NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

All persons are hereby notified to make and bring to said Assessors true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, which they are possessed of, or which they hold as guardian, executor, administrator, trustee or otherwise on the first day of April 1939, and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same.

When estates of persons deceased have been divided during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the executor, administrator, or other persons interested, are hereby warned to give notice of such change and in default of such notice will be held under the law to pay the tax assessed although such estate has been wholly distributed and paid over.

Any person who neglects to comply with this notice will be DOOMED to a tax according to the laws of the State, and be barred of the right to make application to the Assessors or County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.

ENFORCEMENT OF TAX LIENS

Any officer to whom a tax has been committed for collection, may, after the expiration of 8 months and within 1 year after the date of commitment to him of said tax, in the case of a person resident in the town where the tax is assessed, give to the person against whom said tax is assessed, or leave at his last and usual place of abode, a notice in writing signed by said officer stating the amount of such tax, describing the real estate on which the tax is assessed, alleging that a lien is claimed on said real estate to secure the payment of the tax and demanding the payment of said tax within 10 days after service of such notice. After the expiration of said 10 days and within 10 days thereafter in the case of a resident, said officer shall record in the registry of deeds of the county or registry district where said real estate is situated, a certificate signed by said officer setting forth the amount of such tax, a description of the real estate on which the tax is assessed and an allegation that a lien is claimed on said real estate to secure the payment of said tax, that a demand for payment of said tax has been made in accordance with the provisions of this act and that said tax remains unpaid. At the time of the recording of the certificate in the registry of deeds as herein provided, in all cases such officer shall file with the town treasurer a true copy of said certificate and shall also at the time of recording as aforesaid, the said officer shall mail by registered letter to each record holder of a mortgage on said real estate, a true copy of said certificate. The fee to be charged to the taxpayer for said notice and filing shall not exceed \$1.00 and the fee to be charged by the register of deeds for such filing shall not exceed 50 cents.

The filing of the certificate in the registry of deeds as aforesaid shall be deemed to create and shall create a mortgage on said real estate to the town in which the real estate is situated having priority over all other mortgages,

liens, attachments and encumbrances of any nature, and shall give to said town all the rights usually incident to a mortgagee, except that the mortgagee shall not have any right of possession of said real estate until the right of redemption herein provided for shall have expired.

If said mortgage, together with interest and costs, shall not be paid within 18 months after the date of the filing of said certificate in the registry of deeds as herein provided, the said mortgage shall be deemed to have been foreclosed and the right of redemption to have expired.

In the event that said tax, interest and costs shall be paid within the period of redemption herein provided for, the town treasurer shall discharge said mortgage in the same manner as is now provided for the discharge of real estate mortgages.

The above law was taken from Chapter 244 Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the Public Laws of the State of Maine for the year 1933. This method is now being used in the town of Mapleton. After liens are placed in the hands of the town treasurer by the tax collector, all payments of the liens are made to the town treasurer.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Officers of the Town of Mapleton:

Herewith we hand you a report for the audit of your town records for the year ended March 1, 1938. We have already discussed this report with you and will mention here only the more important items.

At your request we examined the records of the three preceding years and have given you a Summary of Appropriation Accounts., Comparative Balance Sheets and Reconciliation of Liabilities over Assets for the each of those years.

In this report, of the year ended March 1, 1938, we have included a Reconciliation of Liabilities over Assets for the three preceding years which shows that your appropriations for the current year were overdrawn every year so that in the three years, 1934-35, 1935-36, and 1936-37 Liabilities over Assets increased from \$2,944.92 to \$10,410.91 in spite of the fact that you raised \$8,300.00 to reduce the town debt. In the year 1937-38, the overdrawn balances amounted to \$2,722.49 but the \$4,000.00 raised to reduce the town debt and other credits reduced the Liabilities over Assets to \$8,050.66.

In our official report to the State Department of Audit the following schedule appears:

Our schools are maintaining their high standards, due to the efficient work of the teachers.

Some of the schoolrooms have been greatly improved by having the walls and ceiling painted. Several new heaters are needed.

It is recommended that the School Committee be instructed to maintain the Creasy Ridge School.

We have purchased library books and material for the science laboratory. The schools should have some new reference books. The classes in typewriting have become so large that we should have three new typewriters.

For some years we have not had enough students interested in shorthand to warrant carrying on the course. The time to resume the course seems to have come. It

might be well to consider the possibility of offering stenotypy.

The work done by the State Bureau of Health is so good that it would seem wise to continue to raise the appropriation.

A door between the auditorium and the adjoining classroom would be of great service when large gatherings are held.

It may be possible as time goes on to secure a building for the grades. If this can be obtained through the aid of Federal funds, without the loss of local control, it will be a great addition to our school system.

Appreciation is due to all who are helping make our schools successful.

 REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine:

As principal of Mapleton Junior-Senior High School it gives me great pleasure to submit to you my annual report

The school year 1937-38 closed June 3rd, 1938. Seventeen students were graduated from the Senior High School. The school also added another trophy to its collection by winning the baseball championship of the Aroostook Central League.

The school year 1938-39 opened September 6, 1938. The registration statistics are given below.

The housing conditions of the school are more inadequate this year than last and all indications are that they will be still more so next fall. There are more pupils in the building than there are seats and desks. This condition made it necessary to place the seniors in the auditorium for a home room and to that end two large portable tables were built. In each anteroom of the stage a cupboard with compartments was built to give the seniors a chance to store their books and personal school supplies.

Our attendance records show fewer and fewer students leaving or dropping out of high school before graduation. Thus far this year we have had only three such cases. One of these cases included a senior who left to get married. The other two cases were freshmen and why they left we have been unable to determine.

I wish to reiterate the needed improvements that I mentioned in my last report. These improvements are still a necessity and should be called to the attention of the townspeople. In addition to those improvements that I had mentioned should be added the need for two more portable tables for use in the auditorium to take care of additional seniors next year.

Again I wish to stress the need for maps, reference books, magazines, newspapers, and laboratory equipment. A few reference books were added and these are appreciated very much but there is still a great deal to be done along that line if we are to keep apace with present day needs.

Our athletic program has been broadened by the addition of badminton as a major sport. This is proving very

beneficial to forty-six students who are actively participating in the sport. We have had a number of matches with the Aroostook State Normal School teams and also with the Limestone High School teams. I have also added to the physical education program the games of shuffleboard and quoit tennis.

The basketball teams are progressing satisfactorily. However, we have not had the attendance support from the citizens that we had last year and this has set us behind financially. It is hoped that before the end of the season this support will be forthcoming and so help us. The boys' basketball team was equipped with twelve new uniforms and three additional uniforms were added to the girls' team. In addition we have expended quite a sum to equip our badminton teams.

The Maple Leaf Board has purchased a new mimeograph machine which it hopes will make the publication of the Maple Leaf an easier task. This new machine has automatic inking, counting, and feeding features which were absent on the older model. A large stapling machine was also purchased and we thus hope to publish our school paper without any outside assistance whatsoever.

Our visual education program has been extended by the use of Erpi Classroom Teaching Films in general science, biology, and chemistry.

An attempt has also been made to build up a six-year guidance program by introducing to the 7th and 8th graders this year the subject of guidance. This, we hope, will be in time extended to other classes and so a well rounded program of guidance will be available to all pupils throughout their six years in the Junior-Senior High School.

The senior class is trying by various means to raise money to attend the World's Fair at New York this spring. All contributions from friends and citizens will be very much appreciated. At the present writing the class has raised approximately \$115.

All of the usual school activities are receiving their proper attention.

The usual reports of the various school departments are being submitted to you by their respective heads so I will merely add that their work has been satisfactory and a spirit of cooperation has prevailed.

There is a sincere desire on the part of the school administration to talk over with any parent or guardian the problems of their children and the best ways to solve them.

On behalf of the faculty and myself I wish to thank you and the members of your school board for all that you have done to assist us in making our school better and so turn out citizens that are better fitted to carry on the principles of such a great Democracy as ours.

REPORT OF THE COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sixty-four students are now enrolled in the Commercial course.

The subjects offered this year are as follows: Business Methods, Typewriting, Bookkeeping, Commercial Law and Economic Geography.

Business Methods, an introductory business course, is given in the Sophomore year. The greater part of the last semester is spent on Arithmetic and Penmanship.

Typewriting is presented to Sophomores and Juniors. Perfection is the ultimate goal in all typing classes. In order to reach this goal the first year is devoted almost entirely to drill work. The second year the practical side is given. Some drill work, however, is always necessary to keep errors at a minimum.

Fundamentals of bookkeeping are taught to the Juniors. Two practice sets are given the first year. Partnerships and corporations are studied in the Senior year and two more practice sets are given.

Commercial Law and Economic Geography are offered in the Junior and Senior years. The aim of the Commercial Law course is to give the student an understanding of his legal rights and duties. Economic Geography is a study of the different parts of the world and their commercial relations to each other.

The equipment in this department is excellent with the exception of the typewriters. They are in very poor condition and greatly in need of replacements.

REPORT OF THE HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT
To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens of the Town
of Mapleton:

I present the following report of the Home Economics Department.

It gives me great pleasure to report a gradual increase in class averages from that of last year, also an increase in the number of classes as a group of Juniors and Seniors are taking Home Economics this year. For a practical knowledge in home making it seems advisable for the girls to participate in Home Economics sometime during their high school course.

The course of study for the present year is as follows with the respective class attendance:

Seventh Grade 9; Clothing and Foods.

Eighth Grade 13; Clothing, Foods, Everyday Manners and Child Care.

Freshmen 17; Home Improvement, Home Nursing, Foods and Clothing.

Sophomores 12; Clothing, Child Care and Family Relationship.

Juniors and Seniors 7; Clothing, Foods, Business of the Household, and Vocational Opportunities.

We have been able to assist the Future Farmers in serving their Father and Son Banquet which is a splendid opportunity for the teaching of the fundamentals in banquet serving.

I wish to express my thanks to the parents and friends who have cooperated so thoroughly with us in our work and feel assured this interest will increase from year to year.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

As teacher of agriculture of Mapleton High School, I hereby submit my fourth annual report for my department.

Our 1938-1939 school year records show thirty-three boys enrolled in agriculture. This number represents 26.9% increase over last year and 43.5% increase over the first year the agriculture course became a part of the course of study of Mapleton High School.

Since my last report there has been many changes in my department. My whole teaching program has been revised. I find it necessary to break away from the former plan of teaching all the crop enterprises in one year, the animal enterprises another year and the farm management enterprises still another year.

A boy who devotes the entire first year to the study of crops does not gain a good idea of a well planned farm business if he leaves school after that year. Teaching all the materials for any one enterprise in one year assumes that the student has the mental ability, the interests and

the experience necessary to master all the information for the enterprise without regard to range of difficulty of immediate need.

The plan whereby the attitudes, practices and knowledges for each enterprise are distributed so as to be taught and developed over a period of more than one year is sometimes referred to as a cross section method of organizing the course of study. It is there that the experiences and the problems arise as the basis for the course of study content. It is there the learner experiences in practice the results of his study.

In our cross section method the text material is organized, taught and studied the way a farmer farms. The materials of instruction are organized in sequence so that the important enterprises may be studied over a period of more than one year. Such factors as the ability of the student, interest, opportunity for practice, difficulty of subject matter, immediate need, and prerequisite value should serve as criteria for the selection and distribution of content.

I find that this way of teaching is used in some of the leading vocational agricultural schools of New York State and it is slowly coming to Maine. I believe it will solve some of our present difficulties.

Each summer I am asked to arrange my work and attend summer school at the University of Maine for three weeks under able men like Professor Louis M. Roehl, Professor of Farm Mechanics, New York State College of Agriculture, Cornell University, Ithaca, New York and Dr. R. W. Greggor who is in charge of part time schools, Washington, D. C.

Many changes have been made in the interior arrangement of the agriculture building. The boys taking agriculture have dropped the ceiling to the agricultural building about four feet, then divided the lower part for a classroom and metal shop and the upper part for a wood shop.

Since the primary purpose of the Smith Hughes Act is

to promote the education of out of school farm youth it becomes increasingly obvious that it is a responsibility of the agriculture instructor in a community to carry out a program. I have one class a week for the purpose of helping the out of school youth. These classes began the first week in January and I have found them to be working out very successfully.

For the first time since the organization of our department, two college men were sent to us from the University of Maine to get their teaching practice.

Our Future Farmers Organization is growing and probably never was as active as it is at the present time. The chapter is placed on the honor roll at the University of Maine for their active membership.

The following is the report of the Chapter Activities and accomplishments:

1. Purchased an electric brooder which cost \$60.00.
2. Carried out a project raising 100 day old chicks, feeding and caring for them until they were three months old and then dressing them for market.
3. We put on a play called "Trial of the Soil Robber."
4. We planted two tuber unit plots of potatoes.
5. The Chapter officers went to Ashland and demonstrated how Mapleton held its Future Farmer Ceremony.
6. We took part in an F. F. A. contest held at Easton in which we won third place. We won a bit brace and a set of bits valued at \$5.00.
7. In November the boys held a "Green Hand" initiation as a chapel program.
8. On December 19th we held a Father and Son Banquet at the Baptist Church.
9. Last spring a district contest was held at Mapleton. There were nine schools present to take part in potato judging, poultry judging, rope splicing and rafter cutting.
10. Two different groups of the Mapleton F. F. A.

chapter visited Boston and New Hampshire on a camping trip.

11. Our chapter took part in the state competition held at the University of Maine, Orono.

12. The secretary of our chapter was elected State F. F. A. Reporter.

13. Lynwood McHatten and Frank Kenney each received their State Farmer Degree.

14. Our organization subscribed to over twenty-five papers and magazines including the Presque Isle Star Herald and the Bangor Daily News.

15. The organization joined the Red Cross.

16. A football was purchased by the chapter and used by all the pupils in the high school, making football popular with all the boys who could play, in physical education classes or otherwise.

17. Each member of the organization is required to bring to his instructor one dollar to start an account at the Northern National Bank and to increase his account through savings each week.

18. A cabinet was made by some of the Chapter members. Each member of the organization is responsible for bringing the necessary things to make a first aid kit.

19. Mr. Lincoln Bishop is working with a number of chapter members interested in music, in preparation for a program to be put on at the request of the Mapleton Grange.

20. During the past year six of the Future Farmer members and their instructor joined the Grange.

21. At the Northern Maine Fair we took first place for potato judging and first place for individual honors.

22. Future Farmer caps and uniforms were purchased by the organization.

23. We conduct our meetings according to strict parliamentary procedure.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Mapleton, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Mapleton High School Auditorium, in said Town of Mapleton, on the twentieth day of March, A. D., 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as printed.
- Art. 4 To see if the Town will vote to elect three or five Selectmen in the following order: One for three years; Two for two years, and Two for one year, and elect one or two as it may be for a term of three years thereafter.
- Art. 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an agent for the Town to perform all the duties and business heretofore done in behalf of the Town by the Selectmen, as authorized or ratified by the Selectmen of the Town, and to authorize the Selectmen to fix his salary therefor.
- Art. 6 To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 7 To see what date the taxes will be due and what date any part thereof shall be collected. Also to see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid November 1, 1939, and what percent: Also to see if the Town will vote to allow discount on all taxes paid before a certain date, and if so, how much and what date.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Educational Maintenance: High School, Common School, Repairs and Appliances, Books and Supplies, Supt. of Schools, Lights and Fuel, Janitors, Conveyance, Insurance and School Nursing.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Incidental expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Interests for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Support of Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Aid of Dependent Children for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise Six Hundred Dollars to be expended on road leading from State Road to residence of Beaumont Griffin. Said road commonly known as Griffin Ridge Road.
- Art. 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, to be expended on road leading from Hanaford Ritchie residence to residence of Irvin Pond.
- Art. 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on Creasy Ridge Road so-called, and if so, how much.

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- Art. 17 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19 Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3 Chapter 229 Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 18 To see what sum of money, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chapter 132, F. L. 1935.
- Art. 19 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
- Art. 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$418.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State Apportionment for the Construction of Third Class Roads.
- Art. 21 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to purchase equipment for snow removal and highway maintenance.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to purchase snow fence for Creasy Ridge road.
- Art. 23 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for snow removal and purchasing of snow fence for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expenses.

- Art. 26 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue, execute and negotiate Town of Mapleton Notes for a sum not greater than \$5,000.00, payable during the year within which the same are made out, of money raised during the current year by taxation. The same bearing interest not exceeding seven per cent.
- Art. 27 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to issue quitclaim deeds for said property.
- Art. 28 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 to pay balance of Temporary loan made in 1937.
- Art. 29 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay abatements.
- Art. 30 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be expended by the Aroostook Anti-Tuberculosis Association for the Suppression in Control of Tuberculosis.
- Art. 31 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Mapleton Fire Department.
- Art. 32 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to pay PWA Bonds, maturing in 1939.
- Art. 33 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to carry on WPA Sponsor Accounts.
- Art. 34 To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Superintending School Committee to maintain the Creasy Ridge School so-called, through the school year 1939-40, as recommended in the annual School Report.
- Art. 35 To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enforce the statutes regarding the li-

censing of peddlers or venders for the ensuing year.

- Art. 36 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or what sum they will vote to set apart from funds already raised for support of poor for carrying out wood cutting projects for the ensuing year.
- Art. 37 To see if the voters of the Town wish to discuss the question of issuing bonds to take care of the Town's present indebtedness.
- Art. 38 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$.05, or any part thereof, per capita, to be expended and used solely for advertising the attractions, advantages and natural resources of Aroostook County and of the Town, the same to be expended through and by the Aroostook Development Association, Inc., with the cooperation of the Maine Potato Growers and Shippers Committee, Inc., Aroostook County Council, Maine Development Commission and State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 39 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office, March 16th, 17th, 18th, 1939 from 9 A .M. to 4 P. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
