

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Supt. of Schools Report

To the Superintending School Committee and to the Citizens of Owl's Head:—

This is my eighth annual report.

During the past year the work of our schools has been in the hands of faithful and conscientious teachers. Good progress has been made, the methods of instruction have been successful and the pupils have in most cases been obedient and studious. This does not mean that the school work has been all that we could wish it to be, but that a good use has been made of our opportunities.

During the fall and winter scarlet fever at Ingraham's Hill has hurt our attendance record, disturbed the peace of mind of parents and caused one death. All connected with the school mourned the passing of the beautiful little girl and felt the deepest sympathy with the bereaved parents. Efforts were made to guard against the spread of the disease. The school house was fumigated twice. The preventative value of fumigation is not so highly regarded by those who should know as it was formerly. The State Physician has said that this disease is often spread by the children who have it so lightly that they are not kept in, as they are supposed to be suffering from a light In times of an epidemic all who suffer from cold. colds are under suspicion and should be kept away from other children.

The rather large overdraft that appears in our repairs account might lead one to doubt the wisdom of our stewardship, but a careful study of the account will show that the situation is not so very bad. Under the system as advocated by the State auditors, balances and overdrafts are brought forward in this ac-This had been done in the superintendent's count. accounts until about two years ago when by the decision of the selectmen the substantial balance in the repairs account was not carried forward. T do not criticise this decision but it certainly was unfortunate for the appearance of my accounts that my last substantial balance must be given up, but this years account must show the amounts of overdrawn in the last two years as though it all had been done this Moreover, the repairs appropriation this last year. year was smaller by two hundred dollars than the sum recommended.

After the last school census it became apparent that, owing to the increased number of children at Ingrahams Hill, it would be necessary to enlarge the schoolroom which was to be given new windows and ' blackboards. The work thus increased, caused a larger expenditure than had been expected.

For several years little work has been done at Timber Hill as there has nearly always been some article relative to a proposed new schoolhouse at Owls Head Village. If such a new building is not an immediate possibility, something must be done on the old schoolhouse. It should be painted. The floor is bad and the lighting should be improved as the children are entitled to the same standards as are observed at the other schools.

TEXTBOOKS

Our textbooks appropriation must be larger than usual. Last year the account was overdrawn. Many of the books are so dirty and torn as to be unfit for furthur use. Our Arithmetic texts must be exchanged for others more in keeping with the present needs. In 1922 the sum of \$200.00 was raised for textbooks. Certainly our needs at present are not less than at that time.

A FORWARD LOOK

Since Owls Head became a town the road of the road building programme has overshadowed the schools in the matter of appropriations. It has often been said by citizens from various parts of the town that when the roads had been raised to a certain standard, some progressive plan would be adopted to raise the standard of our schools.

The project of a school at Owls Head Village has been repeatedly voted down, and some who have opposed the school have suggested a possibility of a consolidated school, centrally located where all the pupils of the town could be brought together in a well graded system.

The fact that the Ingrahams Hill School is becoming more crowded each year indicates a possibility that in a few years the building will not accomodate the pupils of that locality. Certain of the parents of the district are sending their children to the Rockland schools. It is idle to compare Owls Head schools with those of a city to the disparagement of the former. What teacher with about forty pupils and eight grades can do work of as high an order as she could with two or three grades and not over twelve or fourteen daily recitations.

In a consolidated school system the pupils could be well graded and music, drawing and manual work could be taught. There is no other way that the children of your town can have the school privileges equal to those of city children. It is true that this would be expensive but I believe that it need not be beyond the reach of the town when the people are once thoroughly interested and informed.

Our repair bills are large and there is the probability of continuing to spend large sums yearly on these old buildings.

The time is not quite ripe for this enterprise but if the citizens are truly interested in giving our fine young people the best possible chance, they will be willing to labor and sacrifice rather than to flippantly turn down a really progressive system when the matter comes before the voters as it is certain to in a very few years. This thing has been suggested to me by different persons from different sections of the town and it is growing. Before a plan of this sort can materialize much thought and study will be necessary in order that a practicable plan can be formulated.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have assisted in matters pertaining to the schools.

Town Warrant

To M. E. Scammon, a Constable of the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox:

GREETING:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Owl's Head in the County of Knox, qualified by law to vote in said town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, the Tenth day of March A. D., 1930 at Ten O'clock in the Forenoon, to act upon the following articles:—

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector, and Superintending School Committee.

Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer.

Art. 6. To choose a Tax Collector.

Art. 7. To vote (yes) or (no) for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if voted yes. Art. 8. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for three years.

Art. 9. To choose a Fire Warden for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To choose an Auditor and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see what method the town will vote to adopt for the collection of Taxes.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school repairs.

Art. 14. . To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Text Books.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Rockland School Board, for High School Accommodation.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair and construction of Roads and Bridges.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair and construction of Side-walks.

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Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Current Expense.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote (yes) or (no) on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the improvement of the Section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Aid Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised, for the care of the Ways, Highways and Bridges under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916, or under the provisions of Section 21 amended by Chapter 258, P. L. of 1917.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$1600.00) sixteen hundred dollars to be used and expended on Tarvia Road.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$126.00) one hundred and twenty-six dollars, for the maintenance of Third Class Road. As according to Section 4, Chapter 260, P. L. 1929, such sum must be raised in order for the town to receive assistance from the State on Third Class Road.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$500.00) five hundred dollars, to be used on the Third Class Class State Aid Road, at Ash Point.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$150.00) one hundred and fifty dollars, to be

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$100.00) one hundred dollars, to be used for resurfacing the road extending from the Main Road to the shore at Crescent Beach.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (75.00) seventy-five dollars for work on the so called Creek Road.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$125.00) one hundred and twenty-five dollars, to be expended on the road known as Ocean Avenue at Ingraham Hill.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$400.00) four hundred dollars, (\$100.00) one hundred dollars to be used on each of the four Cemeteries in the Town.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Poor.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$31.00) thirty-one dollars, towards the support of County and Public Health nursing under the State Department of Health, to continue work with mothers and children.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the reduction of the Town Debt.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Interest on the Town Debt and Temporary loans.

Art. 36. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to issue Notes for Temporary Loans.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to install three new Street Lights, one at Ash Point and two at Owl's Head Village.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Street Lights.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Officers' Salaries.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to install Fire Extinguishers in each of the School Houses and in the Town Hall, and to raise money for the same.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of (\$100.00) from Miss Cora Perry, and the sum of (\$100.00) from Miss Bessie Hall, each to be deposited in some Rockland Bank, the income of which shall be used for the permanent care of the Cora Perry lot at Ingraham Hill Cemetery and the Bessie Hall lot at Ingraham Hill Cemetery.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to abate all Taxes owed the town by Mrs. Ella Hare.

Art. 43. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and be expended and used for advertising the Natural Resources, Advantages and Attractions of the State of Maine. Art. 44. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
