Report on Islesboro Free Library.

TO THE SELECTMEN OF ISLESBORO:

We are always glad to report on our work, for the library from the beginning, has ever spelt the word "success."

Stone walls do not a prison make, neither does a beautiful building make a successful library—otherwise we would have none, but an attractive building added to a choice library must needs enhance greatly the dignity and importance of library work. But we are just touching upon this for our purpose is to be brief.

The library has been open every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon of the year with one exception, when the weather was severe. The system adopted in '02 has been held to with slight change. We believe that rules are a means to an end—and not an end in themselves—hence the little red tape used in our management. The books are free and the stranger is made to feel at home at once.

In every public library in the country except at Northampton a larger percentage of fiction goes out than anything else. This is so with us, but in comparing statistics of various libraries we find our nature reading is ahead of most of them and our biography and history well up to the average.

That a goodly number of our readers are children is true, and it is a matter for congratulation. It does not seem that any child can know such books as "The Story of a Short Life," for instance or "The Perfect Tribute," without getting some permanent good therefrom.

We wish to thank our branch libraries and those who have assisted in the main library, for their interest in the work and the care they have shown in looking after the books.

There are readers who are careless, books are dropped, leaves turned down, loose leaves lost, and bindings needlessly broken. This all makes work for the librarian. There are

about 25 volumes laid aside now that will be sent to the book binder this spring, and four of the juvenile picture books have been condemned as worn out.

We succeeded in securing a lot with the proceeds of our library fair of last summer, together with the proceeds from a play, and we trust at the forthcoming town meeting that our citizens will see fit to accept such lot for a library site. Surely much effort was made in securing the same, and for desirability of location both as to central position and beauty, there can be no criticism. We feel that everyone in town has visited the library, but if not we give you a cordial invitation now to do so.

Come and see that it is good. We express our thanks here to all those who so loyally worked for the library fair last summer.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF ISLESBORO:

I herewith respectfully submit my fifth annual report of the schools of Islesboro.

I bring to you today greetings of joy from a heart full of satisfaction concerning the pleasant conditions existing in the schools of this town. Every school shows interest in its work and while every pupil may not have done the required study, they have shown a certain interest that is a good foundation for better work in the future. The schools are in a condition when they begin to realize more what is necessary to be done and as this need is recognized more and more, the added effort will be made to accomplish this work.

These changed conditions are partly due to the increased interest that the parents have taken this year in the work of their children. Some have visited the schools to see what was being done, recognizing the fact that it is not just to pass judgment upon a school one has not personally visited. Some parents have shown an added interest in the pupils' work, encouraging them in habits of study at home. Others have helped in various ways; by showing an interest in what the schools were trying to accomplish; to understand what might be the end in view, sometimes offering suggestions helpful to teacher and superintendent. A spirit of interest has been shown and not a spirit of criticism and the work has been correspondingly improved. We all can work better when we have the sympathy and co-operation of the people who should be interested, although under certain conditions a little opposition works no real harm.

Our grammar and primary school teachers could do more effective work if the schools were combined, and a teacher have no more than two grades. As it is now, with four or more grades in a room, a teacher is handicaped and cannot do herself or the pupils the justice she could under other conditions. Perhaps in the fullness of time, we may have something like this; a nice new school house near the present location of Union Hall where could be combined the two Pendleton schools, the Creek school and the pupils north of the Catholic church. The expense would be less for heating and for janitor service and less for repairs on buildings. The quality of the teaching service would be infinitely increased. The same results could be obtained by combining the Parker and Ryder schools at some point midway between the present location of the two schools. It is well to keep these things in mind if we are ambitious for the best welfare of our boys and girls—the future welfare of the town of Islesboro.

We are taking no backward steps in our High school. This last year has been the most prosperous of all—the nearest to an ideal school. Our graduation of six young ladies, in the spring, was considered excellent in every way. Our State Superintendent of Public Schools said it was one of the best graduations he ever attended. The following was the programme:

PROGRAMME

After the graduation exercises a reception was held in the High school rooms. Light refreshments were served. The evening before the graduation a commencement concert was given in Town Hall by the following artists. The Temple Quartette of Bangor, Miss Mary Niles of Chicago, Miss Frances DeVilla Ball of New York and Mrs. Chas. Dana Gibson of New York. It was a concert long to be remembered in Islesboro.

We also thank Mrs. Gibson and Misses Niles and Ball for their kindness in taking part in the Commencement concert of June, 1908.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE.

At the fall meeting of the Waldo County Teachers' Convention in Belfast, a county league for the improvement of schools was formed with Mr. A. W. Boston as President and Mrs. Sarah J. Clifford of Stockton Springs as Secretary and Treasurer. The different schools in town have given entertainments, raising money which has been expended for the improvement of the various school rooms. The "Lincoln League" at the Ryder school, Miss Beulah Philbrook teacher, is the banner league of the town. This league has held its socials in the school room nearly every week and much enthusiasm has been shown by teacher, pupils and parents.

WALDO COUNTY TEACHERS' CONVENTION.

The Waldo County Teachers' Convention will meet in Islesboro May 31st. A fine program will be offered with good speakers and the public is cordially invited to be present.

SUMMER SCHOOLS.

It is earnestly desired by the State Superintendent of Public Schools that every teacher in the different towns shall attend some summer school. The one at Castine, in connection with the Normal School, is the most convenient for our teachers and we earnestly hope all who intend to continue teaching and especially the new teachers, will attend that school for the required three weeks. The only expense is for board and lodging.

TRUANCY AND TARDINESS.

I wish to speak now of something that vitally concerns our schools and concerns them more than many people realize, and that is tardiness and truancy. The Pendleton schools have the greatest per cent of truancy, in fact, the most of it. There is very little in the other schools; but other schools have considerable tardiness. I know it is the honest intention of parents to keep their children in school. Perhaps we get a little careless about the matter. Let us all "turn over a new leaf" this coming year.

. Having left to the last what really is first, we come to the question of Finances. Owing to a mistake, the Common School appropriation was reduced this last year from \$900 to \$550. It was thought that the extra mill tax fund from the State would make up for this difference, but it did not. We have run the schools in the most economical way even cutting them short two weeks, intending to put the extraitwo weeks on spring term, feeling sure that conditions would be changed for the coming year. Considering these two weeks to be made up and the fact that our common school teachers deserve larger salaries, we think it only just for you, Citizens of Islesboro, to make an appropriation for common schools of, at least, \$800 for this year. In this year's State Report of Schools we find that the town of Belmont appropriates the largest percentage of valuation for common schools in Waldo County and Islesboro has the

lowest percentage, Belmont being .006 1-10 per cent. and Islesboro .001 per cent.

As for the High school we can assure you of the fact that we get our money's worth for all money spent in this way. We have teachers that rank with the best in the State, and in order to keep to that high standard a little more money will be needed to meet the running expenses. When you remember our graduation last June, and have seen what this education has done for our girls and will do for our boys, as well, you will not hesitate to appropriate an extra one hundred or two hundred dollars. Make it \$1,200 anyway, and more if you will.

Whatever is spent in the way of education—for schools and for library—is not lost; it comes back to you and yours a hundred fold. Be generous along these lines.
