WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31, 1883

Saturday.

Snowed quite hard most all day. Windy. Cold. I went to the Corner with Father this fore-noon. Elley came out and helped me saw and split wood. Mr. Smith bought a pig of Uncle Ira <sup>5.00 worth</sup> of man came in after Mrs. Smith to night.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1

Sunday.

Pleasant; Cold. Mr. and Mrs. Smith came over a little while. - Chas. and Cara came over this afternoon and stayed to supper. - We all turned out and helped Mr. Smith get his pig.

FRIDAY 2

Monday.

Looked very much like rain all day. Windy. - Ulysses, Arthur, Elley, and I started for Cooper this morning on a gunning cruise. I shot one partridge which was all the game we got to-day. Ulysses says a deer. Got to Chas. Smith's about 5.00 o'clock and will stay here. Xmas

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1883

Tuesday

Quite pleasant. We pounded apples and pressed cider, this morning. Ulysses, Arthur, and Elley went gunning. Arthur got a partridge and Ulysses got a sea-bird(?) - Helped Chas. put up a stage. All shingled. Went on Fourteen road to night.

SUNDAY 4

Wednesday

Pleasant. Cold. Windy. All went gunning. I got one partridge. - Chas. came down with potatoes and came down and stayed with me to night. He came down with him. Arthur shot one partridge coming down. Got home about 8 o'clock. Father plowed for me.

MONDAY 5

Thursday

Cloudy most all day. Father came out and helped me plow a little while and James helped me all day. Chas. Smith started for home for home about 9.30. Mr. Smith worked for Martha Ann.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1883

Friday.

Dull. Looked like rain all day. I put a new handle in my ax and went over to Mr. Smith's and ground it this fore-noon. Cut bushes this after-noon.

Mr. Smith cut bushes.

Benj. Carter stayed with Chris last night.

WEDNESDAY 7

Saturday.

Looked like rain all day. Commenced to rain about 4:30. I went over to the Corner this fore-noon. Doug. cleaned out ditch this after-noon and went over to Summer Vile's and got my sheep and lamb that have been in his pasture. Charges &c etc.

THURSDAY 8

Sunday.

Wet and raining all day. I went out to the road and stayed to dinner. Went over to see Hellington. — Clara went over home to dinner. — Father came out a little while this after-noon. — Mr. and Mrs. Smith and children came over to supper.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 9, 1883.

Monday.

Rained about all day. I dug out under the barn, and helped Mr. Smith kill his hog this after-noon.

SATURDAY 10

Tuesday.

Quite pleasant. I cut bushes. Helped Mr. Smith weigh his pig. Clara washed. — Grace came in from the road. Mabel had a baby **Boy** last night. — Allysia went to the Corner.

SUNDAY 11

Wednesday.

Snow-squally this morning. Quite pleasant. Windy. I hauled out and spread on grass-ground, barked apple-trees, and commenced putting the house. — Clara and Sarah went down to Aunt Nina's. — Mrs. Smith went down to Effie's. — Mr. Smith worked for Joseph & Son.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1883

Thursday.

Pleasant and quite warm. — I worked, banking the house, all day. — Clara and Helen went over to Clara Owen's. — Mrs. Smith went down to Effie's. — (Effie has a "darter") — Mr. Smith worked for Uncle Ira.

TUESDAY 13

Friday.

Looked like rain all day. I banked the house — hauled 16 loads with the steers. I went out to the oval tonight. — Clara spun. — I went over "home" and got dinner (baked spain-rib) — Clara cut Sarah's dress. — Mr. Smith worked for Mr. Buchanan. — Mrs. Smith went down to

WEDNESDAY 14 King Snell's.

Saturday

Rained about all last night, and this morning; Cloudy all day. — I went to the corner this forenoon. Cut a little wood etc. this afternoon. I went to see J. A. Shidley about my sheep getting in to his field, but he charged me nothing.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1883

Sunday.

Pleasant, windy. Father came out this morning, and we went out with him and stayed till four o'clock. — Clara Owen and Clara came over to Father's. I went down to the Holland place and over to see Grandmother's. — Mr. Smith took supper with us. — Grace and Helen came over this evening.

FRIDAY 16

Monday

Pleasant, cool and windy. I went out to go rock-weighing with Ulysses, but did not go. — Came home and cut wood this forenoon and banked the house this afternoon. — Ulysses got his hifer. — Helen, Calista, Rosette, Sizzie, Grace and Nancy neighbors, came out this afternoon and stayed till 1 o'clock.

SATURDAY 17

Tuesday.

Pleasant and cool. Windy. I cut wood this forenoon and banked the house this afternoon. — Mrs. Smith and Grace went to the corner.

Father killed his hog.

Wednesday,

Quite pleasant. — I cut wood, churned, barked the house, and wheeled five loads of leaves for hog-nest. — Mrs. Clara J. Wagner came out here, this forenoon, and to Mrs. Smith's this afternoon. — Grace went out to the corner. — Mr. Smith worked for Uncle Ira.

MONDAY 19

Thursday

Rained all last and today. I worked under the barn digging out for a place to tie "Betty". I went over to the corner towards night. — Mrs. Smith came over a spell this afternoon. — Eliza came out and brought out a piece of fresh pork.

TUESDAY 20

Friday

Pleasant. Cold. Windy. Pleasant and mild this evening. I went out and ground my ax this morning, and cut wood all day. — Father, Mr. Smith and the boys cut wood in the new road. — Mother came out and she and Father stayed till 8 o'clock this evening. Mrs. Smith went to the corner.

Saturday

Pleasant this forenoon; clouded up and snowed some towards night and evening. I cut wood. — We went over "home" to supper and stayed the evening. — Mrs. Smith and Eliza went to the corner with Balis's horse. — Father and Allen Brown went

Sunday

Pleasant, cool. Mr. Smith and Adna were here to dinner. Josiah Dunn, Fanny and three girls were here this afternoon. Josiah staid to supper.

FRIDAY 23

Monday

Pleasant. — I cut some wood. — Ulysses thrashed grain for me. — Herbert Robinson sawed and split wood for me. — Father and the boys cut wood beyond Mr. Smith's. — Mr. Smith worked for Uncle Ira. — Deborah Dunn came out to Mrs. Smith's (with Grace). — Grace went to the corner.

Wednesday.

Cloudy; windy. Looked like a storm all day. We all started for Cooper about 9:30 from Father's and got to Chas. Smith's about 1:30. — Had a very pleasant ride although quite windy. — Clara and I went over to Mr. Ireland's this evening.

Thursday.

Cloudy, Cold and very <sup>much</sup> windy. — I pressed some cider etc, and went down to Hassell Smith's. — Too cold to come home this afternoon.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 30, 1883

Monday.

Cloudy. Looks like a storm to-night. — I hauled wood with Father's oxen. — Herb. helped me. — Ulysses thrashed oats for me this afternoon. — Father killed one of his stags and sold  $\frac{1}{2}$  of it.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 1

Tuesday

Cloudy, Windy. Cold. I split, cut, and piled wood. — Ulysses thrashed oats. — Mrs. Smith went out to the road.

SUNDAY 2

Wednesday

Looked like a storm. I sawed wood to the door etc. Ulysses thrashed oats.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 3, 1883

Thursday

Cloudy. Commenced to snow about 2 o'clock this afternoon. Stormed till evening and then cleared off. — I sawed wood. Went up to Uncle Thom's and got my supper and then to lecture by Rev. L. H. Ting.

TUESDAY 4

Friday

Pleasant. — I sawed wood etc. — Clara went out to harvest. — Mother came out to Mrs. Smith's. Ulysses finished thrashing yesterday. — Mr. Smith went to the Vestry to night.

WEDNESDAY 5

Saturday

Snowed hard this morning. Turned to rain and rained about all day and hard this evening. Windy. — I finished putting the brush round the house etc. I went over to Mrs. Murry's this evening. All 5 of the male teachers met there except Port. Allan. (Poured)



WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 12, 1883

Saturday.

Pleasant. Cold.

Headed up gate, fixed Sarah's shoes, fixed pig in the pen, etc. — This evening, Arthur, Elley, Clara & I went over to the Corner this evening.

THURSDAY 13

Sunday

Pleasant. Cold this morning, moderate to night. Lizzy, Father and Mother came out and stayed, till after supper. He went over to Mr. Smith's this evening.

FRIDAY 14

Monday

Rained all last night, and part of to-day. Rains this evening.

Wellington was over to Mr. Smith's to supper and called in here this evening.

Grace came in from the "road" to-day and will stay here to night.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 15, 1883

Tuesday.

Quite pleasant. Buggy. Father killed his red stag.

SUNDAY 16

Wednesday

Pleasant, Cold. I went out to Father's this evening. — Father went to Eastport. — Clara washed. — Mr. and Mrs. Smith went to the Vestry to meeting this evening.

MONDAY 17

Thursday.

Pleasant and cold. Mr. Smith went over to Adna's this morning with me. — Mr. Murry came in to school this afternoon. — Adna S. Smith came over and got Clara's 2 sheep and 1 lamb @ 250 and 250.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 24, 1883

Thursday.

Cloudy. Looked like a storm this morning. Cleared off to night.

Clara and Grace went over to the Corner this forenoon. — I went around the Corner to night Christmas tree to Mrs. Smith's. Mr. Smith came home to night. Lots of presents.

TUESDAY 25

Thursday, Friday Christmas.

Pleasant and cold. — We went out to Father's and stayed till 3:45. — I got a quilt and I got a shirt. (from Mother) Myself and Grace came over and Chas. and Clara came up from Eastport. — Mrs. McDowell to Mrs. Smith.

WEDNESDAY 26

Saturday.

Cloudy, Cold, Windy. The wind increased to almost a gale and snowed and blowed hard this evening. A very rough day. — I went over to the Corner and sent for Sam and Fireside for U. C. Carter and Young Folks Circle for Florence S. Lyons. Made Clara, Mother, and Mrs. Smith each a present of a butter-knife.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1883

Sunday.

Wind blowed very hard and snowed all last night and to-day. — Mr. Smith started to go in the woods this after-noon. — I went out to Father's a few minutes.

FRIDAY 28

Monday.

Cloudy and blowed hard about all day. Cleared off. Pleasant towards night. — Hard work breaking road to school this morning. — Churned this evening. — Mr. Smart called in to school a few minutes this morning.

SATURDAY 29

Tuesday.

Pleasant, not very cold. Clara washed. — Mrs. Smith went to the Corner.

Wednesday

Pleasant and warm.  
Corra went up to  
Uncle Thais and came  
down with me to night.  
Fedna Smith me 4 of
