

## WARRANT

To H. H. Higgins a constable in the town of Mapleton, in the County of Aroostook, Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Mapleton qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Grange Hall, in said Mapleton, the 19th day of March, A. D. 1917, at 10. o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the town will accept report as printed.
- 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose Town Treasurer, and vote him compensation for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to have one, two or three road Commissioners and
- 7. To see if the town will vote that the collector of taxes be required to give bonds to settle in full with the Selectmen, for all taxes, committed to him by Feb. 20, 1918.
- 8. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, and vote him his compensation.

- 9. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 10. To see on what dates the taxes shall be due, and what date any part thereof shall be collected; also to see if the town will vote to charge interest and what percent on all taxes remaining unpaid Nov. 1st, 1917.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid before certain dates; if so, how much, and on what dates.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for high school for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouses and appliances for the ensuing year.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy text books.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.
- 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest.
- 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for incidentals for the ensuing year.

- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of sixty dollars to help defray the expenses of county nurse for tuberculosis.
- of appropriating, and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 22. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvements of the sections of the state aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the law allows to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 23. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of state aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets.
- 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1500 to pay note No. One given in 1914 and due Jan. 1st, 1918.
- 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial expenses.
- 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to have vocal music taught in school.

- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise \$300 to buy chemical engine.
- 29. To see what action if any, the town will take in regard to bridge across the North Branch in Mapleton Village.
- 30. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes on the Mapleton Flour and Feed Co.'s mill at Mapleton village for the year 1917.
- 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the School Committee to withdraw from the present union of schools.
- 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to join with either or any of the following towns, to wit: Castle Hill, Chapman, or such other towns as it may deem expedient, for the purpose of employing a superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of sections 55 to 62 inclusive, of Chapter 16, of the revised satutes.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Grange Hall, Mapleton, March 19th, 1917, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Mapleton, I herewith submit my second annual report of the condition and progress of your schools for the municipal year just closed:

Of the ten rural and grade teachers employed in the town of Mapleton six are Normal school graduates, three have had one year's work, or thereabouts, at Normal school and the other, Miss Unice Woodworth, is a graduate of Bangor high school and has had two years' work at the Bangor Theological Seminary.

While we realize that there is always a chance to improve in school work, yet we feel that these teachers as a whole have worked faithfully for the advancement of the pupils under their care and good progress has been made.

It is regarded unfair to the teachers in general to make comments regarding the work of any particular teacher, yet I feel that I may be pardoned for making special mention of the work of Miss Emma Blackstone in the New Mill school, as this school presents problems more difficult than those presented by any other school in the town. The school is made up of the first four grades and has a total enrollment of some fifty pupils. This school room is supplied with double seats, thus making the discipline much more difficult than it would be were the room supplied with single seats. Miss Blackstone has proven herself equal to the situation and I feel that her work has been all that could be expected under the above conditions.

I would recommend for the coming year, owing to the exceedingly high cost of building material, that the schools of Mapleton village be continued under the same arrangements as this year, but I would most earnestly urge that those having

charge of your schools the coming school year give much thought to the arrangements to be made in the Spring of 1918 to accommodate those children who will present themselves for enrollment in the schools the following Fall.

It seems altogether possible that the enrollment in the High school by that time will have reached that point when it will no longer be possible to continue the ninth grade in that building, then it will be absolutely necessary to provide a building for an Intermediate school to relieve the congestion at the New Mill school and to provide for the fifth and possibly sixth grades which will be crowded out of the grammar school room owing to the return to that school of the ninth grade.

I feel that the matter of providing more school rooms for Mapleton village is worthy of the most careful consideration by the citizens of Mapleton because the school enrollment in a village as a rule increases much faster than one would naturally anticipate and it is with this thought in mind that I have called this matter to your attention at this time. I believe that it would be a matter of economy to construct a two room building instead of a one room building. It would only be a comparatively short time when both rooms would be needed.

Detailed statements of the several school accounts are given in the selectmen's report so will not be repeated here.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I most respectively submit a brief report of the music study in the public schools. The work has been a continuation of last year's study with the exception that chorus work has been added to the High school course. Here I found excellent material and much interest.

The rural schools are doing well in technic and theory. Good results are sure to follow in the future.

A musical instrument has been placed in every school in the town with the exception of the New Mill school. It is to be regretted that no instrument is found in this school, as the attendance is large and the litle folks are especially bright in music.

In concluding allow me to thank the School Committee and Superintendent as well as the teachers in the several schools for their interest and support.

## HIGH SCHOOL

The Mapleton high school has measured up to our most sanguine expectations. During the summer months courses of study were arranged as follows: a College Preparatory course, an English course and a Commercial course. On the basis of the English course I secured an "A" grade rating for the school and the school is now classed as an "A" grade High school. The town is no longer liable for the tuition of any student who may go out of town to attend a Secondary school.

We now have fifty-two students enrolled in the High school proper and eleven students in the ninth grade. Nineteen of the former and four of the latter are tuition scholars. Indications are that there will be from sixty-five to seventy pupils in the High school proper the coming school year.

The teaching force of the High school is made up as follows: G. H. Gove, a graduate of Bates College, principal; Leila Jordan, a graduate of Bates college, and Julia Hamburger, a graduate of the Bryant Stratton Commercial School, assistants.

All of these teachers are working faithfully for the advancement of the pupils in the school and good progress is

being made. Few High schools in small towns have made such a good showing in so short a time and I trust that the citizens of Mapleton and vicinity may continue to give the school their loyal suppor that its progress may not be impeded.

## TEXT BOOKS.

I have been obliged to overdraw the text book account considerable in order to supply the schools with suitable books. In reality I have not had as good a supply of books for the grades as I should like as the demands for books for the High school have been more than I anticipated. This condition, together with the fact that text books have advanced in price, compel me to ask for a larger appropriation for the coming school year.

#### REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES

New seats were bought for the assembly room of the High school building. Seats were also bought for the Lovely school. A new stove was placed in the Park school.

A cabinet and three laboratory tables were purchased for the physical laboratory of the High school and enough apparatus to meet the minimum requirements of an "A" grade school.

Three typewriters were purchased for the Commercial Department of the High school.

The chemical laboratory must be equipped for the coming school year and enough chemicals bought to meet the minimum requirements.

Some kind of heating system must be installed in the grammar school building.

The Park school building should be repaired on the interior. It seems that the most economical way of doing this would be by replastering where needed and by painting the whole interior of the building such colors as would add to the lighting of the building and at the same time make the room more attractive.

The heating and ventilation could be greatly improved in this room by placing the stove in the back part of the room, building a jacket around the stove, providing for an intake of pure air. There is already a register in the chimney giving vent for the impure air of the room.

In concluding this report I desire to express my appreciation to the Superintending School Committee and citizens in general for the generous assistance rendered me while I have been associated with your schools.
