



Report of Islesboro Free Library.

TO THE SELECTMEN OF ISLESBORO:

In 1902 the town library first saw the light of day. Since this time the growth has been steady and progressive.

The committee have endeavored to put only such books on the library's shelves as would in some small way make for the reader a bigger life, than might otherwise be possible.

The general work of the library has gone on much as in preceding years. The two branches, one at Mrs. A. H. Parker's, in the northern part of our town, and the other at Mrs. Isaac Burgess, in the middle part of the town, have been continued during the year.

Once in three months the books (50 or 60 volumes) are changed.

We have made some good friends during the year, who have shown their friendship in a most practical way. Dr. Wm. Pratt of Dark Harbor, well known to all Islesborians, very kindly lectured for us last September at the 2nd Baptist church. His subject was "A Trip to Egypt," and was enjoyed by many.

The proceeds of this netted \$27.45 which sum is in the hands of a member of this committee awaiting a good book sale.

On the back extension of the library lot, we had made a tennis ground. This was paid for with the "remains" of the library lot fund money, held by Miss Agnes Williams.

Next summer we expect the young people—and there are no old people—to enjoy this fully and thus justify the expenditure in having it made.

The Hewes' Point Dramatic Society under the direction of Miss Cruger of Reading, gave a dance at the hall one evening.

They realized about \$17. from this, which amount was spent in books of their selection.

Mrs. G.W. C. Drexel gave us \$10 which has been spent in nature books—and several volumes besides, noted elsewhere.

We have been negotiating for a set of Burton Holmes' Travelogues for some time, hoping to pick them up at a discount. That we have not given the order yet, is shown by the money in the treasury at this time.

So far as light fiction goes, we simply have not the room. We have added an extra book case and have had two boxes made for the transportation of books to branches.

The circulation ranges from 70 to 80 vols. on a winter's afternoon. This does not include the branch circulation. How important then what books we read. It seems a pity to make a waste basket of one's mind. Outside of vocational reading, we recommend the Chautauqua Course of Home Reading. The books and magazines are always on the library table, and other things as well, with which to supplement the course. Miss Mildred Pendleton has given us excellent service for which we are grateful.

Library work is so big—and the ideal librarian must know her books and know her people.

Our former State Librarian, the late Hon. L. D. Carver, told me this story: "A woman came in here one day and says "Have you any of Mary Jane Holmes' books?" "No, I said but I have some of Oliver Wendell Holmes books" and she said "Well, I'll take one." Mr. Carver said he then gave her Elsie Venner, and in a week's time she came back for another and so the librarian has many a chance to direct and help in the selection of reading.

We have said nothing concerning building appropriation for we realize that not until the town officers feel that the town can afford such a move—and so advise it, will the

voters have a chance to tell how they feel toward it.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

Following is a report of the work done in your schools for the year ending March, 1910.

With a firm belief that the future of children depends almost entirely on the educational advantages extended to them, your committee and superintendent have directed the work of your schools, adopting no plans not approved and successfully carried out by the best educators of our State.

The length of the common school has been increased two weeks, making thirty-two in all. At best this is but a moderate addition to a short school year and may be yet supplemented to good advantage.

When possible, teachers with Normal training have been employed. This seems to be the best plan. While many teachers of rare ability have not this special training, fewer chances are taken in employing those thus qualified.

Conditions in general as they obtain at present are mainly those of last year. We have lost a few good teachers, who left for larger salaries—some for other reasons.

As in other places different schools show different degrees of progress, so it is in Islesboro. Where the things that make for a good school have been present, results have not been lacking, where they have been absent results have fallen off in proportion.

I beg leave to quote from my report of last year. Failure on my part to re-engage a good teacher suggested it. "It is far from a new idea but nevertheless not amiss to mention that successful school work is carried on only by the cooperation of teacher, pupil and parent. The parent who acts as a helpmate and sympathizer of the pupil and teacher may reasonably expect greater advancement than might be attained, these things being absent, or where criticism is rampant and rebellion taught at home.

Teachers are not plentiful and good ones will put up with few indignities. A new teacher each term is to be avoided if possible.

It is with pleasure that I mention the work done in the High school. The enrollment has been larger than for several years and the students are working with vigor and interest. Last year a class of two boys was graduated, one is now in college, the other with several of this year's class expect to follow next fall.

Already the graduates of this institution are making use of their education in honorable fields of labor and you may be sure that the near future will find this increasingly true.

I would mention one more important position that your High school is to be called upon to assume.

It has been the custom in years past for many girls from Islesboro to enter the Eastern State Normal School at Castine. As a result many teachers have gone forth of whom you may well be proud. Now on and after nineteen-hundred and twelve only graduates of standard grade High schools will be admitted and the continuance of this school at its present rating is greatly to be desired.

The State High Inspector, Mr. Jeremiah Taylor, after a close inspection of our school expressed himself as well pleased with conditions as he found them, in fact some phases of the work so pleased him, that he made special mention of it to the State Superintendent, who in turn congratulated your principal.

Several students from the Islesboro High school attended the summer school for teachers at Castine—this may be taken as measuring the interest shown.

FINANCES.

I recommend reducing the appropriation for the High

school fifty dollars and adding same to the common school appropriation as it stood last year.
