The cause of the large overdraw in this account is owing to the estimate made by the engineer of \$125 for the outlet, which was made when the sewer was about completed on the street to the manhole at Dr. Grindle's, and upon this basis we thought the sewer could be completed for about the amount appropriated, but instead this outlet cost a little more than \$400.

REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of Castine:

In submitting the annual report of the condition of the public schools of Castine, it is first to be said that all the schools have had a successful year, without any disturbances that would militate against their usefulness. The teaching force, with two exceptions, remains the same as during the previous year, thus ensuring an evenness of working plans that is so essentially necessary to the proper advancement of the schools.

The most important movement in relation to the schools has been the introduction of a course of study in all the grades below the high school, thereby supplying a long-felt want by eliminating disjointed plans, and uniting the efforts of teachers and pupils along the same lines, with the same ends in view; also preparing the pupils to enter the high school one year earlier than formerly, and giving them a much better and more thorough training.

Although the course is yet new to our teachers, it is meeting with their approbation and approval, and we feel sure that great good will result from a faithful study and application of its principles.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Our high school, which in 1898 had an average attendance of ten pupils, now registers thirty-one, and will probably register thirty-five or even forty next year. The rapid and steady growth of this institution calls for an increase in the teaching force, and also demands a better

course of study. We see no reason why this should not be a standard high school and prepare our students to enter the higher educational institutions of the State.

This can be easily done at a small cost. We must have an assistant teacher, for which we shall ask for an additional appropriation. A small outlay will prepare the recitation-room over the high school room for immediate use, and a suitable course of study can be prepared for the next school year; and as the future weal of the community depends largely upon the present efficiency of its schools, we hope to receive the hearty support of all our citizens in this most important matter.

REPAIRS.

The schoolhouses have received a thorough painting and are in first-class condition externally, excepting the roof of the Emerson building, which needs reshingling.

The rooms in the grammar-school building have been thoroughly painted, and equipped with slate blackboards, making them more attractive and healthful. The high school room is in fine condition. The other rooms need some repairs. The basement walls of both buildings in the village are in bad condition, owing to the combined condition of water and frost; this is a matter of grave importance, and should be attended to without delay.

TEXT-BOOKS.

The schools at present are well supplied with textbooks, only a few changes being necessary; but owing to the increased attendance in the high school, some new books will be needed next year.

Page has painted and presented to the town a fine oil painting of our fellow-townsman, the late Noah Brooks.

To Mr. Page, and all the other donors to the library, we extend, in the name of the town, our sincere thanks.

Since our last report, we have received from the executor of the estate of the late Noah Brooks, the cases and nearly 1,200 volumes of valuable books, forming Mr. Brooks' library. Our special fund provided for the transfer of these and the necessary changes in the book-room, so that the town has been to no expense.

In accordance with the vote of the town at the March meeting, 1904, we opened the library as a reading-room on Nov. 2, 1904.

We have expended \$19 for nine periodicals; Mr. E. H. Carpenter donated six, Mrs. Will Hooke, three; Rev.
