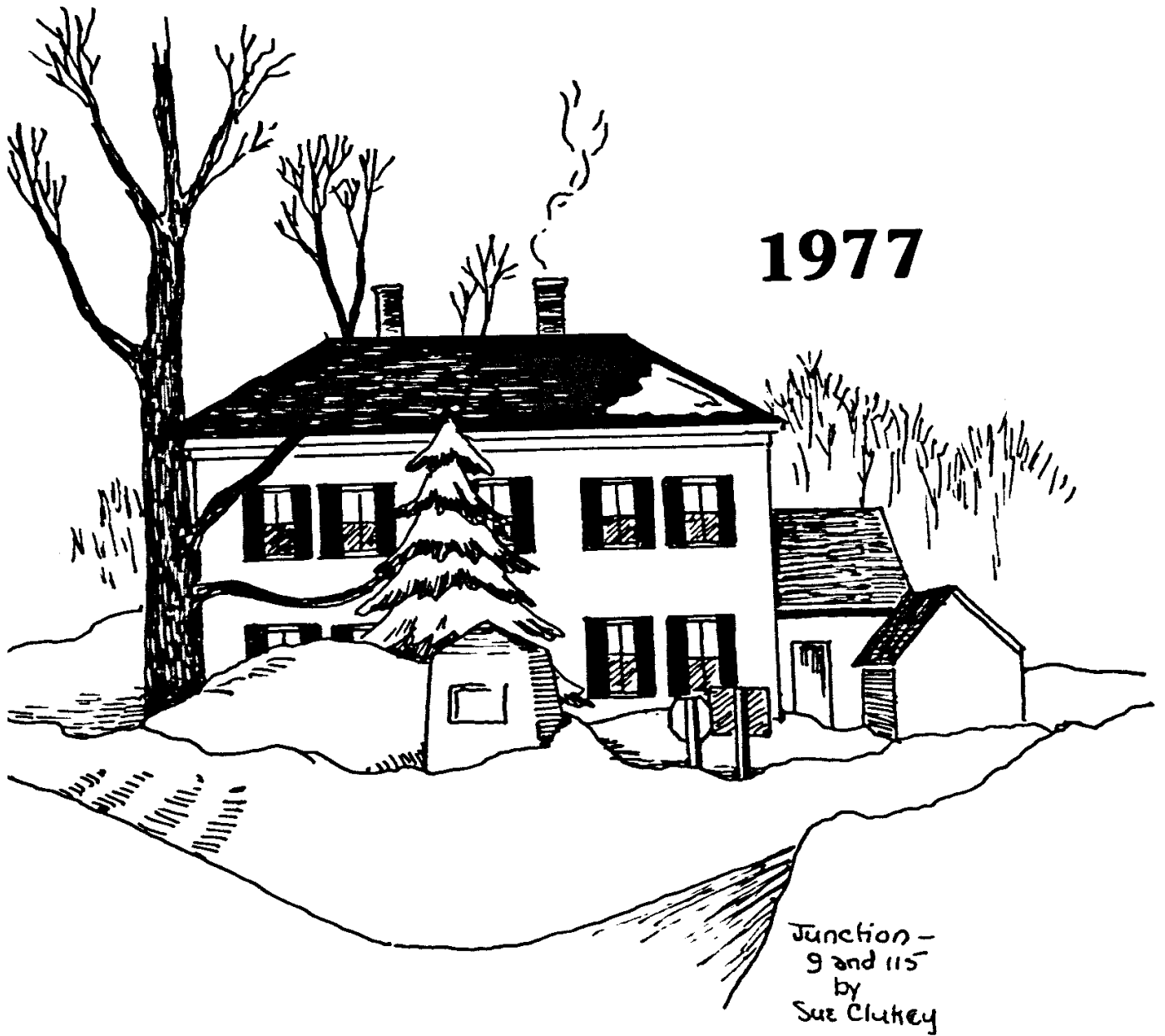

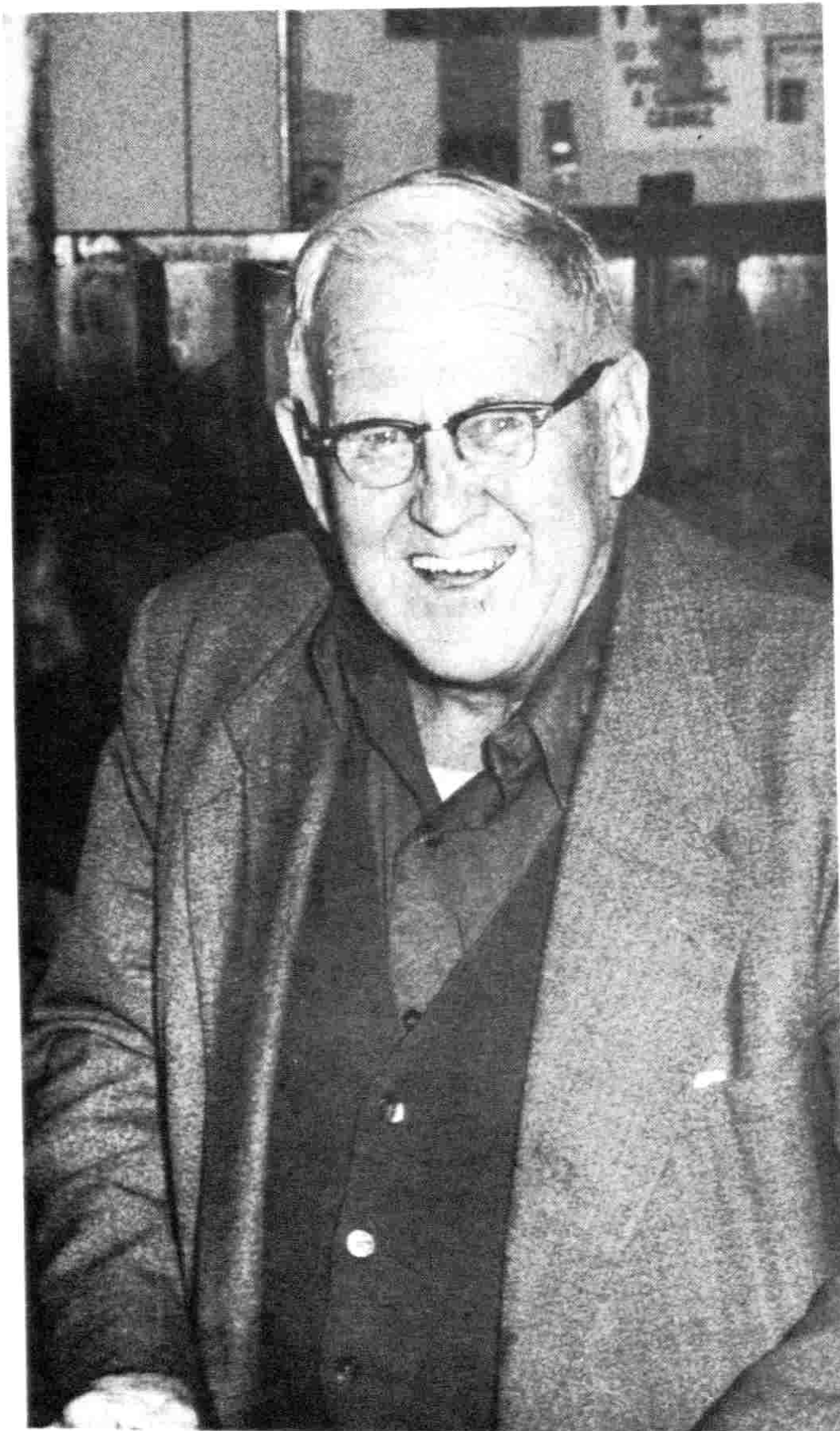

Born in Pownal, Maine, August 17, 1892, Mr. Knight was educated in Pownal in a one room school house, worked a three year apprenticeship in Boston, to learn the steam fitters trade, and worked as a fireman for five years on the Boston & Albany Railroad, before returning to Maine at about the age 25.

He's lived in this area ever since, working first with his father, hauling granite, and for many years owned and operated saw mills. Mr. Knight cut and sawed the lumber for the North Yarmouth Memorial School.

Mr. Knight's contributions to North Yarmouth range from such things as serving on numerous Town Committees, The North Yarmouth School District, getting articles passed in the Legislature, to rounding up a group of youngsters to clean up Memorial Park.

For years Mr. Knight has been a living example of the spirit and involvement that has caused North Yarmouth to prosper and grow.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1977 In Review

1977 was an expensive and eventful year for our Town. Town Meeting was followed by two days of heavy rain that resulted in extensive flooding and road damage. Route 115, Mill Road, Hascall Road, Sweetser Road and The Lane were particularly hard hit. Most of the Spring and early Summer was spent repairing this damage. The Town Truck Committee and Fire Truck Committee completed their work by May, with the new Town Truck in service by late June, and hopefully, the new Fire Truck will be ready for service this summer.

Welfare continued to be a monumental headache. State and Federal laws are rapidly removing local control over welfare expenditures, the results are becoming very expensive.

The Town Dump made news again this year. All Maine communities are required to convert from an open dump operation to a sanitary landfill type of operation by July 1, 1977. To comply with this regulation a considerable amount of work and expense was incurred by the town. In September the town was notified by the Department of Environmental Protection that we were in violation of certain solid waste laws and regulations which would result in the immediate closing of our dump. We were ordered to appear before the D.E.P. Governing Board to answer these charges. Two meetings were held with D.E.P. Representatives. After the dust had settled from these meetings the town had agreed to make minor changes in the dump site and D.E.P. had agreed to drop the charges against the town. A number of towns people were instrumental in resolving this issue, with special thanks to Bob Anderson, Randy Verrill, and Rod Megquire. Support was also obtained from Senator David Huber, Representative Patrick Jackson, and the Pownal Selectmen.

Revamping of the Town office was completed this year, with fresh paint and some new drapes. We feel that the alterations and reorganization have resulted in a pleasant and more business like atmosphere. In October we received C.E.T.A. funds to hire a secretary for the office. She has already completed several major projects with many more to be done. Her position is only temporary and the Town will be asked to fund a permanent part-time secretary beginning in July of this year.

The Planning Board has spent many long hours preparing a Zoning Ordinance for your consideration this year. They have produced a very simple and compact document that deserves your careful and thoughtful attention. We hope you will attend the Public Hearings they will be holding so that you may be well informed as to the details and significance of their proposal.

The Highway Department Study Committee has been working since Town Meeting and will be offering various alternatives for the future of the Highway Department.

The Town is currently involved in a legal suit, whereby the Town is being sued for damaging and polluting property by using road salt while maintaining Route 115 and Route 231. The suit appears to be a result of unclear laws as to the liability of the Town or the State on a State-Aid-Highway. Further details will be available at Town Meeting involving this issue.

We would again like to remind all of the citizens of North Yarmouth of their obligation to participate in the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting is intended to be a meeting of all the citizens of the Town to discuss and resolve the problems and issues of the Town. We hope that you will take time from your busy schedules and make a special effort to vote on Friday, March 10, and to attend the meeting on Saturday, March 11th. For the first time, polls will be open on Friday for 13 hours from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM at the Town Office. The Saturday meeting will begin at 9:00 AM and will be held this year at the North Yarmouth Memorial School.

Special thanks go to the men and women of North Yarmouth that served on the Boards, Committees, and Commissions throughout the year. They provide the leadership and service that is the backbone of Town Government.

We look forward to seeing you at Town Meeting.

REPORT OF THE ROAD COMMISSIONER

The past year was one of several bad storms, accounting for a large part of the highway budget. From January until Town Meeting, for snow roads, \$27,700.00, including town equipment costs; then an additional expense of \$2,677.80, from storm damage and flooding, right after Town Meeting; and \$1,500.00 late in summer for paving, resulting from the same storm. (Mill and Hascall Roads) At a special Town Meeting we were allowed to use, from Revenue Sharing, up to \$2,000.00 for this repair.

For winter roads in December 1977, one payroll was exceptionally high due to ice, overtime, and an increase in salt price (\$10./ton) There was unexpected repair to the grader's hydraulic system, and the price of cutting edge, too, is in orbit.

Several culverts were replaced and several more are in bad condition. In all, about \$2,300.00 for culverts, machinery, gravel and labor.

Due to added costs, just one resurfacing job was done: Deer Run Road, at \$2,900.00 by Durham Paving, for shimming and a one-inch coating of hot top, making a much better job than tarring. We used three mixes of patch along with several tons from Warren Brothers.

After several telephone calls, a sweeper was found at Topsham, who proved much better, and at a lower cost, than we've had in the past.

Revenue sharing was started late due to waiting for a backhoe and the right gravel, which is becoming scarce. It worked well, for the winter crew was used on part of it; Sweetser Road, 510' and Royal Road 1300', with just over \$5,000.00 spent. Our men are now cutting brush on Royal and Mountford Roads, when not caring for winter roads.

Due to changing the dump to land-fill, there was extensive ditching and cutting banks at the dump, and much of this was charged to town roads.

Repair of washed out shoulders on Edna Lane and Delwin Drive on Walnut Hill Heights, was done with rocks and clayfill. We hope this will hold longer than the work done previously.

The new highway truck was used about 600 hours in 1977, saving hiring one for that amount of time. It has been a tremendous help, used for every job since it was ready in May. We were lucky to get it early, as there were some small problems that had to be worked out.

There are several projects needing attention in 1978, including tarring of the new Revenue Sharing roads built last year. But perhaps the most urgent is a section of Mill Road from Gene Gagnon's to Robert Dorr's, which the wet year has made a shambles, due to no drainage and heavy traffic. Many trucks use it because the railroad bridge on Rt. 231 is posted at five tons.

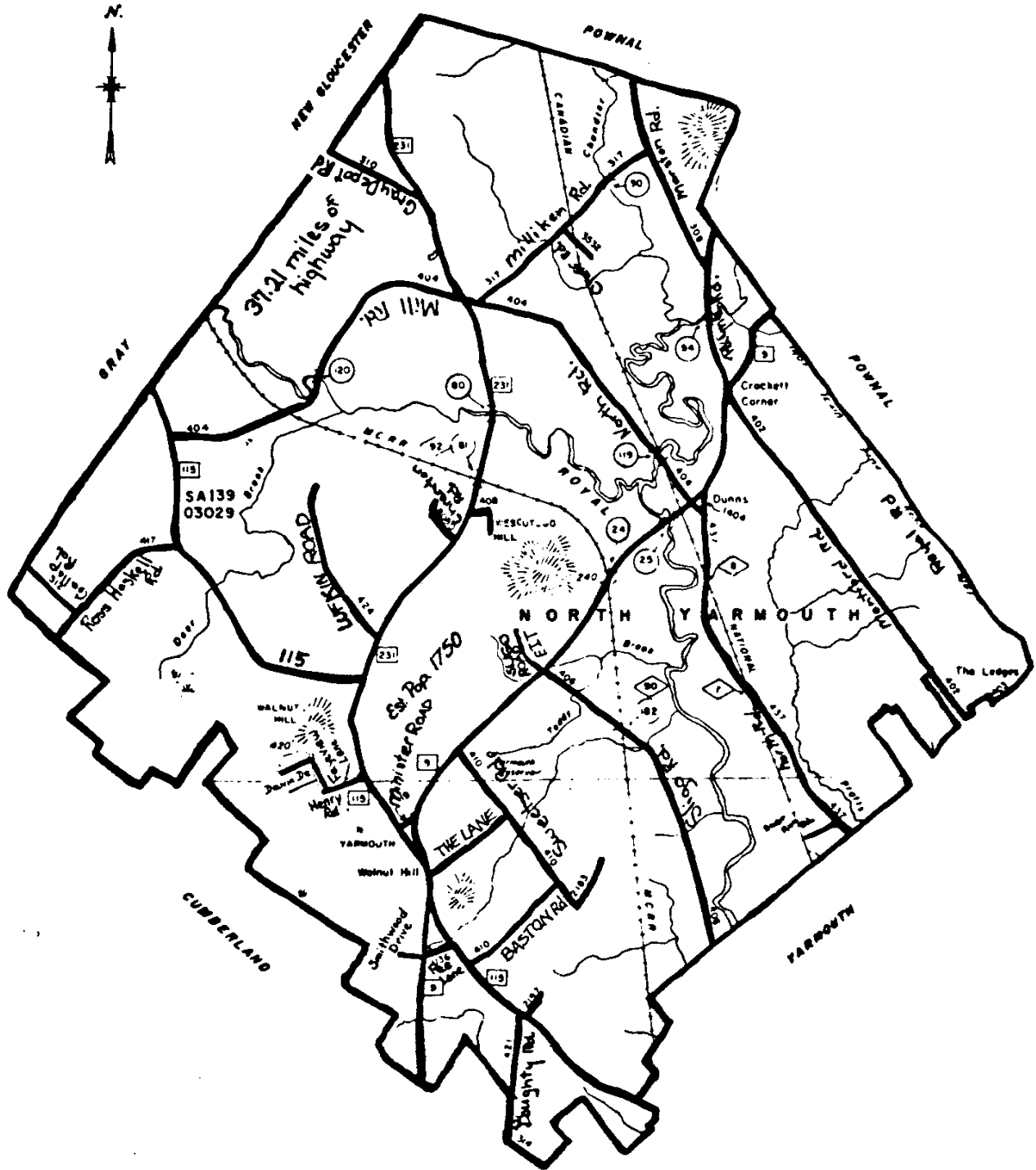

REPORT OF THE NORTH YARMOUTH WATER DISTRICT

We replaced 650 feet of 3/4" water lines on Pea Lane with new 8" water main together with a hydrant. The old line was no longer adequate to serve the needs of four houses on this road.

You water district has not increased its rates since 1968. During that period almost the entire system has been renewed, resulting in substantially lower fire insurance rates on any structure within 1,000 feet of a hydrant. The price that we pay Portland Water District for water has more than doubled during this period. It will be necessary to increase rates during 1978 to cover these higher operating costs.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

During the past year, the Recreation Committee attended all the meetings of the Cumberland Recreation Department, of which North Yarmouth participates. REPORT OF THE NORTH YARMOUTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The North Yarmouth Conservation Commission met eight times during 1977. Edward Vogeler was chairperson.

Forty-six trees were planted through the 1977 Shade Tree Planting Program, and the eight trees that did not survive the winter from the 1976 program were replaced. A follow-up maintenance program of pruning and fertilizing—assuring the trees a good start—will be conducted by the Town Tree Warden, William Young, in the spring. A tree planting program will not be sponsored by the Commission in 1978.

The Eleanor Hayes Town Forest located on the Memorial Highway, Rt. 9, is being thinned out. This is being done with a team of oxen and small tractors so as not to bruise or damage the standing trees. The Pine section of trees has been thinned out and the Spruce part is in the same process now. The State Forester is overseeing this harvesting project, which should be completed by spring. To date, the Commission has been paid for 549 cord of wood, totaling \$1,098.00, which will be used for future Conservation Commission projects.

A litter drive was sponsored by the Commission on Saturday, April 30, 1977. The State Department of Transportation furnished us with many trash bags. Some of the roads in town were cleaned up, but due to the poor turn-out of volunteers, the entire town road system couldn't be covered. The saddest thing about the clean-up was to drive on a road that the litter had been picked up on the week before, and see how quickly it was accumulating again.

REPORT OF THE NORTH YARMOUTH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

To those of us who have had the responsibility for master-minding the work of our Historical Society it sometimes seems that progress is maddeningly slow. However, preparatory to writing this report I read through the Secretary's Record, starting with 1974. Two facts stand out clearly. First, a small core group of workers, without whom nothing much would have been accomplished. Second, the current status of our on-going research and preservation in accordance with the aims of our Society as stated in the by-laws. . . "To collect and preserve data, articles and specimens illustrative and demonstrative of the way of life in former times in our area and to perpetuate the memory of those who contributed to our history; also to publish, or cause to be published, a history of North Yarmouth and surrounding area."

To be specific:

Our collaboration with New Hampshire Publishing Co. resulted in the facsimile edition of *Old Times of North Yarmouth, Maine*. Had we not given our assurance that a reprint would be financially feasible they would not have undertaken the project. As a 'thank-you' to us they are allowing us to sell copies at a very low price to genealogists and bona fide members of nearby historical societies.

About the same time that the reprint was in the planning stage, the North Yarmouth Births, Deaths, Marriages, & Marriage Intentions 1720 - 1850 were photocopied by the Editor of the Mayflower Quarterly Magazine of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. This was done with the permission of the Selectmen and Town Clerk. I was present to represent the Historical Society. I told them about *Old Times*, also that I had made a compilation of burials copied from stones in near-by cemeteries. The upshot of this was that I would make arrangements whereby Mrs. Sherman could obtain a copy of *Old Times* from N. H. Pub. Co. for review in the Mayflower Quarterly, and that I would contribute my cemetery gleanings to be added to the North Yarmouth Vital Statistics when published. The November, 1977 issue of the Mayflower Quarterly contains a very enthusiastic review of *Old Times* ending with the announcement that in another year the Rhode Island Mayflower Society hopes to publish a complementary volume containing the gravestone records and North Yarmouth Vital Statistics, which have already been indexed by the Oregon

Society. Their interest in our history and vital statistics, is, of course, due to the large number of descendants of early Plymouth, Mass. families who moved up the coast to Yarmouth, Maine. The Mayflower Quarterly has a world-wide circulation, so our history-spreading effort has been given a real boost.

We have a very busy group of people presently working on the huge project of researching every house built prior to 1900. Edmund Hall keeps the record sheets up to date. Many people have spent hours in the Registry of Deeds and other places where information may be dug out. Elizabeth Woodward has presented us with some very interesting old maps of the town, made by early surveyors. Some of these have been traced off on mylar and will be duplicated for use of interested people. A good size group of people meets the first Sunday of every month at 7:30 in the Municipal Building to share new information. Anyone interested is welcome to attend and contribute. Our first meeting of the fall was in the Old Town House, but that proved too cool for winter.

As to the Old Town House, a great deal remains to be done but we have more than accomplished our objectives for the first year. As spring approaches, work days will be scheduled once more. Anyone wanting to volunteer may contact Mr. or Mrs. Richard Baston. A log book is being kept, giving credit where due, and including pictures, as our contribution to future history.

A nice addition to our social history is the collection of Journals kept by Henry Sweetser for many years of his adult life. His home was Toddy Brook Farm. Edith Atkins had the Journals and her heirs have graciously donated them to our Historical Society with the proviso that they may borrow them back for reading.

We are still providing workers for the tremendous chore of re-organizing the vault and up-grading the care of records. It has been nearly impossible to make much headway in such an over-crowded and over-heated closet. However, progress has been made regarding it. Ursula Baier has held many consultations with experts on care of valuable records at the Maine Historical Society, Maine Archives, Portland Public Library, New England Society for the Preservation of Antiquities and other knowledgeable people. Some clearing out of extraneous articles has been made, with more planned for, and a definite order for shelving, containers, etc. prepared, waiting

only for the funding. Historical Society labor is volunteered, but cash must come from the Town.

COMMENTS

CASH:

The cash balance, as noted in the Balance Sheet, was reconciled with the bank statement, and a written confirmation of the balance was made.

UNCOLLECTED TAXES:

A percentage of the uncollected taxes, as shown on the collector's records at December 31, 1977, and unpaid tax liens, were verified by written confirmation with the taxpayers.

GENERAL:

The procedure for keeping the municipal records of the town officers was examined, and found to be adequate, and in compliance with the General Laws of the State of Maine, as approved by the State Department of Audit.

SCOPE OF AUDIT:

Records were checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. The system of internal control was reviewed as to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. External verifications, on a test basis, were utilized to determine the correctness of recorded Assets and Liabilities.

Receipts, vouchers and cancelled checks were examined for a selected period. Bond and insurance coverages were examined. Excise tax collections for a selected period were verified with copies of the receipts retained by the Tax Collector. The Trust Fund Investments were physically verified.

We have examined the U. S. Government Revenue Sharing Funds for the year ended December 31, 1977 and the results are set forth in this report.
