To the Superintending School Committee and
to the Citizens of Owl's Head:

Please accept this, my sixteenth annual report
as your superintendent of schools.

At the beginning of the new school year in September, Miss Makinen, who had taught efficiently at Ingraham Hill for several years, was transferred to Ash Point to fill the vacancy left by Miss Sweeny, who had employment in the Rockland schools.

The position at Ingraham Hill was assigned to Miss Edith Grover of Lisbon Falls. Miss Grover is a Normal graduate of Experience.

She has shown herself to be a most excellent instructor and disciplinarian who has secured the respect and good will of her pupils. Mrs. Scammon was reelected to the Timber Hill school and expected to take up her duties there until almost the time for opening school.

Miss Frances Webber of Dover Foxcroft was secured for the position. Miss Webber is a normal school graduate and a young woman of excellent character and refinement. She taught until Mrs. Scammon had recovered her health sufficiently to assume her former duties. That Miss Webber's ex-

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perience while in the school was not happier is a cause for real regret to all who have the interest of the school at heart.

At present our schools are being managed by good teachers, women of ability and experience who use approved methods. The children give hearty cooperation without which no school can be a success.

Our purchases in books will be somewhat larger next year and some reference books should be procured. As we have a balance in this year's account I am asking for less than was appropriated last year.

Where water for one school and lights for all three have to be paid for from the supplies account, the appropriation must be larger than in previous years. Our pupils in Rockland High School have for the most part done good work. The schools at Ingraham Hill and Timber Hill are now well supplied with modern seats. Ash Point should be supplied in the next year or two. A few might be purchased each year.

At Ash Point the water leaks in, around the outside door and might cause a deterioration in that quarter of the building.

An entry on the outside or some thing to shelter the entrance from the driving storms would be a wise investment.

There will be a number of small expenses for repairs as usual.

In conclusion I would like to express my firm conviction that your teachers and school officials are earnestly trying to prepare the youth of the town for

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good citizenship, as well as for prosperity and happiness.

I believe that the type of school maintained here is working to this end. Let us all try by our efforts and our examples to help these boys and girls to attain that high type of citizenship that the world so needs at the present time.

I thank the town officials and the good citizens for their cooperation and support.

Town Warrant

To M. E. Scammon, a Constable in the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Owl's Head qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town, on the 14th day of March, 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside over the meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Superintending School Committee.

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Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to elect only members of the School Board who have children in the schools, beginning with this year 1398, That this vote be for each succeeding year hereafter.

Art. 9. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Repairs.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

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Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current Expense.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the care and construction of Sidewalks.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for construction of Roads and Bridges.

Art. 18. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the care of the Poor.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for Temporary Loans.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Insurance.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Lights.

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Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' Salaries.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Two Dollars (\$152.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for construction.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid road money as provided in Sec. 20, Chap. 28 R. S., 1930.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec 19, Chap. 28, R. S. 1930 or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 229 P. L. 1937.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money if any the Town will recommend to take from the joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous-surface treatment to State Aid roads in excess of the requirements of Sec 2, Chap. 132 P. L. 1935.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be used for the improvement of Ocean Avenue, Ingraham Hill.

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Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to surface (Tar) the section of the Town road from the so-called Jameson store, and to replace the culvert at the west entrance of Owl's Head Inn with a larger and longer one. At a total expense of approximately Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for improvement of Creek Road and Bridge at Ash Point.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to repair the Bally Hack Road beginning at Drew's Corner and extending to the Elliott place.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money necessary to purchase a Snow Plow and Wing for same.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Nursing.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to install an Electric Light on the pole in front of the Fred Ellis cottage on Shell Street, Owl's Head Village.

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Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to purchase insofar as possible all supplies furnished its Poor by the Town from the stores located in the Town of Owl's Head.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds on such property.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to close the clam flats to non-resident diggers.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to close the Creek at Ash Point to clam diggers to the lowest tide mark from April 15, 1938 to Jan. 15, 1939.

Art. 40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be used and expended by the Maine Publicity Bureau for the advertising of the natural resources of Maine.

Art. 41. To choose an Appropriations Committee. This Committee to be comprised of the Board of Selectmen, School Board, and five, seven or nine voters. Said Committee to make annual recommendations for appropriations and present them at the annual meeting in the form of a budget for the Town's approval. Members of this board to serve without pay.

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Art. 42. To see what method the Town will vote to adopt for the collection of Taxes.

Art. 43. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.
