring the situation into conforming with the provisions of this ordinance. It shall be unlawful for any owner not to conform to such orders of the Building Inspector within the time set forth in such order. Such notice may be served by causing a true copy thereof to be delivered by mail, or handed to such owner, or left at the place of residence,

or at his usual place of business in said town, or if the owner cannot be located, by posting notice in a conspicuous place on the premises, the use of which is in violation of this ordinance. If such owner does not conform to the orders of the Building Inspector within the time set forth in the notice, the Building Inspector shall so inform the municipal officers who shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by applying for an injunction or other legal action shall be taken in the name of the Town.

(c) Any person or person owning or having control of any building or premises or part thereof, who violated any of the provisions of this ordinance, or who fails to conform to any of the provisions thereof, or who fails to obey any order of any officer charged with the enforcement to the provisions of this ordinance or any person or persons who shall assist in the violation of this ordinance, or of any order or permit issued hereunder, upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each day such violation or failure to comply continues after notification thereof shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 19.

This ordinance may be amended or modified and its regulations changed by the affirmative vote of a majority, and may be repealed by two-thirds (2/3) majority of the electors of the town voting by written or printed ballot at a regular or special town meeting, legally warned, called and conducted, provided that the statutory provisions are fully complied with.

Section 20.

(a) Should any section or part thereof, of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not effect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof which is valid than the part so declared.

(b) All ordinances and parts or ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, but only to the extent of such conflict.

Section 21.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.

Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 7. To fix compensation of Town Officers.

Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commissioner for a term of five years.

Art. 9. To elect one ore more Fire Wards, designate one as inspector and fix compensation.

Art. 10. To elect four members to serve on the Budget Committee for three years.

Art. 11. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Roads for the ensuing year.

S. 1954.

Budget Committee Recommends **Dismiss**

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Public Health Nursing in North Yarmouth, said sum to be expended by the Department of Health and Welfare for local services.

Budget Committee Recommends **\$100.00**

Art. 26. To choose a Director of Civil Defense, and see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the program.

Budget Committee Recommends **\$25.00**

Art. 27. To elect a Trustee of the North Yarmouth Water District to serve for three years.

Art. 28. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to take from the Town Surplus to apply against years appropriations.

Art. 29. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Dump.

Budget Committee Recommends **Leave Open**

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on taxes or take any action thereon.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when taxes for 1966 shall be paid.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond for the ensuing year.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer on behalf of the Town to sell or dispose of any estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes as they deem advisable and execute quitclaim deeds for same.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to procure temporary loans in anticipation

of taxes, for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town, such loans to be paid during the current year from money raised during said municipal year, by taxes.

Art. 36. To see what amount of money the Town will raise or appropriate to pay its share of the cost of the Social Security Plan as provided for in Chapter 65 of the R. S. of 1954.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will accept the following amendment to the building code:

All dwellings shall have a minimum of eight inch (8") masonry wall foundation which shall protrude below the frost line; in any event not less than thirty-six inches (36") below the finished grade.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will accept the following amendment to the building code:

All buildings to be used for human habitation shall have adequate sewerage either connected to town-accepted or maintained sewers where available, or to a masonry cess-pool with a masonry top-cover of no less than six inches (6") throughout and re-inforced by steel throughout, or to septic tanks, with a minimum size of five hundred (500) gallons for either.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will accept the following amendment to the building code:

All buildings for human habitation shall have a masonry constructed, lined chimney, or a prefabricated chimney approved by Fire Underwriters.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will accept the following amendment to the building code:

All dwellings shall comply with the National Building Code on construction.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to be used for the installation and maintenance of street lights at several dangerous intersections and other places deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

In accordance with your request, we have audited the records of the Town of North Yarmouth, for the municipal year ended December 31, 1964, as required by Title 30, Section 5253 of the Revised Statutes of 1954.

This examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards that pertain to governmental accounting, and included all procedures which were considered necessary in the circumstances. Within the scope of the examination, the financial affairs of the Town appear to have been administered in a proper and efficient manner.

The results of the audit are disclosed in the exhibits and schedules embodied in this report and fairly present the financial position of the Town of North Yarmouth, and the results of its operations for the municipal year ended December 31, 1964.

COMMENTS

CASH

The Cash Balance, as noted in the Balance Sheet, was reconciled with the bank statement, and a written confirmation of the balance was made.

UNCOLLECTED TAXES

A percentage of the uncollected taxes, as shown on the collector's records at December 31, 1964, and unpaid tax liens, were verified by written confirmation with the taxpayers.

GENERAL

The procedure for keeping the municipal records of the town officers was examined, and found to be adequate, and in compliance with the General Laws of the State of Maine, as approved by the State Department of Audit.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

This audit was made as required by the State Department of Audit, Title 30, Section 2203 of the General Laws of 1964.

Records were checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. The system of internal control was reviewed as to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. External verifications on a test basis, were utilized to determine the correctness of recorded Assets and Liabilities.

Receipts, vouchers and cancelled checks were examined for a selected period. Bond and insurance coverages were examined. Excise tax collections for a selected period, were verified with copies of the receipts retained by the Tax Collector. The Trust Fund Investments were physically verified.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Your public health nurse, a member of the staff of the Division of Public Health Nursing, provided public health nursing service in North Yarmouth during 1965.

The public health nurse's function in direct service includes evaluation of the home for adequacy of care, provision of nursing care, evaluation of rehabilitative prospects, and instruction to patient and family in order to insure continuity of nursing care. When the function involves treatment or preventive measures, the nurse works under the direction of a physician.

Home visits were made to all age groups, including the school age children, who are under the medical care programs sponsored by the State Crippled Children's Service and to those under medical supervision who need skilled nursing care.

The public health nurse continued to participate in the child health conference program, sponsored by the North Yarmouth Health Council.

The following number of children were given physical examinations and immunized:

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

In accordance with the requirements of the laws of the State of Maine, I herewith submit the annual report and financial statement of the North Yarmouth School System for the fiscal year 1965. This will be the last report submitted for the North Yarmouth Annual Report. In the future an annual report for the district will be prepared and made available to all the citizens of the two towns.

At last, the realization of a dream begun eight years ago has developed. North Yarmouth is a member of a School Administrative District along with Cumberland. For the very first time North Yarmouth has a voice in the secondary education of its pupils; in addition to this, the elementary program can be greatly improved through providing more instructional aids and maintaining smaller classes. A tremendous debt of gratitude is due your School Committee and to those citizens who helped prepare the final report.

This year the eighth grade has been attending the junior high school in Cumberland. They have benefited significantly from this experience, and both the 7th and 8th grades will be at the junior high school next year. Having the 8th grade

in Cumberland permitted the sub-primary to return to the Memorial School from the Vestry.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

At the beginning of the year all children's eyes and ears were tested and if any defects were found, the parents were notified. This year the "Tine" test was given for tuberculosis in the seventh and sub-primary grades. This is a test given on the skin, and if a re-active is found, it is followed up with a chest X-ray. The percentage of children having this test was high.

Immunization clinics for diptheria, whooping cough and tetanus were held in March, April and May with Dr. Barron McIntire in attendance. At the May clinic, smallpox vaccinations were also given and a booster of tetanus was offered to seventh grade pupils.

In September, dental clinic started with Dr. Kenneth Bunnell as dentist. This clinic lasted six weeks, one forenoon a week, for children in the seventh and fifth grades. Due to limited time and supplies, children having their own dentist are urged to go to him. In December, physical examinations were given in grades seven, five, three and one by the school physician, Dr. McIntire. If any defect was found, the parent was notified. Also, Flu shots were offered to teachers and school personnel in December. Some home visits have been made this past year, and clinic appointments set up.

At this time, I wish to thank members of Health Council and parents who have assisted with these clinics.

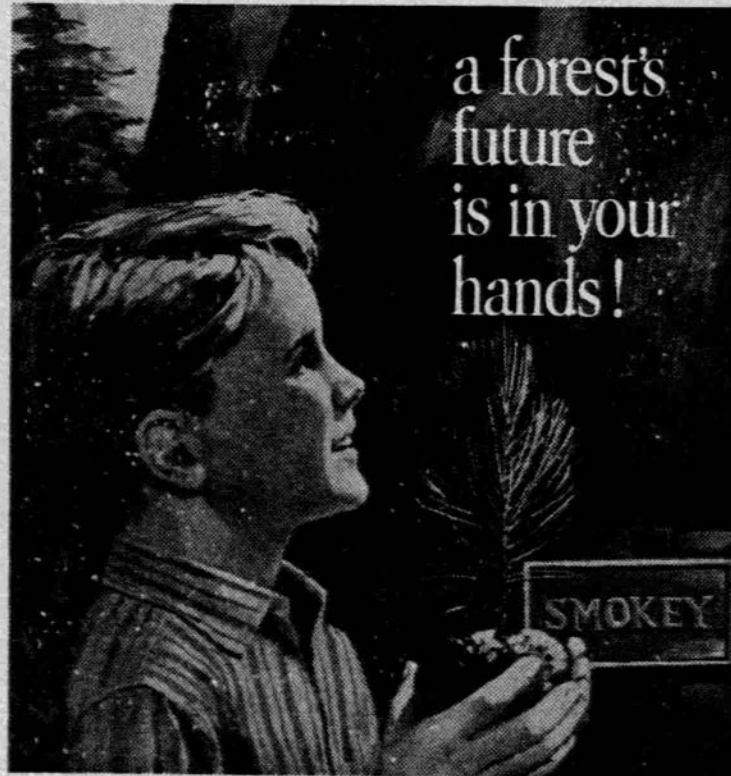
