REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Fellow-Citizens:

During the year just closed we have endeavored to make the work of the public schools still more valuable than ever to your children, therefore to the State. If we, as teachers and school officers, have failed to do this, then we have not kept the trust which has been committed to us; but we believe that the work is becoming more systematic, more thorough, and that the interest is good is shown by the fact that there have been no severe cases of discipline with which to contend, a fact that speaks well alike for teachers and pupils.

The willingness with which you voted money for the musical education reflects much credit. Mrs. Philbrook was engaged at the beginning of the spring term as a superintendent and teacher, and we are glad to report that the work is highly satisfactory in all grades, and is being done in a systematical and progressive manner.

The work in drawing has been aided by obtaining the Prang Course, prepared by the Prang Educational Company for their books which are being used. It is hoped that we may be able to complete the work of six of the eight years which the course covers. Please do not think because we dwell on these subjects that these are the only ones attended to. It is our endeavor to give each subject a due amount of time.

We are glad to report that no change of teachers has

been made in the village, and in one of the rural schools also no change has been made. A change of teachers after one has become acquainted with the children and work is at least a retardation of progress. It is the duty of parent and child to do all in their power to abandon this custom.

Some years ago a library was started in the grammar school, but nothing has been added to it for some time. It is our wish that something may be done the coming year in this line, and we would say that no work of education, at this time, should demand more of our attention than that of supplying good literature and art to the children in the school-room. We, therefore, recommend that the matter be given careful consideration, and a new interest created.

I can say that our text-books are in the best condition that they have been at any time since being connected with the schools, and I again ask that the parents feel a responsibility in the care of them. New arithmetics have been supplied in the higher grades in nearly all cases. I recommend that new geographies be purchased the coming year; but besides these very few books will be needed.

We would call attention to the outbuildings in the rural districts. They are far from being in a sanitary condition. We think that two will need to be rebuilt and others repaired, and we ask that to this end the sum of \$150 be raised in addition to the usual repair fund.

Your committee recommend as follows: New closets to be built in the Steele and Gardner districts, each one having two compartments, and entirely sheathed on the inside, and located at a short distance from but not adjoining the schoolhouse. The one in the Emerson to be repaired so as to be made similar to others within, and each to be supplied with vaults. Some few minor repairs will be needed.

The heating plant has been erected in the basement of the High School building at the total cost of \$374.68. Instead of a steam plant, as was talked first, a Kelsey hot air generator was used. That it is sufficient to heat the building has been fully demonstrated. It is, however, a lamentable fact that unnecessary coal has been used on account of an improper regulation of the supply of cold air; but this may, in the future, be fully guarded against.

As no terms have been made for supplying the sewerage with water, we suggest the following plans: A tank constructed of pine and lined with copper or other suitable material, holding 1,000 gallons, more or less, located on the first floor of each schoolhouse; the water supply to be taken from the gutters, so far as it may be, and a force-pump to be used only when the natural supply is not sufficient; the overflow to be conducted into the bowls. It is impossible to estimate anything like the actual cost, but we think \$150 will be a reasonable sum to be raised.

The term of J. F. Hooper expires; therefore one new member must be elected.

We recommend the following sums sufficient for general expenses:

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen of Castine:

GENTLEMEN: The board of health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1902-03:

After the reappointment of Dr. E. E. Philbrook, the board promptly organized April 27, by the election of Curtis Stevens, chairman, and Dr. S. J. Wallace, secretary. The first act of the board was to see that the town was protected, as far as the thorough vaccination of its inhabitants could protect them, from the dreadful disease, small pox, by giving them free vaccination by any of the physicians of the town, by the re-enactment of the same resolution, and the secretary was directed to purchase a dollar's worth of vaccine in case of emergency to have on hand.

Notices were posted in several conspicuous places, that they could be vaccinated free of charge by going to the office of any of the physicians in Castine. A number of nuisances were reported and abated as follows:

Complaint made by D. W. Wescott, August 12, about the premises occupied by Mrs. Lyons, on Court street; investigated it, and found it a nuisance, and had it abated.

Mrs. Rose Harper, Sept. 18, complained of the premises adjoining hers, and occupied by several families making a nuisance of the yard by emptying human excrement on the surface of the ground; investigated it, and informed the owner, Mr. Justus Staples, who removed the nuisance.

May 29, complaint was made that a child of Charles Howard had a sore throat and eruption; investigated it; found the child had tonsilitis and eczema.

Sept. 2, Dr. Parsons reported a suspicious case of sore throat of the child of Nettie Morse. I visited the child with Dr. Parsons, and found it a case of scarlet fever; quarantined the house and placarded it, and took all the precautions possible to prevent the spread of the dread disease.

On Sept. 6, Mrs. Charles Howard complained of a child, four years old, with sore throat. I immediately investigated it; found the child with a sore throat; no patches. The eruption was a fresh outbreak of eczema.

Mrs. Lizzie Martin reported her little girl sick with a sore throat, high fever and vomiting. I immediately investigated it, found the child with a high fever and in a critical condition; no eruption, and the child lying in a comatose condition, so I was unable to see her throat; this was in the evening; about 11 p. m. I called to see the child again; found it was scarlet fever; quarantined the house, and placarded it. The next day complaints came pouring in. I called the board together, and the board instructed me to place a watchman on the two houses. I saw Mr. John Snow, and he procured George S. Macomber, made him a deputy constable, and we placed Macomber to watch the two premises. In the meantime the little girl of Mrs. Morse came down with the fever. The board has not been able to trace the origin of the fever. Fortunately the schools were not in session, or it might have been worse.

The board was ably sustained by the citizens generally in their efforts to stamp out the disease.

We have purchased 110 new books for the library, at a cost of \$155.80. We have rebound 88 volumes at an expense of \$32.32. The new book-shelves put in this year have added greatly to the appearance and convenience of the book-room.

Gifts of books for the year are as follows: Mr. James B. Ames, 14; Mr. Noah Brooks, 2; Mrs. Buckingham, 2, and Miss Katherine Tileston, Miss M. A. Smith, Mrs. Nellie Johnston, Mrs. Myra Burr, Mrs. S.
