SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

To the Citizens of Castine:

We approve the reports made by the superintendent of schools, and the principal of the high school, and feel that they have done good work in the past year. The work done by the several teachers in high, grammar, model and rural schools seems to be of high standard, and we feel that all these schools are in good condition.

The school committee is considering various means by which the schools can be strengthened, and made even better. Realizing that perfection is impossible, we nevertheless feel that the schools of Castine are considerably better than in the average town of similar conditions, and the results are shown in the excellent work which graduates of these schools have done in higher institutions, or in occupations which they have followed after graduation.

The committee approves the recommendations for appropriations as made by the superintendent. Owing to Mr. Butler's absence, he was not able to join in the report.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Common Schools

The common schools offer many advantages that are not often obtainable in communities of this size. In addition to the work in the usual school subjects, there is a great deal done along the line of special subjects, such as music, manual training and domestic science, physical training, etc. These subjects as a rule cannot be carried on in school systems of towns under several thousand in population. As these studies are considered advisable in a program of well-balanced education, this town is fortunate to be able to have them given.

High School

While some changes have been necessary in the teaching staff this year, in most cases it has been possible to secure experienced teachers to fill the vacancies. A particularly strong program of extra-curricula activities has been conducted. Mr. Small has devoted considerable time and strength to the direction of those activities, particularly athletics, and he deserves commendation for doing these things which are very desirable for a high school group, but which are not obligatory on the part of a principal, as people who are familiar with the history of the school well know. The number of tuition pupils holds about the same, and keeps the size of the school about the same level. The receipt of tuition funds to be credited to the high school account is a very definite aid in the carrying on of the school financially.

Accounts

The expenditures for the year have been approxi-

mately what was estimated in the recommendations of last year. There will have to be some increases in the appropriations to meet definite needs, such as conveyance, which is now costing somewhat more; new seats and desks for the grammar school, etc.

Repairs

The heating plant in the high school cost originally about \$1,300. The accident to the boiler added about \$320. The new floors in the grammar and high school buildings cost about \$320, and painting at the high school came to about \$70. The only large repair job now in sight is the shingling of the south side of the high school building.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The year is passing with conditions good in our high school. Mrs. Hamilton, Miss Harmon and Miss Curtis are all willing workers, our pupils have a good attitude toward school work, Superintendent Philbrook and the school committee give us every aid they can, and the townspeople are always interested and willing to help us in every way possible. The schoolhouse is kept in good repair and our new heating system gives us plenty of heat.

We wish that more of our pupils were making definite plans and preparations to go to school after high school. This is distinctly an age calling for a good education. Advanced learning is not nearly so successful unless plans are made early in high school. Studies

by educators tell us that boys and girls go to school usually as long as parents really want them to; it is the parents quite largely who determine how much education boys and girls wait for before taking their places as men and women. Parents and teachers both ought to get our young people to head definitely for a lifework and plan to prepare well for it.

Schools of education are placing a lot of emphasis on those things which are not bread alone. We are beginning to recognize the right of every man to the satisfaction and broader life that come from music, good books, ability to play in a wholesome way for recreation after work, and for ability to work harder; perhaps we can get more out of good movies by a broader education and we can get more enjoyment out of plays and pictures and gardens and successful family life and other like riches.

Castine has a noble history but her future is not in her history, it's in her boys and girls. If fathers and mothers and teachers and townspeople can raise them sturdy, independent, well-educated, acquainted with the rest of the world, and with a clear understanding of the things in life that bring happiness; then get them to live here; they will make a place for themselves as men always have done before. They will solve their own problems of industries and give us a future to rival our past. I believe every boy or girl that is graduated from high school is as good as a \$20,000 industry to the place they settle in. They'll earn and spend \$1,200 a year, and that's interest on \$20,000. Let's teach them to live life at its fullest and best and, if we can, get them to live it in Castine. If you and I don't see just what they are going to do here, we can be sure that men have found chances to use their abilities in many a place with fewer opportunities than Castine has.

REPORT OF PUBLIC GROUNDS COMMITTEE

The small amount of money appropriated at the town meeting last year has been spent to the best possible advantage. The Common received its usual care, everything being done that was necessary. The trust fund lots at the cemetery have been worked on and gradually are being put in proper shape. The former committee had a formal survey made of the cemetery, with a map and book for a complete record. This year we have taken up the work where they left off, and are making, so far as possible, a written record of each lot, by whom owned and the number and names of persons buried there. Mrs. Alva Clement has been selected by the committee to make this list, and she has proved most efficient in the work.

Much work is needed at the cemetery, which it has been impossible to have done on account of lack of funds. This committee feels that at least \$500 should be granted to attend to the crying needs of our cemetery.

To the Citizens of Castine:

The trustees of the Witherle Memorial Library herewith submit their annual report:

During the year 5,579 books were taken from the library, an increase of 396 over the number taken the preceding year.

Books were given by Mrs. Farnsworth, Mrs. F. A. Jackson, Mr. Fred Williams, Mr. Harrison Small. Magazines were donated by Mr. Gurney, Mrs. Hobbs and Mrs. Hooke. An unknown friend gave a subscription to the Outlook. Twenty-one summer guests registered, leaving \$7.00. About sixty volumes were rebound.

In June, Mrs. Boyd Bartlett added to the George A. Wheeler Historical Fund the sum of \$400, which she had received from various persons. Mrs. Bartlett also had one of the bookcases enlarged to hold the books bought by this fund.

The special appropriation of \$210, made at the last town meeting, was expended in refinishing the ceiling and walls, making repairs on the steps and the outside of the building and in the purchase of globes for the outside lights.

Two new bookcases were purchased with the sustaining fund.

The trustees recommend for library increase, the sum of fifty cents per taxable poll, and for maintenance, the amount of \$500, these being the same amounts as raised last year.
