MAYOR'S ADDRESS

MARCH 19, 1917

To the Members of the City Council:

My message to you this morning is not long and it is not involved. I do not intend to cumber up the day with vain promises of deeds to be done and boasts, but would rather relate to you a few ambitions of my office and urge you to see their wisdom as it appeals to me.

First, I would suggest we are all public servants of the city and that while the people may have been interested to a certain extent in the politics and side lights of the campaign which closed two weeks ago to-day they are now primarily interested in what we are going to do for them, not what political party elected us to office. The people of the City of Lewiston are more interested to know to-day to what avenues of expenditure we propose to turn the city's moneys, in what way we propose to serve the city.

So, I would commend to you, if I may, forgetfulness that a political party elected you to office, that for several weeks you were perhaps active and energetic in perfecting a political organization, and would have you work with me in an intelligent and conscientious effort to make Lewiston a better and busier city, recognizing its civic pride and the fact that we are the guardians of the 27,000 souls that lives within its limits.

In no other way, can the tax payers secure results for their money. If a few democrats and a few republicans, but a mere handful of the people of this great city, fritter away their opportunities and duties in political squabbles and at cross purposes, the year would have been in vain and not one of us would deserve the esteem and respect of our fellow-citizens.

So let us resolve on this inauguration day, to inaugurate a new era in the municipal life of our city, striving ever to do our best, eager to serve our city, and just as eager to stamp down an unrighteous proposition whether it originates in our own political circles or that of an opponent. I am sure that the city council represents the best men in our city and that we all desire to continue the prosperity of the City of Lewiston.

There are a few things that I would speak to you about. The appeal to me as worthy objects of your attention and as of benefit to the tax-payers of the City of Lewiston.

The finances of Lewiston have been the object of considerable attack and speculation. It is my firm intention, and I ask your co-operation in the matter. Certain changes in the method of conducting business, notably the introduction of a requisition system last year, and the natural evolution that comes to any big institutions, cities or corporations make for changes in an old established system.

It is very easy sometimes to follow a policy of destruction and disastrous criticism rather than one of construction and painstaking research. I hardly think the services of an expensive accountant is needed for such a matter. The condition of our city is not such an involved matter that any one of you with any business ability could not step into the treasurer's or auditor's offices and tell within a few hours the condition of the city.

I make this as a suggestion for your consideration; instead of employing a firm of accountants who will charge the city from \$1500.00 to \$2000.00 for their work, that the city government authorize two well known Lewiston gentlemen of unquestioned integrity and skilled in the financial art and let us select one of each party so there will be no question of partnership, and I would suggest for your consideration, Hon. George Pottle and Hon. T. F. Callahan as the two men to examine and report. From my understanding of the situation it is not necessary at all to spend a large sum of money to go over the situation when these two gentlemen can investigate and report to this city, and their report will be accepted by the citizens as the correct condition of our city.

The new issue of serial bonds amounting to \$200,000 of which \$5000 becomed due every year is a step in the right direction and in accord with a scientific and modern conception of city business.

STREET SEWERS AND WATERWORKS

In the great water and street departments that are the source of the very life of our city and by whose growth alone the actual growth of the city can be measured and on whose expansion and amplication, depends the extension of the city, I believe in a careful and warranted extension. Our city spreads out its fingers like the petals of an unfolding flower. A ride on the trolley cars in any direction out of the city shows the enormous strides that have been made in the last few years. These people are children of the city, they are the pioneers of the bigger Lewiston, the busier Lewiston and the 50,000 population Lewiston which I believe is destined to come. They must receive the fullest benefit possible for the money they pay in taxes, not, of course, at the expense of other sections

of the city but as conditions warrant and when careful investigation demands it. They should have streets, and water works and sewers.

The building of permanent streets and sidewalks is another matter upon which I am sure you will assist me. The meeting of our street problem is a big one and I have great confidence in the Public Works Department to carry on its work intelliently and with the greatest regard for economy and business. Too much importance can not be laid upon the road problem not only in the State of Maine but in the City of Lewiston. I believe one of our greatest and best investments is the better roads and streets.

I believe in the extension of the park system and in beautifying our city as we may and providing breathing places for its busy industry.

COAL YARD

I want to touch on the municipal proposition. I shall use all of my power to continue to run the yard and will ask the council to appoint a committee of one Alderman and one Councilman to work with me. I have been in conference with Mayor Brann several times this last week and have gone over his exhaustive report on the yard up to date and am convinced of the great value to the citizens of continuing this Municipal coal yard.

There are several problems beginning to enter into the yard that must be confronted with calmness and forethought. It has been demonstrated without a doubt that the yard was run according to law and by that I mean at "no financial profit". The report shows that there was no financial loss, some thing which the enemies of the yard have charged at various times. All over this State, coal yards similiar to ours are starting up. Reading a great Philadelphia newspaper the other day of work that cities were doing, I found our City of Lewiston, heading the list with mention of its municipal coal yard. Portland after investigation of our yard decided to go ahead

This is one of the early matters that I would ask your assistance in.

SCHOOLS

The public school system is one that demands our attention to some degree although we have a school committee. Our schools are the very foundations upon which the moral and economic expansion of the City of Lewiston depends. They comprise our big capital stock and as citizens and taxpayers we should take an active interest in them. I hope that

every member of the government will make it a part of his duty to protest against the passage of the redistribution of the school fund act. It is grossly unfair to Lewiston and would take out of our appropriations many thousands of dollars. I am informed about thirty-four thousand dollars per year, an amount equal to 2 mills each year on our entire property.

Our new superintendant, Mr. Charles W. Bickford appears to have made a favorable and deep impression. He is alive to the interests of the schools and I believe that our system is one of the finest in New England.

I would like your assistance in one matter that vitally concerns the life and morals of our children attending the Dingley Normal Training School. It is unfortunate that the environment of the school isn't the best, but I propose to take steps to remedy this. I want your assistance in condemning the property adjacent to the Main street side of the school. It is justifiable, I believe, as I said, for the moral and physical well-being of the school children. The school committee have plan for using this land for school purposes, I understand. I would conceive of no better movement to make the school better.

CITY LIFE

I must say a word in passing in regard to the Municipal concerts. The suggestion of our mayor just leaving that Lewiston and Auburn unite in bringing to the city the greatest artists of the world in a series of concerts, is an excellent one in my opinion. The advertising that would accrue from it would be of inestimable value. These things go to make up life of a city and the success that has accorded the concerts of the last two years, drawing attention and patronage from this section of the state, warrants, I believe our serious contemplation. I want the children's play grounds to succeed, I want the public health safeguarded, I would like to see a clean and beautiful city. I believe in keeping in tune with the times.

THE POLICE

Regarding the police, I have but little to say. I can let no opportunity go by without saying that I believe thoroly in the principle of "The referendum" and the rights of the people of any city in the state to manage its own affairs. I am taking steps to inquire into the constitutionality of the act and will make it my business to see that Lewiston is properly policed, and its municipal rights safeguarded.

There are numberless things that I could say to you, the needs of a great city, the opportunities to serve its interests and to make its people happier are countless as the sunbeams, but from time to time, we will be together and I will have an opportunity to talk with you and our problems will work out.

In closing let me again commend your thoughts to a whole-hearted unselfish and non-political service of your city. We can do much together this year as citizens and servants of the people of Lewiston. We can do nothing if we inaugurate this morning of a new city year, 12 months of fighting and quarrells, political muck-raking and abuse. Let's have an era of construction and growth and live for Lewiston, the grand old City of Lewiston, and to end that we may prevent to transact the business of our city, I invite you to the rooms of the city government below, then to enter upon our initial duties.

REPORT OF PUBLIC LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable City Council of the City of Lewiston.

GENTLEMEN:—In conformity to our usual custom we herewith submit for your consideration the Annual Report of the financial condition of our Public Library, covering the receipts and expenditures for the year which closed on the 28th. day of February 1917.

The detailed report of Miss Angie E. Tracy which is embodied in this you will find to contain much information concerning the Institution that will be of interest. We have expended about the usual amount of money for new books and magazines, and the general conditions are very satisfactory. Several changes have been made during the year in the force of assistants, and their work has been entirely satisfactory. The young ladies have been courteous and accommodating, and their efforts have been appreciated. Our circulation has been just about the same as the previous year, the variation being only about 350 volumes. At the urgent request of some of our citizens, the Library reading rooms have been opened for a few hours Sunday afternoons, but the patronage has not been such as to cause the Board to feel that the demand for it is what the advocates anticipated and predicted. Unless the conditions change materially it may be deemed best to discontinue the practice. Nothing will be changed in this direction for the present, however. The lighting system in the several rooms has been very unsatisfactory for some time, and a radical change has been made so that a very marked improvement is shown, and it is very much appreciated by the patrons. The essential details are so carefully and thoroughly covered by the Librarian in her report, it seems unnecessary to comment upon them at length. The suggestion of cutting off the State appropriation amounting to five hundred (\$500) dollars per annum does not appeal to us as reasonable and fair, and we most sincerely hope sufficient influence can be brought to bear upon the members of our Legislature to avoid this seemingly unwise plan. There are many other ways to economize that would appear much more acceptable to the lovers and sympathizers of Library work. Our fuel for the year has cost us over two hundred (\$200) dollars more than the previous year, and that, of course, was unavoidable for reasons well known to all, and several supply necessities

have been so high our amount for book and magazine purchases have been somewhat decreased.

To the Board of Trustees of the Lewiston Public Library.

GENTLEMEN:—Herewith is presented for your consideration the fourteenth annual report of the Lewiston Public Library, for the year ending February 28, 1917.

As no change has been made in the methods or general administration the history of the past year differs little in detail from that of the previous years.

The Library has been open for the reading and circulation of books every day throughout the year except Sundays and the legal holidays observed by the banks.

The number of volumes estimated in the Library on March 1, 1916 was 22,119. During the year 1114 volumes have been added by accession. Of these 150 were acquired by binding magazines. 111 volumes have been discarded; including 90 worn out; 5 lost through contagious diseases; the remaining 16 lost from the open shelves and delinquent borrowers, making a net increase of 1003 volumes or an estimate of 23,122 now in the Library.

The home use of books showed a circulation of 67,579, a daily average of 222 volumes. This compares almost exactly with that of last year, making it the second largest circulation for the year since the opening of the library. Of these 14,548 volumes were circulated from the juvenile department. For the first time a separate record has been kept of the circulation of the French books. 11,581 were circulated for home use. New volumes have been added to this section of books, as in practically every other department with the view in mind of meeting the present wants of the patrons as well as books that will prove to be of permanent value. A replacement list is imperative and will doubtless, be added in the next few weeks.

To say that 67,579 volumes were charged out at the desk does not begin to tell of the work necessarily involved to do this. The charging desk is a veritable literary and general information bureau. The assistants who are engaged in accurately stamping and discharging on an average of two hundred and more books in one day manage to answer innumerable questions on almost every conceivable subject.

Beginning in January the books from the juvenile department have been charged from the desk in that room from four to six o'clock. During school days these are by far the busiest hours of the day, and by having one person always in this

room it has been possible to keep better order and at the same time aid the young people in selecting their books.

On Sunday December the 3d the Library started on a new plan of opening Sunday afternoons from two to four o'clock. Books are not circulated on this day and the juvenile department is closed. The Trustees commenced this opening after receiving requests from many of the local people. This plan was started with the intention of giving a place to those people who were busy through the week, those who preferred a quiet time reading to any other form of amusement, and those who wished to keep abreast of the times, an opportunity as set forth in the magazines and reviews. During the last three months of the fiscal year, December to February, inclusive, or for thirteen Sundays there was an average attendance of thirty-four readers, the largest number for any one Sunday being seventy-eight, the smallest twenty-one. While some of the people for whom it was primarily intended have taken advantage of the privilege, it has been observed by those in charge that some of the public school scholars, who already were daily patrons, and many of the daily newspaper readers frequent the place on Sundays.

The continued usefulness of the reading and reference rooms has been very encouraging. Both rooms have been used daily by students and by those seeking the news of the day. It is to be regretted, however, that we have been obliged to learn that some of the people have shown little respect for literature and public property.

The gifts of the year have been mainly reports from the Government, and Maine reports from the Maine State Library. Mrs. John B. Straw, Lewiston, gave a few copies of Harper's Monthly magazine and Harper's Weekly. These are for the years of 1861-2. They have been bound and added to our magazine list of bound periodicals. Mrs. Juliette Abbott, formerly of Lewiston, also gave thirty volumes on various subjects. In this gift there were the first six volumes of Scribner's magazine. The General catalogue of Bates College, 1863-1915, was a recent gift. The local papers have been continued as

gifts—the Lewiston Evening Journal, the Lewiston Sun and the Lewiston Messenger. The donors may feel that their kindness is fully appreciated by us all and particularly by the daily frequenters of the reading room.

On April the first Miss Martha Gray, who had been an assistant since July 1914, gave up her position and in October and November the Misses Hines and Malia completed their service. The Trustees readily and ably filled these vacancies by electing Ernestine Lemaire, Ruth Robinson and Margaret Dealy. Miss Lemaire came to us with several years experience as a school teacher, while the Misses Robinson and Dealy had taken the Dingley Training School course, Lewiston, Maine. Miss Robinson had given a month's time to the studying of library methods during the summer of 1915. She had also substituted a very little when needed and her services could be secured. Miss Clarice Whitney, Auburn, Maine, gave a month of her time last summer studying library methods. The Librarian attended one State meeting for Librarians and the American Library Association conference during the year.

The building and grounds have been cared for by Mr. Larocque as in the previous year. The lighting system has been greatly improved. It has received many favorable comments from the readers.

The Librarian takes this time to thank those patrons who, through their courtesy and appreciation, help in performing her daily duties; to the assistants who so readily cooperate with every interest advanced to them in behalf of the library, and especially to the Trustees who have always granted that which was best for the advancement of the institution.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDANT OF PUBLIC WORKS

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned herewith most respectfully submits his annual report as Superintendent of the department for the year ending February 28, 1917.

HIGHWAYS

A large amount of work has been done in this department during the year made necessary by the heavy storms of the early spring and also the large amount of snow the past winter and I would recommend a special appropriation for snow work.

And would say that the expenses of this devision must necessarily be larger the coming year as the men on the streets has been advanced twenty five cents per day.

SEWERS

The following sewers have been constructed and extensions made during the past year.

The sewer on Upper Main St., was completed from the point where it was left the year before to Montello St., thus completing the sewer system in that section of the city.

940 feet of 12 in. pipe was laid and 200 feet of 15 in. one catch basin and one manhole was built.

340 feet of 15 in. pipe was laid in Lincoln Alley; this was a very expensive job as we had to excavate some 13 feet but it was much needed for it has given the department a great deal of trouble in the past.

Shawmut St. 248 feet of 10 in. pipe was laid on this street between Sabattus St. and Ash St. and about 80 feet on the lower end of the street below Walnut St.

Russell & Pettingill Sts. this work was an extension of the system to relieve Upper College St. and the department laid 670 feet of 18 in. pipe the past season and have pipe enough on hand to complete the work the coming season.

One manhole was built on this work.

14 Catch Basins have been constructed during the past year and several repaired; several small extensions have been laid in different parts of the city.

PERMANENT STREETS

College St. which has long been in a very bad condition was very much improved by the laying of 4453 sq yds of bituminous macadam between Holland St. and Frye St.

There were also seven crossings laid on this street.

733 sq yds of bituminous macadam laid on Birch St.

1911 sq yds of block paving laid on Middle St. about one half of this amount was grouted with asphalt and painted with the same material this was somewhat of an experiment but shall look for good results.

The paving on Lisbon St. below Ash St. had become very rough and something had to be done so it was decided to remove the blocks, have them recut and reset in concrete and flushed with cement and this work was let to the Hassam Paving Co., at 10 per cent plus the cost. There were 4048 sq yds in the job. The cost to the city was \$2.10 per sq yd of this amount. The Lewiston, Augusta & Waterville St., Ry. R. paid for 1727 sq yds amounting to \$3,626.70.

266 sq yds of block paving was laid in Hines Alley.

In regard to paving for the coming season I would recommend the completing of the work on Lisbon St. from Chestnut St. to Cedar St.; Oxford St. from the G. T. R. R. to the canal bridge; and Chestnut St. from Lincoln St. to Oxford St.

The following Macadam has been recoated: 933 sq. yds. on Main St.; 1300 sq. yds. on Pine St.; 244 sq. yds. on Lisbon St. above Ash St.

No State Road Work was done the past season owing to the condition of Main St. from laying sewer, water and gas pipes it was deemed advisable to postpone the work to next season and it is the intention to start the work as early as possible the coming season.

PERMANENT WALKS

Quite a large amount of work has been done in this division the past season both in tar concrete and cement. Several concrete crossings have been laid in different parts of the city.

I would recommend a liberal appropriation for walks the coming season as the city is very much in need of them.

NEW STREETS AND BRIDGES

The expenditures in this division for the past year have been large, made necessary by being obliged to replace the Bridge St. bridge with a new one at a total cost of \$2,946.80. The bridge was purchased from the M. C. R. R. Co. at a cost of \$1,750.00 in place, the balance of the cost was for lumber labor and painting. This job alone about exhausted the appropriation.

Several of the canal bridges have been replanked and repaired.

The heavy rains of last spring did a large amount of damage to the country bridges as well as the roads.

One bridge and culvert alone was so badly damaged that it had to be completely rebuilt; this was what is known as the Salmon Brook Bridge at Garcelon's Ferry. The cost of this job alone was about \$1,200 (Twelve hundred dollars).

Most of the bridges are in very good condition at the present time with the exception of the bridge over the Main Canal on Main St. which is in a very bad condition and should receive attention at an early date and would recommend a concrete bridge at that place as the traffic is very heavy at that point.

One horse has been purchased the past year and the department has lost one.

There are several horses in the department that should be sold or exchanged.

REPORT OF SUPT. OF WATER WORKS

To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners for the City of Lewiston.

GENTLEMEN:—Pursuant to the custom and in compliance with the city ordinance, this the thirty-seventh annual report of the Superintendent for the fiscal year ending February 26th., 1917, is respectfully submitted.

CONSTRUCTION

Six extension of mains, two fire services and the lowering of 100 ft. of 6 in. pipe on Lafayette St., caused by the lowering of the grade of the street which was made this year.

925 ft. of 6 in. pipe with one hydrant on the Greene road, at Thornes Corner at a cost of One thousand three hundred eighty-seven and 73/100 (\$1,387.73) dollars.

On upper Main St., on new state road, 625 ft. of 6 in. pipe with one hydrant at a cost of Five hundred seventy-seven and 70/100 (\$577.70) dollars.

On Bradley St., from end of pipe at hydrant across Ash St., with a 6 in. x 8 in. cross on Ash St., 100 ft. of 6 in. pipe at a cost of One hundred six and 84/100 (\$106.80) dollars.

Making a total of extension of mains this year of 2,278 ft. Total number of miles of main pipe at the present time fifty-four (54) miles.

48 ft. of 6 in. pipe on Shawmut St., at a cost of Forty-one and 72/100 (\$41.72) dollars.

250 ft. of 2 in. galvanized pipe on Wilson St., from Lafayette St., to B Street, 120 ft. 1½ in. galvanized pipe on B Street, at a total cost of Two hundred one and 05/100 (\$201.05) dollars.

205 ft. of 1 in. galvanized pipe from Prospect Ave. through a proposed street to Rose Dale St., at a cost of Fifty-one and 10/100 (\$51.10) dollars.

FIRE SERVICE

31 ft. 6 in. pipe, E. S. Paul & Co., Lisbon St., put in at their expense, material and supplies and labor at a cost of One hundred forty and 55/100 (140.55) dollars.

At the old high school building on Main St., material, supplies and labor charged to school department at a cost of One hundred forty-two and 22/100 (\$142.22) dollars.

The lowering of 100 ft. of 6 in. pipe on Lafayette St., occasioned by the lowering of the grade of the street, at a cost of Sixty-three and 53/100 (\$63.53) dollars.

NEW SERVICE AND RELAYS

There has been sixty-seven new service mains laid this year, with seventy-four relays.

Have used for new services and relays, 3,704 ft. of 1 in. galvanized pipe, 42 ft. of 2 in. galvanized pipe, 3,123 ft. of 1 in. lead lined pipe, making a total of 6,869 ft. of service pipe laid during the year.

WHEELS

The water wheels were inspected this fall. The two 33 in. Hercules wheels that run the Worthington pumps were found in good condition, except some slight repairs which were needed and completed, the 39 in. Hercules wheel that runs the Dean pump, which was referred to in last year's report is in bad condition. I called the attention of the house committee, Mr. Pennell and Mr. Mahon, to its condition and they had an expert from the Holyoke Machine Company of Holyoke, Mass. come and inspect it; his detailed report will be referred to the full board as early this year as possible.

PUMPS

The repairs to the Dean pump gear and check valve, that were recommended in last year's report have been attended to and the pump valves renewed this winter, and new rock-maple have been installed. The pump now is in

a better condition than it has been for a number of years.

The Worthington pumps are in good condition, excepting, the valves which should be replaced this coming season.

LEAKS AND REPAIRS IN MAIN PIPE LINE AND SERVICES

The extentions of the main pipe this year have been the smallest for a number of years, only 2,278 feet having been laid. Have repaired thirty-two leaks and put in one 24 in. split pipe on intake pipe from the lake on Center Street, Auburn. Have used eight valve boxes on main valves that were rotted out. Have repaired fifty-three leaks on service main, thawed out six frozen service pipes, used fifteen lead connections, twelve curb boxes and four stops and waste on repairs.

HYDRANTS

The early fall of snow with very little frost in the ground has caused the ground water to enter the drip to the hydrants and fill them up in some cases to the steamer connection. To keep them from freezing up, all of them that indicated any water in them were attended to every day in the residential section and those in the business section, twice a day. There has been two new ones added this year, making two hundred fifty-three in service. Have reseated and put auxillary gates on three, repaired and raised twelve to conform with the grades of the street. There are a number of old ones that ought to be raised this year.

RESERVOIR

The Reservoir was drawn down to a depth of five feet, a boat was put in and the committee gave it a thorough inspection, and no sediment was found that could be considered damaging. They found some of the riprapping, and the slides in the gate house that needed repairing, and this was ordered done. It was so late in the season it was deemed best to put it over until this year, and it should be done as early as possible.

RECOMMENDATIONS

When the reservoir was drawn for inspection, the riprapping, showed in a number of places to be loose, needing repairs. I would recommend that when it is drawn this year for the other repairs ordered by the committee, be attended to. That the riprapping be put back in place and a strip of concrete grouting be put about ten feet wide around the top of the reservoir. This will save the liability of the water in the summer washing the sand out of the riprapping, and in the winter stop the ice from forming on the sides and lifting the riprapping out of place.

I should also recommend that a new water wheel be purchased to take the place of the old one that runs the Dean pump, if the condition proves to be as faulty as the inspection indicated. Also, that the old wooden partition in the wheel-pit, that is in a dangerous condition, be replaced with a new concrete partition.

With thanks to the President and Clerk of the Water Board and to the members of the Board of Commissioners for their courtesy, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE POLICE MATRON

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

GENTLEMEN:—I hereby submit my second annual report as police matron of the City of Lewiston, for the year ending February 28, 1917.

I have reported daily at the police station and attended women prisoners as it is my duty.

I have taken three girls to the Industrial School in Hallowell since which I have kept in touch with the Matron of the School, by means of correspondence and have learnt that they have become very good girls which shows that this Institution is doing an immense of good for such cases. Another girl found in danger of falling into vice was also helped by being placed in the Sisters' Hospital without any cost to the city.

A cripple boy and girl were placed at the Children's Infirmary of Portland to receive treatments there.

I have accompanied many women patients to the Insane Hospital at Augusta.

I have assisted many young girls who came to this city as strangers in obtaining employment and boarding places, and many others of tender age I have induced to return home where they would be under the care of their parents.

During the year a child was legally adopted into a good home.

In connection with my duties with the overseer of the poor, to whom I have reported daily, I have assisted him in returning people to other cities and towns where they have a pauper settlement. I have distributed clothing, furniture and other necessities to many of the worthy poor of our city, and aided them in such a way that they have not become a burden to our city.

An abandoned four year old boy who had become a burden to the City was returned to his mother in New Hampshire.

I have written many business letters at the office and at my home which required much time and attention.

These are only a few of the many demands made upon the police matron. In addition I have made between five or six hundred calls upon the poor and sick. Through the courtesy of Mr. Bickford, Supt. of the Public Schools, and of the teachers, there was gathered from the pupils 410 parcels including toys, clothing and food which were all appreciated by both the poors and myself.

Much of my work is of a kind that it would not be proper to make public.

In closing I wish to thank City Marshal McCarron, Deputy Marshal Picard, Overseer of the Poor, Mr. Wm. Ward, Mr. and Mrs. Labranche of the city farm and all employees of the City Building, who have always been very kind to me and assisted me whenever possible.

REPORT OF CITY FARM

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Overseers of the Poor.

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith respectfully submit the following report of the City Farm and Almshouse and also the Correction House for the year ending February 28th, 1917.

The crops have been fair this year and I have been able to turn over to the City Treasurer the sum of \$1,007.63 for product sold.

We have had 95 tons of hay, 150 bu. of oats, 800 bu. potatoes, 100 bu. turnips, 50 bu. beets, 90 bu. carrots, 15,000 heads of (lettuce) cabbage, 75 bu. green peas, 9 bu. onions, 50 bu. tomatoes, 40 bu. pole beans, 70 bu. Yellow R beans, 300 heads of lettuce, 300 bunches radishes, 3 tons of squashes, 20 tons pumpkins, 2,000 cucumbers, 145 tons ensilage corn, 450 doz. ears of sweet corn, 7 tons of straw, 20 barrels of apples.

During the year, we have bought 2 horse cultivator, 1 plow, 125 ft. of rope, 1 washing machine, 1 log chain.

The ice house has been filled with 400 cakes of ice without any expense to the City.

The health of the inmates has been very good this year, there is now 63 inmates at the Farm, and we had 90 in the correction house during the year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank Mayor Brann and the Board of Aldermen, and Overseers of the Poor, for their kindness and advice during the year and to William Ward, their clerk, with whom it has been a pleasure to co-operate to look after the Poor, Dr. J. A. Dupras, the City Physician, the City Marshall, and all the other City Officials with whom I have come in contact in doing my work, and also Mrs. L'Heureux, the Police Matron.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPT.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners.

GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with the requirements of the City Ordinance, I hereby submit the report of the Lewiston Fire Department for the year, ending February 28, 1917, which will include a list of fires and alarms, the value of property at risk, the amount of loss and courses of fires as near as could be ascertained, the insurance on same, recommendations for the ensuing year, and such information as I deem of interest.

The manual force of the Department is as follows:

Permanent men:—One Chief Engineer; one Superintendent of fire alarm; one driver for Hose Co. No. 1, one hoseman for Hose Co. No. 1, one Lieutenant for Combination Chemical and Hose Motor Car No. 1; one tankman; one hoseman; one chauffeur and one assistant chauffeur; one spare man and one driver for Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1.

Call men:—Four Assistant Engineers; one Department Surgeon; two Engine men; two stokers; forty-six hosemen; twelve laddermen; seven drivers and four fire police.

During the year the Department responded to 231 alarms. The following table gives their classification:

The purchase of one City size Motor Hook and Ladder Truck.

The purchase of 2,000 feet of 2½ inch cotton rubber lined hose.

The purchase of twenty-four rubber blankets for covering goods.

The addition of ten permanent men to the Department.
Permanent teams and drivers for Hose No. 3 and Engine No. 3, Central Fire Station.
