Diary for 10 31 to 12 31, 1883 with Financial Records

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WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31, 1883

Pleasant; cool.

Mr. Smith made
some medicine, - bark
from red oak root, white
pine bark, partridge
clown and sugar.

Mr. John Sullivan
peddler came back
from Machias with Mr.
Smith's horse Sam.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 1883

Pleasant and quite
warm. I bought a pa-
per of needles and a spool
of thread⁰⁵ of Mr. Sullivan.
Mr. Smith commene-
ed his plowing. I help-
ed him strike out a
piece after school.
He pegged my shoe this
evening.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 1883

Pleasant and quite warm.

Mr. Smith and I unloaded the wagon ^{straw} and went down to Haskell's and got his tub to scald the hog in to-morrow. After supper we went up to Mr. H. W. Richie's and spent the evening, and he borrowed a rope. I played a few tunes on Mrs. Richie's new organ.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1883

Pleasant and quite warm. We killed the hog this forenoon. About 8:30 Ulysses, Arthur and Elley came up to go gunning. They helped us kill the hog. We all went down to the pond and Arthur and I and Ulysses got a shot at a duck. They got one partridge coming up. They started for home about 2:45. Clara sent up a letter and the Sentinel. Mr. Smith traded old Sam off with a Mr. Black near Machine and got a mare. Thomas and Wellington James were here to dinner.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 1883

Looked like rain in the forenoon; cleared up towards night. I stayed home all day.

I went up to Mr. Ireland's last evening. I bought Ulysses's gun yesterday. (5.00)

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 1883

Pleasant and quite warm.

I sold my gun to Mr. Smith, this morning for a dress coat and two lamb. I put in my father's reader and got a grammer. He went to the corner this morning, but did not get back to night. I went up to Mr. Yeaton's after school and stayed the evening. I paid him for his money that I hired to go home with. (5.00)

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1883

Pleasant; mild windy.
Mr. Smith got home
about noon; he brought
me a letter from home.
James Dodge came there
about noon; this afternoon
he helped Mr. Smith mend
the house this afternoon.
I went down to the pond
but there was nothing
in.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 1883

Pleasant in the
morning; cold and windy
at night. I went up
to Mr. Saddle's after
school and stayed till
7 o'clock. I wrote a let-
ter home today.
Mr. Smith and James
Dodge hauled the horse
and hauled a load of
wood to the school
house this afternoon.
They picked up some
potatoes.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1883

Cloudy, cold and windy in the morning; cleared off in the fore-noon.

Mr. Smith went to Con-
nysville with a load of
potatoes to send to East-
port. I sent my letter to
the office. He got home a-
bout nine o'clock. James Dodge
stayed here to night.

I put some pieces in my
scrap book.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 9, 1883

Pleasant and warm until
this after-noon; it clouded
up and it commenced to
rain about 4:15 and rained
hard all the evening.

Lincoln Yeaton came down
from school with me, and we
went down to the pond, but
there was nothing in. He went
home about 7:45.

My nose bled this after-
noon, and I had to go out door.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1883

Cleared up last night. Wind blowed hard all last night and ~~most~~ quite hard today. Pleasant this fore-noon. Clouded up this after-noon.

I went out gumming this fore-noon, but got nothing. I fixed my registers some this after-noon and put some pieces in my scrap book. Mr. Smith and James Dodge plowed and hauled rocks.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1883

Pleasant and warm. This after-noon Mr. Smith and I started up to Mr. Yantons; after we got to the gate we kept on and went up to Mr. William Sadtlers to see his organs. He has two to his house on trial, - The "Leighton Organ" and The "New England Organ". We got home about 4:30.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1883

Cold and windy. Hail squall this morning. Mr. Smith and James Dodge went down and hauled some wood for Jim. The wind blowed very hard and cold all day. Mr. John Sullivan, peddler, stayed here all night.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 13, 1883

Cold; Cold; Cold.
Windy; Windy; Windy.
The wind blowed very hard all night and all day to day. It was pretty cold going to school this morning. To night, I went to Mr. Geo. Smith's and took supper and stayed till about 7:20 in the evening. Had a very good time.

Mr. Sullivan stayed here all day; did not take his "cart" out of the barn. He and Jim went down to Uncle Haskell's this evening.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 14, 1883

Snowed all day, about
1½ inches. Quite moderate.
Mr. Sullivan went away
this fore-noon.

Just before school was out
to-night, a partridge flew
into a tree to bud; Link.
ran home and got his gun
and fired at her and away
she flew. Mr. Smith was
been shoe making, to-day.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1883

Pleasant and cool.
Ground covered with snow
all day.
I sewed my shoe in the
morning.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 1883

Cloudy and cold all day. Looked like snow. Cleared off this evening. I swept the school house to night.

Mr. Smith and Jim. threshed oats.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 17, 1883

Cloudy and cold. Jim Dodge took the horses this morning and hauled some wood to the schoolhouse.

We had a school to day instead of next Friday.

Mr. Smith and Jim. went out in the woods this afternoon and Jim shot a partridge.

This evening Jim and I went down to Uncle Haskell's.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 1883

Cloudy all day. (Wind)
Moderate.

Jim. went home to day
and came back to night.
Haskell Smith went to
Muddy bumps; I went
down to night and got
a letter for Mrs. Smith
and the farmer.

Mr Smith shaved me this morn-
ing.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 1883

Looked like rain in
the morning. Cloudy about
all day. Mr Smith went
to Dennyville this morning
and got back about 12 o'clock.
Jim. thrashed a few oats
and sawed some wood.
Uncle Haskell went
to Dennyville.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1883

Pleasant and quite warm. Foggy to night.

Jim. cut some wood in the woods.

Mr. Smith went over to the West Ridge. He took my registers and bill; but could not get the money. He got an order (\$4)

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 21, 1883

Soaked like rain all day; foggy and damp. Jim. and I went up to Mr. Edwin Sadler's this evening, and he cashed my order - \$4.00. - We went up to Mr. William Sadler's and stayed the evening. Mr. Smith plowed,

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 22, 1883

Looked very much like
rain; cleared up in the
evening.

School closed in Cooper.
Mr. Rich, supervisor, came
in this afternoon.

This evening, Jim and I
went up to Mr. Ire-
land's.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 23, 1883

Rained hard all
the fore-noon. Cleared
up in the after-noon.

Ulysses got to Mr.
Smiths about 9 o'clock
this morning. We started
for home about 2 o'clock
and got home a little
after 6 o'clock. Mr. Smith
came down with us and
stayed to father's all night.
I bought one barrel of
"Beauties of Hebron" potatoes
of Mr. Smith, and he hand-
ed them down for \$1.50

I got my lamb that
I got for the guny.

Paid mother \$5.00 for calves
and .¹/₂ that I owed her - 5.00

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 24, 1883

Dull all day. Damp.
I went out to Mr. Smith's
a little while this after-
noon.

Paid Ulysses \$5.00 for his
gun.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 1883

Pleasant, warm.
Mother and father were here
to dinner. We went down
to Aunt Minnie's and stay-
ed till after supper.
May and Getta came up
with us and Helen went
down with them and
stayed all night.
Deborah, mother and fa-
ther came over in the even-
ings.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26, 1883

Pleasant.
Killed the hog.
Tom, George, Ulysses and Elley
helped kill him. Father
dressed him.

I went down to the other
place with father. We
carried my lamb down
and brought up 5 lambs
to carry to Eastport to-
morrow. I got Aunt
Minnie's horse to go to
Eastport, to-morrow.

Paid Elley for taking
care of barn etc \$2.35 and
for putting beets etc in
the cellar etc - \$3.10

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 1883

Rained hard all the
forenoon. Blowed very
hard before day-light.
This afternoon we went
to the Corner and sold
8 lbs. butter @ .25 - \$2.00
and bought.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1883

Pleasant and quite
warm.

I cleaned the hog-pens
out this fore noon.

Aunt Margaret came up
this after-noon and stayed
till after supper.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 29, 1883

Thanksgiving.

Mother had a dinner to stay
and Mr. and Mrs. Smith; Mr.
and Mrs. Owen; Grandmother
and Aunt Minna; Ulysses and
Mabel; Clara and Charles;
Clara and I were there.

Cold and windy.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 30, 1883

Snowed part of the day
turned to rain and rained
hard part of the afternoon
and evening.

Father helped me bank
the house in the forenoon
I picked up a few po-
tatoes in the afternoon.

Mr. Smith bought some
hay of James Quinn

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 1, 1883

Pleasant and cold.

I picked up to-ta-tos in
the forenoon, Ulysses, father
I went to the corner in the
afternoon and I bought

3 milkpans @ .25	.75
6 pails glass & x9 "	.30
2 yds flannel "	.70
1/2 " plaid & buttons,	.11
Salts, ⁰⁷ saleratus, rattle ⁰⁰⁵	.15
stone blacking	.08
Rat exterminator	.25

Chas. Owen's place was sold
as per advertisement, to the
town.

Mrs. Smith came out
and stayed to dinner.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 2, 1883

Commenced to snow this morning; turned to rain about noon; snowed again about night.

Clara and I and mother went out to Mr. Smith's and they went home about 3 o'clock and I started for "Four Corners". I got my supper to Oldmie's and then went up to Mr. Synses.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 3, 1883

Snowed and blowed hard last night; blowed hard and was very cold, all day.

I commenced my eleventh term of school to-day, at "Four Corners."

\$58. per month; \$2 per week for board

Mr. Smith came up here this morning.

Mr. Lyons went to the Corner.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 4, 1883

Cloudy; cool.

Mr. Lyons hauled a load of hay over to Mr. Smith this fore-noon.

This after-noon Mr. Lyons went down to Mr. Hesse's and got money. Chloë was down to her mother's today.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 5, 1883

Snowed this fore-noon; rained this after-noon.

My lungs have ached quite badly to-day.

Sim. went out to the Head of the tide this fore-noon.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1883

Pleasant and quite
Cool.

Mr. Lyons and Sim. went
cut hoop-poles this fore-
noon. He and Nancy went
to the Corner this afternoon
and got my Sentinel.

Ed. Antone was here to sup-
per. Sim went down the
road this evening.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 7, 1883

Pleasant and Cool.

I went home to night
via Mr. Smith's. I got
my supper to Mr. Smith's.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1883

Soft; looked like rain all day. Snow about all off. I got some partridge clover, oak root, pine bark, and father got me some black cherry and I made some bitters. Father put mother's hen-pen-up.

Ulysses went over to the Corner and got the horse sharpened.

Mr. Smith put a latch on our door.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9, 1883

Cloudy all day. Mr. Otis Gardner brought Venie down to our house this fore-noon. She stayed to our house to dinner and then went out home. Mr. and Mrs. Smith were out to mother's to dinner.

Clara and I went down to see Alice Saughton, and then we went up to see George Carter's wife, Baby.

Ella Dunn is at home sick.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 10, 1883

Soft; warm; quite pleasant; snowed a little in the evening.

I came from home this morning, and brought a bottle of medicine with me which I made Saturday.

Mr. Lyons went to the Corner and I sent two letters away - one for the Boston Journal and the other for Farm ^{and} Fire-side.

I borrowed \$1. of Mrs. Lyons.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 11, 1883

Cold; windy; broken calm to-night.

My lungs have ached quite badly to-day.

There was a prayer meeting here this evening. Capt. Owen leader.

Ezra Lyons got home to-night, having walked all the way from Grand Lake Stream, a distance of 50 miles.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 12, 1883

Pleasant and quite cool.

Mr. James Wentworth got home from Eastport, to night, where he has been working as night watchman in a sardine factory. Simpson, Lyons and I went up to Mr. Jnd. Snellaker this evening

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 13, 1883

Quite pleasant this morning; Soft; wind South. To night and blowing quite hard. Cold. Jim. went to the Corner and got my Sentinel.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 14, 1883

Rained a little
this fore-noon; hard
this afternoon. It stop-
ped raining about
four o'clock and I
went home.

Mr. Smith came up
and took Alden's horse
and took a load of
hay home. Mr. Syon
went with him and
got the horse shawed
when he came back

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 15, 1883

Cloudy; Cleared
up and came off cold
towards night.
I worked on my hen
pen.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith
and Ezra Syon came
out this afternoon
and stay ed to sup-
per. Ulysses went
to Crows neck.

Arthur went over
to the Herd of the hide
this afternoon.

Mother went up
to Mrs. Haynes's.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 16, 1883

Pleasant and very cold last night and all day today. Mother's plants all froze.

Clara and I went out home; got there about 12 o'clock; stayed till 4 o'clock, she and Grace went out home and I went up to Mr. Lyons's.

Esra Lyons got home a few minutes after I got there.

Hattie came home from Mr. Daggetts and went back to-night. Sim. went over with her.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 17, 1883

Commenced to snow some time last night and snowed hard all day long. About 16 or 18 inches of snow fell. It has been a pretty rough day.

Quite a number of scholars missed today.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 18, 1883

Quite pleasant this morning, clouded up and commenced to snow about 3 o'clock; snowed hard till about 6 o'clock turned to rain; cleared up in the night.

Mr. Lyons went down to the office and got my papers; he got a letter and dispatch from home; his family are sick; he will start for home in the night.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 19, 1883

Pleasant this morning. Commenced to snow about 1:45 this afternoon, snowed all this afternoon and evening.

Ezra Lyons started for Grand Lake Stream between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning.

Messrs. Jos. Wilder Jr. and Bernard Rogers, - school committee, came in to school this afternoon.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1883

Cloudy in the morning; Clear at noon; cloudy at night. Quite cold all day.

Mr. Lyons and I took Anna's sleigh down off the scaffold this morning.

Clara went to the Corner this fore-noon and got my Sentinel.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 21, 1883

Commenced to snow about nine o'clock this morning and continued all day.

I had a pretty hard walk home to night. I arrived home about 8:50

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 22, 1883

Clear most of the day.
Squally at noon. Ulysses
went to the corner this
fore-noon. Clara and I
calculated to have gone
this after-noon but did
not. Father hauled two
loads of wood for me
making (2) two cords of day.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 23, 1883

Cold! Cold!! Cold!!!
Clear and Cold all day.
Windy and cold all last
night and to day.
We only ate two meals
to day. It was so cold
that we stayed in the
house most of the time.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 24, 1883

Commenced to snow
about 8 o'clock this morn-
ing and snowed to snow-
ed hard all day.

I went down to Geo.
Allan's school this fore-
noon. Bert. was there too.
I bought 1 peck of bar-
ley of Aunt Jamina
for 20¢

Charles Owen came over
to night and brought
Helen home.

Christmas

Pleasant and quite
warm.

Father and Mother went
over to Mr. Owen's to dinner.

This afternoon Ulysses
brought Clara and me up
to "Aunt Patsie's;" she stayed
to Aunt Woodworth's, while
Ulysses and I went over to
the Corner. I bought Clara
a hood ^{85¢} for a Christmas
present, a pair of shoes for
Carroll ^{90¢} Christmas cards for
the scholars ^{60¢} and paid
E. Wilder & Son on acct. \$10.00.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 26, 1883

Pleasant and quite warm.
Clara went down to Mrs.
Charles Wards to-day, and
I went down to dinner.
Hattie is quite sick
to-night.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1883

Looked some like rain.
Snowed some in the after-
noon, which turned to
rain at night.

Clara went down to
her Grandmother Smiths
and I went in and took
dinner with them.
Clara Smith's mother, Mrs.
Daggett was there.

W 88 FRIDAY, DECEMBER 28, 1883

Rained all night
last night and this forenoon
Wind came off and it snow-
ed and blowed hard this
afternoon.

Clara came in to school
a little while this af-
ternoon.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 29, 1883

Clear, cold and windy.
I hired Adna's horse
and borrowed Mr Lyon's
spring and we started for
home. Ulysses was out

to the "head of the tide"
and he took Clara and
the baby and carried
them home. I went over

to the Corner and got
2 bags of corn ¹⁷⁰ @ \$3.40

2 " " meal ¹⁴⁰ 3.20

1 bag cotton seed 1.75

1 barrel flour (Hatchers) 7.00

I got home about one o'clock

I carried Carroll's shoes back
to Levy's and paid him 10
making \$1.00

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 30, 1883

Commenced to snow about noon and snowed all the afternoon. I started for "Four Corners" about 8:45 this afternoon. I took supper to Mr. Smith's.

Mr. Lyons and Melissa went out to the Vestry to meeting this evening.

Ulysses went down to "Crows Neck" and Mabel came up with him.

Mother got dinner to our house.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 31, 1883

Cloudy all day, snowing a little in the forenoon. About 3 inches of snow fell. I paid Clara Smith 50 for the horse.

Mr. Lyons went out to the Vestry this evening to Water Meeting.

The "old year" goes out. Cloudy and raw.
