

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

# Report of School Superintendent.

#### TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF MAPLETON:

We wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation of the courtesy and consideration which has been shown by all with whom we have come in contact.

It has been policy to employ trained teachers in all the schools as far as possible and wherever practible to employ residents of the town. We can ill afford to place girls without experience or training in our schools when it is possible to secure the services of trained teachers. It seems to be true that econony does not consist so much in spending but little money as in getting good value for what we do spend. Hence a teacher who is worth ten dollars per week is really cheaper than one who can be hired for six and is really worth three.

A pupil will accomplish more in one week under the instruction of an experienced teacher, trained in the best methods of imparting knowledge, than he can possibly do in a much longer time under the guidance of one who simply knows but knows not how to impart her knowledge.

At the opening of the fall term a course of study similar to that used in the leading towns of the county was placed in all

the schools and a uniform method of ranking was also introduced so that the schools of Mapleton are graded as thoroughly as it is practicable to grade rural schools. Our pupils can go to any of the larger towns and enter the same grade that they were in at home, but there cannot fail to be a difference in the thoroughness of the work done in the school where there is but a single class or grade in a room and that where there are from five to nine grades.

We believe that we teach the essential things as thoroughly in the rural schools as in the grades of the village but some or the less important things have to be left out.

One of the greatest hindrances to successful school work is irregular attendance and a glance at the school statistics will show you that our average attendance is only about fourfifths of our enrollment; which means that, approximately speaking, each pupil is absent from school ten days of fifty or one day in each week. If the people of Mapleton will think this matter over they will see that they are not getting nearly as much for their money as they ought. To put it into figures you are buying three thousand dollars worth of school privileges and using only two thousand four hundred—a waste of six hundred dollars per year. Let us hope that every one having the care of children will see that they get their full share in the future.

The enrollment in the New Mill and Casey schools was so large at the opening of the spring term that it seemed best to open a school for the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth grades in the Old Mill schoolhouse which was accordingly done and the school has been maintained through the year.

The Griffin Ridge school has fallen below the number required by law for maintaining a school and it is discontinued unless otherwise dictated by vote of the town.

#### SCHOOLHOUSE REPAIRS.

The schoolhouses with the exception of the Lovley and the Old Mill are in very good condition. The Old Mill building ought to be thoroughly repaired before the opening of the next fall term. The Lovley schoolhouse needs new doors and general repairs on the inside. The woodsheds and out buildings in several places need considerable attention though the expense will not be very great. The Casey school is the only one where the school lot is properly fenced and we are sure that everyone will see that this ought to remedied at once. In one case at least the owner of the adjoining property has demanded that the matter be attended to this spring as early as the frost will permit. We would suggest that a sum sufficient for fencing nine lots be appropriated.

#### TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

The text book bills have been kept as low as possible this year but a good many new books will be needed soon to take the place of old ones that are nearly past use.

New readers have been put into five of the schools and

should be put into the others the coming term. Many of the small arithmetics and also the small geographies will have to be replaced soon and the text book in physiology ought to be changed for a more modern book.

The schools are rather poorly supplied with maps though many of them have globes. Maps ought to be purchased as soon as convenient. The same amounts for text books supplies that were appropriated last year would be sufficient for the coming year.

- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy text books.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers the ensuing year.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidentals the ensuing year.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to pay R. J. Libby \$17.64 additional to the one hundred appropriated for services as superintendent of schools for 1910
- 17. - 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to settle with Chas. L. Park for fighting fire to save the schoolhouse in 1909.
