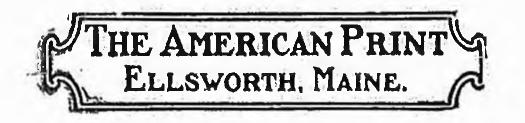

SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

We submit our written report for the year, which includes the budget for the coming year. The tax rate for the past year has been \$35.50 per thousand of valuation, which is \$3.07 less than the average municipal rate throughout Maine of \$38.57 per thousand; and eight dollars less per thousand than the average rate of the towns of Castine, Bucksport, Orland, Penobscot and Brooksville; these towns being taken because their financial problems are similar to ours. Thus, on a basis of comparison at least, our condition is encouraging.

Taxes were abated this year to the amount of \$46.02. The current expense account, with the abatements charged against it, is overdrawn \$207.61. We had the expense of three State elections to meet from this account; the expenses of registration under the law making it necessary for women to register in order to vote; largely increased expenses in connection with the historical signs, which we could not anticipate; and certain expenses in connection

with the town's part in the Centenary-Carnival of August 5, which we deemed proper to charge to this account, there being no appropriation. These various expenditures account for the overdraft. We recommend \$207.61 to pay the deficiency, and the sum of \$1,000 to be raised for current expense.

We recommend \$600 for the support of poor. The sum of \$136.14 must be raised to pay note due Jan. 14, 1922; and \$200 to pay note due May 15, 1921. We recommend \$75 for the interest account; the interest on taxes, and from the bank for town funds deposited, taking care of the remainder. Under the conditions of the Hawes Fund loan, \$500 must be appropriated for the coming year's repayment.

The library trustees recommend \$375 for maintenance, and 35 cents per poll for library increase. For Memorial day we recommend the usual sum of \$75.

The large balance on Emerson hall is accounted for by the fact that we used the old sidewalk material for fuel, and did not fix the inside walls because it would do no good to do so until permanent repairs are made on the roof. We patched the roof this year as well as possible, but the shingles are in very poor shape, also the roof leaks badly around the cupola. We recommend that the south side of the roof be shingled this year; and an estimate of the cost will be submitted to the meeting. Attention has also been called to one of the chimneys, which is used a great deal, and which would be safer if a double chimney were installed in place of the single one now in use. It will be necessary to buy at least \$150 worth of fuel if the hall is used next winter; lights and water run about \$70, federal tax, \$50; janitor, \$125; so that, figuring probable rent at the highest figure, it will be necessary to appropriate at least \$175, for maintenance next year, in addition to whatever sums may be raised for shingling, etc. In recommending this sum, we are reserving \$75 of the balance on hand, towards repairs on the inside walls.

For hydrant rental a fixed sum, \$900, must be raised, and \$800 for street lighting. For the fire department we recommend the purchase of at least 150 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch single jacket cotton rubber lined fire hose, in 50 feet lengths, on which we have quotations of 62 cents per foot. We recommend \$150 to be appropriated for fire department, which includes the price of said hose.

We recommend \$150 for public grounds. The increased cost of labor and teams must be considered especially in highway accounts, and is largely responsible for the overdraft of \$184.88 in the highways account. We recommend \$184.88 to pay said deficiency, and \$1000 for highways. We recommend \$150 for snow, which, with the balance from this year, will bring that account up to its ordinary figure. For road patrol we recommend \$475, and the sum of \$2.90 to pay the small overdraft of this year, caused by the increase of wages by the State, which we had no way of anticipating.

There is a large balance in the sidewalk repairs account. We suggest that \$50 be raised and added to this account, and that with the money then available the dirt walk on the south side of lower Main street be repaired, and the wooden bridge in the Perkins street sidewalk, near the Brophy cottages, be replaced by cement construction.

We recommend the usual sum of \$533 for State-aid highways. The overdraft in this account is more than covered by the amount of iron culverts on hand, which the State will reimburse us for next year, when same are put in.

We recommend the sum of \$500 for the resurfacing of Water street from the corner of Pleasant street to Dyer's lane.

We suggest that \$250 be raised for the Castine gen-

eral hospital and \$20 for the canning club.

There are small balances in a number of special accounts that can be transferred wherever, in the opinion

of the voters, the most good will be done.

The State and county tax will undoubtedly be much larger this year, on account of increased expenses of the State, therefore the voters must bear this in mind, in raising money for local appropriations.

Providing these recommendations are followed, next

year's budget would be as follows:

The budget as suggested totals \$8,739.53, which is \$2,455.85 less than the corresponding amounts raised last year. It does not include the recommendations

for schools, which are found in the report of the superintendent and school committee; nor is it possible to give any idea of what the State and county taxes will be.

We did not construct the Wardwell sewer this year, not being able to make satisfactory arrangements for running same over the property of the golf club. The only other way to construct the sewer is along the line of Wadsworth street, and across the Normal school grounds to connect with the school sewer, and to do this, accommodating at least two families, we recommend that \$300 be raised and added to the unexpended balance of \$400; such sum being included in the above budget.

Only a few more than one hundred women, of voting age, have registered for the State and national elections. As the law has been interpreted in other towns and cities, it is necessary that every woman or man unregistered, should register if desiring to vote in municipal elections. We suggest therefore that every unregistered person (the names of all registered will appear on the check-lists as posted) should be sure to register on the days set by the selectmen for that purpose.

The annual town meeting will be held at Emerson hall on the third Monday of March (March 21) A. D. 1921, at nine o'clock in the forenoon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at their office on Saturday, March 19, from 9 to 12, and 1 to 5, to revise the list of voters and transact any other business that may be necessary. They will also be in session, for the above purposes, at 8.30 on the morning of town-meeting day, March 21.

In addition to the formal recommendations made above we wish to make certain suggestions for the voters' consideration. The old reservoir or cisterns, especially on the common, need new covers; an estimate of \$75 is given as the cost of same. The entrance to the cemetery should be widened by the moving of one of the stone posts; Mr. Gardner estimates the cost at \$75. To carry off flood water on Perkins street, near the Brophy cottages, the covered drains should be opened, as we believe that the only feasible way of handling the problem.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

WITHERLE MEMORIAL LIBRARY.

To the Citizens of Castine:

During the past year 5,873 books were loaned. Books have been presented by Mrs. Ellen Johnson, 7; Miss Eustis and Miss Mildred Cunningham, 3 cash; Miss Baldwin, 1. Twenty-five books purchased by the Mary W. Hooke fund have been added to the children's department.

Magazines have been given by Miss Eustis, Mrs. Cunningham, Mrs. Charles Russell, Mr. William Porter and Mrs. Garnsey. A subscription to the "Open Road" came from an unknown friend.

The Castine woman's club made the following gifts to the library from the proceeds of the carnival: \$25 for the purchase of magazines; \$25 to pay the expenses of the librarian to a State library school; \$200 to establish the Dr. George Wheeler Historical Fund, the interest to be used for the purchase of historical books. The trustees have invested this sum in two \$100 Fourth Liberty loan bonds. A balance of \$22.87 left after this purchase is in the savings department of the City national bank of Belfast. Book plates designed by Wheeler Bartlett for books purchased with this fund have been presented by Mrs. Boyd Bartlett.

A map of Castine, made by the British and later given to the navy department, was presented to the library by Miss Isabel Smith, librarian of the navy library at Washington, D. C. She also gave a copy of the seal of the President of the United States. Both of these have been framed.

An old oil painting of Castine, presented by Mrs.

Matie Grindle Saunders, has been framed and hung in the library.

Nine magazines are received regularly. These will be loaned for home reading when one month old.

We recommend for increase the sum of 35 cents per poll, and for maintenance the sum of \$375.

The accounts for increase and maintenance for the past year are to be found in the selectmen's financial statement.

REPORT OF

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Superintending School Committee:

I herewith respectfully submit to you, and through you to the citizens of the town, my third annual report as superintendent of schools of Castine.

In general, the condition and progress of the village and rural graded schools have been a source of satisfaction to me. Very little misunderstanding or friction has arisen at any time, and the prevailing condition of mutual good feeling and trust between parents, teachers and pupils is a great help toward good school accomplishment. We have been able to arrange our salary schedule in such a way as to retain the services of several excellent and capable teachers, which is, of course, the most vital matter.

At the Steele school unexpected circumstances made it necessary to finish the last few weeks of the spring term under several substitute teachers. This was not as fortunate for the school as it would have been if some of these teachers could have served continuously until the end of the term. During the early summer, arrangements were completed whereby the State would pay one-half the salary of a thoroughly trained and approved teacher, in return for the privilege of using the school for observation and practice teaching for normal school students, in much the same manner that use is made of the model schools in the village. For this teaching position selection was made of Miss H. Marie Osgood. Miss Osgood has had successful experience, and is also a graduate of the Castine normal school, and the State's special training course for rural leaders. The work in this school during the year has been excellent, and effort is constantly being made to put the most modern practices into use. Among the new features carried out by Miss Osgood is the serving by teacher and pupils of the warm noon lunch, supervised playground and games for intermissions, skilled work in teaching of the primary grades, etc. I feel that the town receives much advantage from this arrangement, and while the total cost is more than formerly, yet the town's share of this cost is considerably less than it would have been under continuance of the regular plan of entire support by the town.

It is hoped and planned to gradually remodel and improve the building until the State will rate the school as a standard or model of its kind. Arrange-

ment and equipment of the building is now the only thing lacking. The arrangement of the seating has been changed and some additional equipment already secured, but much still remains to be done as soon as the expense can be provided for. Among these things are change of direction of light from windows and addition of two or three windows, a sheet-iron jacket and ventilating equipment for the stove, and remodeling of the entrance and coat room. It is possible that State aid for this work can be secured.

I had hoped that the Emerson school could be included in this plan by another year, but it now appears that this will be impossible until such time as the number of teachers in training for rural school work at the normal school increases enough so that the State can make a profitable use of more than one rural model school.

Much valuable special work was centered around the pupils of the Emerson school during the summer vacation, with the co-operation of Miss Annie Dunbar, the teacher, and through the efforts of Miss Higgins, the Red Cross public health nurse. Miss Jackson was also associated with Miss Higgins in this work, which consisted of health instruction, junior Red Cross activities, organized play and recreation, the preparation of a patriotic pageant which netted a substantial sum for the use of the school, etc. Special recognition was given this school by national Red Cross officials for being the first in the State for the current year to organize as a junior Red Cross unit. Playground equipment secured for the school during this time has also been much appreciated, and it is hoped will be properly taken care of for further use.

It was much regretted that Miss Annie Dunbar felt it necessary to resign as teacher of this school at the end of the fall term. In order to secure the necessary quality of teaching, it was found to be best to arrange for an equal division of the winter term between Miss E. Marguerite Page and Miss Thelma Reed of the normal school. These teachers have had successful experience previously, in addition to the fact that they have nearly completed their normal school course. Miss Page is also a graduate of the special State course for rural leaders, held at Castine during the summer of 1920. Excellent work has been done in this school throughout the year, and I feel sure that it has suffered no handicap in any way except that always incident to changing from one teacher to another.

In the village grades no changes have taken place, and the work has progressed without break and with excellent satisfaction. The grammar school is an important unit, and Mrs. Harquail's services in that school unusually valuable. A noteworthy feature of this school during the present year is the use of the ground floor of the building for a gymnasium and play-room. This arrangement provides opportunity for supervised intermissions and organized play under the oversight of teachers. This is of especial value in bad weather when out-of-door intermissions are out of the question. Boys and girls have the use of the play-room on alternate days, under supervision of either the regular teacher or a student teacher. The other group, under leadership, has the use of the school room for folk dances or some of the quieter games. This method of providing for intermissions is strongly urged by State school officials, and is a great step in advance. It not only does away with many evils and dangers of the intermission without oversight, but also implants in children the idea of team work, fair play, respect for the rights of other, etc.

Physical exercises and health instruction, in accordance with the intention of the law, are fully carried

out, but will probably be further developed and perfected. Less attention has been put upon the physical exercises in the high school, for the reason that it is felt that participation of nearly all students in the use of the Community club gymnasium largely fills this need.

It is hoped to secure a vote of the town meeting authorizing the appointment of a school physician. The uses and benefits of such a step will be explained at the meeting by the school officials. The plan for making use of a school physician is such that very little expense would be incurred by the town, unless in case of some unusual emergency.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The graduation of a class of nine last June, together with the loss of several pupils by removal from town, has made the student body somewhat smaller than during the previous year. However, the indications are that this loss will be made up again within a year, as a fairly large entering class will be ready to begin next fall.

The resignations of Principal Arthur E. Gregory and Delmont T. Dunbar, Latin, English and French instructor, last June, made appointment of two new teachers necessary. For principal, Mr. E. H. Brasier of Guilford was appointed. Mr. Brasier is a graduate of the University of Maine, with the A. B. degree. Miss Mae S. Greenlaw, the new instructor in Latin, French and English, has completed two years of her course in Colby college. Both of these teachers have made a good start in their work, and are taking an active interest in all the doings of the high school. Their services should become increasingly valuable.

Of the last graduating class, one has entered the normal school, one has just completed a business school course and taken an office position, two are

about to complete business school courses, and five have gone to work in various positions.

This school can easily fulfil every requirement for admission to the approved list of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board, which would admit our graduates with good rank to many of the colleges without examination. We have not, however, had enough students enter college in recent years to entitle us to the privilege. The diploma of this school does allow entrance to the University of Maine without examination, if accompanied by a certificate of good record and good rank. The school continues to be rated by the State superintendent of public schools as a Class A high school.

It has been decided to adopt on trial the rule used by many schools in giving credit for study of music. One point or credit per year will be allowed on completion of the course for one hour per week of work with a competent music teacher, and one hour per day of home practice. The faithful carrying out of these conditions must be certified to by both a parent and the music teacher. It must be borne in mind, however, that such points cannot be used for entrance to most other schools or colleges.

Chorus singing has been conducted once a week, a part of last year under direction of Mr. Lewis B. Clark, and this year under Mrs. J. H. Mueller. Both of these instructors are capable, and the work has for the most part been satisfactory. This enabled some of the students to take part last May in the Knox-Waldo high school music festival chorus at Belfast, and in the Eastern Maine festival chorus in Bangor in October. It is hoped that more students will take an interest in this part of the school work, as this is what is needed. Provision will be made for it only while the interest of students and parents warrants it.

BUILDINGS AND REPAIRS.

The principal work in upkeep of buildings the past year was the new roof on the grammar school building. This was let by contract to the lowest bidder for \$438.75 for a high grade of asbestos shingles, fire-proof to a large extent, and which are expected to last for a long term of years. The actual cost of this work, without profit to the contractor, proved to be \$449.45, which was finally paid for entire.

Many small items of work and material, looking to the upkeep of the various buildings, have been attended to; also over \$200 expended in renewal of insurance policies. The plumbing and furnaces in the high and grammar school buildings are old, and have made necessary work and expense. Some asbestos covering has been placed on bare steam pipes and furnaces, which leads to a noticeable saving of coal. This is not completed by any means, but should be as soon as the cost can be met.

The cellar wall under the front end of the grammar school has been crowded in by action of frost, and will soon cave in entirely, leaving the front of the building without support. A stone mason's job should be done on it this summer, but the cost is hard to estimate in advance.

Labor and material to make needed renewals on furnaces, plumbing and toilets, also drinking fountains in these two buildings, are estimated at \$225.

Improvements suggested for the Steele building are mentioned in the first part of this report. The estimated cost is \$100.

The Emerson building is in fair condition. The people very justly demand, however, better sanitary arrangements. The woodhouse and toilets are an old and decayed building, with the roof in bad shape. This must have something done as soon as possible.

It should be completely rearranged, at an estimated cost of \$125.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The school committee, at a recent meeting, made careful estimates of the sums needed for the various school purposes for the next year. The sum named for repairs and upkeep of buildings should be enough to cover all needs now known or mentioned in this report. As the matter of insurance will be of little expense next year, the supplies, insurance and apparatus account should not need to be as large as for last year. Following are the committee's recommendations:
