In spite of the business depression, our schools have had a very successful year. The teachers have worked faithfully for the interests of the pupils.

The walls of the New Mill schoolroom have been improved. A new register makes the ventilating system more efficient.

The Hughes and the Park schoolhouses have been painted. The interiors need better decoration. Through the courtesy of the highway department, the yard at the Packard School has been put in better condition.

The Lovley schoolhouse needs painting. When circumstances permit, attention should be given to the paint at the High School and at Creasy Ridge.

At the last annual meeting, the town authorized us to open the Dennett School. This made it necessary to paint the building inside and outside and to shingle the roof. The school opened for the fall term in charge of Miss Smith, who taught the Griffin Ridge School last year. The latter school became too small to maintain, and arrangements were made to convey the pupils to Mapleton. Some of the equipment of the Griffin Ridge School was taken to the Dennett School. The opening of the Dennett School has made it unnecessary to continue to furnish conveyance to the Packard School. The windows and the toilets at the Dennett School should be changed to meet the standards of the State Department.

The estimate of school budget for the coming year is based on cur present standards. Some savings may be affected in items of fuel, material equipment and repairs. Any lowering of standards of teaching must be at the expense of our children. We shall strive to make the best of present conditions and look hopefully to the future.

#### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my report for the second semester of the school year 1930-1931 and the first semester of the school year 1931-1932.

A large monthly Honor Roll, a fine Senior Play, a successful baseball season, a high attendance record, and a self paying Maple Leaf marked the outstanding events of the second semester of 1931.

The school year came to a successful conclusion tune 5th with the graduation of thirteen students from the Sentor High School and twenty-five students from the Junior High School. Twelve students were awarded certificates of perfect a tendance for the school year 1930-1931. Of the thirteen seniors who graduated, two have gone on to institutions of higher learning and from the reports received from these institutions they are doing satisfactory work.

During the summer of 1931 the toilets were repaired and the sewerage system somewhat improved. Drinking fountains were also installed in both basements but it has been impossible to use these, since it was reported from Augusta by the Health authorities that the water supply is being in some way contaminated by sewerage. This is a great inconvenience to the students who should have water in the schoolhouse fit for drinking purposes.

The school year 1931-1932 opened September 14, 1931, with a registration that surpassed all previous records for the Mapleton Junior-Senior High School.

The attendance for the School Semester has been very good. The last two weeks of January brought down the percentage. During this period a great many students were out of school because of an epidemic of colds.

Due to the financial straits in which we find ourselves it has been decided not to publish the Maple Leaf this year.

The Senior Play, "The Road Back" will be presented in March and is being coached by Mrs. Kolouch. The School this year has only one orchestra and this is composed of many of the younger, inexperienced students but they are doing very well. They played for the Junior Contest in December, for the Knights of Pythias in February, and they will play for the Senior Play, Graduation and for School Assemblies.

The Junior Contest was a great success and the ten speakers were a credit to the school.

The Commercial department in spite of the increased registration has had very little added to its equipment. This department, as in previous years, is continuing its good work of handling much of the school routine work.

The Home Economics department has been teaching and practicing economy in every way possible.

All the students in the school are taking part in the Women's Christian Temperance Union Essay Contest and these essays will be ready for the Judges early in March.

At this time we are practicing for the County Winter Carnival which is to be held at Mars Hill, March 4th and 5th. We hope to send both a boys' team and a girls' team.

At this time I wish to extend to Mr. Webber, parents, teachers, friends, and students my thanks for their cooperation in helping to make Mapleton High School a better chool with each passing year.

# COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The commercial department of the High School offers the following courses of instruction for the year 1931-1932: book-keeping, business methods, economics and typewriting. All of the courses continue throughout the year.

The bookkeeping course is made up of beginning and advanced students. The individual method of instruction is followed which allows each pupil to progress as rapidly as is advisable. It also permits the student who finds the subject more difficult to go at a slower rate and to have an opportunity of gaining a more thorough understanding of the subject. The beginning course consists of the study of the "20th Century Bookkeeping" text and the completion of the exercises that are arranged in the workbook to accompany the text. The advanced students use "Bookkeeping and Accounting," College Edition, and the workbook that accompanies it. Both workbooks are supplimented by sets which give the student an opportunity to become familiar with business forms and methods. Throughout the course the pupil is impressed with the idea that business is conducted on the basis of equal exchange of values and that every transaction must be complete both in the equality of exchange and in the record of the transaction.

The business methods course is open to the sophomores and is intended to give them an introduction to bookkeeping which they will take up the following year. It seeks to give the student an understanding of business terms and documents and of the different poitions that are open to students. The student is also impressed with the value of continued study in higher schools of learning. It is not possible for the student to be too much impressed with the fact that more and more education is being demanded of the successful business man and woman as well as those who would enter any of the professions. The text used in

this course is "Elements of Business Training" by Brewer, Hurlbut and caseman. This is one of the new texts and is a most excellent one from the standpoint of presentation of material. To accompany this text there is a workbook containing exercises to suppliment the study of the text.

The course in economics is given with the purpose of acquainting the student with the fundamental laws that underlie all business and trade as well as the prosperity of the state and nation. Carver and Carmichael's "Elementary Economics" serves as a very good text. The work in this course consists of readings, discussions and problems.

There are three classes in typewriting. The first year class is taught the use of the machine and the proper method of manipulation fo the different devices. They are given exercises to familiarize them with the keys. At first the pupils are allowed six mistakes in the copy of an exercie, but as they advance the number of mistakes permitted is reduced until on the completion of the twenty-fifth exercise no errors in the copy are permitted.

The second year students are given exercises with the object of increasing the speed of operation. For this purpose each exercise is repeated ten times allowing the student to become familiar with certain combinations of keys before he passes on to others. This increases his speed of operation. All work in the second year must be without error in the copy of the exercise.

The third year students are given letters to copy with the purpose of further increasing their speed of operation and also to acquaint them with the proper form of business letters. The number of copies of exercises required is increased and errors ae not permitted in the copy or the form of the exercise. Speed tests are given once a month to show the improvement of the pupils from month to month.

The condition of the equipment in the department is good. Most all of the texts used in the courses are new this year. The typewriting books are worn but still usable and the machines are, with the exception of minor adjustments, in good condition. The

anticipated increase in the number of students taking the commercial course in the coming year will necessitate some additional equipment and the reconditioning of some of the machines at, the end of the present year.

#### TO THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

This year there have been seventy students enrolled in the Home Economics classes. Courses are being given in accordance with the state outline in Home Economics.

Courses which have been completed during the first semester are as follows, advanced needlework, clothing, care and renovation. In order to carry on our work with as little expense as possible we have not asked the students to purchase new materials: Dresses, skirts, and blouses have been remodled at a very low cost. Mending, knitting and patch work have also been included. Miss Edith Knight, our state health nurse kindly furnished material for fifteen problems for the Presque Isle Sanatorium. Other short courses in personal improvement, personal and family relationship, and home living, child care, home nursing and first aid have been emphasized.

Because of existing conditions it has seemed advisable to omit food preparations this year. The State Conference on Chi'd Health has recommended the study of nutrition from all angles, including food values, food requirements, health requisites, health habits and safety education, to replace the usual laboratory work. This work will be taken up during the spring term. The girls are showing marked interest in their problems and on the whole are doing very efficient work. I wish to thank all parents and friends of the school for their interest and help.
