To the School Committee:

I have the honor of submitting to you my third annual report.

COMMON SCHOOLS

We have been fortunate in securing a strong force of teach-

ers for our elementary schools. All have had previous teaching experience and all are hard workers devoted to their schools. They should be encouraged to improve their preparation. We have a good percentage of State Normal graduates.

We ought to make the salaries of our common school teachers high enough to secure for the children thorough instruction in the common branches. When we have taught the pupils to read intelligently, to write and talk correctly, and to handle numbers efficiently, we have put them in a fair way to obtain a good education. A good start in the common schools will strengthen the work of later years.

We are recommending an appropriation of \$7,000.00 for common schools for the ensuing year.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

We should employ a school physician. The health of our children should be given all possible attention. Our teachers are doing good work in physical education, but with all their regular duties taking their time and energy, they need some outside help for the special subjects. The work in the high school has been carried on under the direction of the principal. We are following the plan of the State, and are expecting State aid.

INDUSTRIAL COURSES

A course in Household Economics has been introduced. The course in Agriculture has been postponed until a suitable instructor can be secured. The handwork does not take away from the value of the book studies. It serves rather as a chance to put in practice theories learned, and helps the regular subjects.

REPAIRS AND APPLIANCES

New steps have been made for the Packard schoolhouse. The shed and the toilets still need attention.

At the Griffin Ridge schoolhouse the shed has been rebuilt and the toilets have been arranged so as to be entered from the

schoolroom. A new stove with ventilating jacket, fresh air intake and foul air outlet, has been installed.

The Hughes schoolhouse has had a second coat of paint.

The New Mill schoolhouse has been painted inside and outside. A new outbuilding has been made. The State plans were used. We have five schoolhouses which should have similar arrangements. It ought to be possible to care for them within two or three years.

The stoves at the Wilson and the Park schoolhouses have been jacketed.

The heating system of the High School building had to have extensive repairs on account of a freeze-up in the Christmas vacation. The office and the book room have been supplied with radiators.

The store in the Grange building has been divided into a classroom and a laboratory.

The Park, the Packard, the Hughes and the New Mill schoolhouses should be provided with single seat desks for the pupils. Many cases of defective sight and impaired health can be traced to improper lighting and seating during schooldays.

We need an appropriation of \$3,000 00 for repairs and appliances.

MODEL SCHOOL

The model rural school is carried on this year in the Park Schoolhouse and is in charge of a well trained and efficient teacher. The other teachers have opportunity to observe the work on Saturdays. The helping teacher is ready to visit other schools on Mondays.

JANITORS

We are asking the teachers, in nearly all of the schools, to have oversight of the buildings. They are given authority to employ help for the janitor work. The wages of the janitors will be included in the salaries of the teachers in most cases. For the High School building and the Grange Hall, we should secure a man of mechanical ability, and he should have the authority and responsibility of a teacher.

BOOKS

It is our aim to give each child a good, clean book for each subject. In addition to this, supplementary and reference books are needed. The events of the past few years make desirable a supply of new geographies and histories as soon as the new census figures can be included.

We are asking for a book appropriation of \$1,500.00.

MAPLETON HIGH SCHOOL

The high school continues to grow in numbers and influence. It has a thoroughly trained faculty, working together in harmony in spite of heavy programs and crowded quarters.

The death of our music teacher, Miss Caroline A. MacDonald, is a severe blow. Her loss is greatly felt in the school and in the community.

The use of the Grange Hall is helping to solve the problem of room. When conditions become settled, the town should seriously consider the question of enlarging the present high school building or of erecting a new one.

While we are waiting for better accommodations and more extensive equipment, the standard of the school must be maintained by the hearty support of the citizens.

For the coming year an appropriation of \$5,000.00 should be provided.

 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine.

The Junior-Senior High School opened on September 29, 1920, with a registration of one hundred and twenty-seven students. This shows a small increase as compared with the enrollment of last year. Since there has not been any addition to the high school building, the faculty are laboring under practically the same handicaps as of former years. But nevertheless, good work, and results are being obtained in each department.

One of the most fundamental factors in making any educational institution a success, is to have modern text books. In this respect (as far as financial circumstances would permit) we are very fortunate in obtaining some for each student. For this new advancement in the right kind of education, much credit is due to our efficient school officials.

The good work done by the boys and girls in athletics (last year, and so far this) has been very successful in many respects. The students have become more interested in their school, and consequently, a better grade of work is being done. For pupils are not permitted to participate in any games unless they have a passing mark in all studies. By this new ruling, all students who wish to take part in athletics are constantly endeavoring to do better work in each subject. Again, the school has improved, for the entire student body have come to realize that the peo-

ple of the town are interested in what they are doing. This interest and loyalty has been shown by the able support and cheerful enthusiasm at all the athletic contests. Also by the donation that was given to the M. H. S. A. A. last fall. Personally, I feel that athletics has been the nucleus of causing the closer relation between the town's people, and all that which pertains to the betterment of the schools.

In the physical education department, each student is required to do forms of calisthenics that give all the muscles sufficient exercise to keep them in good health. During the winter months, we are handicapped, and as a result, the exercises are not as successful. But, regardless of all the inconveniences, each student is somewhat improved physically.

I wish to thank the faculty, school board and citizens of Mapleton, for their earnest cooperation.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE

To the Superintendent:

In spite of the many difficulties which always occur during the first year of such a course as Domestic Science, we have an enrollment of twenty-eight students, all of whom have an intense interest in their work.

The work in the Junior High consists of sewing, principally hand sewing, with a very little machine work.

The work in the Freshman-Sophomore class and in the Junior-Senior class is necessarily very much alike, since this is the first year. Their sewing classes are held in the assembly room and in the Grange Hall. In neither of these places have we the proper kind of chairs. We have learned the construction of the foundation stitches and have applied them to the making of plain garments. We have used a few commercial patterns and have drafted a few of the easier ones. As we have no ma-

chines, the students must do all their machine stitching outside of class. Many of them are living in town this winter, and they either have to do all their stitching when they have an opportunity to go home, or do all the work by hand. This is a great inconvenience. We should have at least two good machines, proper chairs and cutting tables.

Our work in cookery has been carried on in the Grange Hall kitchen. Here we have a two-burner oil stove and a very small equipment of dishes. We also have the use of the range and the dishes belonging to the Grange. By far the greater part of our supplies are given by the girls themselves. Under these circumstances the work cannot be as successful as under ideal conditions. We have taken up the study of carbohydrates and are now studying proteins. We have prepared plain dishes in order to give the students the practice work, but we are handicapped by the lack of text-books and equipment.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the superintendent of schools, the school board and the citizens of the town for their cooperation in this work.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Mapleton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Grange Hall, in said town of Mapleton, the 21st day of March, A. D., 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3 To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town report as printed.

Art. 4 To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 5 To see if the Town will vote to have one, two, or three Road Commissioners and elect same for the ensuing year.

Art. 6 To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year and vote his compensation.

Art. 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year and vote his compensation.

Art. 8 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 9 To see what dates the taxes shall be due, and what date any part thereof shall be collected; also to see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Nov. 1st, 1921, and what per cent.

Art. 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for common schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 11 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School for the ensuing year.

Art. 12 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouses and school appliances for the ensuing year.

Art. 14 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for text books for the ensuing year.

Art. 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for incidentals for the ensuing year.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay interest.

Art. 18 To see if the Town will vote Yes or No on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 19 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 20 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting streets.

Art. 21 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4500, or any part thereof, to pay Town order, given Jan. 1921, and due Jan. 1922, the same being money hired to pay High School Building note held by Houlton National Bank.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial expenses.

Art. 23 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans.

Art. 24 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to employ a School Physician, as the law provides.

Art. 25 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for medical inspection for the ensuing year.

Art. 26 To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to housing the Chemical Engines, and what amount of money the Town will vote to raise for same.

Art. 27 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase or lease a piece of land, and move the Lockup onto same; and if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for same.

Art. 28 To see what action the Town will take in regard to bill of Allen Plumbing Co.; same being for repairs on heating plant at High School.

Art. 29 To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors, as laid out by the Selectmen, and deposited with the Town Clerk.

Art. 30 To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Grange Hall, March 21, 1921, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
