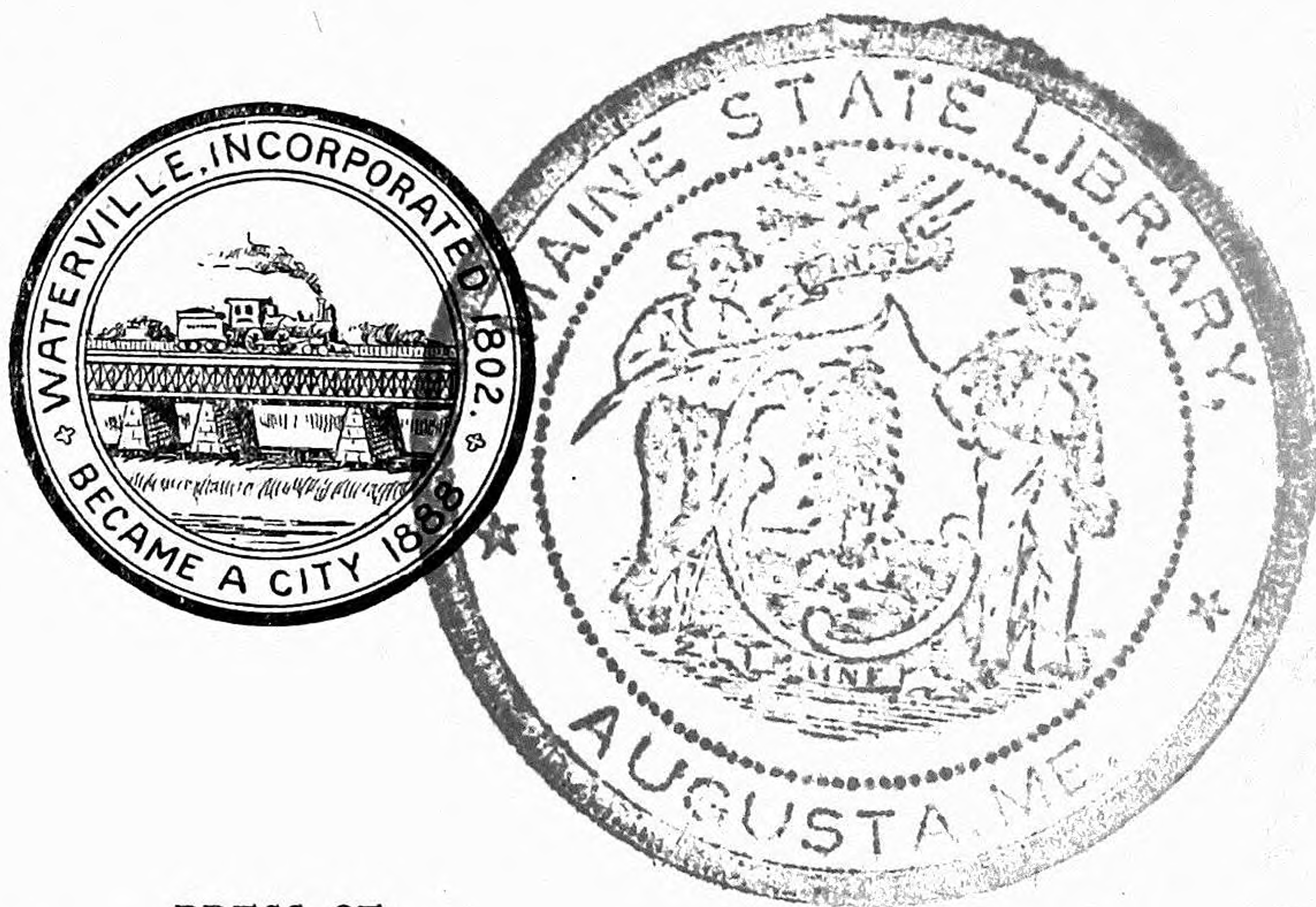

The Mayor's Address.

Gentlemen of the City Council :

We have met together here to-day for the purpose of organizing a municipal government for our beautiful city for the coming year, and I trust we all fully appreciate the responsibility which we assume and sacredness of the trust which has been placed in our hands by our constituents.

I do not see before me a single individual whom I think will betray this trust, yet I want to express my most utter contempt for any man, who having been elected to an office, uses that office for his own benefit at the expense of those who have honored him.

The past year has been a very busy one. We have erected a new city building at a cost to the present time of about \$30,000, \$22,500 of which has been raised by taxation the past year, leaving a debt already incurred by the city of \$7,500.

It will require to finish, furnish and fully equip the building for use about \$65,000 in all. Deduct from this \$65,000 what has been raised the past year by taxation \$22,500 and you have left the sum of \$42,500 still to be paid. I would recommend that one-half of this be raised by taxation the coming year and the balance the year after. Then we shall have erected, furnished and paid for a building in three years which will, I think, be the pride of the city for many years to come.

The various departments of the city government are as a whole in good hands and in a very prosperous condition ; especially is this the case with the school department which only needs a new school building or two to make it even better than that of any city the size of our own in the state.

There is one branch of the Fire Department to which I will

call your attention. This is the Fire Alarm System. This has been replaced, repaired and overhauled at quite an expense and to quite an extent the past year and is, I think it safe to say, in a worse condition than it was a year ago.

This trouble I believe results largely from the careless manner in which the city and the several companies using the city poles have strung their wire through the streets. This same method of stringing wire also affects our street lighting system very much. In many places the wires are in such a position that it is very dangerous to the person who has the care of the street lights.

I therefore most earnestly recommend that the city at once employ a competent Electrical Engineer who can tell us just what the best method would be to remedy this trouble.

I will not take your time in discussing the many smaller needed improvements in the city as I have no doubt those who are most interested in them will bring them to your attention in a more forcible manner than would be seemly for me to do here.

There is, however, one thing more which I would mention: the fact that the one hundredth anniversary of our town occurs this year and I most earnestly recommend a generous contribution to the celebration fund by the city.

Gentlemen, I pledge you my co-operation in whatever you may undertake for the advancement of the business interests or moral welfare of the city and I appeal to you for encouragement and support the coming year.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Waterville :

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit to you my seventh annual report as Clerk of Overseers of the Poor, for the fiscal year commencing February 1, 1902, and ending January 31, 1903.

ALMSHOUSE.

The supervision of the house has been under Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer, and they have proved themselves well fitted for the place and given entire satisfaction. The number of inmates at the beginning of the year was nineteen, admitted thirteen, discharged ten, and three have died, Orrin Towne, Napoleon Cordieux and Chas. Harvey; present number, nineteen. The nationality of inmates is: American, one; French, fourteen; Irish, four. Mr. Sawyer has sold for cash, 1 cow, 1 pig, 2 calves, cream and eggs to the amount of \$89.85, reducing the net cost of running the house for the year to \$1,346.50.

INSANE.

Number of patients at Maine Insane Hospital at the beginning of the year: five; admitted four; discharged three; present number six. Amount of bills paid to Hospital \$761.57 and to the town of Jay, on account of Mrs. Frank W. Sylvester, \$46.79. Collected and paid to City Treasurer \$133.61. Cost of patients to city \$674.75.

I want to recommend the giving of one week to each of the regular officers for vacation, as is done in most of the cities in the State.

In closing my report I extend to his Honor the Mayor and the Committee on Police and also each member of the City Government my appreciation of their respect and support on all matters brought to their attention.

To Judge Shaw of the Municipal Court, for his advice and the courteous manner in which I have been treated, and to the City Solicitor for his help; to the Deputy Marshal, and all of the Police for their attention to business and their willingness to assist me day or night, to all these I wish to tender thanks for the many kindnesses shown me.

APPARATUS.

Consists of: One steam fire engine (recently rebuilt); one two-horse hook and ladder truck carrying 175 ft. ladders, etc.; one two-horse hose wagon, carrying 1,400 ft. of hose; two one-horse hose wagons, carrying 850 ft. of hose each; one four-wheeled hand-reel, carrying 700 ft. of hose; one set bobs for ladder truck; four hose pungs for Cos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, carrying capacity same as wagons; one one-horse spare pung; one two-horse supply wagon; one two-horse supply sled; one two-horse jobbing wagon; one two-wheeled hose-reel; one Eastman De-luge Set; one 50-ft. new rope hoist extension ladder, spare, kept at Hose 2.

HORSES.

The pair attached to Hook and Ladder Truck, and the pair attached to Hose Wagon No. 1, are in prime condition. The blacks are getting old and cannot be expected to do fire duty many years longer.

The above teams have been worked on the streets alternately the past year, when conditions allowed, and have earned the Department \$437 50 (see financial report).

Hose wagons Nos. 2, 3 & 4, are hauled by horses from nearby stables.

HOSE.

The Department has 7,500 ft. of 2 1-2 inch rubber-lined cotton hose. About 4,000 ft. are in first-class condition. The balance will soon have to be replaced by new hose. Several hundred feet of old hose, unsuitable for fire service, have been turned over to the Sewer Department the past year.

HOUSES.

All the department houses are in a fair condition, excepting

the Central Station ; and unless a new Central Station is built this year, expensive and extensive changes will have to be made.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

Under the able management of City Electrician Pressey, the system has worked admirably, since the "slack was taken in." All the Gamewell alarms have been correctly and promptly received.

The Auxiliary (the individual fire alarm) is a constant care and expense. Members are often changing their place of residence and bells, batteries and the stringing of wires necessarily have to be changed. In spite of its costliness, it is practical and efficient.

IMPROVEMENTS.

There have been added to the Department the past year 1,000 feet of new hose, cost \$600.00.

3 new fire alarm boxes, Nos. 32, 42 and 43, cost \$160.00.

50 batteries to the Auxiliary fire alarm.

Hose house No. 4 raised and leveled, Hall painted and papered, at an expense of \$60.00.

Hose house No. 2 has been rebuilt, piped, plumbed, and a hot air furnace installed to heat the building, at a cost of about \$1,000.

A new hose pung, built to order for Hose 4, cost \$80.00.

A new hose pung (except bobs) built to order for Hose 1, cost \$80.00.

Steamer No. 1 rebuilt—new boiler, pumps, etc., metal work replated, gear scraped, and painted, costing about \$1,500.00.

Seven hydrants have been raised to proper height, and several minor improvements could be mentioned.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1st. The building of a new central fire station.

2nd. The installing of a compressed air fire alarm whistle.

3rd. The purchase of 1,000 feet of hose, at once.

4th. A storage battery system, taking the place of gravity system now in use.

5th. That a hydrant be set on Abbott and one on Oakland street.

THE WATERVILLE RELIEF ASSOCIATION.

Organized Aug. 11. Promises to be a valuable aid to the Department. It should be encouraged and fostered by every citizen of this city.

Its object is to afford financial aid to those who may be injured in the discharge of their duties. It is to be his accident insurance, his "great rock in a weary land."

Waterville is growing, her population is increasing, her buildings are larger than of old. Dangers confront the fireman of to-day of which the old-time fireman knew nothing. Accident, pain and may be death are liable to be the lot of the brave fireman. Make this Association financially ready to meet its obligations.

The city is to be congratulated on the very small fire loss that has occurred during the past year. Out of the 48 fire alarms given there were only three where the loss was not fully covered by insurance.

In conclusion, I wish to thank his Honor, the Mayor, the City Council, the Fire Committee, the Assistant Engineers, each member of the Fire Department and Police force, for the kindly aid and courtesy shown me during the past year.

Board of Health.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Health beg leave to submit for your consideration the following report:

During the year the different members have responded to over 100 calls to remove public nuisances, nearly all of which were promptly attended to.

During the year there have been a large number of cases of typhoid and scarlet fever. The exact cause of the typhoid fever is not definitely known, but from facts gathered by the board the evidence seems to show that a large number of the cases have been caused by the city water supply having become polluted; and it seems a very opportune time for the municipal officers to ascertain whether or not the Maine Water Company is carrying out its part of the agreement to furnish the city with a pure drinking water.

We are very sorry to state that many of the physicians of the city are very negligent as to reporting cases of typhoid to the Board of Health; some seeming to think that their whole duty is to call upon the sick ones, never giving any directions as to disinfection of soiled clothing, stools, etc.; thereby neglecting the greater duty they owe to the attendants, family, and neighbors.

The greater number of scarlet fever cases have been very light, and to a great extent the mild character of the disease is responsible for the great number of cases, very many of the

cases being so mild that the character of the disease was not known and, consequently, the afflicted ones were allowed to mingle freely with the well ones during the whole course of the disease. We are greatly indebted to the public school teachers for reporting all suspected cases to the Board of Health, thereby assisting us greatly in our work.

We have had during the year eight cases of small pox. These cases were all treated at their places of abode; at the time the same were discovered, there were five cases in one house, two in another, and one in a third. But one case developed in either house after the Board of Health took charge, and there was no further spread of the disease. Free vaccination was offered and a thorough inspection was made of the employes of the Lockwood Company and the Riverview Worsted Mill, also of the pupils of the public and parochial schools, and all that were in need of vaccination received the same.

The Board of Health has worked faithfully for several years to induce the city government to provide a hospital for infectious diseases, that we might be prepared for an outbreak of small pox; but our efforts thus far have been in vain, and we regret exceedingly that after getting the plans and calling for bids the hospital was not built and furnished ready for occupancy. Why the expenditure of a few hundred dollars, or the criticism of a few sentimentalists, should deter a city government from doing what it considered its duty, we cannot understand. However, we still hope to see a suitable building, easy of access, erected at a very early date, so that in the future the board will not be handicapped as it has been in the past.

There have been five cases of diphtheria reported. There have been a few cases of chicken pox, measles and whooping cough, and the mumps have been very prevalent.

We wish to repeat the recommendation we made last year in regard to having a sanitary inspector appointed, whose duty shall be to inspect all plumbing and sewerage construction, place in quarantine all infected houses and fumigate the same, answer

all calls that are made for inspection of nuisances, and see that the same are removed.

The city has now reached that size where there is work enough to keep a man busy all of the time, and he should be paid a fixed salary, and work under the direction of the Board of Health.

We recommend that all owners of houses on the line of a sewer be obliged to connect or close the houses. The sewerage system needs extension; and again we wish to call attention to the necessity of some action being taken in regard to Hayden brook.

Report of Milk Inspector.

Waterville, Me., Jan. 31, 1903.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of
Waterville :*

Gentlemen: I beg leave to submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1903.

The inspection of milk and analysis of samples have been made in the same manner as in previous years, with the Babcock test and the Quevenne lactometer. Two samples only have failed to stand the test of 3 per cent. of butter fat; said samples having been obtained from grocery stores, where clerks do not always take the necessary time to mix their milk before pouring the quantity sold at each time.

Early last spring we had an outbreak of scarlet fever, and the following letter was sent to all milk dealers :

Waterville, Me., May 26, 1902.

Dear Sir: On account of the many cases of scarlet fever in our city, you are requested to have your customers, in quarantined houses, furnish you and use their own vessels to receive their orders of milk or cream. Neither cans nor bottles should be returned from quarantined houses to milkmen.

Per order of Board of Health,

A. JOLY, Milk Inspector.

The above order was followed scrupulously by all our milkmen who understood the wise course taken in the matter.

During the month of August a rumor was circulated that a herd, from our milk supply, had been exposed to tuberculosis.

After an investigation, and the testing with tuberculin of said herd, the rumor proved to be false, for the herd was found free from tuberculosis.

In November, an outbreak of Foot and Mouth disease was discovered in New England, and as a matter of prudence, as the disease is communicable to man, the following letter, with a circular describing the symptoms of the disease, was mailed to milk dealers:

Office of Board of Health,
Waterville, Maine, Nov. 24, 1902.

DEAR SIR: The "Foot and Mouth" disease has made its appearance among cattle in the States of Massachusetts and Rhode Island. The disease is liable to reach our State, and if you come in contact with any suspicious cases, the Waterville Board of Health wishes you to notify the Milk Inspector at once, and an investigation will be made free of charge to the owner of such suspected animals.

Fortunately, no Foot and Mouth disease has been yet found in the State of Maine.

Since last fall our Board of Health has had to contend with an outbreak of typhoid fever, the causes of which have not yet been found, and in order to pursue investigations, our milkmen were requested to inform the Board of Health if there had been typhoid fever either in their or in any of their employes' families during the year of 1902. To this letter of inquiry fourteen milkmen neglected to answer. I have since been informed that four out of these fourteen had typhoid fever in their families during the year.

In cases of contagious diseases, houses are quarantined, and are under the order of the Board of Health, but in infectious diseases, such as typhoid fever, infected premises are not quarantined and, as a result, the Milk Inspector has no control over the delivery of milk.

The use of glass bottles during an epidemic should be con-

demned, and consumers should furnish their own vessels outside the door. It is a common practice among a few milk dealers, when short of bottles, to take an empty bottle, apparently clean, from one customer, fill it out of his can on the wagon, then pass it to the next. There is no better way to contaminate the milk, for such bottles may have entered infected houses and be loaded with germs, and this might happen without the knowledge of the milk pedlar.

A NEW KIND OF NEW MILK.

A lady who happened to need some milk, in addition to her regular supply, the other day, hailed a passing milkman and asked for some. She was astonished when she received the reply, "I haven't any new milk, but I can make you some." On asking what he meant by that, the milkman assured her he had skim milk and cream and he could easily mix them and make some new milk.

This was the matter of fact statement of a man regularly engaged in the business. He would not of course have claimed that his skimmed milk was of that day's milking, and how old his cream was he probably had no idea, but he was going to combine the two and make morning's milk, fresh from the cow. Query, how much of our new milk is made in that way?

The above article appeared in the Waterville Mail of September 20th, 1902. It speaks for itself and adds one more reason why we should have some municipal laws to regulate the sale of milk.

A law passed by the Legislature in 1901, reads as follows :

(CHAPTER 183.)

AN ACT additional to Section 59, Chapter 3, of the Revised Statutes, relating to City Ordinances.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Section 59 of Chapter 3 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended by adding after paragraph 12 the following paragraph :

XIII. Cities may establish ordinances requiring all persons

selling milk therein to be licensed; and may prescribe in such ordinances the terms and conditions upon which such licenses may be granted, when and how such licenses may be revoked, and may prescribe penalties for violations of such ordinances. No person, unless so licensed, shall sell milk in any city where a license is required as herein provided.

(Approved March 13.)

Report of City Solicitor.

To The Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Waterville:

The report of your City Solicitor for the municipal year ending February, 1903, is herewith respectfully submitted.

The duties of City Solicitor for the year past have been many and varied. I have attended eleven meetings of the City Government and have been called upon to give hasty opinions at most of these meetings.

The case of Marion Cyr vs. the City of Waterville, for injuries occasioned by falling on the sidewalk on Water street, where it was claimed that there was a defect in the sidewalk, was tried at the June Term of the Superior Court, and the plaintiff obtained a verdict for three hundred and eighty-five dollars. The case was appealed to the Law Court, but before it came to trial, the Mayor and Committee on Claims settled with the plaintiff for two hundred and seventy-five dollars and costs.

There are two cases now pending against the City: that of William H. Pearson vs. the City of Waterville, and that of Whitcomb & Cannon vs. the City of Waterville. The case which William H. Pearson has brought is for damages to person and property occasioned by his sleigh being overturned on account of an alleged defect in the highway, *i. e.* snow being thrown up by the snow-plough of the W. & F. Railway and Light Company in the street; the case of Whitcomb & Cannon is for money which it is claimed was paid by the Treasurer to the wrong party.

Only one case has been brought by the City of Waterville

during the past year, and that against the town of Danforth for pauper supplies furnished Mrs. Nina Fogarty.

I have one recommendation to make and that is, that the salary of the Solicitor should be two hundred and fifty dollars per year, as the services which he renders the City are worth that much.
