TO O. P. HUGHES, A CONSTABLE IN THE TOWN OF MAPLETON, COUNTY OF AROOSTOOK—GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Mapleton qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the 21st day of March, A. D. 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report as printed.
4. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
5. To see what per cent. the town will vote to pay for collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid before certain dates, and if so, how much and on what dates; also to see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Feb. 1, 1911.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for common schools.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High school tuition.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and contingent town expenses for the ensuing year.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairing of school houses and school apparatus and applian-

ces for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy text books.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay town officers for the ensuing year.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay interest.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidentals for the ensuing year.
16. To see if the town will vote to build a new school house in the Packard district, and if so, how much money will it vote to raise for the same.
17. To see if the town will vote to raise money to purchase a road plow and scoop scrapers.
18. To see if the town will vote to authorize its school board to form with the school boards of Castle Hill, Washburn and Wade Plantation a joint committee for the purpose of maintaining a union for the employment of a Superintendent of schools; and to see, further if the town will vote to set apart from the appropriation for town officers a sum not to exceed one hundred dollars for the salary of said Superintendent.
19. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Law of 1909 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1910.
20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400 00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112 of the P.L. of Maine for the year 1907 as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.
21. To see if the town will vote to accept the Simpson road, so called, as laid out by the selectmen.



22. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build said road and a further sum equal to the selectmen's estimate for damage incurred by the building of said road.
23. To see if the town will vote to accept that part of the Pulcifer road re-located by the selectmen.
24. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build and repair said re-located portion of the Pulcifer road.
25. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a certain road of highway in Mapleton village, leading from the Mapleton main road, so called, to the station of the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad; said road or highway being the same running across the homestead lot known as the J. P. Roberts homestead lot, and being the same laid out on the 20th day of Sept., 1909, and accepted by the town of Mapleton at a special town meeting held at the Old Mill schoolhouse on the 29th day of Sept., 1909.
26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the board of selectmen to lay out a road or highway leading from the Mapleton main road, so called in Mapleton village, to the station of the Bangor & Aroostook railroad in said Mapleton village, at some point easterly from the road described in article 25 and at such point and location as shall in the judgment of said board of selectmen, better accommodate the requirements of trade from said Mapleton road to said station.
27. To see if the town will vote to maintain a school at Griffin Ridge for the ensuing year.
28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hold on or after May 1, of any year, all orders drawn in favor of taxpayers delinquent for the year or years preceding.
29. To see if the town will vote to elect one, two or three road commissioners for the ensuing year.
30. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the selectmen.
31. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purchase of land suitable for a cemetery.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Mapleton, Me., March 21st at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

#### TO THE CITIZENS OF MAPLETON:

My first year's work has largely been one of getting acquainted with the needs and conditions of the schools.

During this time I have examined teachers, spent at least one day each term in each school, made numerous suggestions and criticisms, insisted on using as near as possible the course of study already in the schools and tried to keep the best teachers in a school more than one term.

Progress has been made, most of our teachers have done good faithful work yet we feel the need of graded schools. The best results can never be obtained until the schools are thoroughly graded; would suggest that we join with another town or

towns this coming year in a combination Superintendency and have our schools graded.

At the opening of the spring term we found the text books in a bad condition. A large amount of the appropriation of last year has been used to replace the worn books. The nine schools are well supplied with the exceptions of a very few more Graves spellers and D. C. Heath, arithmetics. Would recommend the Jones readers by Ginn and Co.; our readers have been in use for a number of years and the scholars are losing interest in the subject matter.

#### OLD SCHOOL HOUSE.

The school board met August 25, and after much consideration voted to have a winter term of school in the old school house. Some repairing was done and January 19, school opened with Mrs. Baird as teacher. The seventh and eight grades were taken from the Casey and New Mill Schools and an invitation given to the older ones with other schools that wanted to come. As a result we have a school of 35 scholars, six coming from Chapman, all doing good work. They use the common school studies with the addition of Book-Keeping, Algebra, and Marmion by Walter Scott as supplementary reading. Hope this school may be continued winters for the present as there are many young people that will take advantage of this opportunity. In a very short time we will need this school building to accommodate the overflow from the Casey and New Mill School. At present the attendance of the Casey is thirty and the New Mill forty eight.
