# NEWCASTLE CEMETERY TRUSTEES' REPORT

The work of caring for the cemeteries and individual lots, for which Trust Funds have been established, was carried on during 1940 as in former years.

During the year two Trust Funds were established for the care of their respective family lots, viz: The B. Frank and Emma H. Vannah Fund and the Alexander and Myra Weeks Fund.

In addition to the above, increases were made to the Lincoln Fund and the Eben and Eleanor Haggett Fund, and a Savings Account, in addition to the present Trust Fund of Bank Stock, was set up on the Susan A. Donnell Fund. This Fund of five dollars was made up of a cash dividend of \$4.17, in lieu of a stock dividend on a fractional share of Bank Stock, and \$0.83 transferred from accumulated surplus to capital account.

In accordance with Chapter 284 of the Maine Public Laws of 1939, the State Veteran's Graves Registration Bureau surveyed and plotted the Veterans' graves in twelve cemeteries. Of these, four are small family lots on private property.

A list of the individual Trust Funds, their principal, 1940 income and expenditures and accumulated surplus, together with a summary of the receipts and disbursements, is attached to and made a part of this report.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Newcastle:

The report of the Superintendent of Schools for the fiscal year, ending February, 1941, is herewith respectfully submitted. The assignment of teachers and registration of pupils for the beginning of the fall term, 1940, were as follows:

As the result of changes in population the enrollment has been increased in several schools since the opening of the school year.

In the field of instruction, the teachers are giving their best efforts. The daily programs appear to be well organized and conducted. School work at the best is always a challenging problem, and the teacher needs helpful co-operation and support from every possible source in her undertaking to guide and direct the development of the boys and girls. It is a pleasure to state that the pupils have indicated a co-operative attitude which is so very essential in making a school program most effective. Pupil attendance has been as favorable as could be expected under the conditions.

#### LIBRARY SERVICE

The habit of reading and taste for good books are important in preparation for adult life as well as to meet the recommendations of the Course of Study. A well-stocked bookshelf in the school is essential to provide books for all, information found in books, and training in using them. Several of our teachers have gathered book selections for their schools and in addition taken advantage of the travelling library service of the State Library. Helpful contributions of library books have also been made by public spirited citizens. The special library project of the Parent Teacher Association of the Village School is also noteworthy. Here a selected list of about 150 books are available for the use of the boys and girls.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND REPAIRS

Under our laws the responsibility, control and custody of all school property and expenditures for insurance are placed under the direct supervision of your Superintending School Committee. The members of your Committee have taken an active interest in the administration of this undertaking. During the fiscal year, undoubtedly the most outstanding accomplishment was the installation of a modern woven wire fence at the Village School grounds. This was provided for by your appropriation for repairs.

At the time of the writing of this report, it appears certain that the average attendance for the school year at the Garrison Hill school in the Sheepscot Community will be below the minimum of eight required by law. In consequence, it would seem advisable to have a favorable vote by the town to instruct the Superintending School Committee to maintain this school for the ensuing year. Otherwise, the school will close automatically unless the matter is approved at a special town meeting. This suggestion is based upon the understanding that your Committee will give the necessary written recommendation for the continued maintenance of this school.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

The recommendations of your Superintending School Committee for Common Schools, Secondary Schools, Repairs, and Insurance follow the financial report. Recommendations have been made after a careful study of essential costs. The items will also be checked by your Budget Committee. Pursuant to Chap. 9, R. S., Sec. 59, your Superintendent recommends special appropriation of \$15.00 for necessary renewals and maintenance of flags and flagstaffs for all school buildings.

#### CONCLUSION

It is a pleasure to make special mention of the en-

couraging interest and material help of individuals and community groups. It would be almost impossible to list all of the contributions made in recent years for improvement of instructional materials, grounds, equipment for electric lighting, etc. The valuable donations of books have already been mentioned. The fixtures for electric lighting so generously provided will be substantial contributions to comfort, efficiency, and sight saving for years to come.

The members of your Committee have given generously of their time and energy. Teachers, Municipal Officers, and Citizens have co-operated. Any accomplishments that may have been brought about are due in no small degree to these contributions to our common undertaking.

## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To HARRIETTE B. DECKER, a Constable of the Town of Newcastle, County of Lincoln, State of Maine.

Greeting:

ART. 14 To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account, for the purpose of applying Bituminous Surface Treatment to State Aid Roads in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

ART. 15 To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen and Road Commissioners to make it a part of all contracts to deduct not more than thirty-five percent from the amount of any Town Order or Check given them for such service, to be credited on their delinquent or current taxes.

ART. 16 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money, as may be necessary to pay current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
