To A. A. Eldridge, Constable in the town of Howland, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Forester's Hall in said town on Monday the eighth day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 3. To elect a fire inspector and fix his compensation.
 - Art. 4. To elect a tax collector and fix his commission.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will allow a discount of 5 per cent. on all taxes assessed in the year 1915 which are paid on or before July first of that year, and see if the town will vote to have all the taxes assessed in the year 1915 collected and paid into the town treasury at least two weeks before the next annual town meeting.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, support of the poor, repairs of roads and bridges, breaking winter roads, and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State aid law of 1913.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount contemplated by that law, for the year 1915.

- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to set apart \$400.00 from the account of highway and bridges for the construction of "Special Highway" and designate the road on which it shall be expended.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to have the turnpiking done on all roads not later than July 15, 1915.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$175.00 to paint the schoolhouse.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the Penobscot river bridge, also the Piscataquis river bridge, and the bridge across Sebois stream.
- Art. 13. To transact any other business which may come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Forester's Hall on the day of said meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

Annual Report of Municipal Officers

for the Municipal year 1914-15

To the taxpayers and citizens of the town of Howland:

In compliance with the laws of the State of Maine, we herewith submit our annual report for the municipal year 1914-15 for your perusal and consideration. We, as citizens, and taxpayers, as well as officers executing your will insofar as we were able to do so, find a great deal of satisfaction in reporting the business of this year, not for this year in particular, but knowing as we glance over this report, and allow our memory to go back something like eight years, taking a survey of the achievements during that period—we cannot help that glad feeling which is bound to make itself manifest throughout our whole being. It may be well in passing, to mention the fact, that during the past eight years, that the average tax-rate has been only six-tenths of one mill higher than it was during the eight years prior to the year ending in February, 1907.

During the past year we took the liberty to use the sum raised for "painting the schoolhouse" to erect "fire-escapes on the same building." They were very much needed, and it is something that is compulsory, as we read the law, and especially the note from the department in relation to it.

The insurance on the school building was overlooked at the last annual meeting, therefore, there was no provisions made for that amount, consequently it had to be paid when due.

The primary school was in such a state of congestion that, the the school committee decided to divide it for best results, and in this new arrangement we expended \$165.26 which we are positive is one of the best expenditures on school property, for the direct benefit of the scholars which has been made in recent years.

Our road work for the past season is especially commendable, that is to say: That the work of both road commissioners was of the very best type, and the quantity cannot be questioned, taking the available money into consideration.

The appropriation made at the last annual meeting amounted to \$6,128.00 to which the State and county tax should be added, State tax \$1,328.19, county tax \$285.99, overlay \$57.21, making a total assessment of \$7,799.39. We found 129 polls at \$3.00 each making a total of \$387.00 which deducted from the above named assessment, leaves us with a total assessment on property of \$7,412.39, which requires a rate of \$.026 on the dollar.

The schools for the year 1914 and 1915 have gone on very smoothly, the same teachers being employed throughout the year. Owing to the large increase in the number of pupils within the last two years it was necessary to take one grade (3rd) from the primary school and also one grade (4th) from the intermediate school and there two grades combined from the sub-primary school. The vacant room in the school building was fitted with seats, blackboards, a teacher's desk and clock, and the grammar school was transferred to the "new room."

The intermediate school which was on the first floor, was changed to what was formerly the grammar room, and now there are four schools in town to provide for, which means an extra expense to the town, therefore more money will need to be raised this year to maintain the extra school.

The parents will be interested to know that the scholars are well protected from fire by means of a fire-escape which was purchased last June. The scholars have been thoroughly drilled on the escape and in one and one-half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ minutes from the time the gong sounds, the children are all safely on the ground by way of the fire-escape.

There has been an unusually good attendance throughout the year, which goes to show that the parents are interested and have made every effort to keep the children in school.

The graduation exercises were held in the Baptist Church, with an interesting program. A class of six were graduated from the grammar school in June. One of the class has entered Bangor high school and one Maine Central Institute. We have three students attending Hebron Academy. One in Higgins Classical Institute, one in Foxeroft Academy and four in Bucksport Seminary, which speaks well for the boys and girls of our town on the question of education.

Thanking the Superintending School Committee and citizens of Howland, for all past favors, I respectfully submit this report of the schools for the past year.
