PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ANNUAL REPORT

1949

The past year has seen a continuation of the public health nursing program in Owls Head. There has been no interruption in nursing service.

As usual smallpox and diphtheria immunization was offered in the spring to all school children. It is natural that a smaller number need this when the program has been given over a period of years. Immunizations for these diseases plus whooping cough and tetanus were also given a group of infants and preschool children who took advantage of the three Child Health Conferences during the summer months.

School health examinations are due this year and plans will be made next spring for these. Whereas in some towns these examinations are given every year to students in every other grade it has been considered byteer to include all the school children at once and have clinics every second year.

Hearing testing was done by means of the audiometer last spring. This machine is made available to the nurse every other year and is the most accurate test for hearing. All children from the fourth grade up are given this test.

Home visiting is always a major part of the public health nursing program. Emphasis is placed on the infants.

School Department

To the Superintending School Committee and the citizens of Owl's Head:

This is my second annual report as your Superintendant of Schools.

The schools have again been in charge of the three teachers who did such good work last year. Their services are appreciated by the citizens of the town.

There have been small repair jobs in all of the buildings. A new drinking fountain has been instailed in the Ingraham Hill School. Fluorescent lights have helped poor light conditions at the Ash Point School. These lights should be placed in the other two building this year. The buildings have been equipped with fire extinguishers. The lot has been purchased as a site for the proposed new school building. There should be an appropriation this year toward the cost of its construction.

High School pupils have been conveyed to Rockland at the town's expense. This is a justifiable expense, since it affords the opportunity for all pupils to obtain a high school education. The last

legislature passed an act permitting the towns to charge higher rates for high school tuition. This will increase considerably the expense to the town for the education of its secondary school pupils. The other school costs should remain about the same as last year.

I want to express my appreciation to the school committee, town officials and citizens, for their cooperation in the school program.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of Owl's Head have been audited by the State Department of Audit for the period January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949 inclusive.

The examination was made by Auditor C. G. Hawes in acordance with generally accepted and iting standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been appropriately

handled with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the result of the financial operations of the Town for the period designated.

COMMENTS-

ASSETS-

The cash balance of \$6040.49 at December 31, 1949, which was in agreement with the records of the Treasurer, was reconciled with the bank statement of the First National Bank of Rockland.

An analysis was made of the receipts as issued by the Treasurer and the bank deposits. From this analysis, it was ascertained that all cash recorded as received had been deposited in the bank.

Expenditures were made by check from warrants that had been properly authorized by the Selectmen.

Accounts receivable totaled \$138.12 at Decem-

ber 31, 1949. These accounts are all current items, and are considered to be collectable in full.

The 1949 taxes receivable totaled \$646.43 at the close of the year. The commitment book was added and found in agreement with the warrant of the Assessors.

There were no prior years' taxes receivable.

Requests for verification were mailed to a representative number of taxpayers whose accounts were outstanding at the year end. If any variations are noted as a result of these verifications, the proper municipal officials will be notified.

The balance of tax liens at December 31, 1949 amounted to \$133.00. Payments received during the year were credited to the proper accounts. All tax liens on file with the Treasurer were examined.

LIABILITIES.

Under Article 5 of a Special Town Meeting held March 30, 1949, the Selectmen were authorized to borrow the necessary amount to cover the town's share of the cost of constructing the Cripple Creek Bridge, the loan to be repaid over a period not to exceed five years from the next annual town meeting. Accordingly the Selectmen issued a note in the amount of \$4,300.00 for this purpose.

RESERVES—

Under Article 40 of the warrant of the Annual Town Meeting, it was voted to take a sufficient amount from the Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a lot for the site of the new school building. Bonds

(Page 35)

in the amount of \$2,120.00 were cashed and a lot was purchased at a cost of \$2,000.00, leaving a balance of \$120.00 in the general fund cash. It is recommended that this amount be deposited in a savings account. The investments representing this fund were examined and are listed on Schedule A-5.

The reserve for authorized expenditures represents the net unexpended balances of certain reprepriation accounts which have been carried forward to the 1950 year for expenditure. The balances carried forward in these accounts represents an increase of \$1,687.45 over that carried forward a year ago.

SURPLUS-

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$963.53 at the close of the year. This represents a net decrease of \$2,937.94. The major item contributing to this change was the note issued for the construction of Cripple Creek Bridge.

TRUST FUNDS-

The time deposits and the U. S. Defense Bond representing the cemtry perpetual care funds were verified by xamination of the passbooks and bond. All income appeared to have been properly accounted for. It was noted that the income had not been expended and \$22.34 remained in the general fund cash at the year end.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES—

A statement of revenue and expenditures is presented on Exhibit B of this report, which presents an analysis of the results of the current year's operations. This statement reveals a net gain from operations of \$1,609.56, which was transferred to unappropriated surplus.

GENERAL-

The 1949 excise tax receipts numbered 38526 to 38848 and those for 1950 numbered 37551 to 37596 were checked and it was ascertained that all collections had been deposited with the Treasurer with the exception of \$15.83 which was omitted from the cash sheets of the Collector.

The following corporate surety bond was found on file:

Treasurer and Collector \$4,000.00

Maine Bonding and Casualty Co No. 75887. The overlay of \$397.82 was within the legal limit of 5 percent of the appropriations plus state and county taxes.

The records were found to have been kept satisfactorily.

TOWN WARRANT

COUNTY OF KNOX, ss:

To Avard L. Walker, a Constable in the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GREETING:-

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Owl's Head, qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the 6th day of March, 1950 at 7 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

- Art. 1. To Choose a Moderator to preside over the Meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Superintending School Committee
- Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

- Art. 5. To choose three Assessors for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.
- Art. 10. To choose a member of the Superintending Committee for the ensuing three years.
- Art. 11. To see what the scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' salaries.
- Art. 13. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

- Art. 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$65.00 for public health nursing in Owl's Head. Said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise \$306.00 for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 for fire hydrants.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$565.00 for street lights.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Current Expense.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of the poor.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town roads and bridges.

- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the cemeteries in the town of Owl's Head.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to accept street in Crescent Beach known as Birchmont street, and if so accepted, to raise sufficient money to gravel and tar the same.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to accept the money offered by the Crescent Beach Improvement Association (approximately \$129.00) for the purpose of re-surfacing and tarring the so called Birchmont Avenue, and if so accepted to see if the town will raise necessary additional funds for this re-surfacing and tarring.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$350.00 for the repair of the beach road which leads down to Crockett's Beach.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the following rubbish ordinance following the vote of the special Town Meeting of March 30, 1949 to have counsel draw said ordinance: "No person

shall dispose of material which is commonly classified as rubbish, on any street or public place or on any property not his own; provided however, this shall not prevent disposal as otherwise permitted, nor delivery to a duly licensed collector. The penalty for violation of any provision of this section shall be not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$25.00"

- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred twenty-nine dollars (\$129.00) for interest on the Cripple Creek Bridge loan.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward retirement of the Cripple Creek Bridge loan. (Voted in 1949 to retire this loan in five years.)
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common Schools.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Text Books.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Supplies.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Repairs.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to pay transportation of the High School pupils on Wood's Bus. If the vote is "yes" to see what action the town will take with reference to raising the necessary money to cover said transportation cost.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will raise and appriate a sum of money for the Capital Reserve Fund (School and Town Hall Building Fund).
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to autorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following in regard to the collection of Taxes: Taxes shall become due and payable on August first of current year; a discount of 3 percent will be allowed if payment in full is made within thirty days of date of tax bills; interest will be charged on all amounts unpaid after August first. Delinquents will be dealt with according to the law provided for that purpose. If vote is "no" some other method must be adopted.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, to execute quit claim

deed on such property, and to advertise land or property in local paper prior to sale.

- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for temporary loans.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will authorize the municipal officers to take necessary legal steps in obtaining taxes on property not in use for airport activities at the Rockland Municipal Airport.
- Art. 43. To see what action the town will take to open the road from first to second Lucia Beach.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to apply for the formation of a school district for Owl's Head.
- Art. 45.To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 6.30 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
