DEDICATION

It is with pride that this Town Report is dedicated to all those who have made 1980 a year for the entire Town of North Yarmouth to celebrate and remember. We will remember the Winter Festival, The Olde Town Meeting, the costumes, the parades, the endless hours of preparation, the cannons, the horses, the meals—oh, those wonderful meals, the displays, the fire engines, the antiques, the special guests, the afternoon program, and those marvelous fireworks in the evening. For many of us it was a celebration that was emotional as well as educational and relaxing. A special year for a special town.

Sadly, however, 1980 was also a year of loss to our town. The passing of Lincoln J. Merrill in 1980 and in early 1981 the loss of Phillip Knight has left the town with the knowledge that their lives enriched ours through their involvement and commitment to North Yarmouth. They will be missed.

TRICENTENNIAL OVERVIEW

Governor Joseph Brennan proclaimed 1980 to be the Year of the Maine Coast, but to hundreds of North Yarmouth people it will surely always be the Year of the Tricentennial.

Reading the town reports for the previous years, as well as the minutes of the various organizations in the Town, will give some idea of the tremendous amount of forethought which preceded the actual celebration. The first steps were taken in September 1978, when Shirley Fountain reminded the membership of the Historical Society that we must not let our three hundredth birthday pass unobserved. She was appointed to approach the Selectmen on the subject, and upon doing this found they had already appointed a "Steering Committee" to get the whole town involved and to coordinate the planned activities. This group became known as the "Tricentennial Committee". To them fell the wise spending of the five thousand dollars which the citizens voted to raise as seed money.

One of the early decisions made by the Committee was that the Historical Society should be asked to put together a history of the Town as its major Tricentennial effort. The resulting soft-bound book, North Yarmouth 1680-1980 An Illustrated History, already has sold more than enough copies to repay the cost of publication.

Every organization was asked to put on a special program sometime during the year. As an outcome of this planning we had festivities from January to September 13, 1980. All the Towns which had originally been a part of Ancient North Yarmouth were asked to join in our celebration.

Founder's Day was the grand finale to which the Winter Festival, the School Program, the Olde Town Meeting, the Flower Show, the Silver Tea, Muster Day, and special Church services, etc. were just the prelude. People came from far and near despite the threat of a rainy day and all seemed to enjoy themselves hugely. Some were old residents, some were descendants who had never been in North Yarmouth before, all were friendly and full of enthusiasm, appreciative of the chance to share in a happening which left us all feeling "GOOD!" about the whole thing. That was a comment often repeated.


Although the fireworks display on the evening of September 13th marked the close of Founder's Day and of the year's commemorative programs, we are still basking in the glow of good fellowship which emanated from it. Interest in preserving our records of the Town's history certainly mounted following Ye Olde Town Meeting with the attendant publicity. This in turn helped insure a favorable vote at the ensuing annual town meeting, when money was requested for building a new vault and records workroom. Now it will be possible to preserve our historical records indefinitely and make the information they contain available to serious researchers.

Another Tricentennial motivated project which should have long-lasting effects is the course of study for local history in S.A.D. No. 51, complete with references for background reading for those teachers who will introduce it. This was drawn up by teachers and ex-teachers knowledgeable in this area. Useful here will be two more North Yarmouth books, the printing of which was speeded up so that they might be available for the Tricentennial: the reprint edition of Wm. Rowe's Ancient North Yarmouth and Yarmouth, Maine; the newly compiled Vital Statistics of North Yarmouth, Maine 1850, including cemetery inscriptions.

The Tricentennial Committee granted my request, that I be allowed to continue awarding the Descendants' trays to any person who sends in a valid lineage proving descent from an ancestor who settled in Ancient North Yarmouth prior to 1722. Eventually, this mass of genealogical information will be housed in the Vault to become resource material.

The town report for 1930 made no mention of the great day of celebration which many of us remember. It is to prevent any such oversight in 1980 that this is written.



SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1980—It was a great year for the Town of North Yarmouth, as many thoughts and ideas came together in the form of the Tri-Centennial. The Board of Selectmen would like to thank all of those people responsible and commend the citizens of North Yarmouth for their support, time, donated articles and patience. Whether it was the gathering for the "Olde Towne Meeting", the cannon fire on a cool, damp morning, or the fireworks in the evening, it was a great time and much appreciated.

The vault and workroom addition to the municipal building was completed and already has shown its value in the restoration of old and fragile town records and other documents. This room will be a much utilized addition to our community and safekeeping of our records will be insured.

1980 saw many discussions of the need to further revise our zoning ordinance as many have viewed it as too restrictive and not allowing any sort of commercial venture in North Yarmouth. This was not the opinion of everyone and the Planning Board is presently working on public hearings to determine the public feeling and will present the town with its proposals on election day.

The Board of Selectmen have found themselves faced with many problems and areas of concern which have required a legal opinion before action is taken. There are many instances of questions concerning the zoning and the Board of Selectmen has had to enforce the ordinance in some cases. These questions make it more certain that North Yarmouth is now a town which is on the brink of growing pains—the question to the voters will be How Much?—How Soon?

As the 1980 highway budget was cut by 15,000 in March, the town's roads are in need of work this year. As a Board, we feel that to postpone certain resurfacing and patching projects will only up the final cost of maintaining our roads at a safe and respectable level. Without proper maintenance, the town will be faced with re-building, rather than maintaining, many roads. The cost of maintaining is a fraction of that of rebuilding.

The end of 1980 did see some bad weather and many inches of snowfall. We would like to thank the Road Commissioner and his crew for the speedy and efficient cleaning of our town roads.

We have entered into an agreement with O'Donnell Associates of Auburn


to re-do, update, and maintain our Parcel Inventory Maps. These maps are of great importance to the Assessors, the Town Clerk and the general public.

Once again this year, we are faced with many decisions at Town Meeting. It is our hope that the majority will not leave those decisions to a handful of faithful attenders. This meeting is our chance to discuss and resolve the problems and issues facing our town. We ask that you make a special effort to vote on Friday, March 13th, and to attend Town Meeting on Saturday, March 14th, at the Wescustogo Grange Hall at 9:00 A.M.

Special thanks go out to all of the men and women who made this year, 1980, a great success. Those who serve and give their time and effort to the many Boards, Commissions and Committees deserve the thanks of the entire town. Please remember that if you wish to serve on a committee to contact the town office.

ANNUAL MEETING WARRANT

To: Norman L. Smith, a resident in the Town of North Yarmouth, County of Cumberland, State of Maine.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of North Yarmouth, Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town Municipal Building in said Town, on Friday the 13th day of March A.D. 1981 at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, then and there to act on Articles numbered 1 through 9.

And to notify and warn the voters to meet at the Wescustogo Grange Hall, in said Town, on Saturday, the 14th day of March, 1981 A.D., at 9:00 o'clock in the morning, there and then to act on Articles numbered 10 through 35, all of said articles being set out below, to wit:

- Article 1: To choose a Moderator to preside at said Annual Meeting.
- Art. 2: To elect all Town Officers necessary by secret ballot.
- Art. 3: Shall the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of North Yarmouth be amended to permit limited commercial, retail and/or industrial activity in the Rural District as a Special Exception subject to prior approval by the Board of Appeals by adding a new Ch. I, Sec. VI D 7. (Yes or No)
- Art. 4: Shall the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of North Yarmouth be amended to put a limit on new residential construction in one calendar year by adding a new Ch. I, Sec. IV D 6. (Yes or No)
- Art. 5: Shall the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of North Yarmouth be amended to clarify and expand the permitted use of roadside and farm stands in the Rural District by adding a new Ch. I, Sec. VI B 7. (Yes or No)
- Art. 6: Shall the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of North Yarmouth be amended to add a new Ch. I, Sec. IV D 6, to read as follows: Regarding the issuance of permits and rights conferred upon the applicant. (Yes or No)
- Art. 7: Shall the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of North Yarmouth be amended to change home occupations in the Rural District from Permitted Uses to Special Exceptions, thereby requiring prior approval from the

Board of Appeals, by amending Ch. I, Sec. VI B 5 and adding a new Ch. I, Sec. VI D 7. (Yes or No)

- Art. 8: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the "National Flood Plain Insurance Program," or take any action thereon.
- Art. 9: "Shall a Charter Commission Be Established for the Purpose of Establishing a New Municipal Charter?"



From the Cannon's boom at daybreak, signaling the start of a special day, until the beautiful display of fireworks in the evening, drawing it to a close - every minute of the day was filled with memories. North Yarmouth should be very proud of what it was able to accomplish.

There were many worthwhile accomplishments other than fun type activities. A pictorial History of North Yarmouth was written, resulting in the collecting and preservation of much data that would soon have become lost or destroyed. We have yet to complete the "Time Capsule". This will be placed in the cement in a special corner of the new records room as soon as there is a copy of the "1980 Town Report" to go into it.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those that helped make our 300th year a successful celebration.




REPORT OF THE CUMBERLAND-NORTH YARMOUTH SENIOR CITIZENS

Last winter, being mild with little snow, resulted in savings in winter maintenance and much roadside tree and brush removal.

During warm weather some ditching and road improvement was done. No real town road project.

The price of hot mix and cold mix rose from \$15.00 to \$24.00 a ton. Resurfacing was restricted to finishing Royal, Lufkin and Lane Roads, which were undercoated in 1979.

We were able to use three years of town road improvement due us from the State. Herman Smith was foreman and did very well - building 1500 feet of road from Pownal's end on Royal Road. I hope to see that road finished in 1981.

We have the steel all bought and stored at the Town Garage for the Milliken Road Bridge. Plans for installation at school's end.

If the roads are to be kept up and resurfacing done, more funds must be raised.

Reports are, that the State Department of Transportation may stop helping on secondary roads or change the system of support. In either case we may be faced with all future care of Mill Road.

During 1980 the Planning Board reviewed three major subdivisions and one minor subdivision. The status of these projects is summarized as follows:

The Planning Board has also reviewed several requests for topsoil removal and approval of back lots. During the review of these projects the Planning Board identified several areas where the Town's ordinances could be improved. Following two Public Hearings in late 1980, several proposed amendments to the Subdivision Ordinance and the Zoning Ordinance were prepared. These amendments will be voted on during the March 1981 Town Meeting.

During 1981 the Planning Board will consider the need for other ordinance amendments to address subjects such as hazardous/toxic materials.

The Planning Board began a review of the Town's Comprehensive Plan during 1980 and will continue to do so in 1981. The North Yarmouth Comprehensive Plan sets the goals and policies that the Town will follow. As the Plan is updated, the Board will hold hearings to receive public comment.

During 1980 Bill Dexter and Jack Gurney resigned from the Planning Board. They were replaced by Peter Rysman and Cedric Brackett. The Planning Board meets at 7:30 P.M. on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month. All meetings are open to the public and we welcome attendance from citizens of the Town to obtain their views on the Board's activities.

In closing, I wish to thank each of the members of the Planning Board for their dedicated effort during 1980.

1980 CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission tried to kick off North Yarmouth's 300th year with a gala Winter Festival, but this was the first winter in many years without snow and it forced us to postpone the event twice. With some luck and Nature's cooperation, the last date chosen — February 28 — gave us a fresh sprinkling and enough ice to hold the event. The old-fashioned horse-drawn sleigh and the two dogsled teams racing around the "bowl" were real favorites. The cross-country ski race, rope-pulling and sledding kept the children further occupied. Inside the 300 people who attended were treated to a lobster-netting exhibition, whittling, tasty goodies supplied by the Historical Society, and lively banjo music and songs. The day closed with the judging of the most unusual and the oldest sled. Everyone agreed that the winter merriment was an appropriate beginning for the historic Tricentennial Year.

Conservation Commission members participated in many of the public hearings regarding Central Maine Power's fly ash disposal site on Sligo Road, located in Yarmouth. The Commission wrote a letter expressing their concern on the possibility of contamination of a major groundwater aquifer supplying drinking water to Yarmouth and parts of North Yarmouth, and the adverse effects on property values in North Yarmouth. That site was voted down by the Yarmouth Planning Board, and a final one is yet undecided.

The annual town-wide litter drive was particularly important in the 1980 Tricentennial Year. Road captains for every road in the town were responsible for their own volunteers. The clean-up weekend was April 18, 19, and 20. Ten small cash prize coupons were hidden in jars, and placed randomly along the roadside to lend a festive air to the traditional spring chore. Everyone agreed the roadsides had not been as clean in the last 300 years and the new manner of organization was fun as well as effective. In addition, the Conservation Commission arranged for the Tree Warden to thin trees in the Town Park in preparation for the Tricentennial, and a better growth management.

Springtime ushered in one more project for the town - the Shade Tree Program, in cooperation with the State. The Commission has participated in the program for many years. This year the Commission and the Town planted two Walnut trees in front of the Town Offices in keeping with the Tricentennial. Seventeen additional shade trees were planted on the road-side at various locations in Town.

The Conservation Commission resumed meetings in the fall at a well-deserved slower pace. Several subcommittee meetings were held jointly with persons from Cumberland and Yarmouth on Recycling. Preliminary work was initiated on the development of a Nature Trail, or "outdoor

classroom" in the thick woods behind the North Yarmouth Elementary School. Further work will be continued in March, 1981. Finally, a program of Energy Conservation for Homeowners was initiated by the Maine Association of Conservation Commissions, assisted by Threshold to Maine. The North Yarmouth Conservation Commission will be participating in this public education project of "what and how to do," especially as we log through the winter months.

CABLE TV COMMISSION REPORT

Our Town had 29 subscribers receiving N.E. Cablevision's service at the end of 1980. This number should be growing by several subscribers a week until everyone, who is interested and located in a covered area, is hooked up.

Almost all carrier cable has been installed. A short section of North Road from Deer Run Road has been added to the covered area.

Service for present customers is acceptable except for signal loss more frequently than tolerable. Electrical power failure anywhere along the cable route thru Westbrook, Falmouth, Cumberland and North Yarmouth will result in cable signal loss. N.E. Cablevision is planning to install, during 1981, some battery powered emergency signal boosters in critical spots along the route, to minimize these power failures.

REPORT OF THE NORTH YARMOUTH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

1980 has been a great year for North Yarmouth Historical Society. In helping celebrate the Town's Three Hundredth Birthday the society has



been involved in several major projects. We initiated and worked on the reprinting of William Rowe's classic history "Ancient North Yarmouth and Yarmouth Maine" published last spring by N.E. History Press. We also wrote and published our own "Illustrated History of North Yarmouth 1680-1980". Proceeds from the sales of this book have already paid for the printing costs, and are well on the way to paying for the ambitious project of copying old photographs, which was undertaken in conjunction with the production of the book.

New sign boards were placed on six of the old granite road markers as another of our projects for the Tricentennial.

The restoration of the Old Town House on Rt. #9 has progressed and several important Tricentennial events were held there. The new windows are now complete and one side of the roof has been reshingled. We hope to see more activities there in the future.

Future projects: During 1981 we look forward to completing our inventory, and to continuing the research and study of the old buildings in town. We hope to run a short research course for newcomers to the town interested in learning more about their houses. The techniques of tape recording local history will be explored in a program held in conjunction with Freeport and other local historical Societies.

Our main effort will be directed toward organizing and preserving the extensive collection of records now securely housed in the new Town Vault. (Many of these records have recently been microfilmed by the State Archives and will be available for research on our new microfilm reader, a generous gift to the society.) The new records workroom will enable us to begin this formidable task, for which the Historical Society has undertaken to provide the workers and the equipment.

The Records Committee intends to start some regular supervised work sessions early in the New Year on Tuesday mornings during the winter months. Once things have straightened out assistance will also be available at certain times for those wanting to study genealogy.

VAULT AND RECORDSROOM POLICY

Access to the vault only for legitimate reasons, permission necessary from one of the Board of Vault Overseers or Selectmen. Currently, they are:

Sandra Grover Norman Smith Nellie Leighton Scott Seaver William Jones

Vault Log for recording every use of the records, showing date, hour, items, its destination (records work room, office, etc.), person's name, time returned to vault and carefully reshelved.

Researchers to have access to the records at posted times under supervision of a knowledgeable person designated by Vault Overseers. Appointments for access at other reasonable hours may be made with the Town Clerk.

Small children have no place in the Work Room or Vault. No child under 15 years of age allowed to handle original records or microfilms. Originals should not be used by anyone if a copy will serve as well. Access to vital statistics 1892 on is denied by law.

Preservation work is to be undertaken only under the close supervision of an already trained person and at the direction of a member of the Records Committee.

A strict ban on smoking in the new vault, the Records Work Room and the old vault area is a necessary part of Conservation practice and will be enforced.

REPORT OF THE VAULT COMMITTEE

The Vault Committee reviewed plans for the addition to the Municipal Building in early April and construction was under way in early July. The constant attention to the construction by Clayt Barter and Dick Baston kept everything progressing at a good pace. Problems were encountered with the slab for the vault ceiling but this was overcome and the major portion of construction was completed by Founder's Day.

The addition of a sink for the cleansing of the older records will complete the project. The records workroom and vault will be open for your inspection during Election Day, March 13, 1981.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The Town of North Yarmouth, Maine currently operates under a Town Meeting-Selectmen form of Government,

The accounting policies of the Town conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to state and local governmental units. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Basis of Presentation:

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equities, revenues and expenditures. The various funds, which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations, are grouped by type in the financial statements.

Basis of Accounting:

Governmental fund revenues and expenditures are recognized on the modified accrual basis. Revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they become available and measurable. In the general fund, real estate and personal property tax levies are recorded as revenue in amounts equal to total taxes levied. Estimated losses for uncollectible accounts and abatements are recorded in the overlay account as expenditures. Expenditures for governmental fund types are recognized in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, if measurable, except for unmatured interest on generally long-term debt and accumulated sick and annual leave pay, which are recognized when paid.

All other funds included in these financial statements are maintained and reported on the accrual basis.

TOWN OF NORTH YARMOUTH, MAINE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) DECEMBER 31, 1980

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued):

Inventories of Supplies:

Inventories of supplies are considered to be expenditures at the time of purchase and are not included in the general fund balance sheet.

Fixed Assets:

Fixed assets are not capitalized in the accounting records when acquired. Funds used to acquire fixed assets are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made.

NOTE 2 - OVER-EXPENDITURES:

During the year, the Town overexpended certain budgeted accounts, which will be raised through taxation in 1981.

NOTE 3 - BUDGETS:

General Fund:

The Town is currently preparing budgets under a net budgeting concept which does not estimate total revenues of the Town.
