

We have added 1 Ford Truck to our Department this year, the station crew has made a body for it and we are now carrying a total of 2,000 feet of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch hose in it. It makes a very convenient piece of equipment.

In closing, gentlemen, I wish to thank the Mayor, City Council and Police Department for the fine cooperation extended to me, also the Fire Department for the fine support they have given me.

#### SCHOOL WORK

I visited each class room in the grades each month. At this time an inspection of the pupils in each room was made. The past year I have planned my visits to the schools to take place the first week of each month. Any other time during the remainder of the month I am on call for any emergency which may arise.

The teachers, as always, gave splendid co-operation with me in every part of the school work.

A notice was sent to each parent of any child found with a defect. During the course of the year, 396 "Home visits" were made to the homes to aid in interpreting the notices and to assist the family whenever necessary and possible to have the defect corrected.

#### **CLINICS**

A "Summer Round-up" was held for the examination of all children who were entering school for the first time in September. Eighty-four children attended. The examinations were made by our physicians, an oculist and the clinic dentist. The teachers assisted at these clinics. Fifty children were inoculated for diphtheria and twenty were vaccinated against small pox.

In co-operation with the Maine State Department of Health, a tuberculosis clinic was held in Junior High and High School. At this clinic 249 pupils were tested, and twelve children re-acted to the test. In previous years this clinic has been followed by an x-ray clinic, but because of the war the x-ray machine has been used in the Camps at Portland, and our x-ray clinic has been postponed until September. There are some 80 children who are followed from year to year as necessary by x-rays, due to attend the next clinic.

Realizing the seriousness of the twelve new re-actors to the test this year, a home visit was made in the case of each, and eleven of the twelve were taken by the parents for x-rays. As the result of this, one child was admitted at once to the sanatorium, and one member of the family—a direct contact of the pupil.

Ten dental clinics were held at the office of Dr. Emery Howard, the clinic dentist. Children from the first four grades attended. The report of these clinics is as follows:

- 72 children attended
- 72 cleanings
- 129 fillings of permanent teeth
- 34 extractions of temporary teeth
- 8 extractions of permanent teeth

Small clinics were held at Knox County Hospital for the removal of tonsils and adenoids. Dr. Frederick Dennison performed the operations and the physicians gave the anesthetics. Both of these services were done gratuitously, the Hospital contributing its part by making no charge for the operating room, and not quite one-half fee for the room and board. Fourteen children were operated upon the past year at these so-called clinics. Glasses were provided for 12 children and paid for by the Rotary Club.

Twelve baby clinics were held, with an attendance of 326 children. At these clinics 108 children were immunized against diphtheria and 17 were vaccinated against small pox. Dr. Wesley Wasgatt has attended ten of these clinics, and Dr. Gilmore Soule, two. Many of our physicians refer their mothers to the clinics after the infant is a month old.

Three crippled children's clinics have been held in this district. I have assisted at these clinics and transported some of our local children who attend these clinics for treatment.

Two lectures in Public Health Nursing were given before the student nurses at Knox Hospital. Talks before the Rotary. Kiwanis and Lions Clubs have also been given.

Six cases have been investigated and reported upon. Ten social service cases were investigated, some of which were for out-of-State agencies; others with the State Social workers and City Matron.

In October we co-operated with the Kiwanis Club and the School Department in their project of sponsoring the noon lunch for the underprivileged children. I was assisted from October until March by the NYA girls with the clerical work in the office and in the schools. It was with regret we learned the project was closed. One day was spent in assisting the physician in his examinatons of all NYA girls working on the project.

This year we used the audiometer, a mechanical devise for the testing of hearing, in the schools. This is used, beginning at the third grade, through Hgh School. We hope to have the privilege of its use at least every other year. The audiometer was loaned to us by the Speech Readers Guild of Portland, and we do appreciate it.

From our practical nurses' registry, we have answered the call for fifteen cases the past year.

Our venereal disease work seems to be increasing and more time is needed to spend on tuberculosis work. We are stressing the need of immunization more than ever before, and the public is responding very well.

Our great objective for the year to come is public health teaching in nutrition, immunization work and service in tuberculosis.

In bringing this report to a close, I wish to assure you, and citizens of Rockland, that every effort is being made to improve the health and welfare of our community. Only with your continued support and confidence can this work continue to grow and serve.

May I express my appreciation to you, as city officials, serv-

ice clubs, Knox County Hospital, School Department, physicians and officers and trustees of the Rockland District Nursing Association. I feel that I owe whatever progress we have made to the co-operation of all other organizations and individuals with us.

To serve, and see the work grow, is a great privilege.

# AN ORDINANCE: AMENDING SECTION 1 CHAPTER XXX OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rockland as follows: That Section 1 of Chapter XXX of the Revised Ordinances be amended by striking out the words "nine o'clock in the afternoon" in the fourth and fifth lines of said section and inserting in lieu thereof the words "such hours as may be fixed by vote of the City Council," so that said section shall read as follows:

Section. 1. No child under fifteen years of age shall be or remain upon any street, alley or lane, or in any public place, restaurant, saloon or pool room in said city of Rockland in the night time after such hours as may be fixed by vote of the City Council unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other person having the legal custody of such minor, or the employment of such minor makes it necessary to be upon such street, alley or lane, or in such public place, restaurant, saloon or pool room after said hours. And to aid in the practical enforcement of this ordinance, it is hereby made the duty of the Fire Department to cause (five) strokes of the bell by which the fire alarms are given, to be sounded each night fifteen minutes earlier than the hour named.

Passed and Approved, July 6, 1942.

The policy of keeping repairs to the school building down to

a minimum during the hard times of the "thirties" made it necessary to do an unusually large number of repair jobs during the past summer.

The outbuildings at the Benner Hill school were in such a condition that they had to be torn down and a new building was built following specifications set up by the State Department of Education for modern rural schools. A new fence was built on the north side of the school lot and that portion of the lot adjacent to the new fence was graded up to level.

The ceiling in the teachers room at the Tyler Building had to be replaced and the room redecorated.

The City Inspector of Buildings, after a thorough examination of the three large chimneys on the McLain Building, ordered them to be torn down to a solid footing and then to rebuild to the original height. The brick walls of the building have needed to be pointed up for several years and a thorough job of repointing was done during the summer vacation. It was found necessary to rebuild the rolley-way as the frost had parted the old rolley-way from the building, which allowed water to flow over the fire room and girls basement floors. The slate roof was repaired and put in first class condition.

The roof on the high school building was given a thorough overhauling and several bad leaks which have been troublesome over a period of years were finally corrected.

The flashing at the cornice on the front and northeast side of the building had to be reset and the walls were pointed up wherever needed. Due to wear, it was necessary to insert new twiers within the stoker retort in the boiler and to reline the front on the boiler.

The outside of the Grace Street school was painted and renovated on the inside.

The old tubular boiler was removed from the Purchase St. school and a new ten section boiler was installed. Considerable repiping was necessary in the basement and modern safety devices were installed on the several steam lines running from the boiler.

The following is a brief summary of several changes made within the high school during the past year:

The war effort has demanded some changes in the high school curriculum. The high school has endeavored to change its program to meet the present day needs.

A course in Aeronautics has been started. This class is studying the theory of flight with its practical applications to serial warfare.

All pupils are taking part in a physical fitness program which is required by the State Department of Education. This program is designed to physically toughen young men so that they may better endure the hardships of modern warfare.

Voluntary military drills are being held once a week under the supervision of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the local State Guard unit. This training should give our boys some advantage when they are inducted into the armed services.

Our mathematics courses have been revised to meet the demands of the Army and Navy. The United States Department of Education has recently requested all schools to give pre-induction courses in electricity, radio, automotive mechanics, shopwork, and machines. We shall try to offer some of these courses using the teachers in the school who are best fitted to teach this type of work.

Rockland is fortunate to be selected as a location for high school machine shop course with complete equipment and instruction furnished by the federal government. This shop is equipped with 10 lathes, 1 power hack saw, 1 shaper, 1 milling machine, and small tools necessary for this work.

The installation of this course has made it necessary for Mr. Dana Cummings to take over vocational training. This field includes mechanical drawing, shop mathematics and related mathematics. Mr. Arthur Grinnell, a machinist of long experience, is teaching the machine shop course. The boys who finish this course will have a fine start for a job in defense plants or in the technical services of the armed forces.

The Federal Government inaugurated a policy of furnishing a half pint of milk to children in the schools at a cost of one cent per day. Approximately 50% of the children in the schools have taken advantage of this generous offer.

A war saving stamp program started in January, has gradually increased to the point where the pupils in the schools of Rockland are purchasing over \$300.00 each week. Better than 60% of the total enrollment are active participants in the program.

The school authorities in the city are trying to keep abreast of the ever increasing demands made by the various governmental agencies who are carrying on the war effort. It has necessitated much extra time and effort on the part of the faculty, but they have entered into every request without com-

plaint and I believe have done a creditable job and will continue to do so in the future.

In closing I wish to thank the citizens of Rockland and the School Committee for the fine support which has been given during the past year.
