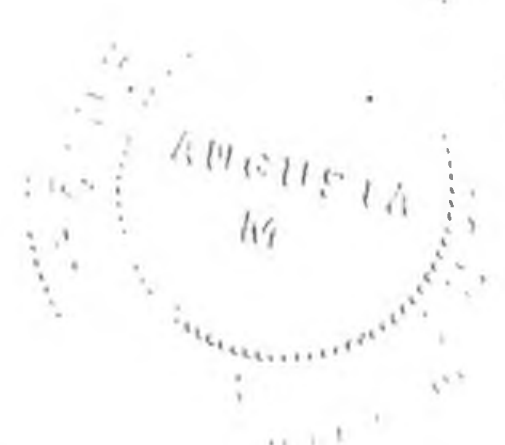

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OWL'S HEAD
Public Health Nursing Annual Report—1945

Although the Public Health Nursing Program in your community, for the year 1945, suffered an interruption caused by the shortage of qualified nurses,, we have made every effort to give you the most efficient service available.

During the time we were able to secure a public health nurse, the following service was rendered.

SEVEN visits were made by the nurse to Owl's Head. While in the community she visited the mothers of infants and preschool children. The value of good nutrition was discussed and advice given.

Through the helpful interest of the mothers in the town and a local public health nurse, formerly a member of the State staff, it was possible for three child health conferences to be held. At these conferences the children were given a complete physical examination by a pediatrician and all immunized against smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

We want to thank the health officer, members of his family, the motor corps, physician and all others who worked so hard to have these successful conferences.

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With a well prepared, experienced public health nurse coming on the staff in January, 1946, we are sure that Owl's Head will have an efficient Public Health Nurseing service during 1946.

School Department

To the Superintending School Committee and
to the Citizens of Owl's Head:—

This is my twenty-fourth annual report on
your schools.

During this school year the same three schools, with grades up to and including the sixth, with the same efficient teachers, have been maintained. The seventh and eighth grades have been conveyed to the Rockland Junior High by the same school bus as served last year.. By private arrangement the pupils of the senior high school have been enabled to secure conveyance in the bus. This makes a much larger group of young persons, whose energy is not wholly exhausted by their scholastic efforts, and at times the order may not have been quite as it should. For the safety of all, the driver is obliged to give most of his attention to his driving. It has been necessary for me to give quite a little consideration to this conveyance. Certain of the pupils are reported to have used improper language and to have been otherwise disorderly. I must insist that a proven repetition of such offenses may bar these pupils from the conveyance. There will be no

hasty action but safe and decent conditions must exist in school conveyances.

The scarcity of print paper has made it difficult to get needed books. Deliveries have been long delayed and this is likely to continue to be so.

The progress of the pupils in your schools has been good. The methods employed are in line with those approved by the best educators. There has been no serious disciplinary trouble.

It should be remembered that each child is an individual with his or her peculiar tastes and abilities. There are always some who because of health, inferior eyesight or inability to carry on intensive study effectually may not be able to go along with their grades. Such children should not be blamed nor can the teacher be discredited. Sometimes the conditions are only temporary. Frequent colds and necessary absences hold back many from expected progress.

Our textbooks are modern, attractive and adapted to sound methods of teaching. These are appealing to the children and hold their interest.

The people of the town must not lose sight of the fact that they need a central school. No teacher can do as efficient work with six or seven grades as she can with two or three. The trend of thought

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in the educational world is very strong in this direction.

Owl's Head must not postpone this matter too long at the expense of the children. Distances for conveyance are not long and conditions are favorable. Putting aside money for this is good but steps should be taken to have the schoolhouse as soon as practicable. There are citizens who will pay taxes more cheerfully to pay for a building that can be seen than they do for one that is entirely in the future. This consideration should not rush us into a situation before conditions are favorable but action should not be postponed longer than is necessary.

Needed repairs have been made in the last year. Our buildings must be kept up until a new building is erected.

In these days education costs a lot as does everything. Your school officials work faithfully and try to serve the children and also to discharge their stewardship of the towns money carefully.

I thank all who have cooperated with the schools and commend the effort of the town officials to do their part and more to encourage the cause of education.

Town Warrant

COUNTY OF KNOX, ss:

To Peter Reed, a Constable in the town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Owl's Head qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town on the 18th day of March, 1946 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside over the Meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Superintending School Committee.

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Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose three Assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.

Art. 10. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing three years.

Art. 11. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' salaries.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

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Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Repairs.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current Expense.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$50.00 for Public Health Nursing in Owl's Head. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Care of the Poor.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain an Electric Light on the corner of Ocean Avenue and road leading to the Cottages on Ingraham Hill shore.

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Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain an Electric Light between Mrs. Fabers driveway and William Donohue's present home.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain three (3) Electric Lights near Owl's Head Village, one near A. B. Borgerson's residence, one on top of hill by Richardson's and one at Holiday Beach Corner.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lights.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and eight dollars (\$108) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for construction.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

Art. 28. To see what sum if any the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous

surface treatment to State Aid roads, , in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chap. 132 Public laws 1935.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain road beginning from the highway to Lucia Beach.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to gravel the whole length, also to make a preper straight gutter on the side of the road known as the Guptill road at Ingraham's Hill.

Art. 32. To see what action the Town will take to repair the washout at Crescent Beach caused by the storm of last fall.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Coopers Beach Road.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town roads and bridges.

Art. 35. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50)

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to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of State of Maine in accordance with provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to take from our Cash Balance to be applied to the Capital Reserve Fund for the new Schoolhouse.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept two hundred dollars (\$200) the interest of which is to be used for the care of the Chauncey K. Snowdeal lot.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the cemeteries in the Town of Owl's Head.

Art. 40. To see what action the Town will take in regard to having the names placed on our permanent Honor Roll.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following in regard to the collection of taxes.

Taxes shall become due and payable on August

First of Current year; a discount of 3 percent will be allowed if payment in full is made within thirty days of date of tax bills; interest will be charged on all amounts unpaid after August First. Delinquents shall be dealt with according to the law provided for that purpose. If vote is "No" some other method must be adopted.

Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit claim deed on such property.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for Temporary Loans.

Art. 44. To elect necessary members for the Planning Board.

Art. 45. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 9.30 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

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Public Health Nursing Annual Report—1946

Your present public health nurse started work in your community last January,, following discharge from military service. It is now time to review the year's activities and give you a brief report.

Nineteen visits were made to Owl's Head and practically every service of a generalized public health program covered. Assistance was given particularly to mothers in the homes by demonstration and instruction in child care and nutrition, stressing the benefits of early immunization against communicable disease.

Owl's Head was represented at a district meeting of Lay Health Committees in Augusta last Spring by a group of women, including Mrs. Frank Ross, Mrs. Dana Knowlton and Mrs. Myra Scammon. Following this a local committee meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Scammon and plans discussed for both school and preschool groups.

Two school immunization clinics were held and three Child Health Conferences, where all mothers were invited to bring their small children for physical examinations by a physician and for protective immunization againsts whooping cough, diphtheria and small pox. The Health Committee assisted

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throughout with both these projects. One hundred fifty-five immunization treatments were given. The cooperation of the Selectmen in paying for medical services at the school clinics was much appreciated.

Repeated visits have been made to the schools and will continue throughout the school year for assistance to teachers and for following the progress of children who have problems relating to health. Audiometer testing will be done early in the new year.

Your nurse greatly appreciates the fine spirit existing in Owl's Head and the fine cooperation received from the Health Committee, Board of Selectmen and teachers, and with this continued unified effort we should continue to carry on a health program resulting in a healthful, stalwart group of young people, who will be the citizens of tomorrow.

School Department

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee
and to the Citizens of Owl's Head:—

Please accept my twenty-fifth annual report.

The only change in the town's teaching force since the last report has been at Ash Point where Mrs. Bertha Thurston follows Miss Emma Harding who secured a position elsewhere.

At the present time our schools are in good condition. Sound methods of teaching are employed and excellent order is maintained with good feeling and cooperation in every school.

When the town books were closed, balances were found in all accounts but this was true because the books were closed one month earlier than usual that they might be audited before town meeting. Expenses have mounted rapidly especially in the case of the high school tuition. In June tuition bills for \$1880.00 for common school pupils while the bills for High School tuition from Rockland will be about \$4125.00. As there is a bill before the legis-

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lature to permit the high schools to increase the amount that they can collect, it is probable that these bills will be still higher in 1948.

The teachers have asked the Committee for an increase for the remainder of the school year. In this they are following a procedure general throughout the state and nation.

There are bills before the Maine Legislature that would establish a higher minimum for all teachers' salaries.

According to the McKinnon Bill, every common school teacher would receive \$1500.00 or more, while the Russell Bill would give a smaller increase at first but establishing a policy of a yearly increase of \$100.00 for six years. This would make it more costly in the long run. The McKinnon bill has the most support at present and is generally expected to be passed. The State would furnish a larger annual sum to the town for teaching positions but not enough more to meet the larger costs.

To meet the certain increases for teaching and for Common school tuition an appropriation of \$4750.00 seems necessary. The new legislation would not affect that much this year. The appropriation of \$4125.00 for High School tuition is recommended.

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During the past school year an oil heating burner was installed at the Timber Hill School which is a great improvement over the old wood burning stove. Citizens of the other districts are requesting similar heaters for their schools and one should be installed if funds are sufficient.

Quite a few repairs will be necessary this year. The exterior of the Ingraham Hill School should be painted. New screens may be necessary for Ingrahams Hill and Ash Point. The annex at the latter building leaks and the roof must be painted or repaired. The interior of the Timber Hill building must be painted and some new shades purchased. I recommend an appropriation of \$550.00 for repairs.

The recommendation for Textbooks is \$125.00 and that for supplies is \$200.00.

For some years the town has been setting aside money for a new central school. While the high cost of materials and the shortage of these would make construction this year seem impracticable, the citizens should persistently look forward and plan for this objective.

Education is costly but necessary in any civilized state. The very best that a community can afford, even at some sacrifice is not too good for those who

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will be called upon to solve the difficult problems of the future.

I thank the members of the School Committee and other officials who have given me their cooperation, and I thank the citizens for their continued support.

Re: Audit of Accounts—Town of Owl's Head

Feb. 1, 1946 to Dec. 31, 1946

CASH—

Cash on deposit and subject to check as of Dec. 31, 1946 was verified with the bank statement and the amount so reported reconciled with the balance as shown on the records of the Town.

All receipts were examined and found to be correctly recorded, and all expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

TAXES RECEIVABLE—

The 1946 commitment of taxes to the Collector was compared with the records of the Assessors and found to be in agreement. The balance due from the Collector on this commitment is represented by unpaid taxes taken from the records and detailed on Schedule A-1 of this report.

No prior years' taxes remained unpaid.

TAX LIENS—

Payments received on tax liens were found to have been applied against the proper items. All tax liens on hand were examined.

CAPITAL RESERVE FUND—

The investments of this Fund consisted of United States Defense Bonds, Series F. The fund was established for the construction of a school and town hall building.

DUE GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY—

This account consists of deductions for Teachers' Retirement retained by the Town pending payment to the State.

SURPLUS—

At the close of the year, the Unappropriate Surplus amounted to \$5,205.60, as compared to an Unappropriated Surplus of \$3,887.15 at February 1, 1946. This represents an increase of \$1,328.45 during the year under examination, the detail of which is shown on Exhibit E of this report.

TRUST FUNDS—

The trust fund investments were examined and all income withdrawn appeared to have been properly expended. The sum of \$22.91, representing a portion of the unused income, is carried in the General Fund Cash.

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GENERAL—

The 1946 excise tax receipts, No. 27,540 to No. 27,714, and those for 1947, No. 41,001 to 41,017, were checked from the copies of the receipts retained by the Collector and all monies were found to have been deposited with the Treasurer.

Art. 6. To choose three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.

Art. 10. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing three years.

Art. 11. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' salaries.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to take from our Cash Balance a required amount to reconstruct the wooden bridge on State Aid road No.

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2 over Cripple Creek. This site has been surveyed by State Engineers and is beleved unsafe for heavy traffic. State and County Aid is available at this time.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and eight dollars (\$108.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads, or to be used in conjunction with State apportionment for construction.

Art. 15. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

Art. 16. To see what sum if any the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chap. 132 Public laws 1935.

Art. 17 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

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Art. 18. To set if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the Lucia Beach road beginning at the tar road and running to the Ethel Weeks place.

Art. 19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to the owners of the lots of land located on the road which passes in front of the cottages at Ingraham's Hill the land on the northeastern side of said road and opposite said lots. Said section being lots between Chas. Walmsley property and Brewster property.

Art. 20. To vote to expend the sum of five hundred dollars to make the Ballyhack road passable to automobiles from Drews Corner to the Elliott farm, so called.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to gravel road beginning from Creek road to the turn leading towards Nielson's residence

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair Town landing and road leading to same at Ash Point.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town roads and bridges.

Art. 24 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dol-

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lars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 25 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Repairs.

Art. 29: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 30 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current Expense.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$65.00 for public Health Nursing in Owl's Head. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Care of the Poor.

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Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Aid to Dependent Children.

Art. 34 To see whether or not the town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of ten (10) years, whereby, in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the Town during the term of said contract, all as more fully set forth in the contract copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the Town will pay for such street lighting in accordance with the company's municipal street lighting rate-contract basis.

Art. 35. To see what action the Town will take in reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding article.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain electric lights, one near corner in front of Donald Lewis residence, and one between cemetery and Gear's Hill at Ash Point.

Art. 37. To see what action the Town will take with reference to raising the necessary money to cover the street lighting service.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for snow removal.

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Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the cemeteries in the Town of Owl's Head.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the proposed zoning ordinances.

Art. 41. To elect a building inspector.

Art. 42. To elect three (3) members for a board of appeals.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote yes or no to be away with the so called Planning Board and that all planning be left to the Selectmen.

Art. 44 To select necessary members for the Planning Board.

Art. 45 To see if the Town will vote not to accept any Cemetery Trust Funds less than two hundred dollars.

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following in regard to the collection of Taxes:

Taxes shall become due and payable on August First of Current year; a discount of 3 percent will be allowed if payment in full is made within thirty days of date of tax bills; interest will be charged on all amounts unpaid after August

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First. Delinquents will be dealt with according to the law provided for that purpose. If vote is 'no' some other method must be adopted.

Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Seltctmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit claim deed on such property.

Art. 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for temporary Loans.

Art. 49. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 9.30 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
