REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE CITIZENS OF MAPLETON

At the close of the winter terms now in session we shall have had a school of thirty weeks. We have been more fortunate this year than we were last in securing trained teachers, and the work done in our schools has been therefore of a higher standard. I am sure that the work done in some of our schools will compare favorably with that done in any town in the state. We have employed but two inexperienced teachers, and in those two cases the work done has justified our choice of teacher. But the lack of trained teachers is a great drawback to our schools. Perhaps it is not practicable just at the present time to hire Normal graduates for all our schools, but I suggest that each voter give the matter careful thought. It means an additional \$500.00 of school money, but it will increase the efficiency of our schools at least 50 per cent. There is usually that difference between the trained and untrained teacher, though the untrained teacher may make this up through experience. Where a teacher has given satisfaction we have strived to retain them in that school for the full year, and this has added to the efficiency of our schools. While our average attendance has been some two per cent higher than last year, it seems that 18 per cent or almost one fifth of our scholars being absent is absolutely unnecessary. One fifth of our school money then is wasted through irregular attendance. Will not the parents cooperate with the teachers and school officials to stop this leak in

results which should be obtained from our common schools? Send your pupils every day unless prevented by illness and you will see your child's interest begin to awaken where it is now flagging.

Am glad to note that more parents visited the schools this year than last, and I personally know several cases where this has been of great advantage to some particular pupil or teacher. We trust that during the coming year you will make still greater use of this privilege to get in closer touch with our schools. Several of our schools have given entertainments to earn money with to beautify and brighten their school rooms. The Lovely school has finished paying for their organ, while the Old Mill school has a substantial sum which they are willing to give towards the purchase of new seats, but which they need to purchase reference books, pictures for the wall, etc. Nor should we forget to mention the organ given to the Casey school through the kindness of Horace Higgins. Some action should be taken by the town in relation to the Griffin Ridge school, where the attendance has again fallen so low that a vote of the town will be necessary to continue it.

SCHOOL HOUSE REPAIRS

The Old Mill schoolhouse has been thoroughly repaired during the past year, and but two things are needed to make it a modern schoolroom, modern seats and up to date heating apparatus. The seats will cost about \$60.00, while we can get a heating, self ventilating system for \$90.00. While the school is willing to help in purchase of these seats, it would seem that the town should be willing to expend the amount mentioned for that purpose. The out buildings must be renovated during the coming year. The Lovely schoolhouse has been slightly repaired and the woodshed has been rebuilt. New outbuildings have been placed at the Park school. During the year the outbuildings at the Dennett School should be thoroughly repaired, and minor repairs will be necessary at several schoolhouses. Many of the school houses are in need of painting and at least three should be painted during the coming year.

TEXT BOOKS

We shall need a new physiology introduced into our schools, as the one we have is not only out of date but is worn out as well. We will have to buy new books in any event, and it seems wiser to put in an up to date text book, one that deals more fully with the evil effects of alcoholic drinks and narcotics.

Would also favor a new grammar as we have several different kinds, but not enough of any one kind to go around. If our schools are to be graded uniformly we must have uniform textbooks.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Mapleton qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said Mapleton on Monday, the 17th day of March, A. - 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High school tuition.
- 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads.
- 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for bridges.
- 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing schoolhouses and appliances for the ensuing year.

16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy text books.

17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.

18 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest.

19 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidentals for the ensuing year.

20 To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provision of chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine of the year 1909 as amended by chapter 69 of the public laws of 1909, also chapter 21 public laws of 1911 and chapter 183 public laws 1911 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1913.

28 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be expended on the Pulciper road near Teakettle Brook.

29 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build road from the north east corner of lot no 96 south to Melvins Archers.

30 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to build

gravel side walks in village, if so how much.

31 To see if the town will accept list of Jurors as prepared by town officers.
