



Our schools have had a good year. We have been able to maintain an efficient faculty in a time when conditions indicate an increasing scarcity of good teachers.

The High School building has been painted. We secured some needed typewriters, filing cabinets, window shades, and desks before prices advanced.

The Agricultural Department needs a workshop, a place to carry on the expanding activities of the course. The continuance of the State subsidy may depend upon adequate provision for the requirements of the department.

The town should look forward to a definite plan of consolidation. It will be necessary to give attention to the problem of transportation. While we are waiting for better facilities, we should make our present schoolrooms as comfortable and attractive as possible.

Continued support of the schools will help maintain favorable opportunities for the children to prepare for changing conditions.

Favorable weather conditions later in the year, however, brought the attendance up so that there was an improvement over that of last year.

C. Faculty Changes

Our coach and social science teacher Mr. Merrill, resigned during the summer. Mrs. Kolouch filled the position until a new teacher-coach, Mr. William Webber, was hired.

D. Extra Curricular Activities

1. ATHLETICS

Our athletic program provides an opportunity for all pupils who so desire, to participate. Thus far we have been able to enroll 40% of the student body in the program. There are a great many improvements that could be made if a physical education director were available.

Our boys' basketball team has won the Aroostook Central League Championship with five wins and one loss. The team has been picked to play in the Small Schools Basketball Tournament which is to be held at the Presque Isle High School Gymnasium on February 14.

The interest in badminton is still high. Many matches have already been played with Presque Isle High School anl Limestone High school students. There will be many more before the season is over. This sport offers an opportunity for a larger number of pupils of both sexes to participate in than is possible in many other sports.

2. MUSIC

Under the direction of our music teacher Miss Wyeth, our music program has been expanded to include a Boys' Chorus.

3. SPEAKING

Our annual Junior Prize Speaking Exhibition was held in December. Glenice Lovley was named best speaker.

Beverley Cray received second honors and Shirley Wilcox was given honorable mention.

We are continuing our participation in the Aroostook Central League Speaking Contest which is to be held at Limestone High School in April.

4. MAPLE LEAF

The publication of the Maple Leaf under the direction of the Misses Bake, Hamilton and Stephenson is under way and will be completed by May.

5. DRAMATICS

Greater interest has been shown in dramatics this year than ever before. There have been so many pupils volunteer for dramatics that we have already placed in rehearsal seven one act plays. The plays and coaches are listed below.

"Grandmother Nick", Freshmen, Miss Hamilton "Junior Buys a Car", Sophomores, Miss Bake "Tub Trouble", Juniors, Miss Stephenson "Love in Bloom", Juniors, Miss Stephenson "House of Greed", Seniors, Mr. Kolouch "Dumb Dora", Seniors, Mr. Kolouch "His First Shave", All Classes, Mr. Kolouch

The above plays will be presented before the end of

February. The best play will be entered in the One Act League Play Contest which is to be held at Bridgewater Classical Academy in April.

The senior play, under the direction of Miss Stephenson will be presented in May.

6. VISUAL EDUCATION

Our motion picture projector has served us well and we have shown many worthwhile pictures at our assemblies.

7. PRINTING

Printing has been offered as an elective and a number of students have taken advantage of the opportunity to learn the elements of the printing trade.

All our tickets, programs, name cards, and other small jobs have been printed by these students.

We are ready at all times to do, at small cost, jobs for any citizens of the town who want any printing done. Among the work which we have done may be listed letter heads, envelopes, tickets, programs, and name cards.

8. MISCELLANEOUS

Many varied assembly programs have been presented. On December 8, the entire student body listened to the President of the United States over the radio as he addressed a joint session of Congress asking for a declaration of war against Japan.

E. Miscellaneous Needs and Improvements.

Many surplus food products such as dried peaches, prunes, raisins, canned grapefruit juice and segments have been distributed to the students.

Air raid precautions and drills have been carried out in the school.

Much needed chairs have been bought for the typewriting room.

Many new desks and seats are needed in the classrooms if the pupils are to maintain good posture. Too many of our present seats have no backs an many of our desks are too high or low and cannot be adjusted properly.

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Storm windows on the North side of the old part of the building are still very desirable and would soon pay for themselves in fuel savings.

G. Conclusion

There is a sincere desire on the part of the school administration to talk over with any parent or guardian the problems of his children and the best ways to solve them. We are at a very critical period in the history of our country and only by an enlightened citizenry through ed-

ucation can we hope to maintain our freedom and democratic form of government. On behalf of the faculty and myself I wish to thank you and the members of your school board for all that you have done to assist us in maintaining the educational program free and democratic in every respect.

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Citizens of the Town of Mapleton:

I wish to present my fourth annual report of the Home Economics Department.

The Course of study with the respective class enrollment is as follows: Seventh Grade, 11, Foods and Clothing; Eighth Grade, 7, Foods, Clothing and Child Care; Freshmen, 19, First Aid, Home Nursing, Foods and Clothing; Sophomores, 14, Home Improvement, Social Etiquette, Clothing; Juniors and Seniors, 7, Consumer Education, First Aid, Good Grooming and Clothing.

One aim in home economics is to teach the principles and fundamentals of better living, having as our goal the nutritional value of different foods, that is, being able to choose a well-balanced diet for growth and repair also one which gives the greatest food value for the least expense. This alone will not give the girls a well-rounded life so we also teach the art of developing personality, how to become well-groomed, and the tact of getting along with each other in society. To my mind we as home economists will never have a better opportunity to teach the younger minds these principles.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

To the Suprintendent of Schools and Citizens of the Town of Mapleton I wish to present the following report of the Agricultural Department:

There are 27 boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture in Mapleton High School for the year 1941-1942.

Part of the burden of running farms in Aroostook County is going to fall on the shoulders of boys who in normal times probably would not have quite as great a share of the work for which they would be directly responsible.

The Vocational Agriculture course is designed to give these boys knowledge to help them solve some of their problems that they will face in such enterprises as Potato Growing and Marketing; Dairying, Soils; Farm Management, Field Crops and other closely related enterprises which make up a balanced Farming Program.

The Supervised Farm Practice Program carried on by the boys during the summer months also enable the boys to actually face and solve some of the problems which they may have later when they are engaged in farming as a life's work.

The Future Farmers of America organization gives an added incentive to boys taking Agriculture by awarding prizes and honors to those who have outstanding supervised programs in Agriculture. This organization also gives the members an opportunity to become better citizens by learning how to conduct a public meeting properly.

The Future Farmer Chapter has been active this last year, carrying on the following program of activities:

- Planted Tuber-Unit Potatoes for local farmers. 1.
- 2.Hatched and sold 1000 baby chicks in the community.
- 3. Sent a Poultry Judging and a Farm Shop team to district contests in Presque Isle.
- Sent Poultry Judging, Dairy Judging, Potato 4. Judging and Farm Shop teams to State Contest in Orono.
- 5. Took a camping trip to Mount Katahdin.
- Each member carried on a Supervised Farming 6. Program during the summer.
- 7. Held a F. F. A. box social in the High School Gym-

nasium.

8. Held the Annual Father and Son Banquet in the High School Auditorium.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

To the Superintenent of Schools and Citizens of the Town of Mapleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit the following report of the Music Department of the Town of Mapleton.

This year the music program includes four rural schools together with the two town schools and the fifth and sixth grades in the High School Building. This past fall I organized a Boys' Chorus of forty-five members. This organization has proved very popular, and the boys thoroughly enjoy singing. They have already performed several times for the Chapel Exercises. The Boys' Chorus meets once a week. The Girls' Chous that was organized last year has increased in membership and we now have an enrollment

of sixty-five.

Our orchestra meets twice a week and is composed of nine members. Because of the loss of six players due to graduation this last year, our orchestra consists of mostly beginning players.

The private music lessons are still continuing with many of the students making fine progress.

This year I have introduced the tonette into the schools. A pre-band wind instrument, it should prove very valuable to any child if he plans to further his study of an instrument. We have organized some fine tonette bands and will


perform with them at our annual Music Festival which will take place in April or May. Our festival this year is to be in a form of a Minstrel Show. The rural and town schools are also going to participate in a "Play Day" which will give the children a chance to display their music games that they have played during the past two years.

The important thing to accomplish is that of helping the children to enjoy music and take part in it. Although I do not believe in too much emphasis on theoretical work, I have stressed it more this year than I did last. The child is becoming more and more consious of time and note values, and I feel that when the opportunity arises, theory should be discussed.

The Girls' Chorus, Boys' Chorus, and the Orchestra received new music this year which we all enjoy very much.

I wish to thank Mr Webber, the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. J. F. Kolouch, the Principal, and the town of Mapleton for their hearty cooperation with me in the music program.
