Brian Fagan, "Archaeology and Climate Change: Lessons from Prehistory"

Funding is requested for a lecture by Brian Fagan, author of some of the best-known books on archaeology and climate change. Fagan will present the 2012 David C. Smith lecture as part of the Borns Symposium, which is hosted by the Climate Change Institute each April. His lecture, "Archaeology and Climate Change: Lessons from Prehistory," will be held in Hutchins Hall, Collins Center for the Arts on Thursday, April 5 at 7:00 p.m. This event is free and open to the University community and the general public.

Fagan is the author or editor of 46 books, including 7 college texts on archaeology that are standards for the field. He has also served as a consultant for the National Geographic Society and was writer/developer for Where in the World is Carmen San Diego on Public Television. He is an engaging speaker and is well known for his public lectures on a wide variety of archaeological and historical topics, which are geared not just for archaeologists, but for the general public.

Fagan's lecture will draw on a suite of books that he has authored on Climate Change: Floods, Famines, And Emperors: El Niño And The Fate Of Civilizations (1999); The Little Ice Age (2000); The Long Summer (2004); The Great Warming (2008); The Compete Ice Age (2009); and Elixir: a History of Water and Humankind (2011). The themes of Fagan's lecture are ones that would be familiar and of great interest to David Smith, an historian and Climate Change researcher, who was the Emeritus Bird and Bird Professor of American History at UMaine and a member of the Climate Change Institute.

The lecture will be promoted in the Hudson Museum's school newsletter, Artifacts, on the Museum's website, through press releases distributed through the University's Public Affairs Department, and through the Maine Archaeological Society's website. Paid advertisements will be placed in the Bangor Daily News and in the Maine Campus. UMaine classes will also be invited including Anthropology, especially ANT 102; History, Geology and students in the Climate Change Institute. Flyers will be distributed to Friends of the Hudson Museum and to Senior College participants at UMaine and the Hutchinson Center. The lecture will be supported by Phi Kappa Phi and members will be invited to attend. The UMaine Bookstore will have books written by Fagan available for autograph the evening of his lecture. As part of his visit to campus, Fagan will meet with faculty and grad students and attend a portion of the Borns symposium.

Expenses for the event total \$4851. The request to the committee is for \$1751 (36%) of the total cost of the event. Funding from the CAC/DLS will support fees associated with Hutchins Hall, advertising, and per diems for Fagan. Match includes a \$2000 lecture honorarium by Phi Kappa Phi; the donation of lodging by the Graduate School (\$100); and airfare (\$1000) by the Climate Change Institute.
