WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Albert F. Wentworth, a Constable in the Town of
Denmark, County of Oxford, and State of Maine,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Denmark, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1935, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To choose a board of selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, and treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 4. To choose a collector of taxes for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To choose a member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.

Art. 6. To choose one or more road commissioners for the year ensuing.

Art. 7. To choose one or more fire wards for the year ensuing.

Art. 8. To see if the town will elect or authorize the selectmen to appoint a cemetery commission, consisting of one or more persons whose duty shall consist of caring for the cemeteries and burial lots, including the graves of old soldiers now in the care of the town, for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 10. To vote the compensation of the tax collector for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to procure the services of a professional auditor to audit its books and accounts at the close of the fiscal year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of town charges for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of street lights for the year ensuing.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of snow bills for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of State aid highways for the year ensuing under the provisions of Sections 9, 18, 36, 38 and 39, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 20. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws of 1931.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes on the highways for the year ensuing.

Art. 22. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$637.00 for maintenance of the third class highway for the year ensuing.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen where to locate the third class road.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000.00 for rent of new tractor, this amount to be applied as part payment if the town votes to buy.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying the new tractor and snowplow.

Art. 26. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the purchase of new tractor and snowplow.

Art. 27. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$300.00 to be expended on the road from Roy Brown's by C. E. Smith's to West Denmark.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the support of common schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of school supplies and textbooks for the year ensuing.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of a free high school for the year ensuing.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights and power for schoolhouses for the year ensuing.

Art. 33. To see if the sum of \$23.00 or more will be raised for school nursing in the Town of Denmark, under the auspices of the Bureau of Health and Welfare.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the care of the soldiers' monument for the year ensuing.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Memorial Day observances for the year ensuing.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote that poll taxes be due and payable May 1st, under the provisions of Chapter 163 of the Public Laws of 1917.

Art. 37. To see if the town wishes to give a discount on taxes; if so, to fix the date and the amount of discount on same.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town. Such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes, or as soon thereafter as possible.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to adopt the State system of bookkeeping as recommended by the auditors.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$947.26 to defray the cost of fire of 1933 and give the selectmen authority to rescind any or all of this amount provided the Legislature should vote any reimbursement.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to pay the same scale of wages for road work as is paid by the State for the year ensuing.

Art. 42. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise as a payment on its permanent debt for the year ensuing.

Art. 43. To see if the people of Denmark will vote, as required by the State Law, to approve amateur sports on Sunday between the hours of 1 P. M. and 7 P. M.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House in said town on Monday, the fourth day of March, 1935, at nine o'clock A. M., for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of
Denmark :

Herewith my twelfth annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the schools of the Town of Denmark.

Schools began September 10, 1934, with the following teachers in charge :

East, Sadie Ingalls, Denmark.

Primary, Gladys Lowell, South Windham.

Grammar, Alice Edgecomb, Kezar Falls.

High, Principal, George D. Grierson, Denmark.

High, Assistant, Beatrice Sawyer, Bingham.

The elementary school year was planned for 32 weeks but we find that we shall be able to extend it to 34 weeks. This year we received from the State School Fund more than we expected, and also \$196.00 from the Equalization Fund, where we expected none at all.

Our schools are in good condition except that we lack new texts and some equipment. The schools are holding to the improved and approved curriculum. Our teachers, although underpaid for the quality of their work and ability, are serving loyally and well.

TEXTBOOKS

Our textbooks are generally in poor condition. Our geographies are of pre-war vintage in some respects and must be changed. Our arithmetics are also out of date. We need a general overhauling and renewal of many books. The library requires some accessions. We need at least \$300.00 on this account. This year it was necessary to set over \$50.00 from the State funds to meet our minimum needs.

MAINTENANCE

The overdraft in the Repair Account was caused by the expense necessary to complete the work on the well at East

Denmark. Unfortunately thus far this expense has been useless. Two State laboratory tests have shown the water to be unfit for drinking and cooking purposes. After the first test the directions as to purification supplied by the State laboratory were carefully carried out, but the second test showed the same condition as to the presence of colon bacilli, that is, intestinal discharge, as did the first test. Another test will be made during the spring. There must be some way by which this water may be made safe.

Very little other repair work has been done. The usual minor upkeep repairs have been made. Next season we hope to have another cement step at the primary entrance at the village building. The plastering, cracked in several places, must be attended to. If a catch basin and underground drain could be placed in the lower driveway it probably would prevent the constant washing after every rain. The upper driveway entrance is too narrow. Another length of culvert is needed. This should be done by the Highway Department.

MUSIC

The appropriation of \$160.00 for music has made possible a course in Public School Music for all.

This work has been under the supervision of Mr. John C. Gatchell. At the village building this year we have had the advantage of the musical ability and interest of Miss Sawyer, who has given freely of her time and skill. The progress in music this year in all the schools has been better than ever before.

CONVEYANCE

This year we are operating six conveyance routes at an expense of \$31.10 per week.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

February 1, 1935.

To the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. C. A. Snow, Members of the School Committee, and Citizens of Denmark, Me:

I offer my second annual report of the conditions and activities of Denmark High School. A year ago the same report was necessarily brief; this one however I hope to make more inclusive. School began September 10, 1934 with twenty-seven pupils registered as follows: seven seniors, five juniors, six sophomores, nine freshmen. The program consists of: General Science, Algebra, Advanced Mathematics, Geometry, Community Civics, Chemistry, French I and II, English I, II, III, IV, U. S. History, Latin I. Such a program covers the suggestions of the Maine School Finance Commission, as later reported, and was personally commended by Mr. Harrison C. Lyseth, Commissioner of Secondary Education. By enlarging the classes through the doubling-up process, the time of the teachers is more broadly distributed. Miss Beatrice Sawyer of Wheaton College succeeded Miss Randall as high school assistant, and in addition to her regular program of instruction helps the music instructor, Mr. Gatchell. Regular daily exercises in music are now conducted by Miss Sawyer not only in the high school but also in the grammar and primary rooms. The results of these efforts no doubt will be found in Mr. Gatchell's report.

Last spring, by means of the school play, every back bill of the school and the League was paid in full. Much consideration must be given the three seniors of 1934 who unselfishly allowed funds, which otherwise might have been placed to their credit, to be used for school purposes. I personally hereby thank them. Of the three graduates, one has continued her education by enrolling in a course of nursing in Portland.

The annual prize speaking proved successful, not only in an educational way but financially so for the winners. The

last day of the past school year was enjoyed by the student body at a picnic and swim on Moose Pond.

The school is again on the approved list and processes a Grade A qualification; consequently requirements in study and progress are strict and our hours are busy ones for all. No competitive sports with other schools have been indulged in, the chief reason being the expense necessarily incurred. Regular meetings of the School League are held and at present the treasurer reports a balance of \$13.78; the seniors have saved \$41.88 for a very definite purpose; the school play was successfully presented December 7, 1934, and is to be repeated as part of the West Baldwin winter carnival program, February 9, 1935; a Christmas tree and proper program was held Friday, December 14, 1934, and a school dance was conducted January 4, 1935.

During the fall term just closed an average daily attendance of 25.4 was maintained; tardiness and dismissals are practically negligible. Eight visitors favored us during the fall term. More are desired to see the pupils under actual working conditions.

As for the school building and its equipment, our library has benefited by the addition of several magazines, five volumes of American History and a new Encyclopedia. A rigid program of cleansing the building and disinfecting is maintained, and the pupils throughout the whole structure are gradually realizing that its upkeep is possible mainly through the taxes paid by the citizens of the town, and thus becomes a personal matter to keep it unmarked and in the best possible condition. In heating the building, economy is employed toward obtaining maximum comfort with minimum expense.

May I express my appreciation for the help and assistance rendered by the citizens, members of the school committee, and the superintendent of schools, Mr. Charles A. Snow.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee, and
Citizens of Denmark:

As I complete my third year of service in the schools of Denmark, I am happy indeed to report that this last year has been by far the most worthwhile of all.

The action of the town in renewing support of the music work was most helpful. In addition, the committee and superintendent were fortunate in securing an assistant in the high school who has an excellent musical background. Under my direction, she has not only handled the daily music work in the high school with good results, but she has also gladly taken the burden of this work in the two other rooms in the building.

As a result, both grade rooms are able to undertake the study of operettas, which it is hoped may be produced before the year is over. The primary room is doing consistently good work in its field, and the grammar room has been able to undertake with unusual success work in both sight and part singing. The chorus singing in the high school is, in my opinion, the best that it has ever been in every way: balance of parts, quality of tone, difficulty of work accomplished, etc.

At East Denmark, the good work is going on. The careful day teaching is producing a result which it would be hard to find excelled in any rural school of its size.

The children have sung publicly on several occasions. Among these may be mentioned: Graduation, Christmas entertainments, the East School at Church on Armistice Sunday, the High School at the Drama, and a group from the High School at the Western Maine School Music Festival in Lewiston last spring.
