

To V. R. Nason, Constable in the town of Howland, in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Foresters' Hall in said town, on Monday the thirteenth day of March, 1916, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To elect a fire inspector and fix his compensation.
- Art. 4. To elect a tax collector and fix his commission.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will allow a discount of five per cent on all taxes assessed in the year 1916, which are paid on or before July first of that year, and see if the town will vote to have all taxes assessed in the year 1916 collected and paid into the town treasurer at least two weeks before the next annual town meeting.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, support of poor, repairs of roads and bridges, breaking winter road, and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State aid law of 1913.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount contemplated by that law, for the year 1916.

- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to set apart four hundred dollars from the account of "Highways and Bridges" for the construction of "Special Highways", and designate the road on which it shall be expended.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to have all turnpiking done on all roads not later than July 15, 1916.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to abate the claim for taxes which it holds against the property of Mrs. Maud Pillsbury for the year 1915.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to join with a union of towns in the employment of a Union Superintendent, and instruct the S. S. Committee to make all necessary arrangements for the same.
- Art. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Foresters' Hall on the day of said meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

for the year 1915-16

To the Inhabitants of the town of Howland:

In compliance with the laws of the State of Mame, we herewith present our annual report for your consideration. We intend to discuss briefly the things of the past year; and, present an outline of what the town is expected to do at the meeting this year; to follow out that progressive principal which has been in the past typical of Howland; or in accord with that high ideal which it has been her aim to typify; in her schools, and highways.

The schools for the past year have been improving, as they have for the past period of years; and we would refer you to the report of the Superintendent of Schools for this matter, as it is fully discussed therein.

The highways for the past year were, considering the weather conditions, in excellent condition most of the time. Yet we have two pieces of road which must have a thorough overhauling this year, viz: the Mattamiscontis road; and the Sebois road.

The Mattamiscontis road was in bad condition during the past summer; owing in part to the wet summer, and partly on account of the bushes, especially from the Clements place to the Davis field, (so-called). It was in such condition that we feel justified in copying, and incorporating herein this letter in full as follows:

Mr. H. C. Scott, Chairman of Selectmen, Howland, Me.

Dear Sir:—

On several occasions our attention has been called to the almost impassable condition of the highway in your town, leading to Mattamiscontis and during the last session of the Grand jury in this county papers were drawn for an indictment against your town, but on our advice the matter was not presented, but later, some of our members had occasion to pass over this section of road and found it in

such a disgraceful condition, that we think it our duty to the public and also to your town, to call your attention to the matter, so that you may be able to make some improvements thus avoiding damages that may occur from injury to some one, and also an indictment in the future, which we would not try to prevent if the road was not put in passable condition at once.

The short section of this road which was "in such a disgraceful condition" was at the swamp at the town line, and several holes toward Howland to the Davis field, with a few little holes from the Davis field down to the Clements place thrown in for good measure.

This is not one of our important highways, but from the above you can readily see that it will be necessary to make some provision for the repair of this road.

The Sebois road. This road never was built, it just happened to lie along the horseback, and as near as one could judge, it was a spotted line, cut out a little to admit the passing of a wagon, and has gradually worn into the earth so that most of the way it is something like a ditch in the wheel track, with no place for the water to get out readily after a rain; and with the heavy motor traffic it is impossible to do much to it, unless you appropriate quite a sum of money to cut the bushes, and blow the stumps, so that you can work a road machine and knock the sides off from the road (shoulders) so as to allow the water to drain as it should. Last year Mr. Sawyer intended to have this road indicted, but, on promise to do something this year he gave it up for the time. Yet, it is hard to tell just how he would feel about it, should we leave it as it is during the coming year. If the traffic was the same now as it was a few years since, the road would be considered in good condition; but, we are living in the age of automobiles; and their rights and complaints, must be taken into consideration; or, we have trouble.

Now we would suggest that the "Special Highway" money, as it existed last year, be taken from the south side of the Piscatiquis river for a year or so, and expended on the Sebois road as per above.

This would avoid raising any extra money on account of the Sebois road; and would not be working any hardship on the people on the south side of the river; as that road last summer was about as good as any in town. We do not mean to leave this piece of road for good and all, but we can get by for a year or so, and nobody will be the worse for it, (on account of road on that side) and the town will be better off, than to raise a lot of extra money. However, this matter is up to the voters, and they will suit their own pleasure. Yet we want you to think this matter over good and hard.

Our highway account is a little "strained" but the Mattamiscontis road, and the Lagrange end of the Meadow brook road during the late fall months did most of the "straining".

The pauper bill has been larger than for years past, but part of this we will recover later from those to whom it belongs.

The appropriations made at the last annual meeting amounted to \$5,208 to which the State and County tax should be added, State tax, \$1,488.47, County tax, \$386.67, Overlay, \$116.52, making a total assessment of \$7,199.66. We found 148 polls which we assessed at \$3.00 each making a total of \$444, which we deducted from the above named assessment, leaving us with a total assessment on property of \$6,755,66 which requires a rate of 24 mills.

This account shows as per account that it is "unexpended" \$80.72. We had from town balance 1914, \$25.75, appropriation, 1915, \$75.00 and the apportionment from the "State" \$122.50 which totals \$223.50. We expended \$227.50 making an "overdraw" of \$4.00—rather than the "unexpended" as shown.

In the place of this account we shall pass from this to the patrol system, which will require that we set apart something like \$56.52 per mile for 6 5-10 miles from the highway and bridge money. And in addition to this we have to set apart 5 per cent of the highway and bridge money to cut the bushes along improved land, thereafter to be cut by the land owner. You can easily figure where we will put a good slice of our money which we raise for the highway and bridges. It will leave something less than \$400. after deducting "Special Highway," Patrol, Bushes, from the amount. Yet we want to go careful in our appropriations.

In compliance with the law, I herewith submit the above financial report of the schools for the school year 1915-1916. and have tried to make every thing plain, so that whoever may chance to peruse this report shall not find anything misleading.

The schools for the past year with few exceptions have been satisfactory there has been good work done and a good interest has been shown with both teachers and pupils. There has been several changes in the teaching force. It was necessary to have a new Principal in the Grammar school and a new teacher in the Intermediate school, the other schools have had the same teachers throughout the year.

The class of 1915 who were graduated from the Grammar school in June, was very small, but with the kind assistance of some of our local talent a very interesting program was given. One of the class has entered West Enfield high school, the other two have not yet taken up any higher school work, but we hope that in the near future they may be able to do so. The class of '15, presented to the Grammar school a portrait of their Principal, Mr. Varnum, which I am sure was highly appreciated by the undergraduates.

The Intermediate school has also had a gift of a beautiful painted picture presented by the school. The funds to purchase the picture were raised by Alice Eldridge, Evelyn Bennett and Teddy Moran.

At the close of the term which is in session at the present time, will complete 34 weeks of school, with an enrollment of 97 pupils. Owing to the illness of two of the teachers and about 40 of the pupils, with the "Grippe" during the winter term, it was necessary to close the schools for a period of two weeks, a number of the pupils have not been able to return to school at the present writing.

The superintendent wishes to impress on the minds of the parents the necessity of their visiting the schools often, and to co-operate with the teachers in the education of the girls and boys in this town.

Surely parents cannot conscientiously find fault with the work of the teacher by listening to the petty troubles of the children, they should visit the schools and investigate the work that is being done, and if they find the work unsatisfactory let the parents have a heart to heart talk with the teacher and they would find that many little troubles would vanish.

The superintending school committee of this town met with Lincoln and Enfield on Feb. 15 last, and discussed the question of Union Superintendency and the report was in favor of Union with Enfield and Lincoln. This method is being adopted by a large percentage of the towns throughout the State and is being pushed forward by the State Supt. of Public Schools.

It will be up to the voters at the coming annual town meeting to decide, and it is earnestly hoped they will decide in favor of Union Superintendency.

Thanking the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Howland, for all favors of the past and wishing them all good things for the future.
