

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE CEMETERY TRUST FUNDS

Due to the shortage of labor we were unable, especially in the Sheepscot Cemetery, to keep up the standard of maintenance as in former years. A special effort, however, was made to keep the "perpetual care" lots mowed, but the work in the cemetery as a whole was less than usual.

A new tar and gravel roof was put on the receiving tomb in the Sheepscot Cemetery. This was needed as the concrete roof had cracked and was leaking badly.

During the year four additional Trust Funds were established for the care of their respective family lots, viz: Nathan Page, David S. Shattuck and Wilmot G. Shattuck in the Sheepscot Cemetery, and Elza A. Tibbetts in the Glidden Street Cemetery.

At the present time the entire 47 Cemetery Trust Funds, totaling \$9,292.00, are in Savings Bank Accounts. All these funds, with the exception of one in the Maine Savings Bank, Portland, on which 2% was received, are yielding only one percent. With the reduction of income and the increase of labor, it is going to be a herculean task to even make a semblance of carrying out the trust imposed upon the Town by the donors of these Trust Funds. As the present indications are that Savings Bank interest will not increase and may decrease, it is recommended that the Municipal Officers give serious consideration to the reinvestment of these Trust Funds in accordance with Chapter 174 of the 1941 Public Laws of the State of Maine.

Further work by your Trustees, and the State Veteran's Graves Registration Bureau has been carried on. Through the cooperation of Pemaquid Chapter, D. A. R., and the Richard R. Wells Post, No. 42, of the American Legion, flag standards have been pro-

wided for all veterans' graves in the Sheepscot Cemetery.

A list of the individual Trust Funds, their principal, the 1941 income and expenditures and accumulated surplus, together with a summary of the receipts and disbursements for 1941 is attached to and made a part of this report.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Newcastle:

In accordance with the requirements the annual report of the schools is herewith respectfully submitted. The following tabulation indicates the school enrollment at the beginning of the fall term, 1941:

As will be noted in the foregoing tabulation of assignments of teachers only one change is listed in the teaching personnel. Miss Annie Pitcher, a former teacher of the Edison school, was employed by your Superintending School Committee to take the place of Mrs. Lurie Ludwig who did not wish to accept this assignment.

The instructional activities and the progress of the pupils appear to meet the usual standards of effectiveness. It is a pleasure to state that in several schools unusually good work has been done by the teachers. The school programs are based on outlines of the State Department of Education, and are in accordance with the State Course of Study. At the time of the writing of this report there have been only a few disciplinary problems, and the attendance has been as regular as could be expected in consideration of the prevalence of communicable diseases.

### EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

For several years meetings of the teachers of this school union have been held annually. At the last group meeting January 12, 1942, there was 100% attendance of elementary teachers from Newcastle, Darriscotta, Bristol, and South Bristol. The object of these meetings has been to consider problems of special need and to encourage group participation on the part of the teachers. The series of programs has included demonstration lessons, program making, teaching units, remedial teaching, "Question and Answer" periods, control of communicable diseases and Regulations of the State Department of Health, Health Clinics, etc. At the latest meeting special attention was given to current educational problems resulting from the emergency. At this meeting we were fortunate in securing the assistance of Leon A. Dodge, Millard Clark, Miss Yvonne Daigle and Elsie A. Anderson, R. N.—authorities in their respective fields. Several of the teachers presented oral or written reports having to do with Fire Drills, Conservation of

Defense Materials and the Defense Savings Program. With reference to this program "The Government has no desire to coerce, solicit, or urgently influence the public schools to become sales agencies" for bonds and stamps; the fundamental purpose is to enable children to take part voluntarily because of a desire to do so. Should some school or class, of its own free will, desire to cooperate with the defense savings program by instituting a plan for the purchase of bonds or stamps, it would of course be welcomed as a patriotic enterprise." It is a pleasure to be able to state that our teachers and pupils are making an excellent record in buying Defense Stamps. The methods by which the program is being presented are designed to stimulate democratic action and prepare the students to be citizens of a democracy.

Last year the Rotary Club sponsored a speaking contest for the eighth-grade pupils of Damarisoctta and Newcastle, and cash prizes were provided for the winners. A preliminary elimination contest was first held in each town, and the local winners were chosen by competent judges. The boys and girls who won these preliminary contests later competed in a final public contest held at the Castner School. The judging was based on poise, voice, pronunciation, interpretation, etc. The recitations were for the most part patriotic selections and were well rendered. Many of our teachers have given emphasis to good speaking, but this competitive public contest provided the children motivation for better effort. These contests which, I understand, the Rotarians plan to sponsor annually, should lead to valuable educational outcomes. pleasure to take this opportunity to express appreciation for the interest that the Damariscotta-Newcastle Rotary Club has indicated in the welfare of the boys and girls.

### ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CONVEYANCE

Several of the former district schools of Newcastle have been closed, and the resulting consolidation has increased the need for elementary pupil conveyance. In consequence of emergency restrictions on purchase of tires and new vehicles the State Commissioner of Education, Harry V. Gilson, has written in part, as follows: "Without doubt all vehicles used for the conveyance of children to and from school for hire which have a seating capacity of less than ten must be taken off the highway within a fe wmonths because of being unable to replace tires. It behooves us to make out plans for caring for this situation as soon as possible. . . . These buses may be owned by the town or by the individuals contracting with the town. In either case it will probably be necessary to provide funds through action at the town meeting . . . and orders should be placed now for school buses that will be needed during the next 12 months. . . . "

Upon the teachers, as guide, counsellor, and instructor of the young rests a serious responsibility. public school obviously admits all types of children who bring with them many variations in personality and background. With a limited teaching staff and a multiplicity of grades the teachers' work is never fully completed. There is a deep lasting satisfaction in putting one's best efforts in such a worthwhile undertaking. The teacher needs support from every available source. She needs support in terms of goodwill and community appreciation as well as in terms of funds for educational facilities. Parents who have children in school and citizens in general are the schools' best friend. In order to make a fair appraisal of what the school is doing patrons are cordially invited to visit the classroom.

It is impossible to express thanks individually for all those whose counsel and aid have helped in this common undertaking. In closing I wish to express appreciation for the unfailing cooperation received from the members of your Superintending School-Committee, Teachers, Citizens, and Municipal Officers.

  - ART. 10 To choose one member of the Cemetery Trustees for three years.
  - ART. 11 To see if the Town will vote to elect one or three Road Commissioners or leave with the Selectmen to act or appoint.
  - ART. 12 To see if the Town will vote to elect three members of Budget Committee for three years.
  - ART. 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the various amounts as recommended by the Budget Committee, necessary to defray the running expenses of the Town as listed below:

ART. 14 To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account, for the purpose of applying Bituminous Surface Treatment to State Aid Roads in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

ART. 15 To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen and Road Commissioners to make it a part of all contracts to deduct not more than thirty-five percent from the amount of any Town Order or Check given them for such service, to be credited on their delinquent or current taxes.

ART. 16 To see what amount the Town will vote to allow per day for men, trucks and teams on the Highways for common roads and bridges during the year.

- ART. 17 To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Third Class Apportionment for the purpose of applying Bituminous Surface Treatment to Third Class Roads in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, P. L. 1939.
- ART. 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for Public Health Nursing in Newcastle, to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- ART. 19 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 20 To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Municipal Officers to invest the Trust Funds, entrusted to its care, in accordance with Chapter 174, P. L. 1941.
- ART. 21 To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a Siren, the most suitable for the protection of all property in Town in case of fire, and appropriate the money for same.
- ART. 22 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell property acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes, and issue a Quit Claim Deed in behalf of the Town.
- ART. 23 To see what action the Town will take in regard to licensing Peddlers, and authorize the Selectment to furnish the proper credentials for the purpose.
  - ART. 24 To see if the Town will vote to ratify and

accept the contract of the sale of Surplus Alewives for a term of two years with the Zatzman McCormick Co., Inc., as made by the Selectmen and Fish Committee in conjunction with the Town of Nobleboro.

ART. 25 To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the care of Burial Grounds for Soldiers, as required by Section 3, Chapter 24 of the Revised Statutes.

ART. 26 To see if the Town will vote to resurface and tar the road beginning at Jones' Corner, so called, and continue to Jefferson Town Line, a distance of two miles, and appropriate money for same, as per petition of Mrs. Ida Littlejohn and 33 other voters and taxpayers of the Town.

ART. 27 To elect all other Town Officers.
