TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In presenting this report there is nothing new to be said about our schools. The different Districts in town will have had thirty weeks each of school at the close of the term now in session. They have all made good progress. Some of the teachers have led in entertainments, which have resulted in increased interest on the part of the pupils and a small financial return to be used in furnishing the school-rooms.

The New Mill School, for example, having purchased an Unabridged Dictionary, with Holder and a fine Globe.

The new Arithmetics have been introduced in seven of our schools the lack of money being the only reason preventing their being supplied to the others.

The Readers are getting very much worn and should be superseded this year.

A new school house has been built in the eastern half of the old Mill District, seating forty scholars. It is in a fine situation and a little spent in grading the grounds would add much to both its appearance and value.

The great need of the scholars now is a High School.

There are about twenty-five scholars in town ready for such a school and as we have an empty school house, it seems as if we could give them this higher training at home cheaper than to pay their tuition out of town.

5. To see what per cent the town will vote to pay for collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid before certain dates, and if so, how much and on what dates; also to see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Feb. 1, 1910.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common schools.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High school tuition.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and contingent town expenses for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairing of schoolhouses and for school apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy text books.

13. To see what sum of money this town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidentals for the ensuing year.

16. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1910.

17. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by section 5 of Chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907 being the sum of \$45.

18. To see if the town will elect one, two or three road commissioners for the ensuing year.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purchase of a road machine and for a building to house the same.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for improving the Mill Cemetery so-called and for purchasing an addition to the same, or for purchasing land suitable for a new Cemetery.

21. To see if the town will vote to pay the members of the school board a specified salary and if so how much.

22. To see if the town will vote to pay to the trustees of the M. E. Church the sum of three dollars annually for rent of land occupied by the road machine house at the mill or to take such other steps regarding the same as may be deemed advisable.

23. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to sell the old mill school house.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for maintaining a school for advanced study during a part of the year.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair and extension of sidewalk through the village.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the purchase of a snow roller.

27. To see if the town will vote to continue the school on Griffin Ridge.

28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer to hold on or after May 1, of any year all orders drawn in favor of tax payers delinquent for the year or years preceding.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Mapleton, Me., March 15th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
