SCHOOL REPORT.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF TOPSHAM: It becomes my duty to conform to law and custom by presenting the annual report of the financial standing of our schools.

This has been a hard year for me. As the free text-book law took effect in August, book agents were after me every hour in the day and I received letters by the thousand. I have made the change and kept within the appropriation and the books give good satisfaction to all the teachers.

At the last annual meeting, it seemed to be the wish of the people to consolidate the High and Grammar schools. I did so, thus saving the expense of one teacher and wood. It was a change that should have been made two years before.

I would not recommend for the Town to raise money for a High School as there are no scholars to go. All the town's people are sending their children to Brunswick. If we get the \$250 from the State, there will have to be some tall lying.

I would recommend an Intermediate school be established as we have a room not occupied. When scholars leave the Primary school, they are not competent to enter the Grammar school.

The first of April there were some four hundred scholars in town. It has cost the town years before some ten dollars to get the census of scholars: this year it cost one dollar.

The care of schoolhouses has been no expense this year to the town, I have bought good wood and had it surveyed by disinterested parties before paid for.

There has been no horse hire to pay for this year. I think in past years there has been a big leak in this direction.

There have been twenty-five weeks of school: Summer, eight weeks; Fall, eight weeks; Winter, nine weeks.

To Edward H. Phinney, a Constable of the Town of Topsham, in the County of Sagadahoc, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Topsham, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Agricultural Hall, in said town, on the second day of March A. D., 1891, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, a Constable, and Collector of taxes, Supervisor or three Superintending School Committee, two or more Auditors and all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of Common Schools, Free High School, Highways and Bridges, the Poor in and out of the Alms house, the Abatements, and for Interest and Coupons, Miscellaneous expenses, the support of the Fire Department, and to see what sum of money if any the town will vote to pay Bonds becoming due this year and all other necessary town charges or to act on any matter relating to the same.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money if any the town will vote for the support of Electric Lights or to act on any other matter relating to the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see what salary the town will vote to pay the Town Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. To see what time the taxes of the ensuing year shall become due, at what time interest shall commence, if any, what rate of interest shall be charged, to see what rate per cent. we shall pay our Collector, and act on any matter relating to taxes.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to exempt Mr. John L. Alexander, of said Topsham, from paying any kind of taxes during the year 1891, agreeable to the petition of David H. Green and ten others.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase of School text books.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to sell the Leavitt property so called, situated in the town of Brunswick.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the Branch bridge and Cathance bridge near the Feldspar mill.
