Our schools have had a very good year. All our teachers are normal school or college graduates and they are doing good work.

The yard at the New Mill School has been graded. The school room needs painting and a little change in the ventilating system. The Old Mill school house might be improved by making a single entrance to take the place of the present two entrances. The windows should be placed on one side of the building.

The Griffin Ridge school house has been newly painted and shingled. The Hughes, the Park and the Creasy Ridge school-houses need painting. The yard at the Packard School should be drained. The shed might be enlarged or rebuilt to good advantage.

The new heating system at the Lovley School is giving good service. The old furnace with its registers should be removed before the next school year begins. The heating system at the Creasy Ridge School can be put into good condition by securing a few repair parts. The system at the Park School is inadequate. When it is replaced the stove can be very satisfactorily installed at the New Mill School.

The site left vacant by the burning of the Grange Hall has been acquired by the town and added to the school grounds.

Good use is being made of the present facilities at the High School building, but when times become more prosperous provision for enlargement should be undertaken.

The school attendance this year, as the above records show, has been very good. Another remarkable fact is the healthy condition that seems to be prevalent among the students, and the sanitation that is being practiced by the parents of those students who are absent because of contagious diseases.

The school day was shortened twenty minutes after the Christmas Holidays. These twenty minutes were taken from the thirty-five minute recess in the forenoon. This long morning recess was put into the school years ago when the school had a director of physical education and music and also a hall for physical exercise. The change was made for the following reasons: First, the school day was too long. Second, the school has no place to carry on any kind of physical exercise. Third, the students living far from school could get home earlier, especially during the winter months. Fourth, the students interested in sports, plays, orchestra and other extra-curricula activities would have a chance to practice after school instead of having to come to evening rehearsals, as was the case with the orchestra.

The school now has two orchestras under the direction of Mrs. Kolouch. One is called the Senior Orchestra and includes the students who have played in the orchestra in the past years.

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The other is called the Junior Orchestra and includes all students who have never played in the orchestra or who have had only a limited number of lessons in music.

Our membership in the Bates Debating League was discontinued this year for lack of a sufficient number of students interested in debating.

The number of students who went out for winter sports was small when compared with those capable of such things. We are, however, proud of those who did go out and the fine showing they made at Ashland. The fare to Ashland and return was borne on a fifty-fifty basis by those who went and the Student Council. The Student Council has also purchased enough lumber to build a platform that will remain the property of the Council. This platform is being built by the students under my direction and will be used for staging purposes in school and also for our annual outdoor graduation. The platform can be set up and dismantled by the students without the use of nails and with a very small amount of labor. The Council has purchased a good pencil sharpener for the main room and is also having the students make a bulletin board for the main room that will be used by the school as a calendar of the month. Every member of the Council will then become a reporter for this calendar and so an inactive Student Council will become active.

We cannot overstress the need of a gymnasium. Again I wish to say that in this part of our educational program we, as a school, are not and cannot do our part until we have some kind of a place for our extra-curricula activities.

Much needed physics equipment has ben added to our small supply on hand. The Commercial department has also had a few additions in the form of typewriters. This latter department is continuing its good work in handling the school routine work and also all types of clerical and business work for the various school organizations and teachers.

The Editorial Board is working on the Maple Leaf and hopes to have the publication out the last of May.

The monthly publication of the Honor Roll has done much to improve the scholarship of the school as a whole. The Honor Roll was put into effect last April with the idea of improving scholarship. In brief, the plan is as follows: Every month the names of all students securing a rank of B or better in all their courses are placed on the A-B list. Students securing a rank of C or better in all their courses have their names placed on the A-B-C list. These lists are then posted on the school bulletin board and copies are sent to two newspapers for publication.

The school year thus far has been very successful and our aim is to make it still more so. In order to do this, we need the cooperation of everyone, whether student, teacher, parent or friend. We have had this cooperation in the past and have been very grateful for it. With its continuance I am sure the school will progress steadily.

## COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following subjects are offered in the commercial course this year: bookkeeping business methods, law, and typewriting. Commercial geography is taught during the second semester in the place of law.

The bookkeeping is taught by means of equations which show that every transaction increases or decreases an asset, a liability, or the proprietorship. Both the beginning and the advanced pupils who study bookeeping have a certain number of bookkeeping problems to do. In addition to these, the classes use sets which consist of books similar to those used by the modern business man. This procedure develops the reasoning power of the pupil; for tracing the effects of business transactions from their inception to their completion demands sustained, accurate thinking of the type expected in after-chool life. If the pupil can interpret these records from the point of view of the manager as well as from the point of view of the bookkeeper, it is a good sign that he is acquiring both an understandable and a useable knowledge of the subject.

Some of the old typewriters have been exchanged for new ones. This has aided the pupils to do better work, as the typewriters must function properly in order for the pupils to do their best. In the typewriting classes, I have the beginners learn the parts of the machine. They, then, study the letters of the keyboard, learn the position of each letter, and practice so as to write from the copy without looking on the keyboard. They strive first for accuracy rather than speed. The pupils practice exercises which are assigned to them each month. Each exercise is written at least four times. The pupils try to make each copy as nearly perfect as possible, because their grade depends upon neatness and accuracy. If a scholar feels he may do better work by writing an exercise more than four times, he is permitted to do so.

The second year pupils in typewriting start in the exercise book with the exercises dealing with information about letters. These students write themes and also do all of the typewriting for the school. All of those pupils who study typewriting have speed tests, occasionally; and they keep a graph showing the number of words written per minute and the number of errors made on each test.

The business methods course is given to the sophomores who are interested in commercial work. Business forms and methods which are common to all types of business are studied and prac-

ticed, as far as possible, by doing exercises and by using the information gained from the textbook and from supplementary sources. The pupils learn, among other things, to prepare business papers and to file business records. The various departments of business establishments and the duties of persons occupying positions in these departments are carefully studied. Some commercial arithmetic is taught in this course, and the fundamentals of bookkeeping are taken up during the latter part of the year.

The law course is for the purpose of giving the pupil an understanding of some of the principles of law governing contracts, sales, negotiable instruments, bailments, insurance ,partnerships, corporations, and also some understanding of the courts and their jurisdiction.

We should be pleased to have more parents and citizens visit the commercial department.

#### GREETING:

In the Name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhibitants of the Town of Mepleton, qualified by Law to vote in Town affairs to assemble at the Methodist Church in said Town of Mapleton on the sixteenth day of March, A. D., 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit;

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2.—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART 3. —To see if the Town will vote to except the Town Report as printed.

ART. 4.—To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

ART. 5.—To see if the Town will elect a Road Commissioner, or leave the care of the roads with the Selectmen.

ART. 6.—To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ART. 7.—To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, and vote his compensation, also to see what part of his pensation the Town will vote to pay him before settlement is made in full.

ART. 8.—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 9.—To see what date the Taxes shall be due, and what date any part thereof shall be collected, also if the Town will vote to charge interest on all Taxes remaining unpaid November 1st., 1931, and what per cent.

ART. 10.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 11.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School for the ensuing year.

ART. 12.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 13.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Repair of School Houses, and School Appliances for the ensuing year.

ART. 14.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Text Books and Supplies for the ensuing year.

ART. 15.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 16.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Incidentals for the ensuing year.

ART. 17.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Interest for the ensuing year.

ART. 18.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Support of Poor for the ensuing year.

ART. 19.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Mothers Aid for the ensuing year.

ART. 20.—To see if the Town will vote Yes, or No, on the question of appropriation and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and Chapter 154, P. L. 1917, as amended by Chapter 157, P. L. 1919.

Beginning at the Presque Isle town line in the Town of Mapleton and extending, via State Aid road No. 2 in the Town of Mapleton, State Aid No. 1 in the Town of Castle Hill, third class No. 2 in Town of Ashland, to route No. 158 in the towns of Ashland and Marsardis, and 9 range 5 to the mouth of the Oxbow road, thence to the end of State Aid No. 1 in the Town of Oxbow.

ART. 22.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lighting Streets for the ensuing year.

ART. 23.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expense.

ART. 24.—To see if the Town wil authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans.

ART. 25.—To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, to be expended by the Board of Health for the suppression and prevention of Tuberculosis.

ART. 26.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be turned over to the Mapleton Fire Company, to be used for fire protection.

ART. 27.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Insurance, and Light for the ensuing year.

ART. 28.—To see if the Town will will vote to raise a sum of money to maintain State Aid and Third Class roads in the Town, and if so, how much, for the ensuing year.

ART. 29.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Outstanding Notes and Town Orders for the ensuing year.

ART. 30—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and grant to be expended and used for Advertising the National resources of the State of Maine.

ART. 31.—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to . raise for Medical Inspection for the ensuing year.

ART. 32.—To see if the Town will vote to accept from Calvin C. Smith the sum of one hundred (100) dollars, in trust, the income of the same to be used each year for the care of his lot in the old Mapleton Cemetery, lot No. 4, number 78.

ART. 33.—To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to repair the Condon Road, said road running from State Aid road No. 1 to the Creasey Ridge road near Fred Wilson's.

ART. 34.—To see if the Town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to open and maintain the Dennett School for the next school year.

ART. 35.—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and convey land held by Tax Deeds.

ART. 36.—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and convey the Casey School house and lot.

ART. 37.—To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for repairing road, leading from State Aid road No. 1 south by Casey house to Thomas corner.

ART. 38.—To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for repairing Teakettle brook road, so-called.
