## REMARKS.

The schools for the past year have been well attended and given most excellent results with a few exceptions. No. 3 and No. 7 were unfortunate in the election of teachers for their winter terms. Although Mr. Ames is a fine scholar and has taught a number of schools before he utterly failed in the government of his school, and the result was what always occurs where order and discipline are lacking.

Mr. Ramball, who taught No. 3, met with very poor success; he failed to hold scholars and at the end of nine weeks closed his school for lack of scholars.

The rest of the schools were as far above the average as those spoken of were below, for the reason the several agents employed first-class teachers.

Mr. Prock, Mr. Heal, Miss Sherman, Miss Buck, Miss Baker and Miss Payson are first class teachers and will be good teachers to employ in our schools in the future.

The two terms of Free High School were well attended and gave very good results. We think it wise for the town to continue the same in the year coming.

The supply of text books is now complete all we shall need in the future is to replace what are now out.
