TEACHERS

Our teachers are doing good work. They have prepared themselves for their profession. In most cases satisfactory results are being obtained. It is our policy to encourage our teachers to improve themselves while in service. Parents and citizens can help make our schools better by showing a friendly spirit and a loyal attitude toward the teachers.

REPAIRS AND APPLIANCES

At the Packard School a new woodshed has been attached to the schoolhouse, with improved toilet arrangements. The Hughes School should have similar work done during the coming summer.

The furnace at the Lovely School has been repaired.

We have secured a few seats for the Park School. We shall need a few more for this as well as for other schools. The best type for us seems to be the movable chair-desk. These come in six different sizes. They enable us to equip a room easily according to the number and ages of the pupils.

Our High School building should be provided with a fire escape, if we are to use it through the coming year without an addition. In case the town decides to enlarge the building, another exit will be arranged.

INSURANCE, RENT, LIGHT AND POWER

We have increased the amount of insurance carried on our schoolhouses. This additional protection calls for an increased appropriation.

In December the Grange Hall was destroyed by fire. We were unable to save the greater part of the equipment used by the Commercial and Home Economics classes. Through the courtesy of the Pastor and Trustees of the neighboring church we were given the use of a convenient basement during the re mainder of the term. In January we moved the classes into a

house owned by Mr. O. H. Smith. We shall be able to carry on the work until the close of the school year. If the town's financial condition will permit, it would seem wise to start an addition to the High School building. The school has been cramped for several years.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL.

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine.

The Junior—Senior High School opened on September 12, 1923, with a registration of one hundred and thirty-seven students. This is remarkable for a town of this size and shows the interest which the citizens of Mapleton have in the education of their children. Since the loss of the Grange Hall, it has been necessary to use four rooms in the Smith house for domestic science and commercial work. These rooms are not appropriate for recitations, as they are poorly lighted, ventilation is bad, and there is always too much of a draft to be safe for children to sit at their work. Consequently, the pupils are not accomplishing as much as they ought.

Physical education has been conducted for both boys and girls. The girls have been divided into groups under the supervision of Miss Hill, and hold their own physical exercises. Exer-

cises for the boys have been held in the assembly room. These exercises consist of calisthenics and such exercises which will develop correct posture. We should educate our boys and girls physically as well as mentally. Better work could be accomplished in a gymnasium yet fairly good results are being accomplished under present conditions. It was necessary to discontinue basket ball this year. Some provision ought to be made for this sport next year. It helps to give "School Spirit" which is essential for the greatest success of the school.

The members of the faculty this year are nearly all teachers of experience and have earnestly worked for the best interests of the school. In spite of the crowded condition of our building, the work has been carried on by the respective teachers with a high degree of efficiency.

Parents and friends are cordially invited to visit the school at any time. It is an inspiration to the teacher to have parents visit as often as possible. You are always welcome.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude to the faculty, superintendent, school board and citizens for the co-operation you have given me and the interest which you have shown in the education of the children of this district.

HOME ECONOMICS

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine.

There are in the Home Economics classes this year 51 girls including 8 juniors and seniors who are registered in the recitation course in Household Management.

The girls of the Junior High School have had one-half year of cooking, in which the selection of foods was stressed. The laboratory work was based upon selection in relation health. The aim in these courses was to make all the problems practical for use in the girls' homes. The ninth grade girls learned to plan, prepare and serve simple well balanced meals. These courses changed to sewing for the eighth and ninth grades at the middle of the year. In this work the girls will learn the construction of garments beginning with the very simple problems and working toward those involving more complicated processes. These students are greatly handicapped in their work because of the lack of sewing machines which means some loss of time as much of the work must be done by machines. The problems will be chosen by the girls themselves according to their needs as shown by the clothing budgets which they have worked out for the coming year.

The Sophomores had sewing for the first half year. Selection and care of clothing were emphasized. The girls made nightgowns, bloomers and slips, learning the use of commercial patterns and the simple principles of garment construction. Their last problem was a blouse which combined with the

simple processes the additional problem of sleeves and the application of bias facings and pipings for decorative finishes. These girls will take up for the last half of the year work in foods based upon meal planning and preparation.

In all of the Home Economics courses given to the girls of the ninth grade and the High School, the State Outline has been followed as closely as possible.

Although the work of this department has been more or less broken up because of the loss of the laboratory, a great deal has been accomplished due to the spirit with which the girls have worked even under serious difficulties.

I wish to thank all those who have given support to the work in Home Economics by their interest and cooperation.

- ART. 5 To see if the Townwill vote to have one, two or three Road Commissioners and elect same for the ensuing year.
- ART 6 To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- ART. 9 To see what date the taxes shall be due and what date any part thereof shall be collected; also to see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Nov. 1, 1924, and what per cent.
