### Summary of Wood

All costs of Wood cutting have been charged to Current Expense. (At the time of closing seventy-five cords of wood had been cut by those having help from the Town aside from that cut for the use of the schools. Much of this is still in the woods. Approximately twenty cords have been distributed among the needy families. Logs have been cut which were sawed into lumber which can be used for repairs to bridges or sidewalks, this being stored in the town storehouse. There is one thousand twenty five feet of this. Cost of lumber twenty-three dollars and ninety cents per thousand feet.

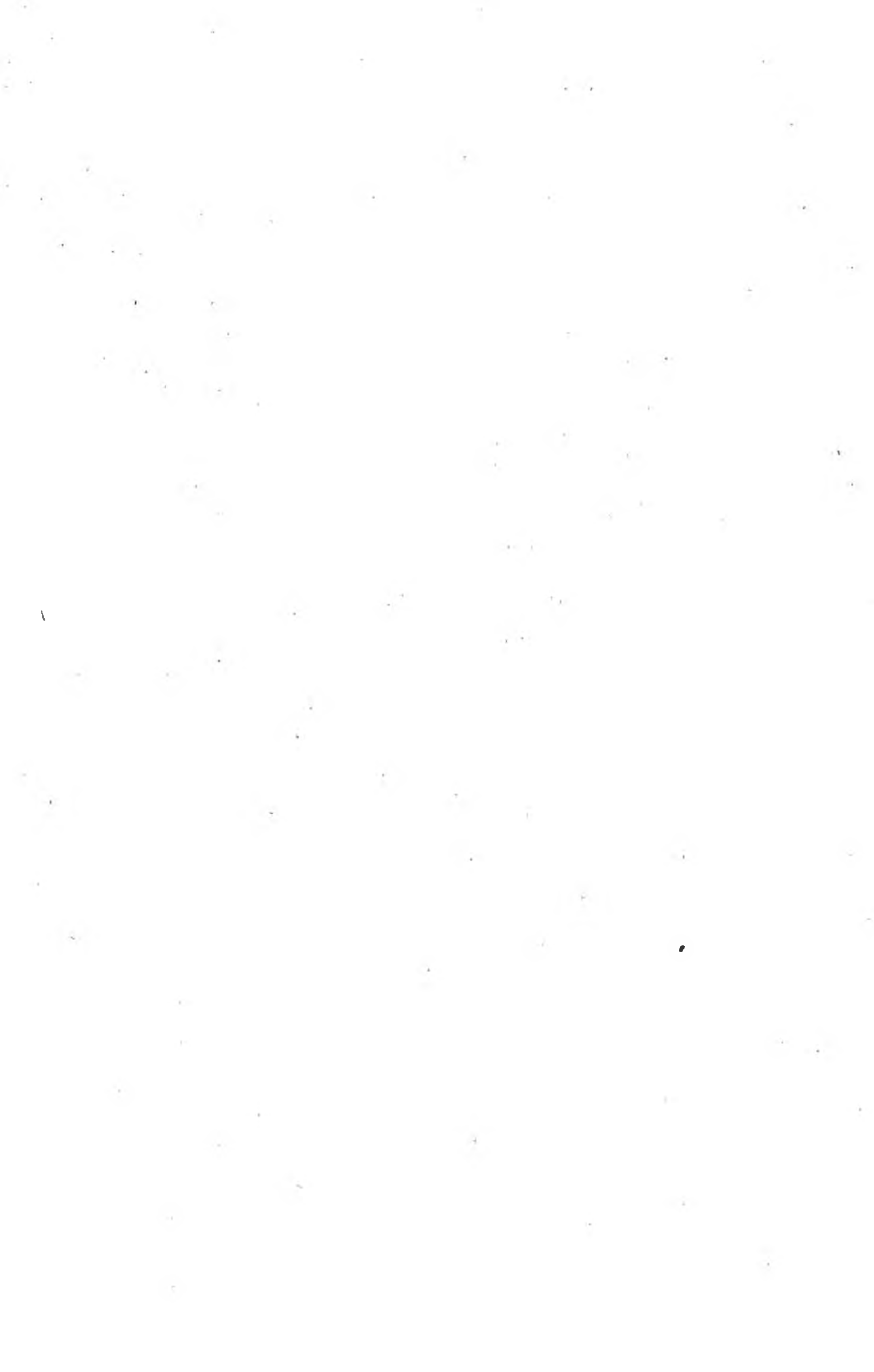

# School Department

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To the Superintending School Committee and  
to the Citizens of Owl's Head:—

Please accept this my fourteenth annual report  
as your Superintendent of Schools.

In the past year the work of our schools has  
been acceptable. The same approved methods of  
instruction and virtually the same texts have been  
used, as were used last year. The progress of the  
pupils has been satisfactory and their behavior has  
been up to its usual standard.

The plan of having an assistant teacher who  
divides her time among the three schools has been  
continued with gratifying success.

At the opening of the fall term, Miss Mildred  
Sweeney, a graduate of Farmington State Normal  
School become the teacher at Ash Point. Miss  
Sweeney has shown herself to be a capable and con-  
scientious teacher. The former teacher, Miss Har-  
jula had served faithfully several years in our  
schools and has many friends among teachers and  
pupils.

During the year a few new readers for the  
middle and upper grades were bought. The rest of

the money spent for text books went for replacement of worn out books.

A jacket for the stove at Ash Point was made by A. J. Spaulding, and was installed this winter. This jacket is beautiful and efficient and is an improvement over any stove jacket I have seen. There is now but one school in town where the stove is not jacketed, that at Ingraham's Hill.

In all of our schools during the winter afternoons the lighting is very poor. This is most noticeable at Ingraham Hill, where the schoolhouse was built wider than would be permitted at present.

Some citizens have suggested electric lights, and these would be highly desirable. This matter has been brought to the attention of the school officials, but the matter of expense and the knowledge that if the committee were to have one schoolhouse wired, the other communities could and probably would expect it at their buildings, have prevented action in the matter.

The double seats in use at two of the schools make it difficult to maintain order on the dark afternoons. A gradual purchase of good new single seats would not be burdensome, and would make our schools more efficient.

At the last term of the legislature, a law was passed making the payment of the portion of the state school fund that is based on the payment of high school tuition, conditional on the tuition having been paid before the first day of September.

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In many towns, yours among these, the cash to pay their bills have not been at hand, and so the school resources have been smaller by \$700.00 than was expected when appropriations were made last year.

This money will be received by the towns when assurance can be given that all tuition bills have been paid.

If it has not been paid by May 1, 1936, the funds left will be paid by the state to the towns and cities to which it is owed.

It is distinctly to the advantage of this town to have that bill paid before the above date as the full sum will certainly be forthcoming under that circumstance.

I have counted this as a resource and have further counted an equal sum among the expected resources of next year.

For convenience in accounts I shall henceforth apply all money paid from the State, on account of high school tuition, to that account. This will cause a shortage to be shown in this year's common schools account and also in the text books accounts, and will require larger appropriation in the accounts.

From the same cause, a smaller appropriation will be required for next year's tuition account, and there will be a larger balance shown.

My statements of the past years accounts show the orders I have written, and not in all cases, the accounts paid by the Treasurer, and the resources will show the amounts actually due, but this does not

mean that these have been received by the Treasurer.

I thank the Committee and the Town Officials for all courtesies, and to those citizens who have given loyal support to our schools I express my sincere gratitude.

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Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.

Art. 8. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose an Auditor and all other necessary Town Officers.

Art. 10. To see what method the Town will vote to adopt for the collection of taxes.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Repairs.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current expense.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for care and construction of Sidewalks.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for care and construction of Roads and Bridges.

Art. 19. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the care of Poor.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Mother's Aid.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for temporary loans.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Interest on Temporary Loans.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Street Lights and Town Hall Lights.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officer's Salaries.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred forty-two dollars (142.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for construction.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote 'yes' or 'no' on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid road money, as provided in Sect. 20, Chap. 28 R. S. 1930.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19 Chap. 28 R. S. 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3 Chap. 173 P. L. 1935.

Art. 29. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2 Chap. 132 P. L. 1935.



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Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Nursing.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (150.00) to be placed in trust, the interest to care for the Clifford Smith cemetery lot at Ash Point.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for repairs to the Creek Road.

Art. 33. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.
