Our schools have had a very successful year. The teachers are well trained and earnest workers.

Only slight repairs have been made. The Park school is greatly in need of a heating system. The High School building needs painting. A small outlay on the windows and a temporary shelter for the front porch would make the students more comfortable and might save fuel. It would be well to move the chemical laboratory to the east end of the building, leaving the present quarters for a small recitation room. The foundation wall of the New Mill school should receive attention. Several of the common schools need desks for the pupils and wall maps for the school rooms.

The question of transportation should be carefully considered. Experience seems to show that better results are being obtained in our consolidated schools. The offer of the State to help furnish vehicles for conveyance is worth attention.

Our appropriations have not been large enough to pay for fuel, books and supplies. Some individuals and companies have agreed to wait until after the annual town meeting for payment of their bills. Wood should be purchased when it can be secured at the best advantage. In order to do the best work books and supplies have to be obtained when they are needed. All bills should be paid when the town books are closed.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Junior-Senior High School opened on October 5 with a registration of 120. Since that date some students have entered and a few have left school for different reasons so that we have had a total of 135 and a present registration of 128.

In spite of the fact that school commenced one month later than usual, the matter of absence has been a serious one and a handicap to both scholars and teachers. If scholars are to accomplish satisfactory results in school, regular attendance is necessary.

The school is fortunate this year in having an almost entirely experienced faculty. All the teachers are doing good work, and are loyal and cooperative. That spirit has been a great factor in making this a pleasant and successful year.

For the first time, the high school has been placed for trial on the approved list of schools. This gives the scholars who have received certified rank the privilege of entering any one of the fourteen leading colleges in New England without examinations. The record of our scholars to one of these colleges will determine whether or not we shall remain on the approved list.

Debating has been introduced as an interscholastic activity. On March 19, the four schools of Mapleton, Washburn, Aroostook Central Institute and Houlton High School will engage in a four cornered debate. The winner will go to Bates to compete with the winners of other leagues. We feel that this is an activity worthy of note in the training of young people and hope it will be continued in the future.

It has been a pleasure to have so many parents visit the school during the year. I wish it were possible for every parent and citizen interested in the work of the school to visit. You are always welcom.

For the third time I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent, School Board and citizens for their co-operation.

COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

There are three subjects which we might consider the most important in a commercial course, bookkeeping, typewriting and shorthand.

Both the beginners and the advanced classes in bookkeeping have sets resembling a modern business man's books. Before the work on the sets was started, the theory work in the text book was first taken up. Besides the set work, practical bookkeeping problems have been given. For example, when working on partnership sets, pupils were re-

quired to make out bookkeeping entries for an imaginary business.

This year there are thirty-two boys and girls taking typewriting. In the beginner's class the time has been spent in learning the mechanism of the machines, how to operate them, and rhythm drills. These rhythm drills enable a beginner to become acquanited with the keys, and to write with ease. In the second year class the proper arrangement of a business letter on a page has been emphasized. As one of the essential points of a good typist is speed, the tests prepared by the different typewriting companies have been given to increase the speed of the advanced classes. By this speed work many pupils have won "Proficiency Cards" and "Medals" which are awarded by the typewriting companies.

In the beginner's shorthand class most of the time has been spent in learning the fundamental principles. These principles have to be mastered before the pupil can acquire skill in taking down shorthand characters. The advanced class reviewed the work of last year and have taken the rest of the required theory work. To give the class practice in reading back their own notes, they have required to transcribe their shorthand characters in the typewriting classes.

A suggestion that I would make, would be, that penmanship be a required subject for all those taking the commercial course.

I wish to thank those who have made this department a success.

HOME ECONOMICS

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This year, because of a few new pieces of equipment and the spirit in which the girls have worked, I feel that the Home Economics work has gone on very well. In tood study, emphasis is being put upon selection of proper food rather than preparation. Posters are used to show in pictorial form the effects of proper and improper food habits. In the clothing work stress is laid upon the selection of materials, proper styles and materials for school girls and hygiene of clothing.

A new plan for shorter unit courses is being put into practice this year in accordance with the state outline. The aim is to give the pupils a broader and more appreciative view of home activities. For grade eight of the Junior High School the following units are being used: foods, clothing, child care, hygiene and first aid. For grade nine the following short course: sanitation, textiles and clothing, first aid and hygiene are being given.

A definite two-year course in Home Economics is to be offered as an elective to girls of the Senior High School. Both years will include the short unit courses of more advanced work.

The school lunch has been carried on during the winter term in connection with the Home Economics work. I wish to thank all those who have made it possible to continue this part of the work.

To A. M. Dicker, a Constable in the town of Mapleton, in the County of Aroostook and State of Maine.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Mapleton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Methodist church in the said town of Mapleton, the 15th day of March, A. D. 1926, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Town Report as printed.
- ART. 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to have one, two or three Road Commissioners and elect same for ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

- ART. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, and vote him his compensation.
- ART. 8. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To see what date the taxes shall be due and what date any part thereof shall be collected; also to see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Nov. 1, 1926, and what per cent.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common Schools for the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of school houses and school appliances for the ensuing year.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for text books and supplies for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Incidentals for the ensuing year.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money to town will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid for the ensuing year.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote YES or NO on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$533, for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial expenses.

- ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans.
- ART. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Medical Inspection for the ensuing year.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money and if so, how much, to be expended by the Board of Health for the suppression and prevention of tuberculosis.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be turned over to the Mapleton Fire Co., to be used for fire protection for the town of Mapleton, and if so, how much.
- ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance, rent, light and power.
- ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to institute a town ordinance forbidding children under the age of fifteen years to be upon the village streets between the hours of nine o'clock p. m. and sunrise, unless accompanied by parent or guardian, and elect some person to enforce the same, or act anything relating thereto.
- ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars to pay note on fire truck due in 1926.

- ART. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on road leading from Main road to Creasy Ridge school house and if so, how much.
- ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to grade lot at Lovley school.
- ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to install street light on east side of track at State road.
- ART. 37. To see if the town will vote the compensation of the selectmen.
- ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to buy one or more road machines and if so raise the sum of money to pay for same.
- ART. 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

ART. 40. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Methodist Church March 15, 1926, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
