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
Annual Report of the Municipal Officers of the Town of Howland Maine for the Year 1930-1931

Howland (Me.)

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WARRANT

Penobscot, ss.

To Harold E. Boynton, Constable of the Town of Howland, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said Town, on Monday, the 9th. day of March, A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

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Art. 3. To choose a Fire Inspector, and fix his compensation.

Art. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay the Collector of taxes or vote any other form of compensation.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will allow a discount of five per cent on all Taxes assessed in the year 1931, on real and personal estates which are paid on or before July 1st of that year; and see if the Town will vote to have all taxes assessed in the year 1931 collected and paid into the Town Treasury, by February 15, 1932.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 or any other sum for the Support of Poor.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8,500.00 or or any other sum for the Support of Schools, (Common and High).

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 or any other sum for School Repairs.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum for Support of Thomas Free Library.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum for the Fire Department.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1500.00 or any other sum for Highways and Bridges.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 or any other sum of for Winter Roads.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$113.00 for the Maintenance of Improved sections of Third Class Highways.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1300.00 or any other sum for Street Lights.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 or any other sum for Insurance.

1/Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 or any other sum for Care of Cemetery.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 or any other sum to provide for the services of the County Nurse.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,150.00 for Retiring Town Bonds, Notes and Interest.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 or any other sum for Incidentals.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 or any other sum for Discount, Commission, Ababtement and Interest on Temporary Loans.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$950.00 for Maintenance of State Aid Roads.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions Sections 26-32 inclusive of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes, for the construction of a State-aid Highway extending from No. 3 in Howland village over the South side River Road to the Maxfield town line, thence over State-Aid designations No. 1 and No. 3 in Maxfield to Howland town line, thence through Howland to Route 154 at the LaGrange town line, thence westerly over Route 154 to LaGrange village, thence over Route 155 to LaGrange-Alton town line.

Note—Under this article Town may raise the sum of \$864.00 or any multiple of this amount up to five times the sum, \$1,728. 00 recommended.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire money for town purposes, if if necessary, in anticipation of the collection of taxes the ensuing municipal year.

Art. 25. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall to the American Legion Post No. 97.

Art. 26. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall, excepting holidays, to each of the three church organizations, the schools, both Locals, and to see if the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall for basket-ball practice of the High School Teams.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act. Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deduct from the wages of any person working for the Town the amount of his total tax for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. (a) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to sell and convey to Patrick Dawson a parcel of land purchased by the Town from Charles McKay a said lot or parcel being 6 by 8 rods and adjoining the Cemetery lot lying north of Cemetery Road. (b) To see who the Town will vote to authorize to sign the deed for the Inhabitants of Howland.

Art. 30. To fix the compensation of the Town Officers namel: Assessors, Selectmen and Overseer's of the Poor, Fire Chief, School Board, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner and all other Officers.

Art. 31. To revise the Jury List.

Art. 32. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Town Hall on Monday, the 9th. day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the voting list.



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



Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Howland:---

Three factors determine man's destiny while on earth: his birth, his education, and his work. By birth we do not mean the simple act of parturition alone: were we to circumscribe his advent by this one act then all men are created equal as Thomas Jefferson wrote, and before him, Jean Jacques Rousseau taught. In the term "birth" we would include the qualities man inherits from the past; and this inheritance, come whence it may, is the most important single factor that shapes his life.

Two pupils in a Howland village grade: one, aetat. 12, and standing at the forefront of the upper quartile of her grade, shows an educational age of 15 years; the other, aetat. 16, and standing at the opposite extreme of this same grade, shows an educational age of 12 years. Both have come up through the grades together; both have been taught b the same methods and by the same teachers; yet between these two pupils there is an intellectual void no educational bridge can span. "Whence comes this mystery?" some one may ask. We answer: "and this inheritance, come whence it may, is the most important single factor that shapes his life. Education is one of the most mystifying processes the mind of man has ever tried to solve; so many unknown quantities are involved in it that its progress through the centuries has been extremely slow. How the brain reacts to the educative process we know in part, but much remains to be revealed, and we are waiting for the alienist and psychologist to supply the information we now so sadly lack. The alienist confines his attention to abnormal cases almost exclusively, for out of such

cases comes the bread he eats. Psychology is an infant science, scarcely out of its swaddling clothes, and we must wait, we know not how many scores of years, before this desired information will be forthcoming from this source.

When we know without question the origin of man; when we can trace his descent from this origin to the present time; when we know his various organs function in health, and react to the morbid process we call disease; in other words, when we know man as the mechanician knows the machine he builds, then we will be able to construct an educational system that will function with mathematical precision. Until such knowledge comes we plod on our way with such tools as are now available to us.

In the light of our present knowledge the Howland school system is functioning properly. Discipline is well nigh perfect. Pupils pass from their rooms through the halls and corridors to the school grounds and back again like organized units under military drill. The teachers may well be rated as specialists in their several departments; for such they are if the schools from which they come are up to the standards they profess to maintain. To determine the amount of progress, or the lack of such, in the various rooms the supervision is making use of the best measuring instruments that the so-called educational specialists of Teachers' College, Columbia University, can place within his hands. One thing is absolutely certain: the results obtained from recent standardized tests, given year after year, show that the work of the pupils compares very favorably with the work of the pupils of the much vaunted city systems of the east and middle west. In the past three years there has been a constant increase of fifty pupils per annum in the school population of the town. During the same time three new rooms have been added to the school plant to house this increase. Thirty pupils to a room are all our standard city systems allow. Five of our grade teachers have considerably more than that number, and three have slight-Whether this increase in school population is to conly less.

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tinue will depend entirely on the industrial situation in the town. We are in the midst of the worst business depression the country has seen since 1837. We were twelve years getting into this deplorable condition; and if, in the next twelve years to come, we succeed in rescuing our Lares and Penates from the wreckage we have tumbled about our ears we will be doing very well.

To bring the town's educational system to its present point of efficiency has cost the tax-payer much money. If the present rate of increase in the school population is to continue each on-coming year will add its full quota to the present cost. But let it be considered that in education, as in human progress in general, there is no middle ground, no line of no variation; we are either advancing or receding as the case may be. At the present time if there is any one word in the English language which, when uttered, awakens a responsive echo in the breast of the average American that one word is "retrenchment." Let retrenchment come, we need to practice it in our daily methods of living; but let our public school system be the last institution on American earth to receive the ax when it falls.

This report closes with a short summary of expenditures for the past year, and an estimate of the probable cost of mainten-

ance for the year to come.

It may be of interest to note the enrollment of our students in 1930–1931 as compared with 1926–1927. By classes our students are divided as follows:



From the above it may be seen that from each class the number taking the Commercial Course is increasing. In the school as a whole about 50 per cent are in this course, 35 per cent in the College Course, and 17 per cent in the General Course. 'I have been asked several times recently if I thought too many were taking the Commercial Course. In my opinion, this percentage is not too large. I believe thoroughly in this course. In looking over the history of Howland High School, I find there have been very few scholars privileged to go to college. It goes without saying, a classical course is the perfect foundation for further study. But, in as much as the greatest number of students we graduate have to take up their life work immediately after graduation, I believe the Commercial Course better fits them for this task. Because having done efficient work in the Commercial Course while in High School, they are as fitted for clerical or secretarial work as if they had graduated from a Business College.

This brings to my mind the fact that many parents overlook the importance of advising and helping their child in selecting . the right course on entering High School. This was brought quite forcibly to my attention during the vacation period last summer, when I was advised that some were discussing what they thought to be facts regarding the standard of our High School, the course offered, and the inability of graduates to enter college on credits received here; that is, that Howland High School could not give a student the desired amount of

credits. After the rumors came to me, I spent much time and effort in tracing them down.

First let me state that the number of credits required for College entrance are $14\frac{1}{2}$ ppoints. The College Course at Howland High School gives 16 points. However, to enter college by certificate without examination, he should have an average of B. This is the standard of every Class A High School in the State.

In one of the cases I investigated the student had all the necessary points, but his average rank was not high enough, so the college recommended another year's preparation at this High School or a Preparatory School.

I also found on investigation, when other students in question entered High School, they were allowed to do as they pleased as regards the selection of a course of study. The parents having given them no intimation that they were to be sent to college, they took the General Course for the first two years. In the Junior year when the Commercial Course was introduced they changed to that. They did not know until into the Senior year that they were to be allowed to go to college. Here they were with over three years of high rank in other subjects, but without college requirements. These students were brilliant and had taken what they thought would best fit them for their work.

To my mind, the trouble lay with the parents that they did not talk with their children and advise them as to what they might expect for advance education after High School, and assist them in selecting a course to prepare for it. It is impossible for the teachers to advisd students as to what they should take unless the parents have made their plans known.

It is often these runnors from misinformed sources that hurt the standard of a High School. If each and every one to whom these rumors come, would do their bit in seeking out the truth instead of passing them along, it would do much for the morale of the school. I sometimes think we teachers, who are but servants of the people, often resent the detrimental remarks more than those to whom the school belongs. It is, however, pleasing to feel that the State Department of Education is watching our work and gives its approval. I have just recently received a letter in regard to the National Survey of Secondary Education from the office of Education, U.S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C., asking my co-operation in compiling information as regards our schools. The following is an excerpt from this letter, "We do not want to impose upon your time, yet, we are told that your schools have been selected because they have been reported by the institution in your State as doing outstanding work."

Our last year's graduating class was the largest in the history of the school, numbering twenty-seven. I give below the class roll and commencement program of 1930:
