

#### State of Maine.

To O. C. Sweat, Constable of the town of Howland in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Foresters' Hall in said town, on Monday the twelfth day of March, 1917, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To elect a fire commissioner and fix his compensation.

Art. 4. To elect a tax collector and fix his commission.

Art. 5. To see if the town will allow a discount of five per cent on all taxes assessed in the year 1917, which are paid on or before July 1, of that year, and see if the town will vote to have all taxes assessed in the year 1917 collected and paid into the town treasury at least two weeks before the next annual town meeting.

Art. 6. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, support of poor, repairs of roads and bridges, breaking winter road, and defray all . other town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State aid law of 1913.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount contemplated by that law, for 1917.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to set apart \$500 from the account of highways and bridges to be used on "Special Highway."

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to build a Town Hall and appropriate money for same.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to build concrete sidewalks, specify the street, or streets, on which they shall be built in the year 1917; and raise the sum necessary for same.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to confer with the Howland Pulp and Paper Corp. in relation to lighting the streets of the town, and report to the town at a meeting which may be called for that purpose.

Art. 13. To transact any other business which may come legally before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Foresters' Hall at nine o'clock on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the voting list.





The amount contemplated at the annual meeting 1916 for "Patrol" work was, as we remember it \$250. But owing to our State aid road being on the "Trunk line" and, therefore coming under State road we were assessed on the basis of \$60 per mile, instead of \$30. per mile, as arranged for in the appropriation, "Highways and Bridges". This condition with a wet summer, caused a slight overdraw in this department.

We feel to thank Commissioner "York" for his effort to produce good results, with the limited amount at hand.

We shall be obliged to raise as much this year as last, and perhaps a slight increase would do no harm.



# Superintendent of Schools' Report

To the Superintending School Committee:

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit this annual report of the condition and progress of the schools of Howland.

#### TEACHERS

Last June Mr. Nadeau, teacher of grades five and six, resigned so as to take a course at business college. Mrs. Kinney, teacher of grades one and two, resigned because of home duties. Miss Pendleton teacher of grades three and four, resigned to accept a position at Rumford, Maine.

The teachers chosen to fill these vacancies were Miss Grace Gilkey,

grades five and six; Miss Albra L. Foss, grades three and four; Miss Anzelia Harriman, grades one and two. These teachers are all normal school graduates and have had experience. For exact training and experience look at table at the close of this report.

Mr. Simoneau, principal and teacher of grades seven, eight and nine, last year, is with us this year and is doing very good work.

### TEACHERS' MEETINGS

Several teachers' meetings have been held during the year. At these meetings different features of our school work were discussed by the teachers and superintendent.

Plans are being made to have some of the best school men in the State speak to the teachers of this district during the spring months. These talks, as planned, are to be very practical and should be very helpful to the teachers and superintendent.

### TEACHERS' LIBRARY

A Teachers' Special Traveling Library composed of books on education, has been secured from the State Librarian. These books are being read by the teachers. The teachers, at teachers' meetings, are to give reports on the books that they have read. In this way each teacher reads at least one good book on education and hears reports on several others.

### MUSIC AND DRAWING

Miss Anzelia Harriman besides teaching grades one and two, teaches music in all the grades, and drawing in all of the grades except seven, eight and nine where Mr. Simoneau teaches the drawing.

The results that are being obtained in these branches are very satisfactory.

### BOYS' AND GIRLS' AGRICULTURAL CLUBS

Although work in agriculture is not, perhaps, primarily the work of the public school, the development of boys and girls, is. Agricultural club work is closely allied to the work of the public schools and we hope to start some agricultural clubs this spring. Clubs for boys are,—corn clubs, potato clubs pig clubs and poultry clubs. Clubs for girls are,—gardening clubs and canning clubs.

We hope to have an opportunity to thoroughly explain this work to the parents at a meeting that we plan to hold in Howland early in the spring.

### TOILETS

The school toilets are about forty-five yards from the entrance to the school building. Even though these toilets are cleaned out at least twice a year it is practically impossible to keep them in a sanitary condition. In the summer time they are full of flies and other germ carriers. These germ carriers are a constant menace to the school children and to the homes in the neighborhood.

We have seen children going to the toilet in all kinds of weather, when it is fair, when it is raining, when it is snowing and when it is extremely cold, but we have never seen them put on their wraps, no matter what they may have been told at home.

It is obvious that toilets in the school building would be much better. They they would always be warm and they would be readily accessible to the children.

We would suggest that chemical closets be installed. Two chemical closets for the girls could be placed in the closet under the stairs, on the first floor. The chemical tanks could be placed in the basement directly underneath the closets. Two chemical closets for the boys could be placed in the basement, on inexpensive platforms built over chemical tanks.

The cost of installing four chemical closets would be about two hundred and fifty dollars.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

We would like to see more of our boys and girls going to high school. We realize that it is very expensive where there is no high school in town, but the old saying, "Where there's a will there's a way" is certainly true.

We have in mind a boy who graduated from Howland grammar school last year. This year he is attending Enfield high school and

doing splendid work. He can attend Enfield high school two years and by that time he will be old enough so that his parents will be willing to let him go away somewhere for the last two years of his high school course. This boy is taking advantage of the opportunities that are right at home.

Most children are too young to be sent away from home when they graduate from grammar school, and by the time they are old enough to be sent away they have lost their interest in school. It seems to us as though one duty of parents is to stimulate and arouse ambition just as much as possible.

A good many school systems, at the present time, are organized as follows;—elementary school, the first six grades; junior high school, grades seven and eight and the first year of the regular high school; senior high school, sophomore, junior and senior years of the regular high school. This method of organization is beyond the experimental stage, moreover, it has been extremely successful wherever it has been tried. A junior high school could be organized in Howland very easily. The principal, Mr. Simoneau, could teach grades eight and nine and also teach first year high school work. The children would be promoted by subject rather than by grade. Of course a junior high school will not be organized until there are enough pupils who want first year high school work, to make the plan feasible. We have had the plan in mind and, as we stated before, it would work out splendidly in Howland.

#### INDUSTRIAL WORK

We have done a little industrial work along with our academic work but have been handicapped on account of lack of funds. We hope to do a little more along this line this coming year.

We wish that the citizens of Howland could see somethings we have seen this year,—large boys in the sixth grade staying in at recess in order to create something that they are interested in, and something that no allowance is made for during the regular school hours.

The credit for this work belongs entirely to the teachers whose resourcefulness enabled them to overcome all difficulties.

At the Eastern Penobscot County Teachers' Convention which

was held at Lincoln, Friday, Feb. 16, the industrial work, exhibited by the Howland schools, incited much favorable comment.
