The Maine Child Care Task Force, co-sponsored by the Departments of Human Services and Educational and Cultural Services was convened in September, 1983. The Task Force is a committee of volunteers comprised of public and private child care providers, consumer groups, business representatives, educators and others with an interest in this issue.

We have been studying the child care needs of Maine parents, and intend to recommend by September, 1984 innovative ways to use existing public and private resources to improve and expand the child care in Maine. Our major areas of focus are the quality and quantity of child care, including the issue of the latchkey child.

NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY WEEK

NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY WEEK - March 4-10, 1984 - focuses on the rich and inspiring heritage of women's contributions in the U.S. It coincides with International Women's Day - March 8 - proclaimed at the turn of the century to recognize the tremendous work of women in the labor movement and the international connections among all women.

The Maine Commission for Women urges all educational institutions, churches, community groups and individuals to organize events to commemorate the contributions of women.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- Contact your superintendent or site principle to make certain that March 4-10 1984 has been designated for special observances on school calendars;
- Ask city and county governing bodies to issue a Women's History Week Proclamation recognizing the tremendous contributions of women locally or on a State level;
- Volunteer to help your local schools with women's history presentations;
- Ask your local libraries to put up special displays for National Women's History Week;
- Contact local banks and ask for donations to buy women's history materials for school libraries and resource centers;
- Contact local press (tv, radio and newspapers). Make certain that they know about the significance of the week. Ask if they will interview local women who have made contributions to the community;
- Ask women's organizations to sponsor essay contests in cooperation with your local schools. Students could write about the special women in their lives, or the women they see as role models, significant women of the past, what it means to be a woman in 1984, or a number of similar topics;
- Ask your church, synagogue, or place of worship to have a special remembrance in their service recognizing the important work of women or of particular women during National Women's History Week;
- Plan a special dinner to recognize and honor women who have made contributions to your community;
- Recruit other people to begin organizing.

We have enclosed a resource catalogue which is full of exciting ideas and materials. If you decide to sponsor events for this important week, please notify the ME Commission for Women by FEBRUARY 15, 1984. We would like to do a comprehensive statewide calendar for distribution.

Next Meeting: Wednesday, February 29, 1984, 5:00 p.m. at the Towne Farm Restuarant, Mill Street, Orono. Betsy Sweet from the Maine Women's Lobby will meet with us.

Item 1) Introductions: Ellen suggested that each person introduce herself and mention which agenda items were of interest.

Item 2) A. Women: An Economic Resources Committee meeting in Augusta: Formation of the newspaper idea: The newspaper promoting economic equity for women, is an idea that grew out of the conference, "Women: An Economic Resource, May 1983". There are two main purposes of the paper. One is to educate women about business and career opportunities in the workforce. The second purpose is to promote accountability among state legislators and programs regarding economic strategies. A sub-committee will be formed to investigate start-up monies and the business plan. Jacquie, Ellen, Rose, Rosemary, Carole and Isa expressed interest in forming the sub-committee about the newspaper. JoAnn Fritsche also had previously agreed to help the sub-committee research and write grants for start-up monies for this effort. Ellen has called a meeting of this sub-committee for Monday, February 27, 1984 at 7:30 p.m. at 287 French Street, Bangor. Please call 947-1593 if interested and plan to or are unable to attend. The date for the next meeting of the Women: An Economic Resource Committee is for March 7, 1984 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at the State Office Building Room 107.

B. Maine Commission for Women Projects and Plans: Carole discussed the booklet on non-traditional occupations expected to be released in June 1984. Carole will supply outlines of the booklet upon request. Meetings on the booklet are held in Augusta. Call Carole McConnell at 942-3417 for further information. The Commission is also looking to fund a computer system which would hook up with women's organizations, coalitions and the Department of Labor.

Item 3) The Maine Women's Legislative Agenda Coalition: The Coalition consists of 16 statewide organizations representing 400,000 members. Nine pieces of legislation were presented to the 111th Legislature. (See attached for more information and contact people). The next network meeting has been scheduled with Betsy Sweet to get an update on the agenda. Further, we will discuss entrepreneurial opportunity and equity for women. People with expertise and experience on ideas on this area, are encouraged to call Ellen or participate at the next meeting at the Towne Farm Restaurant on Mill Street in Orono, Wednesday, February 29, 1984 at 5:00 p.m. Betsy will then be speaking at the American Association of University Women meeting 6:30 p.m. at the President's House.

: Jacquie told the meeting she will look into a bill in the Legislature dealing with bank loans and report back to the Network.

: The Appropriations Committee meeting in Augusta on February 7th RE: LD 2020 An Act to Provide Funding for Rape Crisis Centers in Maine seemed favorable. (This is item 9 of the Legislative Agenda).

: Ellen also relayed information from Deborah Leighton, Director of WEET. RE: Maine Job Start Bill LD 1911. The idea of the bill is to establish a revolving loan fund granting loans of \$5,000 for businesses. It is an important bill worthy of our attention and that of our legislatures. Let them and Libby Mitchell know of your interest. (Representative Libby Mitchell, RFD 1, Augusta, ME 04330 or phone 289-3281).

Item 4) Governor's Task Force on Technology and the Technology Strategy for Women of Maine Committee: The final meeting on the Governor's Task Force is on March 13th. It is an open meeting and ideas or suggestions can be expressed at that time. The Task Force has not added components on human resources or expressed technology strategy in the context of economic development. Ellen has a copy of Technology Strategy for Women draft. If you have comments to make sooner, contact Deborah Leighton also of the Technology Strategy for Women of Maine at 289-2636. The next meeting of this committee will be March 14, 1984 at 9:30 a.m. The place is yet to be determined.

Item 5) Take Back the Night Rally: On Saturday, June 2, 1984, Portland will host the "Take Back the Night Rally" day conference and evening rally. On Friday, June 1, 1984 a "Take Back the Night Rally" candlelight vigil is being planned for Bangor. Concern for increasing public awareness on violence against women was expressed. Call Isa Silva at 942-4690 for further information.

Item 6) Other Announcements: Holly Near concert is Friday, April 13, 1984 at 8:00 p.m. in Lengyl Gym at the University of Maine at Orono. On March 1, 1984 at 8:00 p.m. University of Maine's at Orono Hauck Auditorium will host a theatrical performance by FOODFRIGHT dealing with eating disorders - bulimia and anorexia. Lastly, to help cover mailing costs Ellen Green requested a small contribution be sent to 287 French Street, Bangor, ME 04401.

THE WOMEN'S LEGISLATIVE AGENDA COALITION

The Women's Legislative Agenda Coalition, comprised of sixteen organizations, has presented a package of legislation to the 111th Legislature. The package is designed overall to address the economic inequities we face. There are five areas of concern: Improving the Economic Status of Women who cannot or do not work outside the home; Creating Employment Opportunities; Economic Equity on the Job; Protection of Rights on the Job; and, the Protection of Women against violence. Specifically, there are nine pieces of legislation that we are supporting. What follows is a list of that legislation, a brief explanation, and the contact person and organizations in the Coalition who can give you detailed information.

An Act to Increase AFDC Payments - Sponsor: Representative Connolly
Cost: \$1.5 million
Contact: Chris Hastedt, Pine Tree Legal 623-2971

This bill would provide a 5% increase in AFDC payments. Currently, entitlement payments are 72.5% of a 1974 Standard of Need. That means there are over 10,000 female-headed families in Maine living below the poverty level with a monthly income of approximately \$350/month.

Creation of Transitional AFDC Health Insurance Pool - Included in Governor's package.

Cost: \$150,000

This program will be a pilot project hopefully included in the Governor's package. Initiated by WEET, (Welfare, Employment, Education and Training Program), this will provide health insurance benefits for those AFDC recipients who leave AFDC for jobs that do not provide health insurance. Currently, many women must quit their new jobs and return to AFDC because they have no medical coverage.

An Act to Target Employment Opportunities Financed Through State Construction Contracts

Sponsor: Representative Connolly

This bill targets 25% of jobs created by State construction projects for Job Training and Partnership Act (JTPA) eligible people. One of the chief problems with JTPA is that the funds provide training with no assurances of jobs. This bill requires the State to use its contracting authority to encourage the employment of those trainees.

An Act to Create a State Funded Jobs Program

Sponsor: Representative Connolly
Cost: \$3.1 million

This bill would create jobs with State revenue. It also creates a commission to identify high areas of unemployment in the State, a profile of the unemployed population, and the most serious unemployment problems. It also provides for a study on business - based employment and allows the State to provide additional money for job creation.

An Act to Negotiate Pay Rates of Classification

L.D. 525

Sponsor: Senator Bustin

This bill gives the State Employees Union the right to bargain over pay rates of job classifications. This bill is of particular significance to us because Maine is currently doing a landmark comparable worth study of state employees whose results will be out in the fall of 1984. Whatever the results are, this bill will allow the employees union to implement the results through the bargaining process.

An Act to Increase the Minimum Wage - Sponsor: Representative Connolly

This bill increases the minimum wage to \$4.00/hr. Over 65% of those living on minimum wage (\$7,200/yr. at 40 hours a week) are women. This bill would provide the first increase for these workers since 1981.

An Act to Keep Confidential Certain Documents of the Maine Human Rights Commission - Sponsor: Representative Diamond

This bill would keep confidential documents of an investigation of the Human Rights Commission until a decision or resolution of the investigation is complete. This is designed to protect those involved in Human Rights cases from unnecessary publicity.

The Creation of an Assistant Information and Compliance Officer at MHRC - Included in Governor's package
Price Tag: \$25,000

This bill would create a position at the Maine Human Rights Commission to provide employers, employees and all those who are subject to and/or benefit from the Maine Human Rights Act with information and training in compliance with the Act. Often employers are cited for violations of the Act because of their lack of knowledge of their responsibilities. Also, employees often do not register complaints because they are not aware of their rights. This position would provide the MHRC with staff to take a more active role in guaranteeing human rights in Maine.

An Act to Provide Additional Funding for Rape Crisis Centers in Maine - Sponsor: Representative Bell
Price Tag: \$100,000
Contact: Carol Wyckoff

L.D. 2020

This bill will provide \$100,000 in state revenues to the seven existing rape crisis centers and for the creation of an eighth center in the northern part of the State, to more adequately provide services for rape victims and public information about the problem. In the first six months of 1983 the incidence of reported rapes increased 86% over 1982. Experts acknowledge that only 10% of the rapes that actually occur are reported.

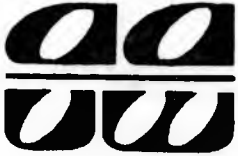


