## Town Warrant

Penobscot ss.

State of Maine.

To A. A. Eldridge, Constable in the town of Howland, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Forrester's Hall in said town on Monday the ninth day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To elect a fire-inspector for the ensuing year, and fix his compensation.
- Art. 4. To fix the commission for the collection of taxes, and elect a tax collector.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 5% on all taxes assessed in the year 1914 which are paid on or before July 1, 1914, and 2% on all taxes paid on or before October 1, 1914, and to see if the taxes assessed in the year 1914 shall be paid into the town treasurer at least two weeks before the next annual town meeting.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, support of the poor, repairs of roads and bridges, breaking winter roads and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State aid road law of 1913.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount contemplated by said law, it being \$533.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to set apart \$400. from the account of highways and bridges for the construction of "Special Highway", and designate the road on which it shall be expended.

- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to have all turn-piking done on all the roads, not later than July 15, 1914.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to cover the sand hill, or the piece of sand-road beginning at V. R. Nason's and extending to the foot of the hill below the Crocker place, with some suitable material, to insure a good road.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will raise the sum of one thousand forty-five dollars (\$1045) to pay the last school house note and interest.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will raise a sufficient sum of money to paint the school building on the outside.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will raise \$250 for painting Penobscot river bridge; to be used jointly with the State appropriation, which amounts to an equal sum.
- Art. 15. To transact any other business which may come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Forrester's a Hall on Monday the 9th day of March, for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

# Annual Report of Selectmen

for the Municipal year 1913-14

In compliance with the laws of the State of Maine, we herewith submit our report of the business of the town of Howland, for the period above-named. You will please examine it very carefully, and compare it with the last annual report, and you can see at once that we (as a town) have made a good substantial gain in the year last passed.

There has been considerable accomplished during the year which

might be enumerated in the following order.

The completion of an unusually difficult piece of State road, which was made possible by some earnest endeavor on the part of the Selectmen, whereby, they secured \$800 of the automobile money which was being "sliced" in the early spring for the benefit of towns who were in some such condition as we found ourselves placed, in relation to State road problems.

The completion of the remaining part of the road designated as "Special Highway" leading from Howland point to the north line of the town: (And we feel that especial credit is due the Road Commissioner, and his foreman on this piece of work for the amount and quality of the road constructed.)

The planking of the Penobscot river, and Piscatiquis river bridges; painting Piscatiquis river bridge; and the adjusting of both of the above-named bridges, by a competent bridge erector, which places them in as good condition as they were at the time of their erection, in so far as tension goes to so place them.

The very satisfactory adjustment of pauper claims, and the modest expenditure of money appropriate to that use; taking into consideration, the extra cases in which the town was involved.

The highway and bridge money was exceptionally well expended, inasmuch as the highways were, with a few exceptions, in good condition during the entire season. That piece of road lying between

the westerly end of the State road, and what is commonly called the "Guide-board" was in a bad condition during the summer, and should have been looked after earlier in the season than it was, as it is almost useless to attempt to do anything to such a piece of road after July, and expect it to amount to much.

The arrangement of a class of towns on weights and measures and the consequent saving in expense to this, and every other town interested with them; and last, but not least, the fight made the past year against the "brown-tailed" moth, which has been so successfully carried on, at a small cost.

If there is anything which we have omitted or neglected which is for the good of the town, just mention it, shake hands with yourselves, and thank the LORD that it is no worse.

The appropriations made at the last annual meeting amounted to \$6,815 to which the State and County tax should be added; State tax \$1,475.61, County tax \$285.99, making the total assessment necessary to defray the above enumerated expense \$8,576.60. The amount assessed was \$8,845.44, leaving an overlay of \$268,84 which overlay is accounted for elsewhere in this report. We found 132 polls which we assessed at \$3.00 each, making a total of \$396 which was deducted from the amount raised, leaving a balance of \$8,449.44 to be assessed on the property of the several property owners throughout the town on a \$.03 rate.

The schools for the past year have with few exceptions been very satisfactory. Owing to the crowded condition of the primary school it was necessary to make some change which was done by the School Committee making a law that no pupil should enter school in the Spring unless they were qualified to take up work in the first grade, as it would make an extra class which would mean much extra work for the teacher, and the pupils would receive much more benefit by entering school at the beginning of the school year instead of the last term of the year as has been the custom previous to this year.

A class of four were graduated from the grammar school in June the graduation took place in the Baptist Church, the program was interesting and the parts well rendered. One of the class has entered Hebron Academy and one West Enfield High School the other two are planning higher school work soon. There has been thirty-eight weeks of school this year and the untiring efforts of the teachers and willingness of the pupils have made it a very successful school year, more especially the Winter term of 14 weeks which is in session at the present time and with the present teaching force is a decided success.

The Superintendent has introduced a course of study which was very much needed and she hopes will be appreciated by all who are interested in the school work.

There has been a chart, a globe and a Webster's dictionary purchased for the school this year also a large number of text books.

The Wentworth-Smith Arithmetic, Gordy's History and Maury's Geography have been introduced into the schools, and with the exception of readers and some classics the schools are well supplied with text books.

Thanking the superintending school committee and the citizens of Howland for their ever ready and willing support.
