#### ENFORCEMENT OF TAX LIENS

Any officer to whom a tax has been committed for collection, may, after the expiration of 8 months and within 1 year after the day of commitment to him of said tax, in the case of a person resident in the town where the tax is assessed, give to the person against whom said tax is assessed, or leave at his last and usual place of abode, a notice in writing signed by said officer stating the amount of such tax, describing the real estate on which the tax is assessed, alleging that a lien is claimed on said real estate to secure the payment of the tax and demanding the payment of said tax within 10 days after service of such no-After the expiration of said 10 days and within 10 tice. days thereafter in the case of a resident, said officer shall record in the registry of deeds of the county or registry district where said real estate is situated, a certificate signed by said officer setting forth the amount of such tax, a description of the real estate on which the tax is assessed and an allegation that a lien is claimed on said real estate to secure the payment of said tax, that a demand for payment of said tax has been made in accordance with the provisions of this act and that said tax remains unpaid. At the time of the recording of the certificate in the registry of deeds as herein provided, in all cases such officer shall file with the town treasurer a true copy of said certificate and shall also at the time of recording as aforesaid, the said officer shall mail by registered letter to each record holder of a mortgage on said real estate, a true copy of said cer-

tificate. The fee to be charged to the taxpayer for said notice and filing shall not exceed \$1.00 and the fee to be charged by the register of deeds for such filing shall not exceed 50 cents.

The filing of the certificate in the registry of deeds as aforesaid shall be deemed to create and shall create a mortgage on said real estate to the town in which the real estate is situated having priority over all other mortgages, liens, attachments and encumberances of any nature, and shall give to said town all the rights usually incident to a mortgagee, except that the mortgagee shall not have any right of possession of said real estate until the right of redemption herein provided for shall have expired.

If said mortgage, together with interest and costs, shall not be paid within 18 months after the date of the filing of said certificate in the registry of deeds as herein provided, the said mortgage shall be deemed to have been foreclosed and the right of redemption to have expired.

In the event that said tax, interest and costs shall be paid within the period of redemption herein provided for, the town treasurer shall discharge said mortgage in the same manner as is now provided for the discharge of real estate mortgages.

The above law was taken from Chapter 244, Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the Public Laws of the State of Maine for the year 1933. This method is now being used in the town of Mapleton. After liens are placed in the hands of the town treasurer by the tax collector, all payments of the liens are made to the town treasurer. RALPH H. CHRISTIE, MILTON E. SMITH, HORACE H. Our schools are running harmoniously and efficiently.

The schoolhouses are in good condition on the outside. Considerable attention should be given to interior improvements. We should have some modern heaters. We are in need of bookcases and equipment for filing school records. We could use several more rooms to good advantage. The auditorium would be more convenient of access if it had another door. This might lead to the adjoining classroom.

We should have one or two more typewriters and the older machines should be exchanged for later models.

The shorthand class is making a good beginning. This subject will be of practical value as it advances.

Since the schoolhouse in the Hughes neighborhood was destroyed by fire, the pupils have been conveyed to the grades in the village. This plan is working well and would

be satisfactory if we could have a separate room for each teacher. This can be adjusted by next year's grading.

When Federal, State, and local funds are available, an adequate building for the first six grades should be erected.

The loss of the Hughes schoolhouse and the damage to the Dennett schoolhouse seem to indicate that there should be some insurance on the elementary school buildings.

When circumstances permit we ought to secure at least one modern conveyance for transporting both elementary and secondary students.

The Creasy Ridge pupils are conveyed to the Park School. Other consolidations are possible, but any program must take into consideration the wishes of the parents.

We trust that our schools will give particular attention to the best interests of the individual pupils.

#### **REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL**

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mapleton, Maine:

With pleasure, I submit to you my annual report as principal of Mapleton Senior-Junior High School.

The school year 1938-39 closed May 26th, 1939. Nineteen students were graduated from the Senior High School. The baseball teams added another trophy to the school's collection by winning the baseball championship of the

Aroostook Central League.

The school year 1939-1940 opened September 18, 1939. The school registration statistics are given below.

The improvement shown in attendance for the first semester of 1939-1940 over that of 1938-1939 is evidently due to the fine weather we have had this fall and winter and also to fewer cases of serious illnesses.

The housing conditions of the school are still inadequate. Desks and seats have gradually worn out but no replacements have been made for a great many years.

Our attendance records show fewer students leaving high school before graduation. Thus far this year we have had two seniors, two sophomores two freshmen and one seventh grader leave school. Of the seven four left on account of long illness but they are expected back in the fall.

We are still badly in need of maps, reference books, magazines, newspapers, laboratory equipment and a variety

of necessary supplies if we are to keep apace with present day needs.

Our athletic program has been broadened so that approximately fifty per cent of the students of the high school grades are participating in some sport. It is hoped that in the future this may be increased still more to include a greater percentage.

Our basketball teams, boys' and girls', have won the league championships with seven straight victories each with but one league game apiece left to play. The boys' team has been given a bid to the Smaller Schools' Basketball Tournament to be held at the Presque Isle High School Gymnasium, on Saturday, February 17 1940. The winner of this tournament is to be the Aroostook Smaller Schools' representative to the Eastern Maine Tournament to be held at Brewer, Maine.

Girls' basketball has been voted out of Aroostook Central League and so will no longer be played as an interscholastic sport. It will, however, be continued as an interclass sport. The elimination of girls' basketball will hereafter give the athletic coach a better chance to develop material for the boys' team.

New basketball warm up suits have been purchased. The school bought the jacket part of the suits and a num-

ber of interested citizens and friends contributed money to purchase the pants. Again on behalf of the school I wish to thank these friends of the school for their timely interest and assistance.

The coaching of badminton has been placed in the hands of Bernard Waddell and he has done a good piece of work with it. Matches have already been played with the Aroostook State Normal School and both teams are evenly matched, making the matches very interesting. More matches will be played in the future and we sincerely hope that friends and parents will take as much interest in these

as they have in other sports. Later in the season we are to have matches with Limestone High School and possibly Caribou High School. This new sport is fast becoming a major sport in the high schools of the country.

The Maple Leaf will be published as in the past but we are to make a number of changes in the paper itself.

Our Junior Prize Speaking Contest was held in December. Virginia Griffin, the winner, is to represent the school at the Spear Regionals to be held in the northern part of the county. Second place was won by Owen Smith and honorable mention was given to Lois Sinclair. All speakers, however, are to be commended upon their part.

The League one act play contest is to be held at Mapleton High School this year and we hope to play host to groups from Ashland High School, Limestone High School, Easton High School, and Bridgewater Classical Academy.

Mr. Lewis the music director of Presque Isle High School has organized a band for Mapleton High School. There are at present about twelve members and they hold their rehearsals in the school auditorium every Wednesday during activities period. The school is allowing <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> point credit for band. Considerable progress has been made by the band under the direction of Mr. Lewis. We hope that more parents will find it possible to have their children

participate in the band.

The senior class of 1939, which attempted to raise enough money for a trip to the World's Fair but failed, took a week's trip to Mt. Katahdin and Bar Harbor instead. They enjoyed the trip and thank the friends who made this trip possible.

There is a sincere desire on the part of the school administration to talk over with any parent or guardian the problems of his children and the best ways to solve them. On behalf of the faculty and myself I wish to thank you and the members of your school board for all that you

have done to assist us in making our school better and so turn out citizens who will carry on the great principles of our Democracy.

REPORT OF THE HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens of the Town

of Mapleton:

I present the following report of the Home Economics Department:

Juniors, 3; Food Preservation, 4 weeks; Advanced Child Care, 6 weeks; Getting Along With Others, 5 weeks; Foods, 9 weeks; Advanced Clothing.

Sophomores, 8; Child Care, 10 weeks; Social Etiquette, 9 weeks; Clothing and Grooming, 15 weeks.

Freshmen, 16; Home Improvement, 9 weeks; Home Nurs-

ing, 9 weeks; Foods, 9 weeks; Clothing, 9 weeks.

Home Economics training is also given to the seventh

and eighth grade girls. One-half year is spent on Clothing which includes the study of construction and textiles and the other is spent on Foods which includes food preparation, menu planning and the study of food values.

The Home Economics girls gained practical experience by helping plan and serve the Future Farmers' "Father and Son Banquet" which was held in the High School Auditorium.

I wish to express my thanks to the parents and friends who have cooperated so thoroughly with us in our work.

#### AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Biology and General Science I am pleased to forward Mr. Webber my fifth annual report on the activities and accomplishments of Vocational Agriculture.

Our 1939-1940 school records show 43 boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture. This number represents an increase of ten boys over last year's enrollment.

I am following the new teaching program which was set up last year and I find it working very successfully. This plan is known as the "Cross Section Method" of teach-

ing and was explained in my fourth annual report.

Last summer I attended the University of Maine for a short session. My work at the University dealt with Current Problems in Agriculture Education under Mr. W. A. Ross, National Secretary of the Future Farmers of America.

Again last fall two students of the University were sent to us to get their Directed Teaching Experience and I expect two more students about Easter time.

I appreciate the new textbooks which were purchased

for the Agriculture Department in October as they will lessen my difficulty in following the new teaching program.

During the past five years I have made a study of boys who are ready for high school, and who have rather definite ideas of how they wish to spend their lives. They may be thought of as divided roughly into five groups. They are only twelve or thirteen or fourteen years of age at that time, and it should not be assumed that they have arrived at any final conclusions, but many of them think they know what they wish to do when they become adults, their ideas having been largely formed under parental influence. The school must meet their minds right where their minds are at that time. The five groups are as follows: (1) Those who expect to become farmers but who wish to secure some high school education; (2) Those who expect to become farmers and either do not like to attend school or see no advantage in further education as a preparation for farming; (3) Those who have in mind a professional or business career and who wish to prepare for college in the completest sort of way; (4) Those who intend to go to the city and wish to get some further education and training in preparation for taking better positions there than they would otherwise be able to secure; (5) Those who wish to get as wellpaid jobs as they can find in a city without spending any

more time in school.

The Vocational Agriculture courses should be for the first group, those who wish to attend high school before becoming farmers. Some of this group would naturally choose those courses; the others ought to be prevailed upon, if possible, to take at least some of them, on the ground that the better-trained farmer is likely to be the more successful one. The vocational program should not be too vigorously urged, however, upon every child who thinks he is going to be a farmer. The one who actually prefers to study foreign language and to take more courses in Eng-

lish literature or history than he could get while taking the full work of the agriculture department should have his chance. It would be unfortunate should the feeling come to prevail that as broad a cultural education as one may secure in high school does not go well with farming. While as complete an exploratory attitude cannot be taken by the rural schools towards its pupils, still the rural high school may be at least sympathetically inclined towards the boy who changes his mind.

The Vocational Agriculture Department should be successful in bringing into high school many of the second group mentioned above. Many who think they are not interested in school may be reached by the vocational appeal. Through vocational instruction these may be made more successful farmers than they would otherwise be, should they return to the farms. There is always a possibility that new lines of interest may develop in school and lead the individual to a more satisfactory life adjustment than he could otherwise achieve.

Members of the third group, those who wish to prepare for college, should be offered encouragement by the school. While it is desirable that the agricultural community shall retain or draw to itself men of good intellectual capacity who have had some systematic training for the life they are to lead, it is equally desirable that this community shall be well represented in the world outside.

8. Our chapter participated in the judging contest held at the Northern Maine Fair.

9. A new officer was added to our Chapter known as "Chaplain."

10. Clifford Keirstead and Reginald Webber attended the National F. F. A. Convention held at Kansas City, Missouri.

11. A skating rink was made on the mill pond for a community service.

12. A straw ride was taken by Chapter members with fifty-seven attending. Refreshments were served after the ride.

13. Four new caps and uniforms were purchased by the Chapter to be worn by the new officers.

14. The Chapter purchased a caponizing set and used it on several flocks in the community.

15. Observed one Sunday as Annual F. F. A. day to attend church in a body.

16. Our chapter furnished a barrel of Green Mountain potatoes to be used at the National F. F. A. Convention at Kansas City.

17. We had a farewell party for William Akerley and Arnold Adams who moved to the southern part of the state.

18. We hope to be given permission to move a building from Castle Hill to be located in a suitable position near the Agriculture building and to be used for a metal shop for a greater portion of the year. During the spring it can be used for brooding chickens and this will provide a place near the class room for carrying out practical projects.

19. We put on a program for the Grange.

20. We built a F. F. A. office in one corner of Agriculture building.

21. The Chapter boys examined 15 bins of seed potatoes from growers of Mapleton, Castle Hill and Chapman for diseases to aid the Agronomy Department at the University of Maine.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Mapleton, qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Mapleton High School Auditorium, in said Town of Mapleton, on the eighteenth day of March, A. D., at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

lectmen to appoint an Agent for the Town to perform all the duties and business heretofore done in behalf of the Town by the Selectmen, as authorized or ratified by the Selectmen of the Town and authorize the Selectmen to fix his salary therefor.

7. To see what date the taxes will be due and what date any part thereof shall be collected; also to see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Nov. 1, 1940 and what percent; also to see if the Town will vote to allow

discount on all taxes paid before a certain date, and if so what date and what percent.

- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Educational Maintenance.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Repairs and Appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Supt. of Schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for teaching Music in the schools.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for School Nursing for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to

- raise and appropriate for Incidental expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Interest for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Support of Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children for the ensuing year.

- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action taken at a Special Town Meeting held Oct. 20, 1939 whereby it was voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for Snow Fence and \$2,000.00 for Snow Removal.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use what portion of the unexpended balance of the 1938 appropriation for Snow Equipment for 1940; the balance to be transferred to Snow Removal or Snow Fence.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Highways and Bridges under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.)
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132 Public Laws of 1935.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Third Class

Apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$418.00 for the Maintenance of Improved sections of Third Class Roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State Apportionment for the Construction of Third Class Roads.
Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated

by the Town for State Aid Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal for the ensuing year.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Snow Fence for the ensuing year.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to match a like amount set aside by the State for the purpose of main taining State Aid Roads.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install a suitable number of lights on the Streets or Dangerous Railroad Crossings to properly light the same. Also to raise and appropriate money for that purpose or for maintaining the ones already installed.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to

raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Abatements and Discounts for the ensuing year.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended by the Aroostook Anti-Tuberculosis Association for the Suppression and Control of Tuberculosis.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to pay PWA Bonds maturing in 1940.

- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Mapleton Fire Co. for the ensuing year.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to carry on WPA Sponsor accounts for the ensuing year.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue, execute and negotiate Town of Mapleton Notes for a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00, payable during the year within which the same are made out of money raised during the current year by taxation.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired for non-payment of Taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to issue Quit-Claim Deeds for said property.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action taken at a Special Town Meeting held Feb. 16, 1940, whereby it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to issue and sell in the name and on the credit of the Town of Mapleton, serial notes or bonds to an amount not exceeding \$30,000.00 for the purpose of paying outstanding indebtedness.

Art. 40. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Daylight Saving Time for the schools.
Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to pay on the three following kinds of Town Indebtedness: Bonds, Notes or Town Orders, the Selectmen to have the power of choice.

Art. 42. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office on March 14, 15 and 16, 1940 for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
