Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Our common school interests are among the most im-It is in the school next to the home that the children receive the most lasting impressions and lay the strongest foundations of character. The common school takes the child at a tender age, when the mind and moral faculties are beginning to develop and stamp an indelible impression upon them. Other influences in later years may modify and change them to some extent, but can never efface. They are like "words graven with an iron pen and lead in a rock forever." The home and the school ought to be one and inseperable in their work. The start ought to be made—must be made in the home. This cannot be pre-If the child gets a good start there, is taught to be clean in body, pure in speech and conduct, obedient to parental authority, kind and polite at home with brothers and sisters, and playmates, then he is prepared to commence his school life. From this time onward the home and school must work together if the best results are secured. should love the children who are entrusted to their care, should study their dispositions, note their peculiarities and conscientiously endeavor for the time to take the parent's place. Parents should heartily co-operate with the teachers, see to it that their children attend school regularly, if well; see to it that they conduct themselves properly on the way to and from school, and, whatever failings the teacher may have, should never speak of them in the presence of their If they have any complaint to make let them go directly to the teacher or to the school officers, and in most cases, if their complaint is reasonable and presented in a

proper spirit they may feel a reasonable degree of assurance that all which can properly be done will be done to remove the difficulty. But by all means, let the parents endeavor to realize how great is the care of the faithful teacher who has from ten to forty little ones to look after while they have so few. And let the teachers remember that their work is not limited to the mere matter of spending so many hours in the day and so many days in the week in the school room, when there are no holidays or other diversio 5, and hearing a certain round of recitations: or the earning of so much money and drawing their pay at the close of each term, but they are employed and placed in the school room, and parents entrust their children to their care that they may be taught, trained and developed in body, mind and spirit, come to possess pure and noble characters, be prepared to perform well the duties of life and act well their part in any station to which they may be called.

Now, when the home training is as it ought to be, when the parents are interested in the schools and co-operate with the teachers and when the teachers feel their responsibilities and perform their duties in the manner and spirit indicated above, the success of our schools will be assured. I am very happy to report that in most of our schools during the past year a good degree of the spirit and purpose indicated above has been manifested; in some it has been very marked. There have been a few cases in which parents have not done their duty by their children. ave permitted them to be absent from school and so lose and waste the golden opportunities of life. Some pupils, especially a few boys, have played truant so much, in spite of all that could be done to induce them to do differently by the school officers that their school privileges have been nearly lost to them. This is a great pity. In after years they will probably very deeply regret their foolish and wicked wastefulness. But as a general thing the older of the children have seemed disposed to improve their privileges and to appreciate the excellent opportunities which are so freely provided for them to obtain an education and prepare themselves for useful and honorable lives. Parents also have generally manifested a good degree of interest in the schools; and it has certainly been the earnest desire and effort of the school officers to secure the best teachers and to have the best possible schools.

Sicknesses, such as children are liable to, have been quite prevalent and have diminished the average attendance and have in some cases prevented in a measure the best results.

Our school books have many of them become so dilapidated, notwithstanding the constant efforts of the superintendent and teachers to have them taken good care of, that many new books have had to be purchased during the year and more will be needed during the year to come. The utmost care and prudence has been exercised in these purchases. No unnecessary expense has been incurred, and the law of the state requires that suitable books shall be supplied.

The Free Tuition law has without doubt in some respects been a detriment to our Common Schools. It has in some instances induced some of the best scholars to leave the town school sooner than they otherwise would and go to the Academy or some other secondary school. On the other hand, it has stimulated others who would have left the common school any way, to make an effort to obtain more education, and so has been a benefit to them. Great care has been taken in the examination of these pupils and none have been certified who have not given satisfactory

evidence of their fitness. In several cases our best endeavors have been exerted to persuade them to remain longer in the town school, but when a pupil presents himself for and passes the requisite examination a certificate has to be given. The past year our town has been sending forty students to the Academy, two to Kent's Hill and two to Hebron. Five of these have come to us with recommendation from other towns, but having become residents of this town we are paying their tuition. Some few are graduating or dropping out of school from arious causes, and the number in attendance on secondary schools will be likely to diminish in the future.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Newcastle, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on the nineteenth day of March, A. - ART. 6. To choose fish committee to act with Nobleboro fish committee.
- ART. 7. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8. To choose three road commissioners for the ensuing year and to fix compensation for same.

- ART. 9. To choose superintending school committee member to act three years.
- ART. 10. To see what method the town will adopt for collecting taxes and fix compensation for same.
- ART. 11. To choose collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount for voluntary payment of taxes and what time it will set for such payment.
- ART. 13. To choose an auditor of accounts for the ensuing
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote tonaise for acheels for the ensuing year
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair schoolhou as for the ensuing year.
- ARI. 16. To see what sam of money the town will vote to raise for free high school furtion for the ensuing year.
- Arr. 17. To see what sum of non-y the town will vote to raise for school text books for the ensuing year.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the cown will vote to raise for roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to lay out not less than one hundred dollars in each road commissioner's district in permanent improvements during the ensuing year.

- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks during the ensuing year.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a State road.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to aise for payment of town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the payment of incidental expenses during the ensuing year.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to pay the Taniscot Engine Co. the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars.
- Arr. 26. To see if the town will vote the sum of one hundred dollars towards the support of the Free Library.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to elect its selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor as follows: one member of each board for one year, one member for two years and one member for three years, and at each annual town meeting thereafter elect one member of each board for the term of three years.
- RT. 28. To see what sum of money the town will raise and what method it will adopt for the extermination of the browntail moth.
- ART. 29. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to carry out the provisions of law relating to sign posts.
- MRT. 30. To see what action the town will take in regard to digging clams.

- ART. 31. To see if the town will instruct its selectmen to meet for the purpose of attending to town business not less often than once a month.
- ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to pay Mr. Otis

 Dodge the sum of two hundred and
 seventy one dollars for the care of his
 lately deceased brother, Lyman Dodge, for
 ten months in 1905.
- ART. 33. To see what action the town will take in relation to the fencing of its ancient burying grounds, to comply with an act passed by the legislature of 1905 to amend section three of chapter twenty of the Revised Statutes relating to burying grounds.
- ARR. 34. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chap. 148 relating to the conduct of elections and which provides substantially that voting booths be provided with swinging doors.
- ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to the Harlow Dunbur Post for Memorial purposes.
- ART. 36. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at the town house on Monday, nineteenth day of March, A. D. 1906, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising the voting list.

Hereof fail not and make due neturn of this warrant and your proceedings thereon at the time and place of said meeting.
