# Report Superintendent Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Owls Head:

The schools of the town during the past year have been maintained at a very high standard of excellence. The teachers are capable and conscientious and rank much higher in ability than the average rural teacher. They are employed at salaries of which the town need not be ashamed.

Each school has an Improvement League in flourishing condition.

There is Health Crusade work in each school, and two of the schools have warm lunches each day. A proof of the value of these lunches was shown recently in the weighing of the pupils of the Timber Hill school in counection with the Health Crusade work. None of the pupils fell below the standard. This is a most unusual record and can be explained only by the fact that school lunches have been served in that school for the past two years.

Mrs. Whalen as helping teacher has been faithful and zealous. All progressive ideas and improvements gained are shared with the other teachers so there can be no rivalry.

The teachers have worked hard for their schools, the pupils have made good progress, and the schools hold a high place in the social life of the community.

The school at Owls Head Village has been discontinued and the pupils from that locality have attended the Timber Hill school. As the distance seemed long for the smaller pupils to travel an arangement was made with Mr. G. C. Wotton whereby

the pupils came to his home and are conveyed to school in the morning and back to the same place in the afternoon during the winter season. In this way what seemed necessary conveyance has been obtained at a small expense. It does not seem wise to establish any costly plan of conveyance at present. If granted to one section, it could not be denied another locality.

The rates of tuition at the Rockland High School will be increased at the beginning of the spring term and the appropriation for this purpose should be larger than that of last year.

The text book appropriation for last year was large and there is so large an unexpended balance that no additional sum is necessary at this time.

In the way of repairs there are needs for each schoo house. New sills and foundation timbers are needed at Ingraham's Hill. The school house at Ash Point is in need of repairs and the front of the building at least should be painted.

To comply with the state law for improvements of school toilets, each of the schools must be equipped in this particular before the first of September 1924. I recommend that the school house at Timber Hill, be furnished with improved toilets during the coming summer. The present out buildings there have been in a shocking condition. They would hardly have been tolerated if the parents of the pupils had been aware of conditions at certain times. These conditions have not been due to neglect on the part of teacher or pupils. Only an improved toilet building, inaccessable to outsiders can prevent this in the future.

The toilets at Ash Point should be made tight to keep out the snow and supplied with locks and with hooks on the outside of the doors. By another year permanent toilets should be built there but meanwhile decent conditions should be maintained.

Some of the residents of Owls Head village feel that the present plan for the schools is not all that might be desired. Several plans intended to improve the situation have been sugg(Page 14)

ested. There are arguments for and against each of these plans. Some would like to have the school at the village reopened. If this were done, extensive repairs would be necessary, an additional improved toilet would be necessary. It is doubtful if under this arrangement the pupils would receive the training that they enjoy at present. Some wish for a new school centrally located. This might be the best solution of the problem. It is for the people of the town to judge whether or not the financial condition of the town would permit this plan to be considered. Before any action a committee of citizens should be appointed to study the situation and report.

If any plan looking to the erection of new buildings is entered upon, it may be wise to be conservative in the matter of conveyance. The school officials will desire to be just and impartial but unless it seems necessary for the welfare of the children will probably hesitate to increase the amount of conveyance.

I have prepared estimates for appropriations for schools In doing this I have tried to provide for the needs of the schools without extravagance. If there are to be repairs upon the village school or increased conveyance, more money will be needed.
