To Wilfred E. Dobson, Constable of the Town of Howland, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Howland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, on Monday, the 12th day of March, A. D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing 'year.
- Art. 3. To choose a Fire Inspector, and fix his compensation.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will accept the Town Report as printed.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will allow the taxes for the year 1934-'35 to be collected by the lowest bidder or vote any other form of compensation.
 - Art. 6. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will allow a discount of five per cent on all Taxes assessed in the year 1934, on real and personal estates which are paid on or before July 1st of that year: and to see if the Town will vote to have all the taxes assessed in the year 1934, collected and paid into the Town Treasury by February 15, 1935; also to see what interest will be charged on all taxes not paid by February 15, 1935.

- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 or any other sum for the Support of Poor.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$7,000.00 or any other sum for the Support of Schools, (Common and High.)
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 or any other sum for School Repairs.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 or any other sum for Support of the Thomas Free Library.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 or any other sum for the Maintenance of Fire Department.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 or any other sum for Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 or any other sum for Winter Roads.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 or any other sum for Street Lights.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for Insurance.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the Care of Cemetery.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,227.50 for Retiring Town Bonds and Interest.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum for Incidentals.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Mother's Aid.
 - Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of

- \$1,000.00 or any other sum for Discount, Commission, Abatement and Interest on Temporary Loans.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$817.50 for the Maintenance of State-Aid Roads.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote 'yes' or 'no' on the question of Appropriating and Raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
 - Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Improvement of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of, Section 3, Chapter 175, of the Public Laws 1933.
 - *Note—The sum of \$1,200.00 is recommended.
 - Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to recind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State-Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire money for Town purposes, if necessary, in anticipation of the collection of taxes the ensuing municipal year.
- Art. 27. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall to the American Legion Post No. 97.
- Art. 28. To see what nights the Town will vote to allow the free use of Town Hall, excepting holidays, to each of the church organizations, schools, and to see if the Town will vote to allow the free use of the Town Hall for Basketball practice of the High School Teams.
- Art. 29 To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.

- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deduct from the wages of any person working for the Town the amount of his or her tax for the current year.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 or any other sum for the purpose of shingling the North side of the Town Hall roof.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$56.00 for Maintenance of Third Class Highways.
- Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to use motor excise tax money toward paying incidental expenses of the Town.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 or any other sum for C. W. A. projects.
- Art. 35. To see what action the Town will vote to take in the matter of unpaid Water Rates.
- Art. 36. To fix the wages or salaries of the following: Assessors, Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor, Fire Chief and firemen, School Board, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Ballot Clerks, Town Clerk, and all other Town Officers.
 - Art. 37. To Revise the Jury List.
- Art. 38. To transact any other business which may legally be taken up in this meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall, the 12th day of March, 1934, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

The Polls will open at one o'clock P. M. and close at 5.30 P. M.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF

During the year 1933, the period from January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934, found the department with a record of 23 calls for fires in and out of Town. There were 17 fires in Howland, the most of them were small fires and caused a partial loss of eight buildings and a total loss of 4 buildings. There were 4 chimney fires with no damage and 1 grass and brush fire at the Davis Farm.

The department fought a loosing battle at West Enfield in a fire which destroyed 3 buildings on July 14th. The lack of water in this Town makes it almost impossible to save even the surrounding buildings when a fire starts.

At Passadumkeag the department made a hard fight when the Mace store and one other building was burned.

At Medford the department had lots of heat and hard work fighting a fire in a large pile of pulp wood, the pumper was put in use and worked steady for six hours.

Several other runs were made to West Enfield and Passadum-keag, but were for small fires, where not much damage was done.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Howland:

Another school year is fast drawing to a close, and 1 am pleased to announce that we can look back upon it as one of the best years we have had during the past decade. Teaching conditions in the grades are well nigh perfect. Every teacher but one is a normal graduate, and their work is fully up to the accepted standards of the present day. Discipline has never been better, and the pupils, both in the school buildings and on the school grounds, are under the strict supervision of the teachers at all times.

In the High School during the past year there has been a decided improvement in both discipline and scholarship. Although the scholarship standard is being maintained at the highest level in the history of the school the students are up to the requirements in their work. The attitude of the students toward the school and their work shows a splendid improvement. Evidently they have been made to understand that the High School is a place for labor and not for play; and if they are to maintain a passing rank they must work and work hard to do it.

That our school system at the present time is being maintained at an unusually high standard is due entirely to the teachers. In spite of repeated wage cuts they have remained at their post of duty with a sacrificial sense of service that ought to win the respect of every citizen in the town. In not one instance that has come under our observation has a single one of our teachers sought to better their condition by securing employment in any other town. That we appreciate such

a service stands to reason; and we hope the time will soon come when we can pay them a liberal wage.

It is well known to all our citizens that public education is now facing the greatest crisis it has ever experienced in the history of our country. 40 per cent of all teachers in this "land of the free and the home of the brave" are receiving for their services \$384 per annum. When we consider that the lowest wage paid to unskilled factory workers under the Codes is approximately \$725 a year we cannot fail to observe the desperate conditions under which many of our teachers throughout the country are working. To make a bad matter worse, if such a thing were possible, living costs are rising under the polices of the "new deal" and teachers in many sections of the country are being charged higher prices for board. We do not expect such conditions to continue much longer. When their conditions are thoroughly understood by the people the American sense of justice will see to it that they are paid a living wage.

It is our policy in our school system at the present time to maintain the essentials. Everything that could possibly come under the head of educational fads has been eliminated. Last year we cut out Physical Training, but we gave our teacher employment at other work. Numerous aids to supervision, such as standardized tests, are no longer being given in the grades. Every non-essential that adds to the cost of maintenance is cut from the program. Just how long we will have to economize no one can tell. Surely there is nothing in the industrial situation at the present time to cause us to believe that better days are near.

We close with a list of expenditures for the past year, and with estimates for the support of education for the year 1934-'35.

Any youth who resides with a parent or guardian in any town which does not support and maintain a standard secondary school may attend any secondary school to which he may gain entrance by permission of those having charge, and in such case the tuition of said youth, not to exceed one hundred dollars annually for one youth, shall be paid by the town in which he resides.

Under the above law 83 tuition students have registered for courses in the high school. The rate of tuition for the academic year of 1933–'34 is \$70.00 for each out of town student per year. With the aid of this tuition money the Town of Howland is able to educated its high school students at a much reduced rate from what the cost would be if Howland boys and girls were forced to obtain their high school training in other towns.

The high school registration this year is the largest on record. The fact that students now graduating from Howland High School have identically the same work as that offered by preparatory schools has helped to increase the enrollment from other towns. With the strengthening of the high school curriculum, students will now be admitted to college on full credit without further training in preparatory school.
