

WALNUT HILL GARAGE

Recognize the scene on the cover? This late 1930s photo shows what is now Ron's Auto Body at the corner of Parsonage Road and Walnut Hill Road (left). In the 30s, it was known as the Walnut Hill Garage and was owned by Roy M. Loring.

The history of this building is simple but unusual. It has been used in the service of the transportation industry since it was built in the mid 1800s (the exact year is not yet determined). That's probably a local record for continuous use!

The property and the land around it came into the Daniel Staples family around 1800. Staples owned the house across the street from this property and eventually, two others: a store, and this building. John Staples Jr., his grandson, was building horse drawn carriages here in 1850 – we know that because the Federal Census at that time lists him as 19 years old and working with another carriage maker, William Lunt. John Staples, Sr. was a merchant and had a store on the same premises.

John, Jr. bought this building to run his carriage making business in 1867. It's unclear how long he made carriages, but in 1889 William True moved from his blacksmith shop at Dunn's Depot and bought the one story building for his business. He shoed horses and pounded iron in the forge inside, fixing farm implements such as mowing machines and hay rakes. By the 1920s, he was getting older and had reduced his horseshoeing to a minimal amount.

Diaries outlining William True's daily work are now owned by his granddaughter Shirley Hanson of Falmouth. Many local residents remember him and his shop; the inside of the roof was black with the soot from coal fires. After many years of blacksmithing, True died and the building was bought by Roy Loring in 1933.

Mr. Loring had previously been in the car repair business in Presque Isle and owned a dealership in Gray before moving here in 1933. The garage did general repair work — springs, tune-ups, oil changes, and tires. He also sold Socony gasoline. Mr. Loring generally worked by himself but occasionally hired Clayton Barter of North Yarmouth or Erroll Adams (currently living in Gray) to assist.

Loring ran the garage until his death in 1949. Shortly before he died, he added the second floor apartment that is still there today. He lived there with his wife after years of renting a home two houses down (originally a Staples family house).

Mr. Loring was the Clerk of the North Yarmouth Fire Department when it was formed in 1945. In fact, he did repair work on the original fire truck, a Larrabee, and would sometimes drive it to local fires. His daughter Margaret married Harold Small, a local dairy farmer who lives in Cumberland today.

The repair garage went through a series of owners after Loring's death. Eventually, Al Powers ran a garage and added the addition to the left side of the structure. Following him, Lennie Aldridge built utility trailers there in the late 1960s and in 1970 Ron and Candy Burgess bought the garage and opened their auto body business.

Additional work needs to be done to verify all the history of this 200 year old site. Any information you have would add to our understanding of our local history.

Report of the Board of Selectmen - 2002

Dear North Yarmouth friends and neighbors:

As we approach the 2003 Town Meeting, we should all feel pleased with the progress that our community is making a number of fronts.

Our Town center has come together beautifully. With the magnificent new bandstand that was built by fire department volunteers, we were able to enjoy community concerts throughout the summer. The fire station now provides improved space for the fire and rescue, as well as a satellite office for the Cumberland Sheriff's Department. The new town hall provides a much improved setting for town employees to do their work. The thinning of the forest next to "Sharpe's Field" has added beautiful views from route 9 and Parsonage Road throughout the year.

At the Old Town Hall Park (formerly Gillespie's), the Recreation Committee and the Public Works Department has built a wonderful walking trail that provides beautiful views (with granite benches) of the Royal River.

The Safe Bike and Walkways Committee worked with tremendous energy and skill to put the Route 9 walkway as close to the top of the DOT plans as possible. When the DOT held a public meeting in Saco this past fall, the North Yarmouth committee dazzled all in attendance with their poise, passion and numbers.

The Comprehensive Plan Committee was chartered by the Selectmen, Pat Hamel took on the chair position, and the committee embarked on the critical process of updating our comprehensive plan. A survey was sent to all residents, with a response rate of nearly 40 %. With the hard work of this committee, we anticipate having a new comprehensive plan to review and hopefully adopt at the 2004 annual meeting.

It was a good year for the Town.

Looking ahead, the Selectmen have a number of priorities. We want to: (i) keep municipal spending at or below the rate of growth in revenues, especially given the financial pressures that will result from the school building projects and the state budget problems, (ii) create affordable, elderly housing designed to meet the needs of North Yarmouth residents, (iii) acquire the Cassidy pit and develop a long-term plan for the property that will serve the Town's need for materials, improve the visual impact of the pit, and provide room for a future site for a new school, elderly housing site, or recreational/open space, (iv) develop additional recreational uses for the Sharp property and the Old Town Hall park, including a trail connecting the two properties, (v) work on regional initiatives in areas like transportation and public safety, (vi) support community events like the summer concerts and Fun Day to bring Town people together, and (vii) create innovative changes to our zoning (in step with the work of the Comprehensive Plan Committee) to encourage more dense, village/neighborhood developments in the town center and other designated areas and to protect fields, pristine woodlands and other critical areas.

To the Town staff, Scott Seaver, the Fire and Rescue and all the town volunteers, we say "Thanks and Good Work!!"

It is my pleasure to present to you the Annual Report of the activities of the Town of North Yarmouth for the year 2002.

Without much fanfare, your Municipal Staff continue to provide you with expanded services. After much training and a few anxious moments, we started to use the new computers and software that were purchased to their nearly full potential. The Town now enjoys the ability to re-register passenger vehicles online. Shortly, you will also have the ability to purchase your annual Fish and Wildlife licenses on-line also.

www.northyarmouth.govoffice.com is now a year old. Though sometimes changes come slowly, we are becoming more accustomed to adding information and features. If you have suggestions for the enhancement of this important method of communications, please do not hesitate to let us know.

As I report every year, the past year has been one of growth, not just for the population, but for the demands put upon all of your staff. We continue to attend training session sponsored by both the Maine Municipal Association and the affiliate groups associated with the MMA. We thank the Board of Selectmen, and also the residents for their understanding, as we have, on occasion, closed the office for a day so that we all might attend the same sessions.

As noted in the Report of the Board of Selectmen, several of your community committees have been extremely busy. Buoyed by the support shown at the 2002 Annual Meeting, the Safe Bike and Walkways Committee have virtually secured matching funds for a project that will greatly enhance Rt. 115 and Rt. 9 for those citizens who walk, bike or travel via any method on those roads.

For your convenience, the Municipal Office is open until 6 PM each Monday.

Town Revenues continue to increase in 2002, thanks to a drastic increase in the number of new vehicles being purchased and registered. It is hard to imagine that this trend can continue for much longer, and revenues will be scrutinized in the next several months.

The town borrowed, when necessary, a total of \$1.35 million dollars in anticipation of tax revenues being paid in July. Funds were repaid to the lending bank well before the due date, and interest expenses were kept to a minimum.

Although the winter storms in the last 2 weeks of December 2002 have come and gone, I want to thank the Public Works Department for their dedication and courage in attacking these storms. We take a lot for granted. We also have noted that the expectations of the traveling public have changed over the past few years. These plow drivers work when called; work when tired; and work until the job is done, many times not going home to tend to their families needs for periods of 24 to 36 hours. My hat is off to them!

One of the great pleasant surprises of 2002 was the series of summer concerts that was organized. We certainly want to thank all of the artists and performers that entertained us. If you would like to help support these concerts this summer, please contact us. There is nothing like a lawn chair in front of the Gazebo on a hot summer night!!

Again, I must thank all employees, appointed and elected officials and committee members. North Yarmouth continues to be the most desired community in Cumberland County in which to live. You are the folks that make it that way.

We look forward to a safe and prosperous 2003!!



Dear Citizens of North Yarmouth.

It is my pleasure to submit the M.S.A.D. #51 Cumberland/North Yarmouth annual report to you the citizens of North Yarmouth. The 2001 -2002 year has been filled with learning and opportunities.

The District's mission is to guide all students as they acquire enthusiasm for learning, assume responsibility for their education, achieve academic excellence, and discover and attain their personal bests.

To accomplish this mission, the MSAD #51 community will collaborate to:

- Use effective instructional practices and provide professional development to assure that all students meet or exceed the district's benchmarks and outcomes;
- Ensure a safe and respectful environment where all feel a sense of belonging; and
- Promote parental participation as fundamental to each student's success.

We continue to focus on the development of a comprehensive assessment system as a means of achieving the above mission.

In support of our learning mission we are entering an exciting period of facilities development in the District. There is no doubt that our two communities have grown over the years resulting in an increase of our school-age population. We have outgrown existing school space and over the years we have adapted space to meet our immediate needs, but not our ongoing needs. In an effort to maximize the opportunity to teach effectively, our District has designed a new middle school, which will bring the 6th, 7th and 8th grades together. The State has recognized this need and will fund \$16 million of the \$18 million cost for this building. Construction of the new Greely Middle School has begun and occupancy is scheduled for the opening of the 2004-2005 school year.

Through the important work of building committees, a number of public forums and newspaper articles we have identified for the communities projected enrollments, program space shortages and the condition of existing facilities. Many more steps must be taken at the federal, state and local levels to actualize our goal of a new middle

school and renovation of the existing junior high school into high school space. I would like to thank everyone for their support, hard work and countless hours of research to identify our building project goals.

I take this opportunity annually to thank Scott Seaver, the town employees, the selectmen and selectwoman and the extensive number of North Yarmouth residents who continue to support the students and staff of M.S.A.D. #51. This support takes many different forms and continues to help the district perform at a higher level. There are many challenges facing us. I hope that we will continue to collaborate and cooperate to find common ground and solve issues that arise as we enter this period of building a new middle school and renovating existing space.

The year 2002 was a very busy year for the District in the water quality aspect of our duties. We detected coliform bacteria on two occasions. The first was during the August sampling period in the North Yarmouth Portion of the distribution system. The Second was in the Yarmouth Portion of the distribution system in October. Coliform is a bacteria that is used as an indicator of potential problems, but does not pose a public health risk in of itself. We have determined that the two instances were not related and felt it was necessary to disinfect both distribution systems by chlorination. We are currently phasing out the chlorination.

The Yarmouth Water District has received a grant from the Maine Drinking Water Program for educational materials for the purposes of wellhead protection. We have been in contact with the North Yarmouth Memorial School so as to institute these materials into their science curriculum in the spring. Another part of the grant was to develop map coverage's for several no spray agreements, which allow us to maintain roadside brush growth manually, and in return, no growth retardants will be sprayed. These agreements will be with the Department of Transportation and Central Maine Power Company on Memorial Highway, Sweetser Rd., and Baston Rd. We will be in contact with adjacent landowners in the near future.

We are still currently in a precipitation deficit. Although autumn rains and winter snowfall will significantly help the recharge to ground and surface waters, we need to be vigilant in consistent conservation measures on both public and private supplies.

Safe Walk and Bike Ways Committee 2002 Report

The year 2002 saw a great deal of progress for the Safe Walk and Bike Ways Committee. Formed in 2000 at the request of the Board of Selectmen to investigate ways to improve safety and access for pedestrians and bicyclists in North Yarmouth, the committee has focused its energies to improve pedestrian and bike safety in the village center along the town's busiest roads – Routes 115 and 9.

Working closely with the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT), a conceptual plan was developed in 2001 to improve the 1.9 mile section of Route 9 from the Cumberland town line to the North Yarmouth Memorial School. Included in the plan is a pathway running along Route 9. This idea was unveiled to the residents of North Yarmouth at the 2002 Town Meeting, at which time \$38,000 – to be allocated over a 3 year period - was approved by residents to be set aside for the town's portion of the cost of building the pathway. The cost of the improvements to Route 9, it should be noted, will be covered entirely by MDOT.

This past summer the committee was able to leverage the solid support from the town meeting and focus its efforts at actually getting the state to devote resources to turning the conceptual plan into a reality. After another letter writing campaign, trips to the MDOT offices in Augusta, and assistance from both of North Yarmouth's state legislators, the committee was pleased to see field surveyors from the state surveying Route 9 this past summer. The survey data collected from their work will be used to develop the draft design for the road improvement and pathway.

The committee's final push came on December 3rd, as twenty-two North Yarmouth residents boarded a school bus at the Village Green and headed to Saco to attend a meeting of the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee. The purpose of the meeting was for MDOT to receive feedback from the public regarding proposed highway improvement projects planned over the next 2 years, and from the feedback received at the meeting, begin to prioritize the improvement projects. MDOT officials at the meeting were once again blown away by the positive support and enthusiasm demonstrated by North Yarmouth for our Route 9 project. Based on feedback recently received from MDOT, our committee is optimistic our project will be initiated within the next two years.

When the project gets the thumbs-up the MDOT will draft a 'blueprint' for the Route 9 improvements and pathway. Once a blueprint is in hand, our committee, along with MDOT officials will hold a series of public meetings to discuss, review, and finalize the plan. Please note that the committee will go to great efforts to solicit the input of all interested parties in this process.

2002 ANNUAL REPORT NORTH YARMOUTH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Did you ever notice that there's just too much to do and there's no good place to start? People feel it, and so do organizations. The North Yarmouth Historical Society started out last year trying to look this problem straight in the eye by spending two Board meetings in a brainstorming session. We came up with a good two or more pages of ideas - everything from producing a North Yarmouth history film to building a town museum to writing a natural history guide. Impossible ideas? Not necessarily. The theory of brainstorming is that there should be no judgement of ideas; no dismissal of what seems like an



impossible dream. As a result of this rule, some impossible dreams make their way out into the open and actually happen, because fellow brainstormers see beyond the barriers that a dreamer builds around a grand plan.

Such is the case with the newly-revived North Yarmouth Gazette, a publication of North Yarmouth Historical Society. Arriving in mailboxes last September, the Gazette was once an impossible dream, but thanks to the vision of the NYHS Board and an energetic volunteer staff, it's now a reality.

This newsletter fulfills many of our "if only" thoughts. If only we could figure out how to publish some of our great local history. If only we had a way to truly give back to members. If only we could showcase some of our collections. If only we could get oral history going and give people access to the interviews. The Gazette does all this and will do more. As our organization grows, we will use it to reach out to more and more of North Yarmouth. We hear through the Comprehensive Plan Committee that our town has a large number of folks with a good sense of our town's history and a desire to preserve the past. That's important for a town that is looking hard at the future; a stong plan for the next 20 years is better built on a strong sense of continuity and endurance.

The Gazette is a benefit of NYHS membership (only the first issue was free for everybody in town). Join up to start your subscription and learn more about our Town's past... and its future.

Another result of our brainstorming is a start at preserving the good work of some of our long-time members - in their own words. Ursula Baier, who has researched our town's history for 35 years, was videotaped during a discussion with Linc Merrill about the history of the Old Town House, North Yarmouth's 1853 historic structure. Paul Argereow of First Light Video worked with NYHS on this project, which will continue with more taping throughout 2003. The film that we hope to produce can be used by NYHS in programs, in our schools and as a lasting legacy of our historic resources and those who have faithfully worked to study and preserve them.

North Yarmouth Fire and Rescue 2002 Annual Report

To all of the members of the North Yarmouth Fire and Rescue department, I would like to publicly thank you for your many hours of dedicated service to the citizens of North Yarmouth. The year 2002 turned out to be an average year for the volunteers of the Department. Members of the Department responded to 287 calls. These calls, averaging 2 to 3 hours each, anytime during the day, represent 4,000 hours of commitment placing the needs of the community above personal plans, jobs and family time. Members of the department also spent another 1,200 hours in training and meetings. The total hours volunteered was over 5,200.

More thanks are due to the Rescue Truck committee for their hours of careful thought, and planning, which resulted in the purchase and outfitting of our new Rescue 1. Their efforts allowed us to place the new unit into service with no interruption of service.

During 2002 we continued our successful fundraising through our bottle recycling building. I would like to thank the citizens and the Selectmen for their continued support of the North Yarmouth Fire and Rescue and thank everyone that donates returnable in our drop off building. We received about \$13,000 that was used to purchase new equipment such as a breathing air compressor and an automatic external defibrillator, as well as a new stretcher and portable suction unit for the new rescue.

The North Yarmouth Fire and Rescue is a volunteer department and we are always looking for new members to join our team. The fire department meets every Monday night at 7:00 P.M. for meetings and training. In the winter from October to April we meet at 6:00 P.M. for supper before the meeting. The Rescue meets on the first and third Thursdays of every month. Anyone interested in joining is invited to attend any of these meetings.

2002 Conservation Commission Annual Report

In 2002 the Conservation Commission continued its environmental protection and education efforts in North Yarmouth. Our education efforts focused around monthly nature walks led by long standing Commission member Sam Ristich. These walks, behind the Memorial School on our nature trail, have been enjoyed by many and will continue this coming year. If you haven't been on one of Sam's walks, do try to attend one this Spring. We're sure you will find them enlightening and enjoyable. The Commission, along with community volunteers, made some improvements to the nature trail this past year. We "planted" posts at 16 stations along the trail and continue to develop a self-guided nature trail brochure that will explain the natural communities and vegetation at each of the stations. At the head of the nature trail behind the Memorial School we installed a bulletin board that will serve as the start to the trail. The donation of lumber from Hancock Lumber was greatly appreciated and assisted in the completion of the bulletin board.

The Commission began to review the Town's wetland protection ordinances this past year to make sure they adequately protect our precious water resources and wetland habitats. This is especially important with the continued development pressure in the Town. We are reviewing, and will possibly suggest revisions to, these protection guidelines in the near future. Many species of fish and wildlife depend on high quality, non-degraded stream and wetland habitat. Our drinking water (both from wells and the water district) also depends on functional wetlands since that is where the water purification process begins. We would like to keep these wetland and water resources clean so future generations can enjoy what they have to offer.

We reviewed two major subdivisions (parcels divided into 5 or more house lots) this year, one off of Mill Rd. (Stowell Brook subdivision) and the other off of Rte 115 (Carriage Hill subdivision).

Working with the Planning Board, and with the cooperation of developers, we were successful in having some open space (to be protected by conservation easements) set aside in each subdivision. We have also kept a watchful eye on erosion and other environmental problems at construction sites throughout the town and have notified our CEO and/or Maine DEP when we thought code infringements were occurring

We had another successful plant sale this year at Fun Day and plan to use the proceeds to help send North Yarmouth students to nature camps this summer. Many thanks to Plainview Farms for their generosity in supplying the plants for the sale! Look for our plant sale again this year and please continue supporting our scholarship program!

A Recycling subcommittee has been established in the Conservation Commission. This group will promote recycling in the town and investigate potential cost effective alternatives to increase recycling and decrease the amount of solid waste we send off to RWS.

The Conservation Commission continues to operate an e-mail notification service (a "listserve") to send out announcements and news on items of interest pertaining to natural resource conservation in North Yarmouth. We currently have over 100 subscribers to this service and they receive announcements on events such as nature walks, environmental scholarships, and other conservation oriented events. If you would like to receive such e-mail announcements please send an email to nyconcom@aol.com with the word "subscribe" in the subject line.

The Conservation Commission is always interested in hearing about your concerns for conservation issues in North Yarmouth. Please feel free to contact us by phone or email (nyconcom@aol.com) with any of your concerns or questions in conservation related issues. We also urge you to attend our monthly meetings; contact the Commission for exact dates. We welcome and thank our two new members this year, Charles Witherup and Alan Fried!

Report of the Recreation Commission

With the much welcomed enthusiasm and energy of four new members, the 2002 North Yarmouth Recreation Commission has enjoyed a surge of activity this past year. With four parks now and the addition of another new recreation area, we continue our charge of researching and planning for the needs of the townsfolk as defined by the comprehensive plan

At Old Town House Park (formerly "Meeting House Park" and renamed at the Historical Society's request), the upper loop of the trail will be complete in the spring and ready for walkers, hikers, and joggers. There are new granite benches placed along the trail for scenic rest stops. The granite used to create these rustic benches is straight from the old North Yarmouth Quarry on Royal Road, now owned and run by Kenny Taplin.

The canoe launch improvements have also been completed, with special thanks to The Friends of the Royal River for their help and grant writing skills. There is now a small gravel parking lot and a much improved launch which has reduced erosion problems.

Granite benches have also been placed at Wescustogo Park and erosion control fabric will be installed to maintain the launch in good shape for the future. More plantings are on deck for next spring and the sign, damaged by wind, will be repaired.

At The North Yarmouth Veteran's Memorial Park, the wooded area behind the point of the park where the monument is sited has been cleared of underbrush and a short trail has been marked out linking the Town Office area with the Conservation Commission's trail through the town forest behind the N. Yarmouth Memorial School. Special thanks to The Walnut Hill Garden Club for their help with the plantings around the monument.

A very noticeable change is the new Village Green between the Wescustogo Grange Hall and the Fire Barn. The Green was the focus of many concerts this past summer with music lined up by the tireless Katie Murphy (Thanks Katie!), not to mention the annual Fun Day last fall. Watch for announcements of community events and more music at the Village Green.

The future activities of the North Yarmouth Recreation Commission focus on the concepts of community and connection. Short term plans include creating a multi use field at Old Town House Park, completing a trail through the Gully to connect the new Town Office and Veteran's Park with the Village Green and Wescustogo Grange Hall, and creating a picnic area on the point of land on the Royal River generously donated by Dick and Roslyn Baston. For the longer term we hope to create a system of trails to connect all of the town parks, and eventually expand beyond the town boundaries to connect with other trail systems in adjacent communities.

We thank the residents and volunteers of North Yarmouth for your support and help. Our town is a rural jewel which is becoming harder and harder to hold onto. We hope to work together to keep it that way.

Yarmouth-North Yarmouth Shellfish Conservation Commission 2002 Annual Report

The year 2002 was a year for some interesting studies.

Working with Normandeau Associates and MER's Chris Heining, we planted several plots of juvenile clams so that growth patterns and survival rates could be studied. This planting program was not confined to Yarmouth flats, but was also conducted by other towns and their own shellfish committees. These studies will provide interesting and valuable knowledge when they are completed.

The commercially licensed diggers and the Shellfish Conservation Commission conducted several surveys of flats once again. The knowledge gained allowed us to open new areas for commercial digging, while closing others for conservation measures.

Good enforcement practices have resulted in a reduction of poaching on our flats.

For the year 2003 we are trying a new approach to license sales. There will be an unlimited number of recreational licenses available to the residents of Yarmouth and North Yarmouth. This should provide a means for those who want to dig to be able to do so, while eliminating the need for many who buy a license just because the might want to dig. In the past, there have been quite a few people who buy a license, and never go digging. License sales start on the first business day of May. No pro-rating of license fees will be considered. The monies earned from license sales goes to support a very successful shellfish program. Hope to see you out there!

The Commission meets the third Tuesday of every month at 7 PM at the Log Cabin, Maine Street, Yarmouth. Meeting are open to the public.

Comprehensive Plan Committee

The North Yarmouth Comprehensive Plan Update Committee was appointed by the Board of Selectman one year ago and given the task of updating the Town's comprehensive plan. This has involved completing a Comprehensive Plan Needs Assessment, which was completed in June, 2002. This assessment was then used to acquire a consultant to guide the committee through the process and preparation of the update. Our consultant, Gwen Hilton, from Madison, Maine, was brought on board in October, 2002.

A Town-wide public survey was developed and circulated in December, with an outstanding return of over 30%. In addition, public sessions are being held during January, 2003 that include activities to guide public input in the development of a Vision Statement for North Yarmouth, what we would like the Town to look like in the next 10-20 years. As a result of these activites, the committee will be presenting Survey results and a Vision Statement to the Town at it's annual meeting, 2003.

Looking forward, with the data gathered by this initial public participation, the committee will, through the spring and summer, update the goals, policies and implementation strategies of the Comprhensive Plan, which will include a Growth Management Plan.

In October, 2003, public forums willresume to review the proposed update. This process should then be completed with the presentation and vote on the update at the annual meeting of March, 2004.

My deepest thanks to the members of this committee, residents who have taken time (and given lots!) to think, to share, to grow and have been committed to giving back to their community in this particular manner.

Report of the Health Officer

Notices in the press tell us of recalls of various food products; from powered infant formula, to cooked deli meats, and to fresh tomatoes, which have been contaminated with various bacteria that can cause illness. The Department of Agriculture and the CDC work at identifying and notifying the public of these problems. Once you get your food home form the grocery or market, keep it at 40 degrees F and below, be certain to wash fresh fruits and vegetables, and inspect for bruised or broken skin.

The American Public Health Association suggests that a 50% decrease in salt in take could save 150,000 lives a year from strokes, heart attacks and other illnesses linked to high blood pressure. Processed foods are high in sodium – eat fresh.

If you or some family member might need care in a nursing home, check out www.medicare.gov to find out what your options are before you need is urgent. Hospice of Maine offers excellent service as well.

If you share your kiddy pool with other neighborhood children, enquire if any have had recent bouts of diarrhea. They need to be excluded from the pool until they recover.

If you experience symptoms of food poisoning that may have occurred form a recent restaurant meal, report it to your local health officer. If other call with similar complaints, it is easier to pin point the problem in food handling and get it corrected.

Don't skip your seat belt just because you have an air bag. Safety belts reduce driver fatalities by 42%. Add an air bag and gain another 6%. But the air bag alone reduces fatalities by only 18%. More over the impact on an air bag can be dangerous if you aren't belted.

When micro-waving, use waxed paper instead of plastic wrap or simply use a small plate to cover your food. As the food heats up, chemicals may migrate from the plastic wrap and it might even melt and stick to your food.

North Yarmouth Public Works Department

2002 was a busy year for the Public Works Department. Sevaral projects were undertaken. A near complete rebuild of Sligo Road, along with resurfacing was undertaken and completed. With co-operation from MDOT, the large culverts that cross Rt. 9 at Sligo Road were replaced.

Public Works crews also worked on many other roadways, doing ditching and brush cutting.

As winters have progressed, it has become apparent that the priorities of the traveling public have changed and more demands are made of this department during the winter months. For that reason, we have changed our priorities, and based our number of full-time employees on our needs in the winter time. This will allow us to provide full time work to a winter employee rather than depending on on-call workers who are not provided a set number of hours per week.

With your support through Annual Meeting votes, we purchased an F550 outfitted for both plowing and sanding. Also a small used utility vehicle was purchased for non-emergency use and for use in tending parks and cemeteries.

In 2003, the major road project, pending drastic increases in the price of paving, will be West Pownal Road.

I want to thank all of the PWD employees for their support and dedication, and thank YOU for your cooperation and patience.

Report of the North Yarmouth Budget Committee

The Budget Committee met between December 15th and January 30th to review both the expenditures for 2002, and the proposed budget for 2003. Of major discussion to the committee were:


- Charging a fee for Rescue Services: While it was not a unanimous decision, the committee felt that the time had come to catch up with the other communities in the area and attach a fee to this service. There was much discussion regarding those who could not afford the service possibly not calling. The Committee decided to recommend a fee structure, with the assurance from the Fire Chief and the Selectmen that a public education process would be undertaken prior to the effective date of the fees being started.
- Paramedic Services: When reviewing the Fire/Rescue Budget, the Fire Chief noted that \$8,500 was in the budget to provide on-call paramedic services. This will be accomplished in a joint partnership with Yarmouth and Cumberland. The Committee felt that this was an important addition to this service.
- Public Works Department: The Committee agreed that full time personnel for public works should be centered on winter activity, therefore an increase in the Payroll section of this budget.
- Acknowledged that the amount appropriated for CIP Fund could be reduced by an amount to reflect the actual bid price on the loader/backhoe.

We want to thank the town staff, all department heads, and the Board of Selectmen for providing us with the information necessary to review the proposed budget. The committee intends to meet quarterly in 2003 to review expenditures and to get a head start on the 2004 budget.

Please remember that the Municipal Budget is a very small portion of the entire tax commitment. The major portion is the MSAD #51 budget. Please make every effort to attend the school budget meetings. This will allow us all to make intelligent decisions regarding the MSAD #51 budget.
