To Harold E. Boynton, Constable of the Town of Howland, in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby require to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Howland-qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said Town, on Monday, the 14th. day of March, A. D. 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose a Fire Inspector, and fix his compensation.
 - Art. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay the Collector of taxes or vote any other form of compensation.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will allow a discount of five per cent on all Taxes assessed in the year 1932, on real and personal estates which are paid on or before July 1st, of that year; and see if the Town will vote to have all taxes assessed in the year 1932, collected and paid into the Town Treasury by February 15, 1933.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 or any other sum for the Support of Poor.

- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$9,000.00 or any other sum for the Support of Schools, (Common and High).
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum for School Repairs.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$700.00 or any other sum for Physical Education.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum for Support of Thomas Free Library.
- Art. 12. The see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00, or any other sum for the Fire Department.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00, or any other sum for Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00, or any other sum for Winter Roads.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$113.00, for the Maintenance of Improved sections of Third Class Highways.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1310.00, or any other sum for Street Lights.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00, or any other sum for Insurance.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00, or any other sum for Care of Cemetery.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00, or any other sum to provide for the services of the County Nurse.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,338.50, for Retiring Town Bonds, Notes and Interest.

- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,200.00, or any other sum for Incidentals.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$156.00, for Mothers' Aid.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,400.00, or any other sum for Discount, Commission, Abatement and Interest on Temporary Loans.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$862.50, for Maintenance of State-aid Roads.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions Sections 26-32 inclusive of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes, for the construction of a State-aid Highway extending from No. 3 in Howland village over the South side River Road to the Maxfield town line, thence over State-aid designations No. 1 and No. 3 in Maxfield to Howland town line, thence through to Route 154, at the LaGrange town line, thence westerly over Route 154 to LaGrange village, thence over Route 155 to LaGrange-Alton town line.

Note—Under this article Town may raise the sum of \$728.00, or any multiple of this amount up to five times the sum, \$1456.00 recommended.

- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire money for town purposes, if necessary, in anticipation of the collection of taxes the ensuing municipal year.
- Art. 27. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall to the American Legion Post No. 97.
- Art. 28. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall, excepting holidays, to each of the three church organizations, the schools, both Locals, and to see

if the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall for basketball practice of the High School Teams.

- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deduct from the wages of any person working for the Town the amount of his tax for the ensuing year.
- Art. 31. To fix the compensation of the Town Officers named: Assessors, Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor, Fire Chief, School Board, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner and all other Officers.
 - Art. 32. To revise the Jury List.
- Art. 33. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Town Hall on Monday, the 14th day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

The new pumper is a great improvement over the old one. The members of the department feel that they are doing as good a job as the average volunteer department can be expected to do.

The Town needs a better place to house the equipment but we can get along until financial conditions warrant the expense. The hose is in fair condition and should last another year without any being bought.

If people would use the telephone instead of the Mill whistle for small chimney fires it would save expense as all the men who possibly can are expected to answer when the whistle blows, while a telephone call to the Chief or Assistant Chief will get quick results and only the message men will respond.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Howland:—

With pleasure we submit to your consideration our annual report of the schools of the town.

This year has witnessed some changes in our school system; changes, we are pleased to report, that have in no wise lessened the efficiency of the system. Circumstances entirely beyond our control cut the number of our village grade schools from ten to seven; yet these circumstances, regrettable as they are, did not reduce the number of students attending our high school.

Of the seven teachers now employed in the village grades five have held their positions so long they could well be considered permanent; of the other two one is no stranger to our schools as she has served as a substitute teacher many years; while the other, new to teaching experience, is a well known resident of the town. In the high school a new principal and a new Commercial teacher were the only changes in he teaching staff. While these two teachers are new to our system they came to us with valuable experience, and their qualifications are of the best.

The whole school system from the beginners in the first grade rooms to the seniors in the high school is well co-ordinated. The methods of the grade teachers are as nearly identical as the ages and experiences of the pupils will permit; and pupils pass from room to room without loss of time in adjusting themselves to procedures of teaching with which previously they had been unfamiliar.

In education, experience, and training, there is less variation among the grade teachers than usually is found in a school system of its size. There are no over-age teachers, no immature teachers; all have arrived at that period of their life when they are quick to sense the responsibility placed upon them, and all are working hard to accomplish the work required of them.

In all departments of the high school unusually good work is being done. At the beginning of the fall term it seemed expedient to strengthen the Mathematics department in order to meet the requirements of entrants to the Mechanic Arts courses at the State University with the hope that more of the students might be induced to continue their education beyond the high school. There is a tendency at the present time to break away from courses once considered cultural, and to co centrate on the more practical offerings of the universities. The Mechanic Arts courses seem especially practical for young men, but they require of the young entrant more Mathematics than we had heretofore given in this school. Acting on our best convictions Advanced Algebra is being given the first half year, to be followed by Solid Geometry the second half year.

The Commercial course continues to be the most popular of the three courses given in the school. The reason for this preference is not far to seek. There was once such a thing as business in this country, and we are still clinging to the hope that it will return to us. Young graduates of bookkeeping, shorthand, and typewriting courses used to find ready employment in the various lines of business, and such a thing may happen again. Be that as it may it is interesting to visit the upper classes in this department and to note the proficiency of the work. A class of young ladies will be graduated next June who will be worthy of employment.

It will be of interest to citizens who contribute with their money to the support of this school to learn that the per cap ta cost of maintenance, computed on the municipal year March 1, 1930 to March 1, 1931, was \$92.02. As the charge for tuition during that time was \$90 per year it will be seen that the rate was equitable.

"Keep the young people in school" is the appeal that is coming to us from government officials, business leaders, and emi-

nent men in all walks of life. This is what we are trying to do. We believed in class education in 1776. Now the belief is general among our people that the only hope for the welfare of our country rests upon universal education from which shall come an honest, intelligent, well educated electorate who will insist upon honest government and equal opportunities for all. The young generation now passing through our high school will soon be face to face with living conditions that will demand for their successful solution a far better mental equipment than those which their fathers were called upon to face. We are living in serious times, and we must train our children to carry on when we cast our burdens upon their shoulders.

We close with a list of expenditures for the past year, and with an estimate of appropriations needed for the year to come.

According to present indications it will cost slightly over \$18,000 to finance the schools next year. Very often a student decides in his senior year that he wants to attend college. For that reason all students are required to pursue one of the straight courses of study. These courses are perscribed by the State Department of Education and are approved by The New England College Entrance Board. They give the required credits to enable a student to enter most of the New England Colleges.

However, if a student has the required sixteen points for graduation at a mark barely above the passing grade of the school they are not fitted for college. It is very doubtful if a student whose four year average is below 88 (B+) will be able to do passing work in college. It is impossible for a student of average ilnelligence to attain this mark without at least one hour's study at home each night. Any student whose average is below B+ will not be certified for college or normal school by the school authorities.

In view of the above facts we wish to urge the parents to require each student to study at home at least one hour each evening.
